### Heron Talk-Biology, Status and Stewardship

The Heron Working Group, c/o the Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection (MWLAP) states that the Pacific coastal subspecies of Great Blue Heron is designated as a "Species of Special Concern" by the Committee on Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC) and is "Blue-listed" or vulnerable in BC due to productivity declines and habitat threats. Continued concern over large colony failure, colony abandonment, habitat loss and Bald Eagle predation suggests that a serious decline in Great Blue Herons is imminent.

In response to heron declines the Heron Working Group continues to organize monitoring and research of heron nest colonies on Vancouver Island, the Gulf Islands and the Lower Mainland. This information will help biologists hone population estimates and trends and aid in the stewardship of both marine foraging and nesting habitat.

On Monday at 7:30 pm, November 25 a talk and slide show will be given at the Community Centre on herons covering their biology, status and stewardship. Presenters include: Trudy Chatwin of the Heron Working Group and Rare and Endangered Species Biologist (MWLAP); Blair Hammond of the Canadian Wildlife Service, and; Ross Vennesland, heron contractor. Blair Hammond will discuss stewardship options for landowners with significant natural features. Ross Vennesland has completed his thesis on the effects of disturbance on breeding herons and will cover life history aspects, colonies and movements.

### **Talk by Ruth Masters**

Ruth Masters will be suggesting various creative ways of dealing with the current threat to Planet Earth's existence as a result of pollution and plant/animal extinctions. Ruth is a deeply commiteed and inspiring environmental activist who will be speaking on the topic "Why I am an Environmental Activist." ## **Orchid Ensemble**

The Quadra Island Recreation Society Cultural Committee is pleased bring another wonderful concert to the Quadra Island **Community Centre on Sunday December 1st at 7pm**. The Orchid Ensemble is a trio of musician in full musical bloom. Traditional Chinese tunes are improvised with jazz and the sounds of the Middle East, interweaving melodic lines and complex rhythms.

The Ensemble formed four years ago and has completed a number of very successful North American tours. In 2000 their recording debut was critically acclaimed across the country and won two Pacific Music Awards nominations.

Dynamic fusion of colorful tones, exotic musical instruments, and incredible musicality describe the concerts of the Orchid Ensemble. Sometimes it showcases the serene beauty of Asian music, and at other times, the musicians' high energy on stage just shine.

Lan Tung, the leader of the Orchid Ensemble, studied music professionally at the Chinese Cultural University in Taiwan. She immigrated to Canada with her family in 1994, and she has since then been very active around Vancouver improvising with blues, Gypsy, swing and Celtic bands, as well as being involved in innovative projects based on free improvisation. Lan Tung is a master of the erhu, a two-string stick fiddle played while held on the lap. An ancient instrument, the erhu was introduced by the Mongolians to China by the Tang Dynasty in 598-906 AD.

Mei Han is one of the world's leading authorities on zheng, a half-tube zither with movable bridges and 21 strings. This instrument can be traced back in China to 475-221 BC. Holding two master degrees, including UBC's ethnomusicology, Han has given lectures and demonstrations on the zheng internationally.

The marimba player and percussionist Jonathan Bernard performs wide ranges of instruments, from Middles Eastern drums, Chinese opera gongs, to Turkish bells. Jonathan is the principal percussionist with





the Vancouver Island Symphony Orchestra. Also he has performed with Vancouver Symphony, the National Ballet Orchestra, and Vancouver New Music.

Tenoch is the son of a wealthy Mexico City politician. His best friend, Julio, shares a tiny apartment with his mother and sister. Tenoch and Julio come from separate worlds, but they are best friends and, at age seventeen, share a numero uno preoccupation: women and sex.

Its summer and the boys are at loose at ends, until they meet Luisa; the lustrous, neglected wife of Tenoch's older cousin. To impress her, they invent a beach holiday and invite her along. When Luisa calls their bluff they must show their cards. Astonished by their fortune and the erotic possibilities of a station wagon they embark on a road trip that will change their lives.

The film promises more than an adolescent male fantasy. Director Alfonso Cuarón's frank attitude towards sexuality is in stark contrast to that of mainstream American movies. He goes where similar films fear to tread, exploring the blatant competition and latent homoeroticism of teenage mateship and the complicated mix of need and lust which drives sex between people of different ages.

The charm of the film comes from the constant collision of events and intentions. "It's a film of amusing non sequiturs that instinctively make sense."

The story of a group of Danish thirtysomething singles in an adult-ed class might seem a conventional romantic comedy, but Lone Scherfig, the writer-director, has "made a film so unabashedly hopeful that it actually makes the heart soar."

Andreas is a new pastor living in a hotel while he waits for the previous pastor to vacate his quarters. Jorgen, the desk manager, is beginning to despair that he'll ever find a woman, befriends the minister. Shy, clumsy Olympia works at a baker's shop and lives with a despot of a father. Giulia is an attractive and generous waitress at a local restaurant. The sharp-tongued Halvfinn, who also happens to be Jorgen's best friend, manages the restaurant. Halvfinn is drawn to Karen, who runs a haircutting salon. These characters engage in an elaborate courtship dance until, during a vacation they take together in Venice, each relationship is clarified - one way or another.

### Letter to Editor

Re: Amnesty International

I am writing to express my deep concern about the notification of meetings of the Quadra Island Branch of Amnesty International (AI) published in the November 8th, 2002 edition of the *Discovery Islander*. The notice gives the date and time of the next meeting and then states; "We would like to welcome *all interested women* to join us".

I consider it outrageous that a branch of AI exercises discriminatory, exclusionary practices in its invitations to its meetings. This is certainly a moral and quite possibly a literal breach of the ethics of AI. It is an affront to the very core of the reason AI exists. AI's essential work on behalf of so many victims of inequitable governments, regimes and judicial systems will be compromised if the organization, or any part of it, is perceived as being bias on the basis of gender or for any other reason.

I hope the Canadian Anglophone Branch of Amnesty International will urge the local Quadra Island branch to end its discriminatory recruitment practices.

### Done Deals Behind Closed Doors

Area J Local Government

 $\sim$  a Rate payers and Residents Report

Several local citizens at a recent public Ratepayers and Residents meeting wanted to learn about the activities of the Area J's Advisory Planning Commission (APC). Attempting a follow through on this issue has proven quite challenging for your Ratepayers and Resident's executive committee. Even though several dates were proposed, Area J Regional Director Jim Abram made it known that he is not able to attend any public meetings regarding this topic before the end of the year. With all APC members appointed by him and reporting to him, it makes little sense to hold a meeting to discuss the composition and role of the APC without the Regional Director being available to respond to questions.

Further, Director Abram told one member of your Ratepayers and Resident's executive committee that an advertisement would be submitted to the *Discovery Islander* asking peopleto submit their names, to him for consideration to be appointed to his APC. To date this advertisement has not appeared and the termination of office for the current APC appointees is December 31, 2002. This does not leave much time for those others who could be interested in APC activities to become involved.

What little information on the APC that we were able to obtain certainly was not reassuring. We understand that behind closed doors the APC is currently assisting the Regional Board planners to rewrite the Quadra Island zoning bylaws. The alarming aspect of this process is that it appears to be taking the place of early public involvement. As the veterans of the previous bylaw re-write will remember, the interested public had a chance to be involved right from the early draft stage on, and that involvement proved to be really important. There will be a public meeting on the revised bylaws as part of the approval process, but by then there will be no room for any significant changes, and then it will be the usual take-it without

being able to leave-it situation.

From the perspective of the Regional Board planners, it appears that dealing with the small and selectively appointed APC is a very convenient substitute for the messy process of having to listen to any of Ouadra Island's interested "unwashed public". Moreover, to make doubly certain that the public is not stirred up with any information beforehand, the Regional Board even adopted a bylaw that effectively muzzles the APC members, just in case any of them do not get the message that they are only to talk to the Board and its staff.

**Comox-Strathcona Regional District Bylaw # 23** reads (in part): "No member of the Advisory Planning Commission shall, on behalf of the Advisory Planning Commission, make representation, either verbally or in writing, to any member of the public, government agency or other meeting, unless they have been directed to do so by the Regional District Board".

Another concern of your Ratepayers and Resident's executive committee relates to public involvement in the discussions leading to the formulation of a Regional District budget for 2003. The preliminary budget for the Regional District has to be completed by November 30, 2002. In this connection, we hoped to be able to provide input into this process or hear what is being proposed. When the Regional District representatives attended a meeting here on Quadra Island during June of this year, we were told receiving input at a local meeting beforehand would not be a problem.

Subsequently however, we are now informed that they are unable to discuss budgeting with us at a Ratepayers and Residents meeting, as apparently our Regional Director is to hold a public meeting sometime in the future to inform us of the budget that will have been set. Naturally, of course by that time, it will be far too late for any significant input or changes by taxpayers.

As it seems, appointments to Area J's Planning Commission and Regional District's budgeting process continue to be done deals behind closed doors, consequently the planned public meetings for November and December had to be cancelled. Your Ratepayers and Resident's executive committee could not schedule other willing and knowledgeable speakers or otherwise provide meaningful information to ratepayers and residents on these impending and important issues.

prosecutor, was granted bail on Wednesday, but was then promptly re-arrested by the INS. The scariest thing about all of this? Were it not for the visit to Ottawa by Secretary of State Colin Powell, also on the 14<sup>th</sup>, he would likely still be in a Maine jail cell awaiting a distant trial. Powell, who had heard of the matter, called it "an unfortunate incident".

So Michel will likely have to face the bother, expense and obvious risks of a trial next year, unless somebody goes to bat for him and requests that the US government drop the whole embarrassing mess. I'll bet he doesn't even care if they apologise, which of course is an impossibility. So I've decided to send off a copy of this missive to the Right Honourable Jean Chretien (whom I doubt gets to see the Discovery Islander very often) and ask him to make a call to his colleague George and ask him to put in a fix. Tell him we'll make it up to him some day. I'm sure that would do it, and then Michel could merrily continue to buy his gas at Ouellet's Gas Bar. But what is more likely to happen is that he will simply stop going to the USA, if his comment is any indication of intent. "Don't go to the United States, don't set foot there" was his advice to fellow Canadians. And who suffers most? Probably the guy who owns the gas station, who has seen his sales plummet by over 70% as Michel's friends and neighbours heed his advice.

Rex Murphy recently wrote of Michel – "Our guy went down the street for gas. He was less of a threat to the United States than Tweety Bird sent out on a mission by Mr. Rogers. And the way he's been treated ever since, and by implication the rest of us Canadians, has been a compoundofmiserablepettiness and a direct contradiction of how Canadians, when given the chance, have treated Americans when they fell into our hands." Many of you have probably also heard the tale of the Ottaw business executive who was hauled off to jail while switching planes in New York, a stop on his journey from Tunisia to Montreal. He was eventually deported - to his birthplace Syria, not his Canadian home. Even though he is a Canadian citizen, they send him to Svria! Under the new rules down there he was held incommunicado. and his family were unable to contact him or be contacted by him. Can you imagine the trauma this must have caused all those concerned? At the time of writing he is being held in Syria, and neither the Canadian or US governments are saying anything, although the US is convinced he has terrorist ties. This, in spite of the fact he moved to Canada at age 17 and has never been to Syria since he emigrated.

A tape purportedly produced by Bin Laden has specifically identified Canada as a target. along with 4 other nations in addition to the USA, and the need for vigilance and a heightened level of security is real. But what is happening right now is obviously overkill, and may do serious damage to relations between the two countries if left unchecked. Sadly, it is unlikely to change anytime soon, not while one country prepares for war. One final note about Michel. There was standing room only at the Quadra Legion as a full crowd packed the building for the annual Remembrance Day service. In attendance were islanders of all ages from babies to veterans, as well as 14 members of Canadian Forces 19<sup>th</sup> Wing Comox.

Cliff Hand led the service, beginning with everyone singing 'O Canada'. Following the hymn, 'Abide With Me', the audience was treated to a recitation of 'In Flanders Fields' by three Sprites and five Brownies.

In his address, Cliff focused on the poet, John McCrae, who penned his now famous lines on a piece of scrap paper during an enemy attack.

"McCrae was inspired when he saw that following the heavy bombardments of the First World War, poppies flourished in the chalk soils in the Flanders area, which had become rich in lime and rubble from the demolished buildings," Cliff said.

Cliff went on to sat that although the poet speaks of Flanders Fields, the subject is universal: the fear of the dead that they will be forgotten, that their deaths will have been in vain. Although McCrae did not live to see his poem recognized, his message endures in the symbol of the poppy.

"The poppy is now an international symbol of remembrance for our war dead, and on November 11 many millions of us are proud to wear poppies on our jackets," Cliff said.

Cliff paid tribute to the tens of thousands of Canadians who rest in graves far from home.

"They fought alongside their friends, family, and Commonwealth counterparts on land, on the sea, and in the air, in some of the bloodiest battles of the wars."

After a two-minute silence to honour those who have died during wartime, Rob McKerracher played the evocative notes of 'Lament' on the bagpipes.

Representatives from the regional district, RCMP, Canadian Forces 19<sup>th</sup> Wing Comox, Quadra Island Legion, Ladies Auxiliary, Quadra Seniors, Quadra Island Volunteer Fire Department, Sea Cadets, and Brownies then laid wreaths under the cross at the front of the stage.

When the service was over, members of the crowd filed outside to pay their respects at the cenotaph. While four members of CFB Comox stood in the Sentinel position, people came forward to pin their poppies on the wreaths.

Inside, the Ladies Auxiliary had laid out a tasty lunch and many people stayed to socialize. Quadra Legion president D-Jay Keim observed that this year's turnout for the service was the best one yet.

"Every year it gets better, with more participants in the service and more members of the public joining us," she said.

D-Jay added that it was great to have the Sparks, Brownies, and Sea Cadets involved in the service, as well as lots of children in the crowd.

Sea Cadet Ashley Williams, who is 12 years old, said she enjoyed being involved in Remembrance Day at the Legion. Along with the other Cadets, Ashley was smartly attired in her uniform and shiny black boots. Six Sea Cadets from the Campbell River branch live on Quadra.

"I joined Sea Cadets in September. We just got back from an 'onboard' practice for

Remembrance Day at the Navy Hall, where we polished our boots and fixed up our uniforms for today," Ashley told me.

Captain Chartrand was one of the members of  $19^{th}$  Wing Comox who attended the service on Quadra this year.

"Our members love coming to this service," he said.

George Norman, a World War Two veteran, said he never misses the Armistice Day service. Dressed in his uniform decorated with several medals, George told me about some of his experiences during the war.

George was in the Army Service Corps, and served in Canada, England, Sicily, Northwest Europe, Holland, and Germany. He travelled from Canada to England on the *SS Arbida*. Onboard conditions were crowded and half the troops were seasick.

George went to North Africa on the *Duchess of Richmond*, and from there to Sicily in a landing craft. Their arrival in Sicily was peaceful, but they soon saw action against the Germans in Leonforte. George's unit was on the front lines, right behind the infantry.

"From there it was bad all the way. The Germans were tough. It was two miserable years," George recalled.

George's unit went to France and from there up to Holland and Germany. They were in Germany's Black Forest when peace was declared, but they didn't find out until two days afterwards.

Sam Hooley, Quadra Legion vice-president and a World War Two veteran, said he was very pleased to see the impressive turnout at the service.

"I always get choked up thinking about all the friends I lost in the war. I also think of all the friends I had on Quadra who were vets. Many of them are gone now too," Sam said.

On behalf of the Legion, Sam thanked all those who donated to this year's poppy fund. The money goes to assist veterans and their families in need on Quadra.

"I've been a Legion member for over 50 years. The Legion does a lot of good for a lot of people," Sam said.

My stomach rumbled, as I contemplated the irony. "But one does need money to buy the chow..."
