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

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

The Great Bear Rainforest is a land of narrow, steep-walled fjords and towering cedar trees that boasts one of the world's largest populations of grizzly bears, as well as the rare white Spirit Bear. Five species of wild salmon spawn in its streams and genetically unique coastal wolves find refuge in its forests.

Over the past eight years communities, environmental groups, industry and tourism sectors have come to an historic land-use agreement which would protect one-third of the region from logging, define sustainable logging practices and invest in diversifying the community economies. All that remains is for the BC Government to ratify the agreement.

On Friday, October 28th at 7:30 pm in the Quadra Island Community Center, Sierra Quadra will show a National Geographic film on this very special place. Lisa Matthaus from the Sierra Club of BC will be present to update the audience on this campaign.

Killing Time At Explore

If you would like to enjoy a seldom recorded insight into the gripping topic of murders and murderers you can join Quadra Island author Peter Smith for a book launch at the Explore Gallery on Saturday, November 5, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m.

Peter will be there for a reading from his newly published true-life book "Prairie Murders" after which he will sign copies of the book, and be available for a question and answer session.

His book contains unusual murder cases, from the killings to the trials, some of which he covered during his 37 years as a crime reporter in Canada and England, and other historical cases which he researched in depth.

During his career as a crime reporter in Calgary, he interviewed murderers, traveled to the States for major cases, including the Littleton, Colorado school massacre, went back to England for the case of a doctor who murdered 215 patients, and even received a death threat from a convicted killer.

He'll be talking about these cases and revealing some of the secrets in his crime reporter's notebooks and murder files, thousands of which are stacked to the rafters in his house in Hooleyville.

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Museum at Campbell River Veterans Week Events

The Museum at Campbell River is offering a series of events to mark Veterans Week, November 5 ^ 11. This week is in honour of 2005 Year of the Veteran, a Canada wide tribute intended to celebrate, honour, remember and teach our youth about the contributions and sacrifices of our veterans. The Museum will focus on the war years 1939-1945, as 2005 marks the 60th Anniversary of the end of WWII.

On November 6, from 2 pm ^ 4 pm, the Museum will offer a chance to spend an afternoon listening to memories of the war years from local veterans and community members. This is intended as an informal opportunity to gather and chat about an era that has had a profound impact on global history. Audience participation is encouraged as anyone is welcome to attend and ask questions or tell stories of their own. The North Island is rich in what is termed ŒLiving History, and the Museum is encouraging the community to come out and learn from the memories of people who lived through the years of World War II.

On November 7, from 7 pm - 9 pm, author Chris Weicht will present an illustrated talk on the secret wartime activity of the Japanese off the coast of Vancouver Island, as well as the efforts of the RCAF to deter it. This presentation includes a series of photographs taken on board Japanese submarine I-26 showing its torpedo room, engine room, the launch of float plane fighters from its forward deck as well as a photo taken from the sub of the Estevan Point lighthouse. Chris Weicht is an expert on the history of aviation on the west coast and is the author of ŒPacific Airway, and ŒJerico Beach and the West Coast Flying Boat Stations,. Books will be available for sale and signing.

And then on November 8, from 7 pm ^ 9 pm, Danny Brown will give an illustrated talk on the historic background of Yorke Island. This isolated and windswept island in Johnstone Strait was on the frontline of our west coast wartime defense system. Danny will provide surprising details and interesting insights into this truly historic local landmark.

Friday Flicks Bright Young Things

Friday, November 4th Q.C.C. Doors - 7:30, Showtime-7: 45

Actor Stephen Fry, best known for his spoton Oscar Wilde in the film "Wilde," and his comic roles in "Black Adder" and "Jeeves and Wooster", demonstrates that he also has talent as a screenwriter/filmmaker in "Bright Young Things." Adapted from Evelyn Waugh's 1930 novel, "Vile Bodies," Fry successfully satirizes London socialites of that era. "Bright Young Things" demonstrates that this classic period piece also has relevance today through it's examination of the excesses of an era, and the empty-headedness of self-indulgent lives.

The story centers on one emblematic couple: Adam Symes, a screenwriter, whose commissioned work has just been confiscated by a puritanical British customs officer, and Nina Blount, an easily bored socialite who comes from money but always wants more. From its dramatic opening, with the classic swing song "Sing, Sing, Sing" overlaying a lavish London party, the viewer is engaged in a fast-moving and sharp look at the last days of England's young upper-crust.

In America, the 18th amendment prohibited the consumption and sale of alcohol. The era was known for its political conservatism and anti-immigration policies, yet it was also an era of unprecedented prosperity and certain social freedoms. Women had won the right to vote in 1920 and a perpetually intoxicated jet set was taking to nightclubs across the nation. In England, similarly self-indulgent socialites were nicknamed "Bright Young Things" by the British press and, with profound ignorance, were blithely drinking, drugging and partying their way into WWII.

Through the imminent crash of London's class structure, "Bright Young Things" remains a gorgeous-looking film and comes highly recommended for anyone who loves sophisticated, Merchant/Ivory-style fare with a good dose of acerbic wit and cynicism thrown in.

Increas e in Child Care Subsidy

Quadra Children's Centre would like families on Quadra to know that on October 1,2005 the government made some dramatic increases to the funding of childcare in our province. The government has increased the income threshold which determines a family's eligibility for subsidy with children under the age of 6.

This threshold has been increased from \$21,000 to \$38,000 per year. Families with incomes over this amount may still be eligible for a partial subsidy. Also the amount of monthly subsidy has increased. For example a child who attends a regulated childcare facility full-time will see their subsidy increase from \$394 to \$500.

Any families who currently receive subsidy will automatically see their subsidy increase, they don't need to do anything. We encourage you to take the time to phone Childcare Subsidy Program at 1-866-866-0800 to see if you qualify.

New Recycling Depot

As part of national Waste Reduction Week, the Regional District of Comox-Strathcona today launched a new recycling bin area on Quadra Island.

This new area, located at the south end of Harper Road (between People's Drugmart and the Credit Union), offers residents a clean, well designed recycling bin area for the 24-hour drop off of recyclable materials. These materials will then be collected and taken off-island once a week. (Plastic is removed or "tipped" separately-usually every seven to 10 days.) Maintenance and cleaning of the site will happen each day during the busy season and four to five times a week otherwise.

"We have proven over the years with our pilot recycling project that there is a real need for this new and improved depot," said Jim Abram, Director for the island. "A great deal of planning and hard work went into bringing this project to fruition and islanders were lining up to drop off their recyclables as we were opening the new site. It is very extensively used by the people of Quadra Island and helps us do our part in diverting a significant amount of material from the landfill."

Materials accepted include plastic household containers (numbers 1 through 7), newspapers, magazines and household stationery (including junk mail), metal food containers, glass food containers, cardboard and boxboard.

After many months of planning and hard work, a new public access wharf at Hoskyn Channel Landing on Quadra Island is a reality, thanks to volunteer labour from the outer islands and Campbell River and \$10,000 in financial support and leadership from the Regional District of Comox-Strathcona (RDCS).

"The previous wharf was unsafe and, in bad weather, unusable," says Jim Abram, chair of the RDCS board of directors and the director for the Discovery Islands - Mainland Inlets. "I am very excited to see the results of the cooperative efforts of so many volunteers, local businesses and our regional government."

The wharf serves over 100 people from neighbouring islands year-round and many more in the summer months. It is the closest and safest year-round access point for groceries, jobs and medical care for residents from Read Island, Maurelle Island and other islands as well as countless tourists and many eco-tourist businesses from Quadra Island and Campbell River.

"This wharf and the new sign are great examples of what can be accomplished when government, private businesses and citizens work together to provide something of benefit for everyone," says Abram.

The ramp for the wharf was built on Quadra Island at Cape Mudge Boatworks. A large cedar tree removed during road access work was taken to a local small mill on an outer island and used for making the wooden part of the wharf construction. In order to take advantage of the tides when the wharf was ready to go up, it took place in the middle of the night during very bad weather. The former fish farm company, Marine Harvest, transported the ramp on a local freight boat, the "Chinook" from the boatworks to its current location.

The specially designed sign was created by Richard Pielou, a resident of Quadra Island.

She awakens our gardening passion with the brilliant flower colours of the cultivated varieties, or for some, the subtler tones of the species. The texture of her evergreen leaves contrast so nicely with the native trees and ground hugging ferns. On Monday November 14th 7 pm, the Garden Club presents Paul Wurz, local Rhodo expert, and President of the North Island Rhododendron Society. Paul operates a small nursery, Hidden Acres Rhodos on the north side of Campbell River, near Mystic Woods. Raven Bay

I have been receiving many letters every day supporting the Regional District's (RD) application to acquire the lease at Raven Bay for public use. The province was planning to sell it off privately and we asked that they consider an arrangement with the RD so that we could keep it in the public domain. They were agreeable and it has been advertised. I have only received three calls opposed to it, mainly due to inadequate information. I have also met with representatives for the Cape Mudge Band (who have an interest in this area) and explained why this is being applied for and I felt that they were also supportive of keeping it in the public domain. I have offered to meet with the entire Council if they like. So, I hope we will be able to proceed as soon as possible with finalizing this agreement.

Recycling Bin Depot

Well, after many months of "discussion" and uncertainty over the placement of the recycling bins, the RD has secured a site and entered into an agreement with the Ministry of Highways and we have officially opened the depot, during Waste Reduction Week. The site, as you will see, is very professionally done and was designed and overseen by Murray Johnson of MM Johnson engineers here on Quadra. He has done a wonderful job of project management and the finished product is a joy to use. You will see flowers and grass in the spring to complement the paving and fencing that is already there. My thanks to the RD for persisting with this very valuable community service in the face of much adversity. Congratulations, Murray, on a job well done. Over the past three years this service has diverted tens of thousands of tonnes of waste from the landfill. Our community should be proud of its efforts to recycle.

Read Island

I will be attending the annual general meeting of the Surge Narrows Community Association and an information sharing meeting on Saturday, Oct. 29th. There are many issues on Read and the outer islands that are requiring my attention. The Evans Bay wharf is still being discussed and we are awaiting final word from Transport Canada on the request to turn it over to the community. We will also be discussing the possibility of Canada Post trying to cut back service at the post office.

If you are in the area of Hoskyn Channel Landing (Surge narrows Road end), have a look at the beautiful sign that was built and installed for the RD by Richard Pielou of Quadra Island. It is a testament to the cooperative work of the RD, the community and businesses.

Upcoming issues

I will be meeting with the Prime Minister's senior advisor and the senior advisor to the Minister's Regional Office on Nov. 8th to arrange for the reconnection of 13 more fog horns on this coast. I have been working behind the scenes on this for the past year with these same people and have had incredible cooperation.

Planning issues

We will have a new General Manager of Community Planning by the beginning of the month. We have been looking forward to this so that we (the Electoral Areas) can get on with prioritizing our planning needs for the coming year. Our zoning bylaw is at the top of my list along with components of a Local Area Plan for Quathiaski Cove and possibly a look at sections of our Official Community Plan. Quathiaski Cove is a priority due to the amount of development that is taking place or being proposed and we have all heard loud and clear that this is the gateway to Quadra Island and the look and feel is important to islanders and businesses. So, those three are the major projects and then there are the day to day ones that must be looked after also ... it never ends!

Granite Bay/Kanish Bay

I have gone to this area with a group of our senior staff to see what needs to be done to realize all of the projects that I have been advocating for over the past few years. We will be setting up two meetings (TBA). One will be for the area of the parking lot, boat ramp and dock and the other will be for the connector road into Kanish Bay Estates, Telus services and a discussion of Hydro service.

Island Timberlands Logging Plans on Read

Subsequent to the September 20th Island Timberlands visit to Read Island, many of us were hopeful. We understood the company was unwilling to consider our ideal scenarios relating to lot 21 (Bird Cove Creek) – scenarios such as the donation of the land to Nature's Trust, no logging, or willingness to sell the lot to the community at an affordable price. However, it did seem a reasonable solution might be possible – one in which the salmon spawning creek was protected with a minimum 30 meter logging set-back, and the logging on the balance of the beautiful and well-canopied lot would be careful and selective.

On October 5th, about 35 people gathered at Surge Narrows to hear the plan, as presented by senior engineers Ally Gibson and Kraig Urbanowski. On hearing the result, I, for one, felt naïve and foolish for having hoped too much.

Ally, on behalf of Island Timberlands, made it clear that their parent company, Brascan, is in the business of logging and land development (Brascan also owns Royal Lepage real estate). He stated this three times, along with advising the property is privately owned, and that they intend to log it with or without community approval.

The only good news of the day was that the company will back away from Bird Cove Creek on Lot 21, giving the 30 meter stream set back we had hoped for. However, instead of selective logging on the west side of the road, we understand that area will be effectively clear cut, apart from temporarily leaving some large trees standing close to the road. We understand logging will begin mid-November.

The news progressively worsened.

IslandTimberlands five year plan is to harvest about 10,000 cubic meters of marketable timber annually from Read Island.

Community members asked about their environmental certification, ISO 14001. Island Timberlands asserted that in purchasing Weyerhauser lands, they are covered by the Weyerhauser certification, meaning they can cut old growth trees and clear-cut if they so chose. We understand they see nothing wrong with logging anything Weyerhauser left behind,

including anything of value in the green strips that were set aside in agreement with the community.

IslandTimberlands was unwilling to discuss their cutting plan for the Blockhouse and Earthquake Lake areas. This cutting plan will be provided in late October or early November, cutting will occur in 2006.

The community left the meeting feeling frustrated and worried.

Ken Flager, point-person for the community, spoke with me after the meeting. We both were dismayed at the prospect of the rich forested beauty of Read Island being turned into a clear-cut Douglas fir monoculture "Christmas tree farm" or yet another "log and flog" scarring the land.

A Quadra Ode to a Southeaster

(With apologies to Anonymous and Ezra Pound.)

Winter is icumin in, Loudly sing we damn! Skiddeth bus and sloppeth us, And how the wind doth ram. Sing ye damn! I type quicker, Light bulbs flicker; My file goes to the aether. Sing ye damn!

Actually, you're lucky if only your file goes into virtual NeverNeverLand. When the wind blows branches across power lines, the lights flicker and the voltage at the wall sockets, which are supposed to deliver about 114 volts, can vary quite a bit as all of your electrical appliances cut out and then start up again. Not only does this put a strain on the whole system, but these events often put particular stress on the sensitive electronic circuits in your ty, stereo, and your PC. It's not unusual for us to get calls after the lights have come back on that a computer won't start (often because the computer's power supply has fried), or that weird error messages are popping up (from a hard drive that was running either when the lights dimmed or went extra bright). Think about spending a few dollars to avoid the odor of smoldering electronics.

Power protection comes in different flavors and costs. My first consideration, before plunking down the cash would be to decide how much I want to protect and how upset I would be if I lost what I was working on when things went blip. I would absolutely want to protect my computer hardware against sudden power surges; for that basic coverage I would choose a decent surge protector (not the \$5 power bars which are often no more than disguised extension cords). These generally use a component called a MOV (metal oxide varistor) which act like an electrical sponge and diverts spikes and surges from the incoming power line to your house's ground, instead of to your equipment. A good surge protector will cost you about \$15+, and comes with a lifetime warranty plus the company's "insurance" against damage occurring while using their product.

Although a surge protector takes care of spikes and surges, it can't protect against brown outs. These low voltage events often cause data loss or even damage components. To protect your equipment from low or no voltage, consider using a UPS (uninterruptible power supply): a combination surge protector and battery backup. When the power goes, this device quickly switches from Hydro to an internal inverter powered by its battery. Run time depends on the capacity of the battery and on the number of items it has to maintain, but you should get at least 5 minutes of backup power; this should give you time to save your work and shut down the computer properly. Furthermore, they often come with software that will automatically turn off your computer if you happen to be away at the time of the power failure. UPS units cost about \$50+ and sometimes even come with a manufacturer's warranty insuring against damage to your hardware.

Electrical storms are rare on Quadra, especially in the winter months. However, a lightening strike at a nearby telephone pole or close to the house can get by power protection devices. If the modem is the only thing that gets incinerated, pour a dram of your favorite libation, and thank Dame Fortune. The best advice I've seen for thunderstorms is to pull the power plug out of the wall and disconnect your modem. Hiding under the bed is optional.

A couple of reliable brands for power protection devices: Belkin and APC (American Power Conversion). You can call APC @ 1-800-800-4272 to have a real human answer your power protection questions (or Google"power protection").

Dangerous Games?

arious forms of electronic entertainment have been around for some time now. It all started with pinball machines in the late 1930's, until mechanical appliances started to give way to the digital age with the development of Pong (originally named "Tennis for Two") in 1958. This was followed by SpaceWar (also called Asteroids) in 1962. The games were incredibly complex - by 1960's standards - and required dedicated computers to run them, and were released to the public only as arcade models during the early 1970's. In 1972 Magnavox introduced Odyssey, a TV game console that could play several "Pong" based games, but it was so rudimentary that one had to apply coloured mylar sheets to the TV screen to get background colours. In 1974, Atari invented a cheap version of Pong that could be played on one's television set, and it sold out the first 150,000 units released, in days. This was the tipping point for gaming.

The epitome of gaming technology today is Sony's PlayStation consoles and Microsoft's X-Box. These are in fact powerful microcomputers, albeit devoted to game play. The amount of detail in the graphics displayed by these machines is beyond the capabilities of most personal computers, and the introduction of sophisticated control devices allows tremendously accurate input for game control. The development of roleplaying games (in which the player becomes a character within the game) has been a very popular innovation, and occasionally players become overly involved in the game, ignoring all else. Recently in Korea a middle-aged man quit his office job to stay at home and play games full-time. He reportedly suffered a heart attack and died after playing for over 48 hours without a break. This would appear to be one of the darker aspects of the gaming phenomena - the others are generally non-fatal - for now,

I have enjoyed game play in all of its forms over the years, but my preference leans toward realistic simulations, such as Microsoft's Flight Simulator. Already interested in flying, my first reaction to even early versions of FS was total awe. Taking actual flight characteristics of aircraft and superimposing a digital flight environment was formerly the realm of bazillion dollar simulators for pilot training, at least until Microsoft made the same data work on a PC. The realism is startling, and it can be a blast

to spend hours mastering an aircraft. Newer versions of FS are positively mind-blowing. But it is not a game, as my grandkids have learned much to their disappointment. I also enjoy some game action, and not long ago my wife surprised me a Sony PS-2. The one game she purchased proved to be beyond my capabilities, so I went shopping for something easier. I soon discovered my proficiency level warranted shopping in the "kids" section, and there are many "E" rated (meaning everyone) games that should soon sharpen my digital dexterity.

I also tried renting a few games, and one that I tried caught my attention because it had attracted a lot of media attention. Called "Grand Theft Auto", this role playing game puts the user in the action as a criminal attempting to survive and prosper in a seedy city, using wits and guile. Also using knives, guns, baseball bats and vehicles as weapons. I have to admit that stealing cars and running around the city was kind of fun, but I found the more violent aspects of the game somewhat disturbing – and it can be very violent. Alternatively, my favourite game is called ATV Off Road Racer, which is harmless and great for developing the skills necessary for more advanced gaming.

So when my almost-9 year old grandson came for a visit one rainy day, I thought he would enjoy playing it with me - great bonding opportunity, you know. He was familiar with the game, and proceeded to kick my butt doing aerial stunts with his ATV, earning tons of points. When I challenged to him a simple race he was reticent, and he said racing was boring. We eventually did race, and it turned out his control level was not as good as it was when performing unlikely aerial tricks. This is a crucial difference between games and simulations - sims require solid control of the item you are driving or piloting, and will punish you immediately for small mistakes. Games, on the other hand, let you get away with just about anything, and therefore provide little in the way of educational value.

Caleb had by now had enough of my game and wanted to play the game he had brought with him – yup, you guessed it – Grand Theft Auto. I was in no position to argue with him about the appropriateness of the game ("but, grandpa, I play it all the time") so I sat back to watch. He proceeded to terrorize Liberty City, joyously motoring around in his stolen vehicles, ignoring roads and aiming for pedestrians. When tasked by the game to beat up someone

with a baseball bat, he mashed them. Then he started mashing bystanders, and I learned that one is awarded points for doing so. Fortunately dinner was soon ready and the game was put away, but not before I became somewhat appalled at the viciousness of the game, and worse, my grandson's enjoyment of it. Given the opportunity he would have gleefully wiped out the entire city. And by the way, Caleb is no different from other kids his age. Violent games are the rage for many kids today, thanks to skilful marketing.

Killing bad guys has been part of game play since our forebears were tots, but today's games display a level of blood and guts never envisioned by game developers 30 years ago. Will children become completely desensitized to violence through playing such games? I'm not sure, as the same has been said of violent movies and TV, and there is no empirical proof this is so. But it is certain kids will learn nothing useful from the games, and allowing them to become the protagonist - delivering fatal blows - within the game is potentially dangerous, and may further enure kids to the real horror that results from violence. Given the level of violence in our cities, often carried out by youth, I think some game developers are headed in the wrong direction.

But then, I'm an old fart, and some would say a stick in the mud besides. Who am I to criticize? But those of you who are parents to pre-teens should be highly aware of what your kids are playing. It may only be a game, but the underlying concept is hardly game-like. There are many games out there that have some redeeming value – Grand Theft Auto and its ilk have none. And finally, it is up to parents to provide an entertainment environment that nurtures and teaches your kids – that responsibility ultimately belongs to you, not Sony or Microsoft.



Island Report

Quadra Fire Department Honoured with Award

uadra Island's Volunteer Fire Department was presented with a Community Safety and Crime Prevention Award from General, John Les, on September 23, 2005. The Quadra RCMP nominated the QIVFD for the prestigious award, in recognition of their outstanding community service.

"The Quadra fire department continually goes above and beyond the call of duty, and we're all very excited that they have received this award," said RCMP Corporal Rick Fraser.

"During my 24 years in the RCMP I've attended many major crime scenes and worked alongside several fire departments. The Quadra fire department stands out for exhibiting a very professional attitude."

The QIVFD was the only service club to receive an award under the Solicitor General's Community Safety and Crime Prevention Awards program this year, which honours both groups and individuals across the province.

Fire Chief Murray Johnson admitted that the award is "a bit of a feather in our cap."

Murray said he received a call in early September from a member of the BC Solicitor General's Office, who informed him that the QIVFD had been nominated and won the award.

Members of the department responded to the good news with characteristic modesty.

"First reactions tended to be - why us, we're just doing our (volunteer) job ...later replaced by pride in having our constant efforts towards a safe community recognized in such a public way," said Murray.

Recipients of Community Safety and Crime Prevention Awards are selected based on their

level of commitment, perseverance, innovation, and contribution. In his nomination proposal, Cpl. Fraser stated that acknowledging the OIVFD as just a "fire department" does not do them justice.

"In an organization where people are already giving of themselves on a regular basis for fire protection, and as first responders assisting the ambulance service, they vault further, tirelessly serving their community in a public safety/ crime prevention role," he wrote.

Noting that the Quadra RCMP detachment has only four members, who also cover Cortes and other neighbouring islands, Cpl. Fraser said members are often on shift alone.

QIVFD's 32 members can always be counted on to offer assistance outside of their mandated role of fire protection. This includes such instances as traffic safety and control, protecting crime scenes, search and rescue, crowd control, and extra security for community events," he illustrated.

Cpl. Fraser went on to say that during countless solo shifts, the RCMP have relied on the "backup" of QIVFD members working alongside them in all types of weather and positions of elevated risk.

As an example of the QIVFD's commitment to crime prevention and community safety, Cpl. Fraser cited the department's role in ending a spate of break and enters committed against Quathiaski Cove businesses.

"QIVFD stepped forward and contributed hundreds of volunteer hours for overnight surveillance, supplementing the strained resources of the RCMP. This resulted in the apprehension and conviction of a suspect for a great number of offences."

Cpl. Fraser surmised that perhaps an even greater contribution to this effort is the message sent to the criminal element that Quadra Island

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is not an "easy hit", as there is a committed fire department willing to go above and beyond the call to protect their community against crime.

As well as highlighting their support services to the RCMP, Cpl. Fraser pointed out the QIVFD's commitment to training."It is my opinion that they conduct themselves in a very professional manner, taking their training seriously and striving for excellence."

He also noted their donation of time and resources at community events, such as May Day, Canada Day, Halloween, and Quadra School's hot lunch program.

Judy Hagen, an Associate Director of BC Crime Prevention, moved to Quadra one year ago from Invermere. She joined the fire department as radio dispatcher, and said she was impressed by the commitment of its members.

"I feel the Quadra fire department is very deserving of this award. They help the RCMP and the community in so many ways," she said.

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Judy pointed out that the QIVFD is exceptional for several reasons, including its significant proportion of women members and its commitment to Quadra seniors.

"They teach safety courses such as CPR to seniors, volunteered as judges at Quadra Seniors' fall fair, and set up tables and chairs for the provincial OAP convention held on Quadra last June," she recounted.

Regional District Director Jim Abram pointed out that an award from the Solicitor General is not something that is given lightly.

"This award recognized the QIVFD not only as a fire department, but as a really fine organization that is an active participant in policing, crime prevention, and community involvement," he said.

"In our rural area, we don't have the large numbers of staff that urban populations do in community services. The volunteer fire department is always on call to help meet the needs of the island."

Jim went on to say that as former President of the Union of BC Municipalities, he visited many small communities, and "has never seen as professional a volunteer fire department."

The QIVFD's role in assisting the RCMP and ambulance service helps to make Quadra Island a safe community, Jim noted.

"I think people on Quadra generally feel safe. It is a unique phenomenon to have a population of approximately 3,000 who feel that way largely because of the presence of volunteer emergency services."

Quadra Fire Chief Murray Johnson and Trustee Bob Brown received the award on behalf of the QIVFD at the Annual Conference of the BC Crime Prevention Association on September 23 in Burnaby. The Solicitor General's office paid the expenses for them to attend the event.

Several members of the Quadra community organized and hosted a celebratory dinner on October 11 at the Heriot Bay Inn for the QIVFD and honoured guests. In addition to the QIVFD members and trustees, the attendees included MP John Duncan, MLA

Claire Trevena, Regional District Director Jim Abram, Campbell River Mayor Lynn Nash, Campbell River Fire Chief Rob Owens, Quadra RCMP, QIVFD pioneers Russ Swanson and Bill Nutting, other retired firefighters, representatives from Quadra Seniors and the Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce, and BC Ambulance attendants.

Highlights of the event included speeches by John Duncan, Claire Trevena, Jim Abram, and Bob Weicker of Frontline Fire Department Training.

Looking back on the event, Jim Abram recalled that an emergency call came in just as the firefighters were sitting down to their congratulatory dinner.

"Four or five department members immediately got up from the table and left to respond to the call. They are never off duty. It was an honour to be able to say a few words to this group of dedicated volunteers."

The QIVFD was also acknowledged in the BC Legislature by Claire Trevena in an address to the House on October 4.

On a related note, Crime Prevention Week is November 1 - 7.All are invited to Quadra Safety Day at QCC on Sunday, November 6 from 2 - 5 pm. The event will feature booths, demonstrations, and fun family activities. Kids are encouraged to bring their injured teddy bears and dolls for the Quadra Ambulance Doll Hospital.
