2004 Property Tax Increases.

"Unacceptable and Unaffordable"?

Quote from the Ministry of Provincial Revenue, Budget Bulletin 2003-02-28: "For the 2003 calendar year and future years, average residential school taxes before application of the home owner grant will be increased by the provincial inflation rate in the previous year."

The Budget Bulletin reports further that "In 2003 and future calendar years, average residential provincial rural area property taxes will be increased by the provincial inflation rate in the previous year The average tax increase will be 2.5% for 2003, matching the tax increase for residential school taxes."

Meanwhile, the Comox Strathcona Regional District Budgets project their 2004 tax requisition for Area J (i.e. for the most part, Quadra Island property owners) to be increased by 21.66% over their imposition for 2003. This will result in a total increase of 86.73% for the prior eight years (averaging 10.84% per year), compared to this year's of 53.48% over the last seven years, (an average of 7.64% per year, certainly much greater than any annualized inflation rates). Who has income that average such annual increases?

Apparently neither the provincial government nor the Regional District utilizes the zero budget analysis techniques for cost benefiting services to be provided, but rather they simply just increase taxes rates imposed previously. It this so, simply because of taxpayers are totally apathetic when it comes expecting governments to be responsible? Who was it that said such tariff increases were "unacceptable and unaffordable"?

The upward momentum of the major stock indices of late has not gone unnoticed, and is worthy of comment. Since hitting its low in March of this year, the Dow Jones Industrial Index is up 20%, while the NASDAQ is up 28%. Does this mean we have entered a new bull market in stocks? In a word - no. But try telling that to the people who are buying Air Canada shares today, in spite of the fact there is a 99% chance that the stock will become worthless, no matter the form in which the company emerges from bankruptcy protection. As usual, I look to the fundamentals of the market to make any determination as to future expectations, and right now those fundamentals and the future outlook both stink.

There is a very simple reason for this. While the market is still down dramatically from highs previously achieved three years ago, the underlying problems (which helped propel the markets to those highs) still exist, if indeed they are not worse. Three elements point to a weak market for some time to come; poor profitability, excess capacity and price stagnation. In fact, some economists warn that we are actually on the cusp of experiencing deflation, and markets definitely do not thrive in a deflationary environment. North American markets currently resemble Japan's of a decade ago. Since the market crashed in 1989, the Nikkei has seen 5 occasions where rallies drove up the value by more than 25%, only to fall back shortly thereafter. After 14 years, investors in the Nikkei are still short 80% of the 1989 values. Japan entered this period with significant excess capacity, and still has the problem. Meanwhile, the USA only utilises 73% of its manufacturing capacity, which worsens to 65% in the semiconductor/ electronic components sector, and a dismal 50% in the telecommunications industry. This is all due to the general foolishness that reigned supreme during the late 1980's and 1990's, where it seemed that everything would keep going up. Remember the late 90's book "Dow 36,000"? There is a lot of excess capacity that has to work its way through the system, and that process usually unfolds both slowly and painfully.

Deflating Expectations

And that leads us to the crux of the matter - asset stagnation and/or deflation. Writing recently in The Nation. William Greider offers a stark assessment. He predicts that unless the USA abandons it present reckless economic policy, deflation is just around the corner. "Declining prices, if they persist generally, create a viscous spiral of negatives - falling profits, more closed factories, shrinking employment and incomes, accompanied by waves of failing debtors, both corporations and families. In short, a far larger calamity that stagnation". Personal debt is now at a ridiculous 130% of disposable income, up dramatically from levels of the mid 1990's. Corporate debt is no better. In fact, corporate and private debt now adds up to a whopping 200% of US GDP. So the individual family now has \$130 in debt for every \$100 in income, and the USA as a whole owes more that \$200 for every \$100 in economic output. This cannot be sustained, and something will give - soon. Add to the mix the still growing US trade deficit, as well as an economic policy that provides little to no economic stimulus and vou have a recipe for disaster. Greider notes that the present administration's policies seem blind to notion of deflation, and at present only 4 of the 19 governors of the Federal Reserve are concerned at the prospect of deflation. All 4 have made close studies of the Japanese situation, and see parallels in the US economy.

It is truly remarkable that such a situation is being allowed to happen, especially with Republicans in control of the government. One of the bedrocks of Republican principles is that of fiscal responsibility, and has in the past created policies that honour that principle by pursuing legislative policy that have included both spending cuts and taxes hikes. Today's GOP is a completely different animal, seemingly blind to the economic precipice they are approaching. Having

inherited a projected \$5 trillion surplus, their tax cuts and spending increases have not only wiped out the surplus but are estimated to create a projected \$10 billion deficit. Clinton's Democrats, inheriting a large deficit from Bush the elder, quickly moved to increase taxes and cut federal spending, which in a relatively short time erased the deficits accumulated by the two previous Republican administrations. It is now time to take the medicine again, but given how the state of the economy cost his father his re-election, it is unlikely George W. will head anywhere in that direction. Therefore it is guaranteed that the present policies will not change until after the 2004 elections, if at all.

So no matter how enticing the present upward trajectory of the markets, don't be fooled. Canada rarely if ever escapes the impact of a US recession, and with a possible small "d" depression being projected by some of the more conservation economic commentators, it is a very poor time to be entering the markets. Of course, there are always some enticing individual stocks, but they are very hard to pick. Greider writes "The market signal of a small-d depression might be saying: Don't invest more in the old stuff since we've already got too many shopping centres. Start investing in "problems" the country has long neglected see these really as economic opportunities." He then goes on to suggest investing in things such as alternative energies and technologies, healthcare and transportation. Preferably smaller firms that are more nimble and that do things differently. In other words, do your homework and invest using your head, not your heart. Unless you were born in the 1920's, there likely hasn't been a more dangerous time, economically, than the present. Be very careful, as all of the economic signals that I see are now flashing yellow.

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


GOD'S CHART

Tardis Expeditions: Hiking Tours on Quadra Island

ne of the main attractions of a visit to Quadra is the island's extensive network of hiking trails. According to volunteers at the Quadra Tourist Info Booth, more and more people are coming to Quadra looking for active outdoor experiences such as hiking.

Tardis Expeditions, a new company owned and operated by Quadra resident Steve Trayler, is tapping into the growing demand for guided outdoor experiences on the island. Offering a variety of hiking tours complete with door-to-door transportation and hearty lunches, this eco-adventure company allows visitors to explore the island's trails with a knowledgeable local guide.

Steve named his company 'Tardis Expeditions' after the time machine in the British sci-fi television series 'Dr. Who'. 'Tardis' is an acronym for 'Time And Relative Dimensions In Space'.

"The name seemed like a good fit because hiking in the wilderness on Quadra does feel like another dimension for visitors who lead stressful city lives," said Steve.

Steve invited me along on a recent guided tour of the Maud Island/Seymour Narrows trail. He planned the June 15 hike to coincide with one of the biggest flood tides of the year, knowing we would be treated to views of spectacular whirlpools at the entrance to the Narrows.

During the drive to the trailhead in the Tardis Expeditions van, Steve provided information about various points of interest

along the way. He also went over basic safety procedures, explaining that we would be hiking with a first aid kit, cell phone, and VHF radio.

Our group of six hikers set off from the starting point near Morte Lake, after Steve led us in a series of warm-up stretches. The sky was clear and a light breeze sang softly in the trees.

As we hiked on the Quadra Conservancy property towards the lake, I asked Steve what attracted him to becoming involved in the eco-tourism industry.

"I've always been an outdoors person and I enjoy working with people," he

replied. "When my government job in social services ended, I started looking at how I could combine these qualities in a new career."

Steve went on to say that working as a hiking guide is an ideal way to show people the best of what Quadra has to offer.


"This job allows me to share what we have and give people an awareness of its fragility and beauty," he said.

Steve started researching his business idea last year. This spring he became a Certified Level One Eco-Interpreter, after taking a course taught by Rod Burns at Bold Point Centre.









Starting up Tardis Expeditions was a considerable amount of work. After purchasing the former North Island Therapeutic Riding Society van, Steve acquired the necessary liability and vehicle insurance and licenses. He and his wife, Susan, outfitted the business with backpacks, whistles, and rain ponchos for every hiker.

Each backpack sports the Tardis Expeditions logo, designed by Lesley Matthews, featuring a kingfisher against a view of mountains and ocean. A closer look reveals that the backdrop doubles as the iris of a human eye.

Susan Chickite embroidered the logo on the backpacks, as well as Steve and Susan's shirts and jackets. Rob Simpson created the decals for the van and Philip Stone designed the company brochure. The Tardis Expeditions website is currently under construction by Jo-Anne Moore.

After briefly skirting the lakeshore, we turned left onto the trail that leads to Maud Island. Steve, who volunteers with the Quadra Island Trails Committee, recalled putting up signs and cleaning up the trail this spring.

The Trails Committee, with the help of dozens of volunteers, works hard to keep the island's recreational paths safe and free from obstructions. This year, the committee has published a new version of the Quadra Island Trails Map. This handy guide is available at local stores for \$2. Tardis Expeditions was one of the local businesses that donated to the production costs of the new map.

Hiking through the cool, moist forest was refreshing. Steve stopped to point out different varieties of ferns growing alongside the trail, explaining how local First Nations people used parts of the plants for cooking and decorating baskets.

As we neared the base of Mount Lolo, Steve drew our attention to some wolf scat on the old skidder road we were following. Moments later, a bald eagle swished overhead. Steve told us that there are at least 250 nesting pairs on Quadra.

A new sign erected by the Trails Committee indicated the way up the mountain. We followed trail markers up the rock bluffs until we reached the viewpoint at the top. Mount Lolo's impressive vista stretches south to the lighthouse and west to Seymour Narrows and beyond.

We decided this was a fine place to enjoy the ample lunches provided as part of the hiking tour. They included generously filled sandwiches made to order by Quadra Foods, veggie sticks, trail mix, fruit leather, cookies, fresh seasonal fruit, juice, and bottled water.

After a lesson in VHF radio operation

by Steve, we descended the mountain and headed towards Maud Island. Arriving at a viewpoint on the shore of the Narrows, we could hear the roar of the rapids just south of us. This was going to be quite a show.

We crossed over the causeway to Maud Island and hiked up a steep track to the power line towers. Reaching the viewpoint on the bluffs at the southern entrance to the Narrows, we were able to look straight down on the incredible whirlpools, rips, and boils created by the huge flood tide.

At 3:45 pm the flood reached its peak at 15.7 knots. From our perch we watched several powerboats navigate the rushing tide. Some of the whirlpools were monstrous, much wider than the boats were long.

A pod of dolphins played in the wake of a zodiak and a seal frolicked in a whirlpool as if it was a giant jacuzzi. Across from us on the opposite shoreline, a large crowd was watching from the Ripple Rock Trail.

Steve told our group about the history of the once treacherous Ripple Rock, and the engineered explosion in 1958 that blew up its twin peaks to make this dangerous passage safer for navigation.

It was hard to leave the awe inspiring natural spectacle of the flood tide, but we had a two-hour return hike ahead of us. As we walked through mixed forest along a stretch of trail at the base of Mount Lolo, Steve mentioned that one of the features he likes about this 12 km hike—and many others on Quadra—is the variety of terrain.

Back at the van, the general opinion of the group was that it had been a fantastic day spent in beautiful surroundings. Everyone vowed to lace up their hiking boots again soon.
