

BC Ferries **FAC Meetings.**

They are indeed interesting to attend and to observe, as was the recent meeting of May

B.C. Ferries officials insist they want to be in communication with their ferry traveling public. Consequently they appoint Ferry Advisory Committees to serve their interests, then advertise dates of meetings to be held in public places of terrible acoustics, and consistently structure their meetings so that all official attendees sit disdainfully with their backs to that the public in attendance who are hard pressed to discern the mumbled presentations. Such meetings, as always, are an interesting example of blatant Corporate psychopathology.

Also interesting was the termination of the myth that BC Ferries was a part of the provincial ambulance system. Attending the meeting were several local residents to address the rumour that on a number of occasions in the last month the ferry failed to sail in the middle of the night for an ambulance callouts. It wasn't just a rumour, as also attending was a representative from the local Ambulance service to address this issue. She related that for the first time in the last 15 years of her experience serving the island, there were ambulance callouts that were not ferried across so that the patients in immediate need of timely emergency medical services could be hospitalized.

BC Ferries confirmed that they no longer can assure the personnel to properly crew the ferry for emergency services. It was obvious that due to a drop in the numbers of vehicles and people paying passage on the local ferry in the last few years, fares will undoubtedly be increased accordingly to cover B.C. Crossing the Great Water At Night

In the middle of the night, at home on Cortes, my wife Sherry went into labour with our second child. It was May, and we'd figured with 17 hours of daylight, we'd know in time to ferry or fly off the island. But it was soon obvious that this baby wasn't waiting for dawn.

There was no doctor on Cortes then and no ambulance service, and the Cortes ferry tied up for the night at Heriot Bay. I called a friend who grew up here and knew everyone, and less than an hour later we were in a open boat leaving the Manson's Landing dock for Campbell River.

Fortunately, it was a calm, clear night, and we sped across the water into the face of an enormous full moon hanging over Vancouver Island. With the noise of the outboard, there was no conversation as Sherry and I held hands and I tried to pant with her through the contractions.

As we rounded the southern tip of Quadra, it seemed like a Vancouver hotel was floating by. Then our little boat hit the wake of an Alaskan cruise ship heading south, Sherry cried out, and our helmsman backed off the motor and said, "You have the baby on this boat, and I'm jumping overboard!"

She resumed her panting, and we bobbed over the wake and made it to the dock next to the ferry terminal. Ethan was born just minutes after we got to the hospital. He'll be 35 next Wednesday, and he hasn't had a birthday yet when Sherry and I haven't thought about that trip and felt grateful for Dennis Newsham's boating skills, his knowledge of the local waters, and his willingness to help a couple new to the island.

Dennis is a lifelong resident of Cortes. He's worked for BC Ferries for years now, helping to keep things running smoothly below the deck on the Cortes ferry. Thanks again, Dennis.

Times Have Changed

Now we have doctors and ambulances, police and firemen, the Coast Guard and helipads plus 911 service and street numbers. We have 12-hours-a-day ferry service from Cortes with the ferry docked at Whaletown overnight. We have 16-hour, daily service from Quadra (18 hours on Fridays & Saturdays). We have many more means of communicating. Cell phones and email didn't exist in 1973.

It would seem that we could hardly have a problem without being able to get skilled, knowledgeable help within a reasonable amount of time. But last week a baby was born in the ambulance in the Quathiaski Cove parking lot, and there were stories circulating on Quadra that BC Ferries refused to make a middle-of-the-night run

to take the ambulance to Campbell River.

Dawn Ross, Quadra unit chief for B.C. Ambulance Service, said the Emergency Services coordinator was unable to contact the night watchman on the ferry, who would normally call the crew for an after-hours run. She said the medevac helicopter and the Coast Guard cutter were on other calls. Mother and child were later taken to Campbell River by the Coast Guard.

Capt. Lynn Hagen, the senior master on the Quadra ferry, said the night watchman's pager did not pick up the call. From now on, she said, the night watchman will also carry a cell phone. FAC members and Quadra residents at Monday's FAC meeting at Cape Mudge Community Hall expressed a great deal of concern about this communication breakdown, and BC Ferries management said they would work with the ambulance personnel to put better systems in place.

But, they noted, there is nothing in BCF's contract with the government that requires it to make after-hours sailings for emergency vehicles, and we were told that the union contract also does not require ferry personnel to be on-call or to turn out for emergencies. In addition, the ferry cannot be used if essential crew are unavailable, if weather conditions are too severe for safety, or if certain mechanical work is being done at night.

The official word, emailed to me Tuesday morning:

"BC Ferries staff is more than pleased to assist our customers living on smaller islands without medical facilities during non-operational hours when we can," said Deborah Marshall, BC Ferries Director of Media Relations.

"However, because our crew is not on-call 24-7, we cannot guarantee we will always be able to muster a crew in the middle of the night. Communities should discuss their concerns with B.C. Ambulance, which is the provider of emergency services."

So we cannot assume that the ferry is always going to be available whenever an ambulance crew needs to get a patient into Campbell River after scheduled hours of operation. And we are dependent on the good will of the people who work on the ferry who, hopefully, will continue to show up to help their neighbours in the same spirit Sherry and I were helped 35 years ago.

When the Ferry Is Running

There has never been any question about priority for the ambulance during BCF's regular hours of operation. They'll always wait for it, and if they are on the Campbell River side, they'll skip loading Quadra-bound vehicles to go get it.

FAC member Bob Brown, who represents Quadra Seniors, has raised other concerns about Quadra residents being able to catch the ferry to make medical appointments, and Campbell River physicians and health care workers being able to get to the island to keep appointments.

In advance of Monday's meeting, Bob received a letter from Corrine Storey, vice president of terminal operations, informed us that BCF is "unable to provide assured loading for physicians and other health care workers to travel to and from work."

In a statement of fleet-wide policy, she also said that anyone with a medical emergency should call 911 and that Emergency Health Services will contact BC Ferries to arrange transport of the ambulance.

Ms. Storey also writes that individuals "who have submitted official requests from a unit social worker, hospital, clinic or doctor can receive medical assured loading letters from BC Ferries with the following general criteria:

"Traveling to/from ongoing medical treatment (e.g. cancer treatment)

"Traveling to/from a critical medical appointment

"Life-threatening illness

"Undue or extreme discomfort and difficulty waiting at the terminal

"Other medical conditions as deemed appropriate by BCF and the referring agency."

"They have been assisting customers with Medical Assured Loading Letters for some time on all our routes and are well versed in the process," writes Ms. Storey, who was recently head of customer relations.

There remains a gray area between the 911 call and the assured loading letter which involves an urgent but not emergency need for a patient to get to a specialist or the hospital in a private vehicle. Discussions are continuing about possible ways to meet this need.

FAC Membership Change

Alois Strannan from Cortes has resigned from the FAC. The terms of reference for FACs allow the chair to appoint a replacement so Monday we welcomed Myrna Kerr from Manson's Landing to the committee. In the fall, expressions of interest in serving on the FAC for the next three years will be sought.

Card Tricks & Ticket Tips

The Experience Card had only been available for a month when I heard from someone who lost an unregistered card and was frustrated because there was no way to recover the \$27.80 receipts said was still on the card.

So here's a way to protect yourself:

There are two numbers on the back of every card which you need to register it. One is the 9-digit card number. The other is the verification number which is hidden by stuff you have to scratch off.

As soon as you put money on the card, if you are not going to register the card right away, copy those numbers and file them where you can find them. Then if you lose the card, you can still go online or call in and register it to an account in your name--and then report that you lost the card and get another one to access your remaining funds.

Quadra foot passengers, including those with bicycles, have the option of continuing to buy paper ticket books and hand the attendant at the ramp a paper ticket to get on board.

Since you have to put \$40 on your card to get the \$4.25 prepaid passenger fare for Quadra, and a book of 10 passenger tickets costs \$42.50, there are no big savings for those who regularly walk on and would just as soon avoid the ticket booth.

There are plans to have a card reader at the waiting room, but until it is installed, this practice is intended to reduce congestion and delays at the ticket booth--and accommodate those who have mobility problems or who arrive at the last minute from work.

However, if you have older Quadra passenger tickets that are only worth \$4.05, you have to go back to the ticket booth, pay 20 cents, and get a boarding pass.

Area I Regional Director's Report



May 9, 2008

he past weekend brought the first truly spring-like weather this year. It was truly delightful to retire coats and toques for sunglasses and sunhats and spend the entire day outdoors and be totally comfortable while doing it. My garden, which is about a month behind, heaved a sigh of appreciation. The garlic plants are healthy and strong. Peas are up. Onion and brassica transplants are in the ground. Now if only the slugs can be kept from devouring everything!

A number of community issues have been bursting forth of late which require community meetings of some sort or another. Below is a review an April meeting plus an overview of another to be convened in a couple of weeks. Arrangements are ongoing for yet another with date, time and place to be confirmed (hopefully) soon. Announcements will be carried in both local flyers.

High Speed Internet Meeting

On April 21, nearly fifty people gathered for a meeting in Manson's Hall to hear from Telus and NetworkBC representatives about the Connecting Communities Agreement (CCA) and how it prevents Telus from providing high speed Internet Service to Cortes Island. Wilf Bangert (Network BC) gave a detailed presentation of the CCA. This was followed by a lengthy question and answer session. Through the course of the evening, the rumor suggesting high-speed Internet service would be coming to the island was dashed. (For further information please read the letter from Telus Director for the North Island, Hichem Garnaoui, online at www.discoveryislander.ca)

Through those discussions it became obvious that Twincomm, our local service provider, needs more capacity to meet increasing demands, and Telus and NetworkBC will work to resolve that problem. The method used to deliver broadband service to small communities is to first bring service to area having greatest population density. Once the centre is established the service can then expand to areas with sparser densities. Twincomm has followed this model and announced they will be able to deliver service to additional area in the Whaletown area starting this June.

Some people were appreciative to learn the parameters governing broadband Internet service. Others had issue with the process and policy developed between Telus and the provincial government. Currently the provincial policy is based upon a business model rather than a model, which invests in the development of rural infrastructure. These policies are the jurisdiction of The Minister of Labour and Citizen Services, Olga Ilich. Anvone wishing changes to these policies should write to: Minister Ilich, Box 9052, Stn. Prov. Gov't, Victoria BC, V8W 9E2 or olga.ilich.mla@leg.bc.ca. The federal government regulates telecommunications through the CRTC. It is the CRTC that directs Telus to provide telephones as an essential service. Anyone wishing to have high-speed Internet access made an essential service should write to: CRTC, Ottawa, Canada, K1A 0N2 or fax: 819-994-0218. Please remember to copy letters MLA Claire Trevena - claire.Trevena.mla@leg.bc.ca so constituent concerns can be documented and acted upon.



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

Finally, the weather has warmed and we can get to work in the garden without the long johns. This is good news for participants in the Garden Sharing program, an initiative undertaken with Quadra Circle. Fifteen partners are now sharing soil and toil. Eventually they'll share harvest, too. This is a strong start for a new idea.

Food sustainability is a main focus for I CAN. A local food directory has been in progress for about six weeks and is nearing the end of research and data collection. The directory should be compiled and printed for distribution later this summer.

We are also beginning work on a Quadra Green Book. Similar to LIVING GREEN ON CORTEZ, our publication will have information on alternative energy technologies and low ecological impact building. It will also include suggestions for earth-healthy lifestyle choices.

Our first group project, back in January, was a valentine campaign at the Sierra Club Energy Fair. Valentines were made ahead and fairgoers added their comments. Prime Minister Harper received 103 valentines with pithy slogans such as:

Put your heart and soul into reducing ghg emissions.

Melt my heart, not the polar ice caps.

I have a burning desire for action on climate change.

Share my love of the planet.

We didn't get a valentine back. 
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'Closing in on Sustainable Salmon Farming'

Province Funds New Seniors' Housing on Cortes

VICTORIA – A \$380,000 grant from the Province's Housing Endowment Fund is enabling the Cortes Island Seniors Society to begin the construction of six new cottages for seniors.

"These homes will provide Islanders with high quality and affordable seniors' housing," said Minister responsible for Housing, Rich Coleman. "The Province invested \$250 million in the Housing Endowment Fund so organizations such as the Cortes Island Seniors Society can try innovative new programs that are not traditionally available for funding."

The six cottages are being built on a site owned by the Cortes Island Seniors Society and will offer affordable housing for low to moderate income seniors. Construction is anticipated to be complete by April 2009. Support services will be provided by the community and the society anticipates local volunteer support in the construction of these units.

"Our partnership with the Province will allow us to effectively support the seniors in our community," said Susan Ellingsen, president of the society. "This project will give seniors the opportunity to live in the community they helped build. The Cortes community has banded together to make this project a reality."

The \$250-million Housing Endowment Fund was established in the 2007 provincial budget. The fund generates investment revenue of approximately \$10 million a year, which is used to fund and support innovative housing solutions. Budget 2008 increased the amount the Province invests in affordable housing and shelters to more than \$380 million a year, more than three times as much as in 2001.

7 Steps to **Emergency Preparedness**

Residents need to be prepared to be self sufficient for a minimum of 3 - 7 days in a disaster, with 7 days becoming the new standard based on lessons learned from Hurricane Katrina. Please add one or two items to your kit each day this week, by the end of the week you will have built a solid foundation for your family's emergency preparedness kit.

Day 1 - Water - Make your first bottled water purchase. It is recommended that families stock 4 litres of water per person per day. (2 litres for drinking, 2 litres for cooking and cleaning/ hygiene per person per day, (remember your pets!) Most bottled water has a 2-year shelf life, rotate stock with new purchases.

Day 2 - Food - Set aside food that won't spoil, such as canned food, energy bars and dried fruits. Make sure it's food that everyone in your family will eat, make additional purchases if necessary. Replace once a year or prior to expiry so that it doesn't go to waste. (Include a manual can opener.)

Day 3 - Flashlight and Radio - You will need a separate flashlight and portable radio to stay with your emergency kit. If they are battery powered make sure to include extra batteries and to replace them once a year. Wind-up radios and flashlights are ideal.

Day 4 - First Aid Kit - Your emergency kit will require F.A. Kit that stays with it at all times. If you don't have the necessary supplies at home to make one, there are numerous safety supply stores that sell first aid kits.

Day 5 - Special Items - This will be different for every family, may include prescription medications, infant formula, pet food and equipment for people with disabilities.

Day 6 - Other Essential Items - Extra keys for your car and house. also include some cash in smaller bills as there may not be electricity for bank machines, supply of change for payphones, Candles, matches or lighters.

Day 7 - Assemble Your Supplies and Your Family's Emergency Plan - Prepare a family emergency plan including out of area contact information and a family reunification plan. Give each family member copy of plan and contacts, and store copy of plan along with your assembled supplies in a suitable container/bag in a safe and accessible area in or near your home. Water may need to be stored separately.

Day 8 - Sleep Well - Well done, you've created a great foundation for your family's emergency preparedness kit. If you are still motivated there are additional recommended supplies you could add such as: extra clothing and footwear, sleeping bags, whistle, garbage bags, toilet paper, safety gloves, basic tools such as hammer and screw driver etc., small camp stove and fuel.

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

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Halliday's Viewpoint

Canada's Lack of Zenn

hile exiting the Post Office in the Cove the other day I noted the arrival of a very big, shiny and obviously brand-new Dodge Ram 4-door, 4 wheel drive truck. The young owner acknowledged the age of the truck as one day, and was obviously tickled pink with his new wheels. I looked up the truck on Chrysler Canada's website, and nicely dressed this machine will set you back near \$50,000. Curious about the truck I spent some time locating the relevant technical data, and was astonished to learn that the behemoth could travel (unloaded) 900 klicks on a tank of diesel. Of course, that trip will cost \$185 at today's price of \$1.39 per litre. This time last year that cost would have been \$111. Next year? Who knows, but I'm pretty confident it will not be cheaper. If this driver doesn't tow big objects or carry maximum loads, and drives an average of 30,000 kilometres per year, that fuel price differential alone translates to \$2,442 extra fuel costs - annually.

On the other end of the scale, a friend of mine referred me to the website of ZENN Motor Company Inc, a Canadian company coincidentally featured in the current edition of The Economist magazine (May 3, 2008 - Not on Our Roads). Headquartered in Toronto, ZENN is a TSX listed company formerly known as Feel Good Cars Corporation that builds LSV's, or Low Speed Vehicles, designed for urban use and entirely electrically powered - just plug them into a standard wall socket and they fully charge in 8 hours. Their website (www.zenncars.com), which is understandably very high tech, tells the story. ZENN, short for Zero Emission, No Noise, is a start-up company that went from zero sales in 2006 to 160 units sold in 2007. They were all sold into the USA, where ZENN has established 35 dealer locations in 20 states. The small car (somewhat larger than a Smart car) is legal to operate on city streets in 44 states - no highway use though, as these babies max the speedo at 40 kph. But that city driving, using the same 30,000 km average, if driving a ZENN, based upon our Hydro rate of .06 per kilowatt hour, would cost only \$325, not the \$2,300 ZENN's website calculates as the current fuel cost for my small truck. Of course, you can't compare the ZENN to the big Dodge, nor is that my intent. But the running costs of big units are becoming burdensome for many, and their sales (and resale value) are sure to plummet as fuel prices increase. Millions upon millions of Canadian city dwellers have an option to switch to a ZENN, which also has tremendously positive environmental implications - Americans are certainly starting to do so. However, Canadians actually do not have that option.

It seems that Transport Canada has decided, in its infinite wisdom, to withhold approval for the use of ZENN on Canadian streets, based upon safety concerns related to potential collisions. The US government, on the other hand, recently approved the use of the vehicles by federal government agencies, opening up a vast new market for companies such as ZENN and its few peers. As stated before, 44 US States have authorized the use of the ZENN on their city streets and there are 45,000 LSV's of various manufacture are operating safely - not a fatality reported to date, according to The Economist article. But the Stephen Harper government, undoubtedly with the wholehearted support of their oil-patch benefactors, is adamant about its refusal, and has so far refused to release the crash test data they say prompted the decision. A competitor to ZENN, also Canadian, has given up, sold itself to a Pakistani firm which moved its operations to Pakistan and will export to the USA. One has to wonder how many present - and much more importantly, future manufacturing positions this Harper government decision has eliminated, as the concept catches on and demand for such vehicles grows in lockstep with fuel prices. Big oil, one must suspect, is not thrilled with the concept of vehicles that don't burn any oil or oil by-products, except in the generation (in some cases) of the electricity that power them. Exxon recently announced it's past quarterly profit at US\$11.7 billion, the highest profit ever reported. Exxon earned US\$40.6 billion in fiscal 2007, or as CNN calculates, \$1,300 per second. Other oil companies are expected to report similar bumper profits as we stubbornly continue to tolerate our addiction to their products.

James Howard Kunstler is a US author (I highly recommend The Long Emergency) who is convinced we are entering a new era of monumental change predicated by oil's disappearance as a cheap and plentiful natural resource. In a recent speech to the Commonwealth Club of California (transcript at Alertnet.com - We Must Imagine a Future Without Cars) he notes among other things "In 1970 we [the USA] produced 10 million barrels per day. Now we're down to less than five, and we consume 20 million barrels per day." On a global basis, "Net world production is going down by just under 3% per year, but total exports from the top ten exporters are going down at an even steeper rate...showing a net export decline rate of seven percent the past year. Why? Because on top of production decline rates, nations like Saudi Arabia, Iran and Venezuela are using more of their oil at home with rising populations and more automobiles." And as we all know, non-oil producing nations such as China and India have demand growing for automobiles at a rate never before seen - fossil fuel burning vehicles, of course.

PBS recently ran a documentary called "The Future of Cars" which, in spite of the two somewhat annoying hosts "Click and Clack', brothers recruited from NPR's (National Public Radio) automotive program, did a reasonable job of exploring some of the alternatives in development. In it they focus on GM's response to the growing demand for cars like the ZENN. Their answer is the oh-so-originally named "Volt", which purports to offer the same performance as the ZENN, but will be equipped with a fuel powered generator as well. As usual, GM stands out as a laggard in their development work, and are "hopeful they can begin production by the end of the decade". Meanwhile Toyota is eating their lunch with the Prius hybrid. I travel to Vancouver fairly frequently, and I haven't ridden in a cab belonging to at least 3 different cab companies that wasn't a Prius, at least not in recent memory. I have no sympathy whatsoever for the executives and the shareholders of the major North American car producers, who collectively have had their head in the sands since at least 1976 when they started reversing the process of re-engineering launched by the 1974 oil "crisis". That crisis will probably look like a tea party compared to what is coming at us in terms of less supply at ever increasing cost. The program also pointed out that the average weight of a US manufactured half-ton pickup only dropped in weight for a few years post-1974, and has steadily increased to where they are 40% heavier when than before the oil crisis. Yes, they have more efficient engines, but the gain is absorbed in pushing around the added weight. And the biggest gas-guzzlers made by these companies are, of course, their most profitable market segment. However, all that is undoubtedly about to change.

Early in 2007 the Chief Economist of the CIBC forecast that oil prices would reach \$110 per barrel by April of this year, and was fairly lonely in that opinion, which was of course correct. Jeffery Rubin has just issued his latest thoughts - \$150 per barrel by 2010 and \$200 by 2012. Using today's price of \$1.34 per litre against oil at \$116 per barrel, my math produced a price estimate of \$2.30 per litre at \$200 per barrel. That would mean that big shiny Dodge Ram will likely cost northwards of \$300 to fill up in just a few years...and my little Ford Ranger will probably gulp up \$150 at a time. Let's hope ZENN is successful in appealing the government's scandalous obstruction, and in producing the 500 klick range, 50 MPH top speed model they have in development. A pickup truck version would suit me just fine.
