

Fire Dept. AGM Report

The Trustees of the South Quadra Fire Protection District would like to thank all those who gave up a sunny evening to attend our May 01,2002 AGM. We truly appreciate your support. As the Chair, I neglected to mention one very important item, which I would like to do now.

The Trustees of SQFPD wish to acknowledge the overwhelming support we have received from everyone who has worked on the construction of your new fire hall. Local business and contractor donations of labor and machine time are being received in the range of 15% to 25% below standard rates. Cash donations (Legion), individual person-hours (some going back 10 years or more, especially previous Trustees who looked ahead), are all giving this community an excellent facility at a reasonable cost.

For those of you who could not attend the AGM, I will give a brief synopsis of figures presented. These figures are from the audited Financial Statement and the presented Long Range Plan document which both must be filed in Victoria.

A handout was also presented which compared examples of fire insurance premiums (supplied by B.C. Land and

2 Trustees terms expired at the AGM, and an election was held with 3 candidates letting their names stand. Jim Evans and Ken Dinnes were elected to 3 year terms.

Many people expressed interest in seeing what goes into constructing a building to "post disaster" standards. After the general contractor has completed his part (mid May?), and while the walls are still open, we will ask you to come and tour your new Fire Hall. Watch for upcoming advertised date.

Campbell River-Quadra Island-Cortes Island Ferry Advisory Committee

The Regional District of Comox-Strathcona and the District of Campbell River have agreed to assist in the establishment of the Campbell River-Quadra Island-Cortes Island Ferry Advisory Committee to BC Ferries. The mandate of the committee is to advise BC Ferries on local ferry service issues in relation to the Campbell River to Quadra Island route and the Quadra Island to Cortes Island route; and to advise on inter-dependent ferry service and policy issues that may arise from time to time.

The local governments request citizens, groups and organizations interested in representing their communities on the Ferry Advisory Committee write to Doug Raines at the District of Campbell River, advising of their interest in being members of the committee and outlining their previous experience in serving in voluntary and interest based activities in the community. A maximum of 15 persons will be appointed to the Committee to represent Campbell River (5), Quadra Island (5), and Cortes Island (5). The Committee will meet a minimum of two times each year.

Once the Ferry Advisory Committee is formed, two members will be chosen by the Committee to represent the Campbell River - Quadra Island - Cortes Island committee on the Coastal Council to BC Ferries. The Coastal Council is made up of representatives of each of the 12 Ferry Advisory Committees and its mandate is to advise BC Ferries on inter-dependent ferry service and policy issues. The Coastal Council may meet up to four times each year.

There is no remuneration paid for service on the Ferry Advisory Committee. However, BC Ferries pays approved expenses incurred by members participating on the Committee. Interested citizens, groups, and organizations are requested to express their interest in writing, by May 31, 2002, to:

NOTICE OF PUBLIC COMMUNITY MEETING

TO DISCUSS THE PROPOSED CLOSURE OF SURGE NARROWS SCHOOL

The Board will also be discussing this proposal at its regular scheduled public meetings of May 14, June 4 and June 25, with the final decision being made on June 25, 2002.

ICP DECISION - Permit upheld with some improvements.

In December, 2000, Sierra Club of B.C. Quadra Group, Don McIver of Campbell River and Reach for Unbleached appealed the air pollution permit for the Island Cogeneration power plant (ICP). Both appeals were heard last June in Campbell River.


The Appeal Board released its decision last week. Although the permit was upheld and the appeals dismissed the Board ordered the following permit changes, which made it all worthwhile.

1. Oil. The permit as written allowed the government to authorize ICP to burn oil for more than 10 days per year. Reach for Unbleached and Sierra Club both made submissions on this issue as oil is so much more polluting than natural gas. We are very pleased that the Board agreed with us that ICP should not be allowed to burn oil if the price of natural gas rises again. They ordered the permit amended so that can't happen.

2. Low Load Conditions. Low load conditions at start-up or when there is not enough natural gas to operate at full load are the most polluting times of operation. The Board ordered the Regional Manager to amend the permit to address these circumstances instead of ignoring them.

3. Particulate Matter. The Board noted that Elk Falls pulp mill emits a huge amount of PM2.5 and PM10 emissions compared to ICP. However, recognizing that PM2.5 poses a serious health risk, the Board ordered that ICP do some PM2.5 stack emission monitoring and that information be made public. ICP has already paid for an ambient monitor for nitrogen oxides and ozone at the Elk Falls-Dogwood site.

The Board turned down the Sierra Quadra request for lower Nitrogen Oxide limits. As David Anderson, Federal Minister of Environment, pointed out back in Sept. 2000, ICP does not have the pollution control devices that other similar plants have. ICP said that their plant is so clean that it doesn't require further pollution controls. At the same time they objected to lowering



the permit levels for Nitrogen Oxides because, they said, it might not always burn as clean as the first test results show.

We were also concerned about emissions from the cooling towers. ICP said that sulphuric acid is not being used in the cooling water and that it is currently being treated with sodium hypochlorite (bleach). They also said that in the future, the water would be treated with other unknown substances. Our concern is for the people working and living in the area. The Regional Manager can amend the Permit if cooling tower emissions result in environmental concerns in the future.

The other benefit of the Appeal is the impact of our concerns on other project or power plant Applications dealing with air pollution. The Environmental Assessment Office referred to it during the Port Alberni power plant Application and the Min. of Water, Lands and Air also considered our points in the technical report for the Elk Falls coal test.

Once again we would like to thank everyone who helped with this. Sierra Quadra and Don McIver were represented by Bill Andrews, environmental lawyer and Reach for Unbleached were represented by their Board Chair, Counsel Lynn McBride. Sierra Quadra was mainly funded by West Coast Environmental Law's Dispute Resolution Fund with supplemental funding from Sierra Club and Campbell River Environmental Society. Both groups are grateful for funding from unnamed donors.

Standing up for clean air is never a waste of time. We may not always get all we want but the cumulative efforts of many people speaking out (as is happening on Vancouver Island), will make a difference.

Now based in Vancouver, he's earned a matchless reputation internationally for the excellence of his musicianship and the excitement of his live shows, whether performing solo or with band Bafing.


Diallo is a uniquely multi-talented artist. His dexterous acoustic and electric guitar playing, with its fluid melodic lines and compelling grooves, places him in the front ranks of African axemen. In addition he is a skilled and experienced performer on a variety of percussion instruments including the balafon, a wooden xylophone. To complete the embarassment of riches, Diallo writes his own songs, and his voice has a beautifully modulated edge. Writing about Diallo's latest album "The Journey," the Toronto Star's Geoff Chapman said that Diallo "achieves with this release what most African musicians have failed to do: he has created a classy Afro-pop synthesis of the continent's musical forms with western technology that won't infuriate the purist."

Hello! Thank you for your financial and moral support that you have extended to me and to my community for five years. Our children have gained a lot. We had our closing ceremony last March 14 with 14 graduates ready for grade one out of the 22 daycare children.

Mrs. Petra Durrance was our guest speaker during our closing program.

The children were able to do many activities in the daycare since they were supplied with materials like paper, pencils, notebooks and art supplies through IAT. There were also storytelling books which the children had enjoyed the most. We thank you for all these supplies since without them the children would not have been able to do these activities.

The program has really helped the community because when the children are in higher grades, it is easy for the teachers to teach them because of the special methods and strategies that we have been using in the Montessori daycare. The only way to get to Surge is by boat or float plane and the first man-made construct to greet the visitor is an antiquated but charming government dock on which is built the only post office for the outer islands group and an old store built on pile-ons in the 1920s by the Tipton family, still standing and in almost the same, charming condition. The store is run by Doug and Teresa, the dedicated couple who always have their store open and marine radio on. Up the hill from the store are the Al Murray Hall, (the community centre), Alvina Poitras Art Centre (the old quonset hut), the teacherage and the school, which is the subject of current contention. The **Campbell River School District is proposing** that Surge Narrows School be closed.

The history of education on Read Island began in 1894 with the opening of the original log cabin school in Burdwood Bay on the other side of Read Island. In 1921 another school was opened towards the south end of the island. Teaching conditions were a challenge and teachers changed frequently. In 1925 a school opened on the north end of Read Island at Surge Narrows. Both schools operated until 1935, when the north school closed until 1945 when it was opened again. The south school closed permanently in 1951 but the Surge Narrows School stayed open until 1964 when it closed for three years only to be re-opened in 1967-70 and



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1973. The school has remained open since 1977. In 1952 the first quonset hut school in B.C. was erected at Surge Narrows. This school was equipped with blackboards and a wood stove and was in operation until the late 1980s.

A brand-new 2 room school that is attached to the community centre was opened in 1990. Read Islanders requested a simple building that would provide room for the then growing population of 52 students. This new school has a large generator, cellular phone and photocopier. Al though not as simple as the islanders requested, people are proud of this school. The nineties saw a slow-down in the economy (fisheries and forestry) resulting in a population decline. There are currently 11 children registered but increased economic development in the oyster farm and eco-tourism industries have seen renewed growth on Read Island and the surrounding vicinity. There are currently 9 pre-school age children living in the area and the numbers are growing.

Residents are concerned about their school. It is very difficult for children to commute to another school Boat travel and even road travel on North Quadra is treacherous. The parents of this community want their children to have a public school education. The educational tax base for this area (Read Island, Maurelle Island, Sonora, Rendezvous and Northeast Quadra Island), according to our regional director, Jim Abrams, is more that \$258,000 The running of Surge School is \$120,000 a year. There are few public amenities such as hydro, telephone, public transportation, garbage pickup, police and fire protection. The school is one of the few services available. The economic growth of this small coastal community depends on this school staying open.

On June 14 the Board of School Trustees plan on coming to Read Island and have a public discussion of this possible closure. Without the school this community will suffer a great hardship. We are asking input from members of the community to save Surge Narrows School.

Quadra Daycare Changes Name

The child care centre formerly called Quadra Daycare, located adjacent to Blenkin Memorial Park on West Main Road, has been re-named and is now known as Quadra Children's Centre. Administrative Director, Dee Conley, says the name was changed, "*To celebrate what we do and to reflect that the children are the heart of it.*" It has come to the staff and Board of Directors' attention that the community may not really understand what the Centre offers. The staff and board invite the community to get to know the world of action, wonder and adventure that is Quadra Children's Centre.

There are three programs at the Children's Centre: A child care and preschool **program**, full-time or part-time, Monday to Friday, for children aged $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 5 years of age. "Some people think children have to be toilet-trained to attend this program," Dee says, "but they don't. We'll help with that process." The Quadra Kids Program is for school-aged kids during the school year, and includes professional development days. "On professional development days we provide full-day care which includes field trips and other special activities." Quadra Kids is housed in a separate building from the preschool program. This program is complemented in July and August by the Quadra Kids' Summer Program, which is available as a full-time, part-time or occasional drop-in program. All staff members have Early Childhood Education or equivalent training. But there is more to what the Centre has to offer.

"The care given to the children in all three programs is on a different level from basic child-minding," Dee explains. "In addition to providing a safe and comfortable place where children can spend the day, we offer programs that meet children's social, emotional, intellectual and spiritual needs."

Heady goals, and one might ask how they're met. Conley answers. "We respect the children and put them first. Collaborative relationships are the foundation of our work with the children and their families. We view the children as competent, inventive, and resourceful individuals. They're not vessels for us to fill up with information; they're partners with us in the learning process. We facilitate their learning by being aware of each child's interests and providing them with the necessary support to develop these interests. We are open to the wonder of where the children may take us."

Town Hall Meeting Report

April 30th was the most recent meeting of the ratepayers and residents. Gary Leitch and Ann Carpenter from BC Ferry Corporation presented an overview of how the public consultation process is to be implemented for the ferries serving our island. A Ferry Advisory Committee (FAC) would be set-up with five members from each of Campbell River, Cortes Island and Quadra Island for a total of fifteen members. Anyone wishing to be involved with the FAC is to forward his or her name to The District Clerk of Campbell River. The District Clerk would then forward these names to our three elected directors from these communities, who would then appoint fifteen members to become our Ferry Advisory Committee.

Several of the audience challenged this process of selection feeling that there should be a public meeting and members should be elected to FAC to ensure fair representation from Quadra. Seniors, Business, Trucking, Ratepayers, Search and Rescue, School, and Daily Commuters, are some of the groups needing representation from Quadra on this FAC. There was no resolution proposed to solve this selection process so it is up to our Regional Director or another organization to call this public meeting and elect our FAC representatives. The committee must be in place by September 1, 2002.

The counter-petition, regarding the Sunnydale Golf Course in Courtenay, and the Regional District's involvement in a lease agreement with the Golf Club was discussed. Counter-petition forms were available for signing. Jim Abram explained that 3,100 petitions were needed to defeat the lease agreement. Concern was expressed about the liability The Regional District might have to absorb if the Golf Club could not meet its obligations.

Bill Pirie gave a summary of the Church House Sea Farm re-zoning application with the result that because of a tied vote among the Regional Directors; the application was in limbo until another meeting in a month's time when the application will be heard again.

Following the formal part of the meeting everyone was given five stickers to place on any issue collected during the March 26th meeting so the issues could be priorized for future Town Hall meetings. Large displays were posted around the hall and people wandered around discussing and indicating their choices by placing stickers on the display.

The next Town Hall meeting of the Ratepayers and Residents will be June 11, 2002. The issue for discussion will be property taxes. Property owners should have their tax information by then.

Quadra Conservancy News

Those of you who were around 12 years ago and contributed to the purchase of the Morte Lake property, you are all members of the Quadra Conservancy. So for those who were not at the A.G.M., we missed you. But things go on and we did have a full annual meeting. Apart from the formalities we discussed the effects of logging around our, that is your property on Morte Lake, by Timber West. How close are they going to come to the property line? How is the planned road into that area going to affect us? We do not have any answers but we are in contact with Timber West so that we can protect our community forest as best we can. We also talked about the windfall from the storm in December. The skid road from the gate up to the lake is blocked by fallen trees. It was decided to leave things alone which is also in the spirit of the Covenant.

Then we heard about the plans Richard Schellinck has for lot 208. There is major storm damage in several areas and he is now creating access to those fallen trees to rescue them before they become unmarketable.

George Barabas reported on his collection of Eagle nest sites, which is an ongoing project. We have hope that with the knowledge gathered, somehow we can prevent destruction of those sites.

Then a motion was passed reading as follows: "That QICSS write a letter of appreciation to our regional director Jim Abram for all his efforts to achieve what are really the objectives of QICSS regarding the Raven Lands" This motion was passed on to Jim by letter.

If you happen to be interested in what we do outside being the guardian for the Morte Lake property in the form of covenanting and other issues that come our way, please contact us.

The "old" executive was returned by acclamation. They are: Stan Paterson, Joyce Johnson, George Barabas, Guy Holmes, George Murdoch, Janis McLean and myself. Any questions? Just phone us.

Lastly: If you arrived on the island after the Morte Lake property was bought and the conservancy was formed and you did not have the opportunity to make a contribution and become a member, you joining us now would be really appreciated. Dear Editor,

It was a surprise for me to move to Read Island, but there's the old expression "you can't leave your past behind." My one room school house experience was "mine" until we were bussed off to a big school and ours was closed. I could maintain quite an invisible profile, who knew me? And a sense of anonymousness took over.

Now, the responsibility as a mother finds me with two young boys enjoying school in another one room school at Surge Narrows. I see the flexibility of all ages playing together. The youngest child's interests extend to their older peers and instinctively the children follow the road best travelled. We are blessed to the point I would fear closure due to jealousy, that the larger, more stifling pressures, at bigger schools might lead the individuality of the students to deflate and be more vulnerable and prone to follow easier influences. Self-consciousness can be intense during these determining years and I watch the carefree selection of clothes grabbed and the un-brushed hair of these boys bounding out the door: Lets's go!

Their dynamic interest in the moment, I love. Their teacher, Tina Saunders, captures their attention with the educational proverbial carrot with delight and respect towards this unique situation.

At times there may be discrepancy in

behaviour. A bad egg in the group but with the need of friendship, the rough edges have more of chance to wear thin. With guidance resistance yields to co-operation. I hope I'm colouring the scene of our school.

Children come to the school on Read Island from all channels. The route from Maurelle Island is more challenging by boat. In winter, Beasley Pass is especially an obstacle for Robyn and Frieda in the winter months compared to the more protected waters of Hoskin Channel that the children from Northeast Quadra cross. Yet through gales and storms, children come.

Words sketch the very physical, diverse lives, the harshness of the trips to school due to weather, the loneliness where feelings of why one lives off the grid is odd to describe. People come from afar with curiosities and talents that equip them with this love of place for Read Island. And we have built homes and are concerned with the wholeness of our small community. The school is soulfully our centre. The children's education is so necessary to them. It is the school that educates as well as socializes and prepares them for the world.

Please continue your support of our children and school. I remember when I was 9 years old and the world was good.


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Dear Editor;

The April 26th issue of the Discovery Islander contained a letter to the Editor from Ted Conover of Quadra Island, regarding the South Quadra Fire Protection District (SQFPD). While I truly hesitate to enter into a media debate with Mr. Conover, the letter contains false information and the fact that it was published for the broad readership of both your newspaper and another demands that the record be corrected.

In his letter, Mr. Conover claims that the SQFPD is about to impose a tax increase on District landowners, of 26.57%. Some very creative math must have gone into the development of this figure, because, as he is well aware, the Trustees of the SQFPD deliberately reduced taxes this year. The below figures are from the duly-filed financial statements and tax collection bylaws.

The only figure that Mr. Conover has correct is the total amount of taxes to be collected for the year 2002, at \$157,653. As can be seen in the figures above, this represents a decrease of 11% from the previous year. The Department's operational budget has been frozen at the 2001 level, while taxes for capital expenditures have been reduced significantly. There's no fancy government-style accounting tricks here, folks, the SQFPD keeps a very straightforward set of books, administered by honest, dedicated individuals. The SQFPD tax rate is the lowest of almost any Fire Department located within the Comox-Strathcona Regional District, and District taxes are currently at their lowest level since 1994.

Mr. Conover has of late been crusading publicly against the level of taxes levied by government. Fine, more power to him, and I'm a strong defender of his right to free speech. He goes too far, though, when he begins to make up numbers to try to get attention, to the detriment of other peoples' reputations. Mr. Conover knows better; he has an accounting background and had the correct figures in his possession. It appears that he is so certain that he'll be overly taxed that he can't see when an organization is doing a good job, efficiently and at a good bargain to the taxpayer.

I would to thank all those District landowners that were interested enough in the operation of the South Quadra Fire Protection District to attend the AGM last Wednesday May 01. They were able to pick up copies of the financial statements and other documents and judge for themselves the quality of the representation they have been getting from the Trustees.

At the end of his letter, Mr. Conover offers to send anyone who asks for it information on the finances of the SQFPD. The SQFPD itself is a much better source for such information, without any personal agendas and complying completely with the requirements imposed on Improvement Districts by the provincial government. The information is a matter of public record.

Costco, Home Depot, Staples, you name it, I abhor them all. Notwithstanding the fact that they are of real benefit to those who need to watch their budgets, such as the families of my own grandkids, I have been steadfast in my belief that the negative aspects of such stores far outweigh the benefit of a mind-boggling assortment of goods at deeply discounted prices. But I really reserve my ultimate distaste for the big "W" - Wal-Mart.

While there is no shortage of like-minded people, the media has been very reluctant to opine on the subject. Why? Consider the fact that Wal-Mart spends billions (yes, billions!) of dollars a year on advertising, and now that the mass media here and in the USA is controlled by a handful of giants its easy to see that no-one would risk offending one of the largest media buyers in the world. But a fellow named Jim Hightower has written a piece entitled "How Wal-Mart is Remaking our World" (Alternet.org - April 26/02) that exposes some of the seedier practises of Sam Walton's retailing behemoth. It is my pleasure to share some of the juicier bits.

In case you didn't know, Wal-Mart is now the largest corporation in the world (based on sales), having dethroned ExxonMobil last year. Global sales exceed \$220 billion, which is larger than most nations entire Gross Domestic Product. But their PR and marketing people would have us believe "aw shucks, we're-just-folks-from-Arkansas, neighbourly small town shopkeepers trying to sell stuff cheaply to you and yours." Meanwhile, they rake in upwards of \$7 billion a year in net profit. And by the way, 5 of the 10 richest people on earth are named Walton. Says Hightower "Wal-Mart and the Waltons got to



the top the old-fashioned way - by roughing people up. The corporate ethos emanating from Bentonville (Arkansas) headquarters dictates two guiding principles for all managers: extract the very last penny possible from human toil, and to squeeze the last dime from every supplier". I'm quite sure that the new Wal-Mart in Courtenay is providing lots of new jobs in the area, but at what cost? It is estimated that for every 2 jobs at Wal-Mart, 3 existing retail positions at competitors will be eliminated. Wal-Mart employs more than a million people, and its personnel policies are positively draconian. So draconian in fact that the average employee turnover per store is over 50%, and has been recorded as high as 300%. Who would want to quit a job where full time work yields you a princely \$1,500 per month, sans benefits (it takes two years to qualify, and the employee pays the bulk of the premiums)? Where you get to start every workday pleading allegiance to your munificent employer by singing the company song? And god forbid if you even mutter the word "union". The company line "While unions might be appropriate for other companies, they have no place at Wal-Mart". Oh, and by the way, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission in the USA has filed more suits against Wal-Mart (where 70% of employees are female) than any other corporation.

Wal-Mart is equally repressive of its suppliers - they are so insistent on getting cheaper costs that they actually reserve the right to peruse supplier's books, and insist upon cuts of "unnecessary costs". And in their drive to achieve the lowest costs, much of their inventory now comes from overseas, where of course they are exempted from all those pesky North American rules and regulations. You know, unimportant stuff such as human rights, workplace safety, minimum wages and environmental standards. Wal-Mart is



now the single largest importer of goods made in China, at some \$10 billion per year. According to Hightower - "this company is the world's most powerful private force for lowering labour standards and stifling the middle-class aspirations of workers everywhere". Or even better - "This outfit operates with an avarice, arrogance and ambition that would make Enron blush". Wal-Mart protests that their suppliers must comply with it's "code of conduct", but refuses to disclose the name or address of any of the factories supposedly following the code. The National Labor Commission in the US has investigated Wal-Mart's suppliers in China, and was shocked by what it found in terms of working conditions, pay and workplace environments, which in many cases fell below minimal Chinese standards and regulations.

When I heard that Wal-Mart was coming to the north Island. I shuddered. It is a well-known fact that when Wal-Mart comes to town, competing merchants duck and cover. I share the same view as Hightower: "It hits a town or city neighbourhood like a retailing neutron bomb, sucking out the economic vitality and local character". When the company opened in Germany, the laws had to be-written to allow local merchants to compete, as it had previously been illegal to have a "sale". Wal-Marts incredibly low costs allowed it to devastate the German retailing industry in very short order, much as they are achieving in Canada. I think fondly of 3 names in retailing; Army & Navy, Hudson's Bay Company, and Woodward's. One is gone, one is ailing, and the third is thriving - Army & Navy. But Woodward's was special. It catered to everybody, did a great job, and provided good secure employment. Many, many people had full working careers at Woodward's, and retired relatively comfortably thinking fondly of their employer. Both my mother and myself worked for "The Bay". But I can assure you, had I been forced to wear a blue bib and sing each and every bloody morning, whilst earning little better than minimum wage, I don't think I would be a happy camper. Perhaps that is why the pregnant young lady who collapsed in the Nanaimo Wal-Mart last week was ignored by the employees (sorry. Associates). They were all too busy dreaming of the day when they wouldn't be working for Wal-Mart. I'm sure every staff member feels absolutely awful over the incident, but under the circumstances the blame must be pointed at the employer, which has mutated into an economic monster without a heart.

Give Me a Break!



Despite somewhat inclement weather, an enthusiastic group of Sparks and their leaders, Karen Abercrombie and Cheryl Jordan, were busy helping Mia Frishholz in the Quadra School and Community Garden last Saturday. Sparks are five to seven-year-old members of the Girl Guides organization, the age level before Brownies.

"We want to get the Sparks involved in helping the community, in order to introduce the principle of service in their daily lives. Working in the garden seemed a good way to do that," said Cheryl.

Cheryl decided to start up a Sparks group on Quadra last fall, as she really enjoyed being a Brownie when she was growing up. Her daughter, Raya, is one of the Sparks. Karen, who was a Brownie leader on the island in the past, was happy to get involved.

The Sparks gather every Monday from 2:45-3:45 p.m. for a structured meeting. During the meetings they play games and sing songs, work on a project such as a craft, and begin and end the meetings sitting in a friendship circle.

As well, the Sparks sometimes meet on the weekend for events such as hikes. In February they went on a hike in Paddy's Lagoon to collect items from nature for a craft project.

Last Saturday was not the first time the Sparks have worked in the garden. Two weeks ago they assisted with the planting of two Dogwood trees, one in memory of Karen Taylor.

"I'd like to see these girls continue to be involved in the community garden throughout their school years," said Karen.

On Saturday some of the girls sported their pink Sparks t-shirts, which are emblazoned with the Sparks promise: "I promise to share and be a friend." Sparks begin every meeting by reciting this promise.

"We emphasize sharing and taking turns to help the girls learn to cooperate with others," Cheryl explained. "We also help the girls learn how to be friends with others and how to make new friends."

When asked what they like most about being in Sparks, the girls were quick to provide answers.

"My favourite part of Sparks is making crafts," declared Alannah LeClere.

"I like playing games the best," chimed in Jessica Nutting, adding that her favourite game involves a teddy bear who also wears a Sparks t-shirt.

Cheryl and Karen have been introducing the Sparks to Girl Guides internationally, by looking at girls their age in different countries. One of their weekly meetings had a Mexican fiesta theme.

"We ate Mexican food, made maracas (a type of percussion instrument) out of paper plates, and danced a Mexican hat dance—all in one hour!" recalled Karen.

Next Monday the Sparks meeting will have an English tea party theme. The girls will have tea, make a craft, and talk about what Sparks in England do. Karen noted that they are planning to have more theme meetings in the fall.

Cheryl and Karen said they have been grateful for assistance from parents and other community members in organizing activities for the girls. As part of their Community Studies, the Sparks enjoyed visits from a policewoman and a female firefighter. Now they are learning gardening techniques from Mia.

"Part of the Sparks program is to provide role models for the girls," observed Karen, adding that they are very interested in having guests from the community attend meetings to share their skills with the Sparks.

There are 12 Sparks in the group and half are ready and eager to move on to Brownies. However, there is no Brownies group currently meeting on the island and there hasn't been one for many years. Brownies are seven-nine year old girls (grades 2-4).

Cheryl and Karen would like to encourage any women who are interested in leading a Brownies group to call them for more information. Girl Guides Canada stipulates that its leaders must be women 19 years of age or over, but otherwise it is open to anyone.

"You don't have to have children of that age to become involved. My girls are 24 years old now, and I have really enjoyed becoming involved with the Sparks group," Karen stated.

Two or three leaders are needed in order to make a Brownies group a reality. According to the Guider's manual, Brownies is "an active program in which girls can have fun while learning new things and developing habits of service and stewardship." In Brownies the girls start working towards service and skills badges. They also do lots of outdoor activities.


Sparks will run until mid-June, and then take a summer break before starting up again in September. If leaders are found, Brownies will begin in September.
