

Counseling is one of the many services I offer. I recognize that we are all part of an Infinite Intelligence and the point of awareness of each individual is unique. Within lies all the answers for a life more fully expressed. I found this article by Neale Walsch, an e-mail from Conversations with God Foundation:

"If someone is standing in front of you asking for clarity, asking for wisdom, what do you suspect would be more empowering to offer - advice or a question?

Giving advice could be your answer if you do not believe that all the answers and insights live within each of us.

There is great power in a simple inquiry. If life is a journey with no end, if it is a process rather than a destination, then living with penetrating questions might be the fuel that moves us forward. Pondering, reflecting, contemplating, dancing with the right questions can change your life!

How often do you fall into the habit of giving advice when someone is having a challenging moment? How often do you feel the need to give answers and fix people's problems?

The word "education" comes from the Latin: educare, which means to draw out, that is, to draw out from within, the wisdom and understanding that already exists.

This week I encourage you to expand your awareness and recognize how you interact with those around you. Do you have the need to give the "right" answers, to "fix" the problem? Do you ask questions, trust in other's wisdom, and support people by simply holding a space of inquiry -- knowing all the answers are within them?"

This is my practice as a minister and a student of Religious Science. But I ask you to consider how you go about your day? When you meet friends and family in need, do you offer kind advice, or do you ask them the question, knowing they truly can find their own way?

Geshe Yongdong Returns

Geshe YongDong is speaking on the "Three Heart Mantras" at the Upper Realm at Quathiaski Cove on Sunday, September 5 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.. Geshe will explain the traditional Bon Three Heart Mantras and give a direct transmission. Latter, there will be time to practice chanting the mantras together.

Mantras are a powerful instrument for reaching a calm state of mind and enlightenmeent. We are very fortunate that Geshe Yong Dong took a 10 day difficult and dangerous trek over the Himalayan Mountains to escape from Chinese occupied Tibet in 1992. As a result, we who live on Quadra Island can share in his wisdom tradition. Before leaving Tibet, Geshe YongDong obtained the Rajampa Geshe degree, the highest degree awarded in Tibetan monastic education.

Regular Sunday Morning Buddhist meditations begin on September 12, the week following Geshe YongDong's talk. Please note that weekly meditations are at 10 a.m. but Geshe YongDong's talks are always at 11 a.m.. Usually a 25 minute meditation is followed by a reading and discussion of Thich Nhat Hanh's The Heart of Buddha's Teachings.

IATís focus has been upon education and leadership development of children and vouth, environmental restoration and preservation and community development. One of IATís projects (initiated 10 years ago and made possible through funds generated from the Annual Quadra Island Community Garage Sale) has been the development of day care programs in the villages of Paligatto, Mabato, Ipil, Lacnog and recently, Nambaran. Thanks to the compassion, cooperation and community solidarity of the fine folks of Ouadra Island, the lives and hearts of hundreds of preschool children have been touched. The original daycare programs initiated in the villages of Paligatto, Mabato and Ipil, and supported for 5 years each through the Quadra Island Garage Sale,

have recently been recognized by the local government and are now receiving funding to continue. This would not have happened had Quadra Island not supported the initial years of operation. Your donations and purchases of materials in support of this fundraising event have, over the years has made possible a quality educational foundation for hundreds of preschool children. I also wish to acknowledge and thank those Quadra Islanders who are personally sponsoring older children to schools and colleges through IATis child sponsorship program. In a country where some children drop out of school because their parents cannot afford to provide them with pencils or a notepad, your support to an education grants them an opportunity to escape the pit of poverty into which they were born. Quadra Islanders can celebrate arrival of the harvest season by dancing to the The Wheat in the Barley on Friday, September 10th, at the Quadra Island Community Centre. Doors open at 8: 00, and the multicultural whirlwind of music fires up at 8:30pm. This is the first visit the group has made to this island, although they have developed a rabid following on Cortes after 5 years of annual concerts at Gorge hall.





Dear Islanders

It has been just over a year now since the U-Haul truckand trailer carrying all our earthly possessions were towed onto Ouadra Island behind two tow trucks. The move from Saskatchewan to Ouadra was eventful to say the least. I guess if I had taken the time to think about it our eventful move might have left me questioning whether we had made the right decision in coming here. But we have never doubted the decision.

I was reflecting on our first year on Quadra and was struck with the following thought: In seminary we are told that a pastor's role is to lead and to teach. What they don't tell you is that before you can effectively lead and teach you need to learn. You need to learn the culture of the place you are at. In order to know the culture you need to learn the people.

I have really appreciated the opportunity to get to know so many of my island neighbours over the past year (not just those who come to our church). Some of you have graciously allowed me to learn from your desire to serve and give your self to others on the island as we dished up soup together at the community kitchen. Others have shown me how care and concern can be demonstrated in much less public ways through secret acts of kindness. Some have helped me to understand how family history has affected who you are and caused you to reject human companionship. Others have taught me how to read the signs of loneliness and feelings of abandonment as we have shared a coffee and some life stories. Still others have opened your lives to me in naked honesty, sharing your pain and grief during some particularly difficult times. We have shared some funny stories, challenges and times of great excitement. Time and again I was reminded how the packaging can be very deceiving as first impressions gave way to understanding when we got to know each other. One of my favorite comments when people discovered what I do on the island has been, "He can't be a pastor! He's too normal!" I just want to respond that I'm not sure I know what normal is.

Most importantly you have taught me that learning is never done. I have so much more to learn from you. There are many more people on the island I have not yet met or gotten to know. And there are those of you I need to apologize to because, in my busyness, I didn't have time for you when you needed someone to talk to. I hope I will do better in the future. Try again and if I still mess up, let me know (we all need to be reminded of our failures from time to time-its part of how we learn).

I look forward to learning so much more from all of you in the coming years. I'd like to think we have a lot to learn from each other.

Anti-Canadian Sentiments

Editor.

This morning I had a very disconcerting conversation with Carol Grav. publisher of "The Hungry Eye," informing me of her refusal to publish an announcement I had submitted (see below.) Ms. Gray's stated reason for her refusal: she did not wish to turn 'The Hungry Eye' into a "political forum".

I found Ms. Gray's explanation of her refusal to publish the announcement to be hypocritical and a request for a one sentence condensation during our phone conversation astounding. My announcement was intended as a direct, somewhat satirical, response to another announcement, one which she admitted to having personally submitted for the previous week's edition of "The Hungry Eye." That announcement was addressed, in bold text, to **DEMOCRATS** ABROAD and offered "U.S. citizens and dual Canadian/US citizens" an information source related to their ability to participate in the upcoming United States of A election.

When the owner/publisher of a local/ community advertising publication located in Canada uses that medium to make an announcement about an election in a foreign country, s/he has already turned that medium into an instrument of political interests...foreign interests at that. Subsequently refusing to publish another community member's response to that announcement because the owner/publisher has judged it to be a "political announcement" is not logical. It is contradictory and represents an instance of hypocrisy (Concise Oxford Dict.: 1. the assumption or postulation of moral standards to which one's own behaviour does not conform. 2. an instance of this.)

At the level of personal opinion, I consider Ms. Gray's refusal to publish my paid_response to a previously published, obviously political, announcement as an expression of precisely the kind of Anti-Canadian Sentiment referred to in my banned announcement. I believe this whether she is a "dual" Citizen or not.

It should be obvious from the content of the proposed announcement that my intention was to stimulate some thought in the minds of "Dual Citizens" and, perhaps, some action on their part. At the same time, I was attempting to point out the negative affect which "Dual Citizenship" has on the basic foundations of Canadian, or any other democracy's, society. My first intention was certainly effective in the case of Carol Gray: although it did not open her mind to overcome her own hypocrisy, she did take the time to call me to make a limp attempt to rationalize her decision.

As the owner/publisher of 'The Hungry Eye', Ms. Gray is free to publish or refuse to publish whatever she chooses. I hope that in the future she will open her mind and stop discriminating against Canadians wishing to defend their culture against the silent invasion of a worldview that has no respect for the meaning and responsibilities of citizenship in a Democracy. "Dual Citizens," unable to make choices about their identity, have divided loyalties. Their ability to make responsible decisions affecting the common good of at least two nations is suspect.

The offensive/banned announcement:

DEMAGOGUES ABROAD - U.S., Other "dual citizens:" under democracy, citizenship is a privilege and a responsibility not a convenience or a right. Dual citizenship denies the responsibility protecting individual rights. It undermines trust: the basic fabric of society. Unable to make responsible decisions about your own identity, can you be trusted to make responsible decisions affecting the lives of others, i.e., The common good? Choosing not to be a responsible Canadian follow your heart back to your roots.

Discovery Islands

aving lived on Quadra Island for over seven years, I have developed an appreciation for the island that is difficult to describe. Saying I feel pride of place does not adequately express my feelings, but let it suffice to say I have no plans to live anywhere else, and in fact my wife and I are in the process of acquiring a new home on Quadra. We have opted to trade our lovely water-view home in a quiet neighbourhood for an inland home on acreage, and we will create our own view within our property. We have finally found our dream of a home located upon a dream of an island, and it feels great.

Anyone even remotely involved in the real estate market on Quadra or Cortes will know that we are in the midst of a whirlwind of activity. Properties are selling very rapidly - Norma and I viewed 2 properties recently that were under offer before we had a chance to even think about an offer - and people from literally all over the world are driving the market, and driving prices upward. What is it that is behind this surge in activity? Many things contribute, but the foremost thing on buyer's minds is still the #1 rule of real estate...location, location. Our being situated in one of the most environmentally pleasant, relatively unscathed regions of the most beautiful province in the greatest country in the world certainly helps. Canada's well-deserved reputation as a peaceable and glorious nation is attracting many people that are starved for space, freedom or wilderness, or in many cases all three. And when they first visit the Discovery Islands, what they discover is generally far better than whatever they had imagined. Yes, it is that good here.

The selfish side of me comes out when real estate is the subject. While not so extreme as to want to raise the drawbridge behind me, the other day I found myself glaring at people in other cars on the ferry. I was thinking "who are you people to come here and screw up a good thing", knowing full well that everyone on that ferry who was not a local was coming here lusting for land with bulging wallets. Then I realized that back in March of 1997 I was one of those people, without the burning lust or bulging

wallet but hungry for a piece of Quadra nonetheless. That realization was the genesis of this column, and has led me to speculate about where we are headed as a region, and at what pace? While short on specific data, I have reams of anecdotal information that indicates extremely brisk sales, and prices are rising as they are wont to do in a seller's market. While this is great news for vendors, it is not so great for those wanting to buy. Worse, our already high real estate prices are creating havoc for those that live on the Islands and dream of home ownership, and now find that dream to be rapidly fading. That particular thought struck me some time ago when I first started to worry myself, as I knew our present home was not compatible with the full spectrum of what we expected from our dream location. Fortunately we have been able to fulfil our needs before property became unavailable or out of our reach.

Helmut Pastrick, Chief Economist of Credit Union Central of BC provided me with a source for projected population growth in our region, though data specific to the Islands is not available. Local Health Region 72 (Campbell River) had a 2003 population of 39,374 people, and is expected to rise to 47,647 by 2031, which is less than 1% per year growth. This is based upon regional historic data, and I would question whether historic data is representative of the situation today, given the shift in the economics of the area. Anecdotal information indicates growth in the region is presently much higher than it was in the 1976 to 2003 period analyzed in the report, and perhaps the decline in population experienced in the region from 1998 to 2003 has skewed the results. This decline reflects the shrinkage of forestry and fishing jobs in the area and the resulting out-migration. But we are seeing a new influx of people that look at the islands as an ideal retirement location, or whose employment or net worth allows them live wherever they choose, and they are generally "baby boomers". This segment of the population are the wealthiest generation ever (largely courtesy of their parent's depression-developed habits of thrift) and they are scouting for their dream homes, with the Discovery Islands firmly in their sights.

One local realtor mentioned an interesting shift in demand. It used to be that those looking for a home on Quadra were

quite willing to do without - many boomer generation Islanders moved here hoping to "move back to the land", and did so. Not so today. Today's boomer buyers want their comforts, and being accustomed to the congestion of the cities has made them much more amenable to having closer neighbours than many an Islander would choose. They want all the services and amenities too, and there's the rub. There is a finite amount of property available on the Islands, and our present land use regulations make it unlikely there will be enough to allow a huge influx of new buyers to be accommodated. Without that type of growth there is little economic influence for the market to react to, as the demand won't be there, and growth in services and amenities only follows demand. So we can all sigh in relief that we are not in danger of an orgy of unrestrained development in our area, but that is not to say development will not occur. It will occur, only at a much more preferable sedate and controlled pace. and hopefully this development will be in line with the sensibilities of those of us fortunate enough to call this paradise home.

One thing difficult to convey to readers is the appearance of the graphs accompanying the population report. In 1976, the region's population of 24,000 graphed out on an age scale has the appearance of a coniferous tree - the thin tip representing the 70 plus age group, then a gradual widening to the "skirt" of the tree representing the 25 to 35 age group. Today, it looks more like a shrub, with enormous growth in the middle range, being us boomers. The projection for 2031 shows a tremendous increase in the 60 plus categories, which is where you'll find us old folks born in the late 1940's and 1950's. As this group ages their involvement in our marketplace will increase, as will the prices, and supply will become much tighter. Finally, the development trend of the southern Gulf Islands has plateaued, with lack of supply and extremely high prices dampening growth. The mid-Island is booming, but it doesn't offer the lifestyle afforded on the Discovery Islands. Nope, we've been discovered again, folks, and all those envious visitors are spreading the word like wildfire. Good luck to those of you seeking a piece of the rock, and congratulations to those who already have it. There's no place like it.



Business Profile

Butterfly Brand Seafood

o you have a hankering for fresh seafood but don't have the time or gear to catch it yourself? Linda and Tim Richards of Butterfly Brand Seafood will serve you the catch of the day and more at their new seafood shop.

Located next door to the Landing Pub in Quathiaski Cove, Butterfly Brand Seafood is appropriately situated in a harbour that has long been the home of a commercial fishing fleet.

I was fortunate to stop by on a Saturday, the day when Linda offers customers a selection of free samples. Eager to try the shop's varieties of smoked products, I had difficulty deciding where to begin: peppered chum, honeyed chum, hot or cold smoked sockeye, candied chum, or smoked scallops? Hmmmm . . .

"Not to worry," said Linda, "you can try as many as you like while you're here."

And so I did, with great appreciation, as did the customers who dropped by while we were doing the interview. Almost everyone purchased a bag of candied chum, a treat that Linda warns is "very addictive."

As well as smoked items, Butterfly Brand Seafood offers an extensive fresh seafood selection. This changes daily, according to what local fishermen bring in. On the day I visited, Linda was selling halibut caught near Port Hardy, oysters and clams from Cortes Island, shrimp, sockeye, and live crabs.

Butterfly Brand Seafood also offers canned smoked scallops (their own label), canned sockeye salmon (Walcan and Gold Seal), packaged Walcan smoked sockeye and pink salmon, canned butter clams, horseradish, and seafood sauce. Seafood gift baskets are available, as well as photo cards by Barb Williams.

The shop's frozen selections include scallops, sidestriped shrimp, fish planks (a set with cedar plank, fish rub, and sockeye steaks), and vacuum packed individual sockeye steaks.

Butterfly Brand Seafood also fills bulk orders for special occasions such as weddings.



As commercial fishermen themselves, Linda and Tim are committed to supplying their customers with fresh, high quality products. They are also committed to supporting other local commercial fishermen.

Having fished with Tim since 1980, Linda has seen the industry decline in recent years.

"This year we got three openings in Barkley Sound and one in Johnstone Strait. Our whole salmon season has been fewer than 80 hours so far. Some of the guys over here only got to fish the opening in Johnstone Strait," Linda reported.

The Richards will fish chum in October and scallops from the end of October until May, but times are definitely leaner than they used to be. The shop not only gives them a place to sell their catch year round, it also helps their fellow fishermen stay afloat.

"We talked to friends in the industry who said they weren't doing well, so we decided to open the shop to help support ourselves and other local commercial fishermen." Linda affirmed.

Everything sold in the shop is caught locally except the thawed shrimp, which comes from the East Coast. If Linda doesn't have what a customer is looking for, she refers them to fishermen who will have the product.

"I think our shop helps to make the island a little more aware of commercial fishermen, as well as giving fishermen a market to sell their catch. And our prices

are comparable to those you would find in Campbell River." Linda said.

name 'Butterfly The Brand Seafood' derives from swimming scallops, which flap like butterflies when they are swimming. When Tim invented an awardwinning trawl used to catch scallops without damaging the substrate and with minimal by-catch, he called it the 'butterfly trawl.'

Linda and Tim opened the shop on June 30, at the same time as one of their Barkley Sound openings. "It was a very busy few days!" Linda recalled.

Fortunately, the counters were already in place from when Joe and Sharon Duprey, owners of the Landing Pub, had used the space to sell pizza and sub sandwiches. Linda and Tim still had to install fridges, freezers, a display case, shelving, and an air conditioner to convert the space into a seafood shop.

Since opening the shop, Linda has decorated the small but bright space with several of William Van Orden's concrete fish, as well as historic canning labels and a display of photos of local commercial fishermen at work. Linda affixed the photos to a piece of fishing net festooned with a variety of floats.

"I'm hoping fishermen will give me photos to add to the display. It gives customers a chance to see where their fish came from, and it's great to see familiar faces up there," Linda said, as she pointed out some of her favourite shots.



The photo display is a fitting tribute to the hard work and personal pride that goes into catching fish. For Linda, fishing and processing her catch is a labour of love.

"I had someone run the store for me during salmon openings this summer so I could go fishing with Tim. I enjoy being out there and I also love to smoke and pickle our catch. I started smoking scallops and salmon for family and friends, and they convinced me to start doing it commercially," said Linda.

Butterfly Brand Seafood is a great family business, Linda added. Their two sons, Adam and Ben, help in the shop and on the boat.

Linda said the response to the shop from both locals and tourists has been excellent. She pointed out that locals are the backbone of their year round business.

Although operating a shop for the first time has involved a steep learning curve, Linda said her familiarity with the industry has helped a great deal.

"I know fish," she said with a big smile, offering me another tidbit of smoked sockeye.

How could I refuse?

Butterfly Brand Seafood is open from 11 am to 7 pm seven days/week until Labour Day. After Labour Day the shop will be open Tuesday to Saturday from 11 am to 5 pm. Drop by the shop or call 285-2897 for more information.
