Dear QCU members;

New Federal Government legislation affecting all Canadian Finanical Institutions took effect June 23, 2008 with the enactment of the Proceeds of Crime (Money Laundering) and Terrorist Financing Act and Regulations (Canada), commonly called PCMLTFA. Quadra Credit Union, along with all Credit Unions and Banks, is required to comply with the provisions of the Act.

The Act requires us to collect certain personal information in "transacting" with a member; some of this information has been routinely collected and recorded in the past, but in many instances new questions will be asked of you when making some transactions. An example of this is that you will now be asked the "Intended Use" for the account you are opening, or when making an investment.

We feel it is important for members to understand that we are not being nosy, nor are we collecting data for any use by QCU itself. This information is required, by federal law, to be recorded and retained, and failure of the institution and/or an employee to do so can result in significant criminal penalties and fines. We trust members will appreciate we must comply with the law.

Members are encouraged to contact the Financial Transactions and Reports Ananlysis Centre of Canada (FINTRAC) with any questions or concerns they may have. They can be reached at 1-866-346-8722 or www.fintrac.gc.ca.



Blood supplies are critically low. Without renewed commitment from donors, urgent surgeries will be cancelled and many people suffering life threatening illnesses will be endangered. I am sadly a member of the latter group.

As a lifelong donor myself, I recognize the time and effort required to donate blood. A visit to the blood donor clinic will take an hour or more from your already busy schedule. I cannot speak for others but that hour is not only a gift to me but to my children. I use that gift well. Four years ago I was diagnosed with a rare and invariably fatal cancer and given a few months to live. To make a long story short I am still here but without a couple of units of packed red cells every few weeks and immunoglobulins once a month, my beautiful girls would be without a dad. I may be too ill to be a great dad but I am not too ill to love them well. They are wonderful children and while they deserve better than I can give them, what I can provide is way better than nothing at all.

So I urge you - for my children - call Canadian Blood Services at 1 888 2donate (1 888 236 6283) or go to www.blood.ca and arrange an appointment for your next trip to Campbell River. Don't do it just for me. Do it for all those children who need their parents. Do it for yourself. One day someone you know or someone in your family may need transfusions and by giving blood and setting a good example you insure a much better chance of a successful outcome in a difficult situation.

If you belong to a club or other kind of group, bring it up at your next meeting. Call a friend and make a trip to the blood donor clinic a part of your next social engagement. You cannot possibly know how much your effort will be appreciated but I assure you I personally am grateful for every new day with my children and we know it is not just doctors keeping me alive - it is you.

Free Firewood

Free Firewood is now available. We can help load your vehicle after the Community Lunch on Wednesday, November 19 from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. Bring you vehicle and let's meet at the side door on the South Side of the Ouadra Community Centre. If you do not have a vehicle, we can arrange to deliver in most cases. For example, we are delivering a truckload of wood to the home of a single mom without a vehicle this week. So if the above time doesn't work for you, call Steve Moore at 285-3323 or Paul Bishop at 285-2766 to make an alternative appointment.

This service is provided by the Free Wood Association which is a small group of communitty volunteers whose sole purpose is to supply free wood to elders, single parents and low-income families & indivuduals during the Winter months.

While we can supply small amounts of wood for free in emergency situations, we do not have the capacity fo substitute for your regular Winter season wood supplier.

Last year, we were able to help nearly 40 people in difficult situations

The shelter for the wood is shaping up slowly with the foundation in and the poles up but we have temporarily kept the wood dry by covering it up.

Free Money



KARDIA melds fable, fiction, science and metaphor to tell the story of Hope, a pathologist, who embarks on an unusual journey of reconciliation.

Hope was an abandoned infant, found and raised by a veteran war pilot and a Scottish caregiver. When she underwent experimental heart surgery, her surrogate father donated his blood for a transfusion for her. As a young girl with a colourful imagination, Hope constructed an enchanting world for herself. As Hope, the adult, revisits the curious tale of her childhood she explores the landscape of love, loss and the human heart. Her journey is an enigmatic one that is only fully understood in its final moments, when Hope reconciles what she believes with the truth she discovers.

Director Su Rynard delivers a beautifully crafted piece about love and what the absence of it can do to the human body. Elegantly shot with effective mood scoring and dreamlike pacing, it is a story about the limits and potential of the body's most important muscle.



BC's Oceans: Time to Act

Quadra Islanders recently received sobering information about the state of our ocean fisheries from Colin Campbell, a scientific advisor to the Sierra Club of BC.

Campbell, with a Ph.D in paleontology and world-wide research experience on marine ecologies, provided historical and global perspectives about our planet's ecology that is rarely available in traditional media.

By calculating the amount of fossil fuel burned since the beginning of the Industrial Revolution, for example, scientists can calculate that we have added 480 billion tonnes of carbon dioxide to the biosphere. Much of this CO2 has been stored in the world's oceans — we are presently adding 1 million tonnes per hour as this gas transfers from the atmosphere to the seas. Since CO2 forms carbonic acid in salt water, the oceans are becoming more acidic — a drop in pH from 8.16 to 8.05 has occurred in the last 200 years. We are now close to the threshold where microscopic plants and animals, the biological foundation of the entire ocean ecology, will be unable to form the calcium structures they need to survive.

Campbell also pointed out that paleological studies reveal that only 200 billion tonnes of carbon dioxide in the biosphere accounts for the difference between an ice age or no ice age. With our present level of emissions, we may already be committed to a warming that will eventually melt the 2km thick ice sheets of Greenland, thereby raising the world"s oceans by 6 metres — most of the marine damage would be to corals but almost all coastal cities would be flooded and prime agricultural land would be lost to ocean encroachment and salinization.

As for ocean fisheries, Campbell explained that about 75 percent are overfished, depleted or in collapse. When a new species is targeted by industrial fishing, the capture is so efficient that 80 percent of the stock is gone within 15 years

Oceans are already showing signs of this overfishing: biomass change such as the proliferation of lower species (jellyfish); evolutionary pressure that produces smaller fish; and ecosystem restructuring where shrimp, for example, have proliferated after the collapse of Newfoundland cod stocks. Unless overfishing is curtailed, Campbell explained, we will soon be encountering "issues of equity" - "who fishes and who eats". (This is already an issue in BC as wild salmon stocks continue to decline.) Barring other factors, Campbell said, the restoration of most global fisheries could be accomplished by placing one-third of the oceans in no-fishing marine reserves for a century.

Campbell was critical of salmon farming, noting the inefficiency of using 2-20kg of wild fish to produce 1kg of farmed fish, particularly when herbivorous species such as tilapia could be a quality food source without stressing marine ecologies.

As for BC's wild salmon, Campbell suggested we might consider abandoning an oceanbased fishery and replacing it with an estuary-based fishery. This would allow the specific targeting of specific fish and thereby reduce the capture of endangered stocks that are now inadvertently caught at sea with healthy stocks. Such a change in fishing would also allow for a far more accurate count of returning fish and a more precise management of the resource. This was the system practiced by the coastal First Nations people who caught considerable fish but achieved sustainable stocks for

The evening was enlightening but unsettling. However, it was honest and frank. And, as Colin Campbell explained, if we are going to address the growing urgency of our environmental challenges, we need to accurately define them. HIs implicit message was that we already have a fairly clear idea of what is going wrong and what we have to do to address our environmental problems. What we lack is political will.

Clearly, as the evening revealed, he has been doing his work as a scientist. Now he is inviting us to do ours.

To all the Quadra Islanders involved in Nov 01 Exercise

A big THANK YOU is in order to all the nearly 70 volunteers of Quadra Emergency Program, who participated in our FIRST Exercise of our Quadra Island Emergency Plan. Our thanks as well to the 29 people who acted as evacuees for the practice, and were processed through the various areas of reception centre.

The scenario for the Exercise, was an Earthquake at 0930 in AM Saturday, causing structural damage to various homes on Ouadra and necessitating evacuation of several residents.

Our first attempt in implementing an Emergency Operations Centre was truly a learning experience. On Quadra Island, we have well organized, fully functioning responders in our Fire, Police and Ambulance groups. Attempting to coordinate and develop an action plan with these self sufficient groups was truly humbling for me. Representatives from each group, were fully supportive of the EOC concept and I am grateful for their assistance and cooperation.

Ambulance "responded" to 3 incidents, Fire checked out much of the 4 main quadrants in the Fire District and Police provided support in "evacuations, investigated reported lootings", and assisted with the Security group at Reception Centre. Our thanks to all three groups. Your participation made it all work so much better.

As is supported by the provincial emergency program, evacuees are asked to report to a Reception Centre. These Centres are set up to register evacuees to assist in family reunification, offer vouchers

for food, clothing, transportation accommodation for the first 72 hours after a disaster occurs along with any necessary first aid, emotional support, and short term child and pet care.

Our planned main reception centre on QI is the Community

Centre on West Road, depending on the disaster area and the condition of the roads.

Howie Seimens and Russ Hotsenpiller from the Strathcona Reg. District Emergency Program, were present to support and advise in the EOC, and to take part in volunteer appreciation at the Reception Center just before it was "opened for business. " at 1300 hours. They both expressed their pleasure in seeing the Volunteers' skill in setting up and running the Reception Centre.

I just have to say how proud I was, when I walked into the Reception Centre, and saw how well everything was going. It looked just like the videos we see of REAL Reception Centres - so professional, and well organized.. I know from the debriefing that not everything went smoothly, and that it was a learning experience for all – but we are a very "young" group in the big picture of emergency preparedness and we are still evolving.

I feel all of you should be proud of your efforts. Your success in the overall Reception Centre presentation is a tribute to the number of volunteer hours each of you spent in training, planning, organizing, and in the actual physical work involved in the set up and effective running of the RC.

We consider this Exercise a great success. We are fortunate to have so many talented leaders willing to give time and effort to our Emergency Program. I had so many Volunteers tell me what fun they had and how much they enjoyed being part of the group and the Exercise. This is a reflection of the positive attitude, and the life skills, all of you bring to the program.

Author's Labour of Love Brings History to Light

Thirty years of work will come to fruition this November when Quadra Island author Jeanette Taylor launches her new book, Tidal Passages: A History of the Discovery Islands (\$36.95, Harbour) with events on Quadra and Cortes.

Taylor, formerly with the curatorial staff for the Museum at Campbell River and now the executive director of the Campbell River Art Gallery, says the 300-plus page book is a labour of love and I'll be sad to let the project go. There's no end of fabulous tales to collect!

In Tidal Passages, author Jeanette Taylor delves into the history of Cortes, Read, Sonora, Maurelle, Hardwicke, Stuart, Redonda and Thurlow Islands, also covering many smaller islands and the surrounding mainland inlets (though not Quadra Island, which is the subject of a future book by the author).

Taylor introduces us to many inspiring characters in these pages and a few rogues and scoundrels too. We meet Edgar Wylie, one of the most notorious of the many eccentrics. rebels, bad guys and intellectuals who have made Read Island their home over the past century; old George McGee, born around 1850, who survived several slave-taking raids as a child and managed to live through the 1862-64 smallpox epidemic that killed many of his relatives on Cortes; Bonnie (Whittington) Brown, a famous cougar hunter from Read Island who had ten kills to her credit when she was still just a girl; Dan McDonald, who was rumoured to have been part of the infamous Jesse James Gang before he relocated to Twin Island, then called Ulloa, in 1889; and Mike Manson, the resilient and charismatic pioneer and businessman who helped shape presentday Cortes Island.

Since the 1970s, Taylor has collected hundreds of photographs and documents and conducted interviews with long-time residents whose memories reached as far back as the late 1890s. The result is an absorbing story of pioneering, resilience, humour and

kinship. Overflowing with archival photos and painstakingly researched, Tidal Passages is history and storytelling at its best.

The public is invited to meet Jeanette Taylor at two island book launches. Book Bonanza hosts a free slide show presentation and talk at the Quadra Island Community Hall on Wednesday, November 19 at 7:00pm (doors open at 6:30pm). The Cortes Island Museum & Archives and Marnie's Books will also host a free slide show presentation and talk at Mansons Hall on Cortes Island on Friday, November 28 at 7:30pm (doors open at 7:00pm). 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
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General Board Meeting Presentation on Integrated Health Network in Sooke **Open House** Wednesday, Nov. 26, 2008

he weather this fall was the ideal blend of rain and sun creating glorious autumn colours associated with the interior or "back east." The maple leaves transformed into a golden glow that was most pleasant to view as I travelled about to October meetings. The recent southeaster has relocated the glow from the trees to the ground offering the opportunity to examine the grandeur in a new and different way. The size of some of the leaves is as breathtaking as their colour. Seasonal change is one of the many transitions happening around us, I'll outline a few others.

Local Elections

On November 15, Cortes residents will be going to the polls to elect our next local/regional representative. Cortes (henceforth to be known as Area B) has three candidates seeking the honour of representing our island community. They are: Noba Anderson, Myrna Kerr, and Stephen Moyse. All three candidates offer their unique strengths and experience to the electorate and I encourage each voter to investigate which candidate they feel would best represent the community for the next three years.

Opportunities to learn about the candidates are increasing. Each has a posting on the Tideline at www.cortesisland.com and everyone can peruse these presentations. Each is being interviewed on Cortes Radio on consecutive Tuesday evenings starting at 7:10 pm (Oct. 28 -- Stephen; Nov. 4 -- Noba; Nov. 11 -- Myrna). The Cortes Seniors group has once again organized an All Candidates Debate. The debate will be held on Sunday November 9, 7:30 pm at Manson's Hall. It is hoped Cortes Radio will be able to carry a live broadcast of the debate for those unable to attend.

This is a pivotal time for Cortes. However you choose a candidate, whether it's strategically, logically, or instinctively, please exercise your democratic right, privilege and responsibility, and cast a vote on November 15.

Harbour Authority of Cortes Island AGM

The annual general meeting of the Harbour Authority of Cortes Island (HACI) was held on October 19. Manson's main hall was filled with members and interested islanders eager to discuss the live aboard situation on the local docks, which the HACI oversees. Joe Cliffe

chaired the discussion and everyone wishing to speak was given the opportunity to be heard. Speakers eloquently spoke in favor of a made on Cortes solution. The membership voted to form a committee from its members to review the live aboard situation and develop a community solution. This committee will report to the HACI board by Dec. 1, 2008 and at a special membership meeting to be held by February 1, 2009. The special committee consists of four members (Delia Becker, Ron Bowen, Hubert Havelaar, and Melanie Mielke) and 3 Board members (Jedidiah Duyf, Randy Van Eyk and Eli McKenty) who were appointed after the election of officers.

Following the elections the executive board was formed as follows: Eli McKenty (President), Joe Cliffe (Vice-President), Andy Ellingsen (Secretary), and Ray Grout (Treasurer). Directors are June Cameron, Jedidiah Duyf, Vern Logan and Randy Van Eyk. The community looks forward to the progressive and positive work being done by the Special Committee and HACI executive.

I recently received more good news relating to the HACI. The Integrated Land Management Bureau has finally issued a 30-year lease on District Lot 1510 (the Whaletown Dock) for community dock purposes. Thanks to all the folks who worked steadfastly for many years to gain this facility for the community.

Parking in Downtown Manson's Landing

The Southern Cortes Community Association organized a meeting on October 22 to discuss the parking congestion in "downtown" Manson's Landing. Two areas of concern were identified—the first in the "downtown core around the community hall and the second near the entrance to Hague Lake. Representatives from the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (TRAN), Emcon, the RCMP, Friend's of Cortes Island, Fire department, the Seniors Society, local businesses, concerned and generous citizens, and the regional director were present to discuss these ongoing safety concerns. Everyone recognized the dangers presented by folks speeding through the area plus the ever-increasing parking congestion which endangers pedestrians and bicyclists, and restricts access for the school bus, emergency vehicles, and road maintenance (i.e.: snow

in Courtenay, agreed to paint two crosswalks across Sutil Point Road (at Charlotte and Beasley Roads), post more visible speed signs, and speak to the Ministry of Parks about the summer parking congestion around Hague Lake Park.

It is recognized that lack of sufficient parking is one of the main difficulties facing the area. A number of potential parking possibilities were identified and discussed and hopefully will start to manifest over the next year or so.

Hazardous Waste

Many island residents, myself included, were surprised by an announcement that appeared on the Tideline (Oct. 24) and the Marketer community flyer (Oct.31) stating that as of November 1, the Cortes Island Waste Management Centre (aka the Recycling Centre) would no longer be accepting a host of toxic items including, all automotive fluids, batteries, electronics, garden chemicals, paint and tires. Residents started contacting me on November 1 via phone and email. Unfortunately, I had no knowledge or information about the situation and being the weekend had no access to regional district staff

On November 3, Dova Wiltshire, the contractor who runs the Cortes Recycling Centre, posted an article on the Tideline explaining that the Cortes facility does not have the licence to handle these materials under the BC Eco Stewardship Regulations. She has been in contact with an organization in Campbell River, Encorp, which handles some of these products and has made arrangements for a mail-out to be distributed in the near future. Items not covered by Encorp should be returned to the point of purchase for proper disposal.

There are concerns that some folks won't bother to return these products to Campbell River and that they will end up in our forests, waters, or landfill (via our transfer stations). Returning these products to town will ensure they are disposed of safely. Changing any habit is always difficult, however, with some time, effort and patience we can make this change and keep our island clean, green and safe.

The search for creative solutions to deal with hazardous waste will be ongoing. I will, of course, relay any pertinent information to island residents as I receive it.

Gnat Road Beach Access

I am very pleased to announce that today, (November 3); the Gnat Road Beach Access trail was completed. The trail is quite new and will probably be muddy in places but is now open for public use...and on a clear day the view of the mainland is spectacular and definitely worth the walk. Winter rains will dictate if any further work needs to be done come springtime.

Mark Appleyard, trail builder extraordinaire, designed and built the trail. Philip Wood was Mark's principle assistant with Aidan Wood, and Bob Chapman fulfilling the role of helpers. Sandra Wood organized the neighborhood volunteers. Thanks to each of you for your part in ensuring this trail got built for the community. Your efforts represent a shining example of how volunteers continue to be a vital part of our island way of life. My most heartfelt appreciation to each of you.

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Fitness & Healthy Bones Osteoporosis

Osteoporosis which means porous bones, is a systemic skeletal disease characterized by low bone mass and deterioration of bone strength, leading to bone fragility and an increased risk of fracture.

Approximately $50\,\%$ of woman and $25\,\%$ of men over the age of 50 will suffer an osteoporotic fracture.

According to the National Osteoporosis foundation, the associated cost of osteoporotic fractures is approximately \$18 million annually.

In addition to their cost, fractures have a debilitating effect on the independence and quality of life. Moreover, the problem will worsen, and it has been estimated that 35 years from now hip fractures will be three to four times more common than they are now.

Research shows that our less active lifestyle and poor nutrition has caused decreased bone health and muscle strength- both which are risk factors for fall- related bone fractures.

Effective treatment options for for osteoporosis include medication, nutrition and exercise.

Exercise can improve muscle mass, promote strength gain, and improve dynamic balance and therefore is a unique and vastly underused therapy for people with osteoporosis and at increased risk of falling.

An exercise program of falls prevention, strength, balance and coordination is designed to improve strength and functional ability, and increase confidence and quality of life into old age.

Weight-bearing physical activity is essential for the normal development and maintenance of a healthy skeleton. Activities that focus on increasing muscle strength also may be beneficial for non-weight-bearing bones.

Sedentary woman increase bone mass slightly by becoming more active, but the primary benefit of the increased activity may be in avoiding further loss of bone that occurs with inactivity.

On November 2nd I-CAN hosted a shopping bag sewing bee at the community center. After weeks of preparing and a couple of preparatory work days, the Bee arrived with a flurry of activity. Things were well organized. About 35 people of all ages and levels of sewing experience dropped in to sew a bag (or two or three). Many took patterns and material home. Others shared their expertise and machines over the afternoon of sewing. It was a busy and dynamic day of picking fabric, ironing, cutting, pinning and finally, sewing. After each bag was completed it was marked on the "bag thermometer". We beat our goal for the day which was 55 bags made (not including fabric and patterns taken home). Also each person could iron or sew on an "I-Can Bag Bee" tag. Thanks to Hannah Rohan for designing our cute label.

This was a great success because of people volunteering their time. The key organizers were Lisa Spizziri, Maureen Fox, and Annette Yourk. They did a great job taking on and coordinating the Bag Bee. Watching and Hoping

s I type this, record numbers of Americans are making their way to the polls to vote in what may well be the most important election in their country's history. According to most major polls Obama either has a slight lead over McCain or a very large one, depending upon whose poll you are reading. Personally, I agree with Paddy Power, whose confidence in an Obama victory is so strong that immediately following the final presidential debate he paid out \$1.4 million to customers who had bet with him that Obama would win. Power, who owns 260 betting offices across Ireland, was quoted on NPR as saying McCain's odds "are drifting like a ship without a captain" while "Obama is at 9 to 1, which means that you have to put down \$9 to win \$1, that's how short he is. He's a red, red-hot favourite". In Power's view Obama had already won, so he paid off gleeful Obama punters several weeks early.

Further positive signs of an Obama victory can be found at www.iftheworldcouldvote. com, an Icelandic website that collects votes from global participants and displays the demographic results. As of 10AM November 4th the site had registered 803,986 votes from 212 different countries, with 87.2% voting in Obama's favour. This almost mirrors the results of the Globe and Mail's poll yesterday, in

which 6,521 Canadians voted for Obama, while only 1,450 (18%) were for McCain. Unfortunately, during the 2004 elections both of these organizations had John Kerry handily

defeating George W. Bush, a result that perhaps should have happened but unfortunately did not. The most conservative of the unscientific polls is certainly at the staid old Economist, whose global poll registered 85% voting for Obama. A Midwinter's Ferry Tale

At last, some good news about fares:

The hefty August 1 fuel surcharges were cut in half Tuesday because of falling oil prices. And all of BCF's fares will be reduced by one third for December and January, due to a decision by Premier Gordon Campbell to ante up \$20 million from the provincial treasury to restore some canceled sailings and hopefully boost declining traffic.

The Campbell River-Quadra Experience Card charge for a car and driver dropped from \$18.30 to \$16.70 on Tuesday and will be \$11.70 for the two midwinter months. The passenger fare went from \$5.15 to \$4.70 on Tuesday and will drop to \$3.30.

A car-and-driver roundtrip from Campbell River to Cortes was a \$42 Experience until Tuesday when the surcharge cut made it \$38.45. In December and January, it will be \$26.95. A Cortes passenger was paying \$6.75 for the same trip at the card rate. Tuesday that fare became \$6.20. On Dec. 1, it will be \$4.35.

Cash and commercial rates will be lower in similar proportions. On the Vancouver Island-Lower Mainland ferries, two people and a car will pay about \$50 each way in December and January instead of about \$75.

What prompted this sudden response by the government, after five years of pushing BC Ferries' increasing costs onto ferry users, was a precipitous decline in traffic on the major routes in September. Traffic didn't

just back off. "It went off a cliff," CFO Rob Clarke said.

With BCF's 2008-09 business plan predicated on 2.3% more passengers and 2% more vehicles than the year before, BCF and the government were startled by a 13% drop in fare revenue on BCF's major routes this September compared to 2007. Over the whole system, there was a 10% drop.

Of course, the greater financial world was bubbling like fondue, gas was almost as costly per litre as bottled water, and the Canadian dollar was as unattractive to U.S. travelers as their investment statements.

BCF responded by parking some of its brand-new Super C ferries in favour of smaller, older ships on the mainland-Vancouver Island runs and by canceling some sailings on those routes and on the Horseshoe Bay-Langdale route that connects the Sunshine Coast to Vancouver.

Raising fares is one thing. We whine and travel less. Cutting the schedule is something else. Residents of the Sunshine Coast who depended on those sailings responded with a roar of objection that crossed the water to Victoria like a tsunami.

Singing A Different Tune

The day after Premier Campbell acted to restore the service and reduce fares, three of us representing the 12 FACs on the coast were in Victoria for a prearranged meeting with Transportation Minister Kevin Falcon to discuss a paper we had submitted calling for a "Minor Routes Strategy for Coastal Ferry

This session was very different from five previous meetings the FAC Chairs had with ministry officials. The 16-page paper, drafted by Tony Law, the FAC chair for Hornby & Denman, contained many of the arguments we had made before to no avail, but it also analyzed many options for cutting BCF's costs and increasing its revenue and defined the limitations of each approach.

The Minister told us he used many of the points in the paper to explain the choices to the Premier who had decided to provide some relief for ferry users in his 10-point plan in response to "these turbulent economic times."

"We want to help our coastal communities, retail and tourism sectors during this key time of business and to help families connect during the upcoming holiday season," the Premier said. "It will require \$20 million in one-time funding. This will reduce costs for passengers and will act as a bridge until lower fuel prices work their way through to lower ferry fares."

Of course, nobody knows what the price of oil is going to be. In six months, it's gone up above \$140 US a barrel and it's dropped below \$65 US. But now the Canadian dollar has also tanked, and BCF has to pay for its fuel in greenbacks.

Even if oil stays down and the rest of the fuel surcharge comes off, fares will only go back to what they were in July, and the Ferry Commissioner has already approved an increase of up to 7.2 % next April 1. By the May provincial election, Campbell's Christmas gift will be a distant memory.

To have a meaningful, long-term impact on the cost of ferry travel, the government is going to have to increase the annual service fee it pays BC Ferries. The quasi-privatized vehicle the Liberals created for BC Ferries in 2003 has crossed the centre line and is colliding head-on with market forces its designers didn't anticipate. Minister Falcon seems to be recognizing this.

In our meeting, he characterized the Dec/ Jan fare reduction as a "shot in the arm" to "bridge us into the new year." He said BC is going to be "buffeted hard by what's going on" in the world economy and that they were "concerned people would stop traveling."

He called it a "commercial decision to buy down those fares and to restore those services" and said they are "hoping to see a spike in ridership" over the two months. This gave us an opening to talk about getting together again. He agreed we should "see how things are going" and "look at what we need to do

I referred to Falcon's comments after the August 1 surcharge about cutting service levels--and the reference in both BCF's annual report and 2008-09 business plan to looking at changing service levels as means of costcutting--and I asked if he now thinks that "service cuts are not the way to go." He paused and then said very deliberately, verbatim, "Yes, it's fair to say that."

In spite of my cynicism about what politicians will say in the months before an election, I think our message is getting through. All over the coast, in the media ferry users

read, FAC members, local government leaders and BCF's management have made it clear that it is the government's "public policy" that ultimately determines what riding the ferries costs.

Enjoy the respite. It's long overdue.

Q. Cove Questions

Noting that the bathrooms in the new Quathiaski Cove terminal building were frequently "out of order" this summer, Quadra FAC member Connie Burns heard the water supply was limited and asked what was being done to correct the problem.

In an email, Rob Seitz, BCF's project manager for terminal construction, said it wasn't a water shortage that shut down the bathrooms but pumps that "weren't working properly." Changing to larger pumps, he said, has solved that problem.

But water supply and quality are concerns. BCF has a well at the top of the hill next to the holding lanes and has an agreement with the Q. Cove Harbour Authority "to provide them with any excess water we do not need," Seitz wrote.

He said BCF recently installed a larger storage tank, but the water from the well still isn't potable. As a result, the Harbour Authority hasn't drawn from BCF's well yet and BCF is "working on resolving the water quality issue."

Likewise, BCF is still working on how to better manage traffic on the hill in overload conditions. Two meetings that were scheduled at Q. Cove couldn't bring together all the desired participants--BCF & Dept. of Highways' managers, FAC representation and the regular Q. Cove lot attendants. The effort to get the right people on site at the same time continues.

If you have a vision of how everything could be better or a question about why something is the way it is, bring it to the Town Hall meeting next Thursday.

Dear Editor,

Steven Halliday makes some good points in his October 24 Viewpoint about ferry fares, as many other islanders have done during these past few months of brutal fare hikes. I'd like to elaborate on a couple of those points, as I too have been a regular ferry commuter for the past 26 years, and I resent being put in the same category as a tourist who can afford the occasional inflated cost of a ferry ticket. The ferries I take to get to work were originally part of the highway system and should remain so.

Many years ago I lived in a small northern community where vast amounts of money were spent in the winter months on the highways - grading, sanding, salting, repairing frost heaves, repairing the many bridges on one small stretch of road. At no time was I required to pay extra for the high cost of maintaining the 20 mile stretch of highway that connected my small community with Highway 97. As Steve Halliday notes, we islanders are continually being hit with rising ferry rates because "we made a lifestyle choice". Well of course we did, and it's no different than the choice I made when I moved north to teach school and live in a small, isolated community served by 20 miles of highway that requires expensive maintenance. Most of us choose to live somewhere in this province so we can raise a family, work, and pay our taxes to support necessary amenities like roads, schools, and health care.

Mr. Halliday notes that our province markets the ferry system in a big way when it promotes supernatural B.C. in its tourism junkets. At the last Ferry Advisory Committee meeting I attended on Gabriola, I learned with dismay that BCFC now has a very grand office near the Canada Place Pier on Vancouver's downtown waterfront. The purpose of this venue is to promote BC Ferries to the Asian market, as an international tour destination. That would be fine and dandy, if such ventures were not subsidized by the beleaguered ferry commuters of our coastal communities, who just want to get to and from work and home. It's time to separate BC Ferries as high-end tourism from coastal ferries that should be providing affordable, reliable transportation.
