<u>Island Forum</u>

Dear Quadra Island Residents and Visitors,

On Oct. 26, 2007 the Junior Naturalist Club from Quadra Elementary School had the pleasure of interviewing awardwinning wildlife photographer, author and conservationist Ian McAllister. Among his answers to the children's questions about wolves he said "We need to educate people; wild wolves are tolerant of humans, curious and accommodating." Wolves simply do not attack humans as our other two predators, bears and cougars do on occasion.

That said, there in not one documented case of any individual, including children, being harmed by a wolf on Quadra in over one hundred years. Humans are safe from wolves on our Quadra trails, although your dog may not be.

Which brings me to what prompted me to write this; caring for facts, truth and education about wolves. The June 24/09 Hungry Eye printed a 'name withheld' letter stating that their dog was attacked by wolves on May 12 and that "the vet at Coastland veterinary Hospital told us their facility had treated a dozen such cases from Quadra Island in the previous three months".

Not believing this I contacted Dr, Tutteli -Pukarinen at Coastland and was informed that they had treated 3 and possibly 4 Quadra dogs for "confirmed wolf attack" in the previous 6 to 8 months. What a huge discrepancy!

Also the word "confirmed" is relative in this case. Without photographic proof, vets can only accept the dog owner's claim of "wolf" at face value as there are many husky and German Shepherd crosses that look like a wolf to the unpractised and inexperienced eye. And dogs do attack other dogs. Most of us have witnessed dogfights, a very disturbing experience.

Our west coast wolves are smaller, leaner and have different colouring than the large gray timber wolves of northern and interior BC. One identifying feature is that a dog can bend its tail, but a wolf can not.

For further study I highly recommend the extensive collection of wolf photos in Ian McAllister's "Last of the Wild Wolves". Since we live with wolves and other wildlife, there are bound to be some wolf attacks on dogs. They're natural enemies, as wolves are very territorial and will even on occasion kill another wolf from a different pack who doesn't respect those boundaries.

Do we want the world to think that Quadra Island is overrun with wolves and not a desirable or safe place to live of visit? No. And fear-mongering printed information that is not true is not at all helpful for supporting our local businesses, especially the seasonal and outdoor ones. If First Nations people have lived in a respectful, knowledgeable and balanced way with wolves for thousands of years, we can learn from them. We can do it too.

Wolves Belong Here, Do You?

In response to the Hungry Eye's ongoing fear-mongering.

I am sorry for the loss of your pets; but I have spoken at length with our conservation officer and someone <u>must</u> tell all of you that his office's only mandate is to protect our pets and livestock; they are <u>not</u> in the business of 'conserving' wildlife.

People are not at risk of being attacked by wolves. As a matter of fact a pack will abandon a den full of pups as they see a human approaching to avoid conflict (aren't they clever?). They will attack and kill anything else to protect their home and family (sort of like us), that includes bears, wolverines and yes they despise dogs and will go out of their way to attack them.

But we have defaced them far more than they will ever effect us, remember \$5 an ear?

There are perhaps 10 or 12 wolves on this island, none of us really know, it is not them that are populous. They belong here and it is up to us to protect our own animals with knowledge and assertiveness.

So yes, keep Quadra wolves wild; avoid them when you can and stand up to them as top predator when you must; they will not defy you if you don't feed them, corner them or habituate them to your presence.

DO NOT phone conservation as they will simply come and shoot the next wolf they see in the area. These men are hunters not biologists and don't necessarily distinguish one 'trouble' wolf from another.

So if you consider a wolf's right to live to be lesser than your pets'; you should move to a place where there are no wolves; there are plenty of those left! - Hélene Lepage

Since it has been switched over it has saved at least one and a half million litres of fuel oil and thousands of litres of engine oil. Plus they don't have the associated exhaust and noise pollution. There is none.

Too bad all the camps don't do this. Think how much it would save. Too bad we can't all have this, oh well.

The making of a silk purse out of a sow's ear

As many of you are aware, we as directors have been going through extensive deliberations regarding the application by Grieg Seafoods for two fish farm sites near Sayward, in Area C. This has been a very trying time for each of us and probably one of the harder decisions I have had to make as your director. I had an incredible volume of information to thoroughly read, two public hearings to attend, countless emails and phone calls to answer and many, many discussions with my fellow directors on this topic. It has been difficult to concentrate on anything else.

As your director, I am in the unenviable position of having to make decisions. I am your representative but I am also expected to be a leader. Sometimes the two positions can cause conflict for me. In this situation, everything was conflicting! I have a community that has people on both sides of the issue that require "representation" and I have people on both sides of the issue that require "leadership". And I have to try to be all things to all people! We all know that this is impossible and that is where the leadership role needs to come into play.

I was put into the position of trying to find a "middle ground" from the "representation" perspective since there are people who oppose fish farms and people that earn their livelihoods from fish farms living in Area C. That position was completely impossible to deal with. Adequately addressing both sides' needs was impossible.

Hence, the "leadership" role, and the bolded title above. How can I take a difficult situation and try to come out with a decision that will do the best job of making things better for Area C and for the coast in general? My thought was to fall back on my long time, tried and true philosophy of "Balance". I needed to find a way to balance the needs of the workers in our area and also the concerns of those who are concerned about wild salmon. And I will note here, that I am one of those people who is concerned about our wild fish and our entire ecology. It is all part of my being.

I came up with a compromise proposal that would allow some economic activity, and, at the same time, try to move a very unpopular industry toward a more sustainable and responsible position with regard to wild fish. That was the goal: improve the industry that is here to stay for the time being so that no damage to the wild systems would occur as a result. Quite the task, but it came to me that if we don't try, then who will? The status quo didn't seem to be an option and we are in for another four years of government that has no intention of shutting down an industry that is such a huge economic engine for this province. So, my direction was to try to make it work, for both "sides".

The by law has been given third reading and my proposal limits it to one site with a whole list of conditions. For those of you who were not there at the SRD board meeting last Thursday, I am including, verbatim, what I had to say at



the board table. This is a proposal. The board agreed to it. I have no idea if the industry will agree to it. They must still come back to the board for final adoption, after they have met all of the conditions that I have proposed.

The following is what I had to say:

*As background, I was elected to my position in 1988. I was requested by my community to run for office due to the unprecedented proliferation of fish farms in what was then, Area J. My community was not happy and they wanted to see an immediate halt.

*I spent my first year in office dealing with the provincial and federal governments trying to stop the issuance of any further tenures. I worked with the Ombudsman's office for many months and toured him to sites in the area to demonstrate the inappropriate siting and bad practices of those early farms.

*It was to no avail.

*I then worked with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs to put in place local government zoning in my area, over the areas covered by water, so as to give my constituents some say in the siting of farms.

*After two years of intensive meetings with the public and all sectors that were possibly affected, we came up with unique foreshore zoning. Over the following 5 years we managed to extend that zoning to all areas within Area J.

*Let me be very clear... At that time I did not like what I saw with fish farms: I didn't like the siting; I didn't like the operational practices; and I didn't like how they were impacting my constituents and other users of the finite areas of water within Area J.

*What I did at that time was to work with my community <u>and with the industry</u> to mitigate the impacts.

*I had meeting after meeting with focus groups and with the industry and with the total community.

*My mantra was "Balance". If we were going to live together, work together, and thrive as a community, we would need to <u>achieve</u> <u>balance</u>.

*All parties' interests must be looked after, and I believe that they were, through the zoning.

*<u>For clarity once again</u>... I have never been a proponent of major industrial activity in the areas that I represent.

*I fought with the forest industry for years, opposing short-sighted practices that impact my constituents.

*Once again... <u>Balance</u>!

*Forest activity was not going to go away, so it seemed that a forum for discussion with the industry was the best way to achieve that balance.

*I established, with help from other members of www.discoveryislander.ca

the community, a "Forest Resources Committee" that I got sanctioned by our Regional District board. that included representatives from all affected user groups and from our major TFL holder and forest workers.

*We managed, over a period of a few years, to completely change the way that industrial forestry was carried out on our islands. The huge clear-cuts we had seen were limited to 5 hectares; local loggers were employed; local planters and spacers were employed; pesticide use was all but eliminated. Wood lots were promoted and now support many families on the islands.

*We did this by working with industry and government, not by fighting them. Confrontation did not work!

*20 years or so ago, many of us protested the events that were causing the decline of our salmon stocks.

*Things such as habitat destruction from industrial forestry...

.. such as overfishing of all species, from salmon right on down the food chain to the species that the salmon needed to survive.

... I supported a federally proposed, drastic reduction in fish harvesting... to give all species a time to recover.

*Stocks were plentiful then and humans, being human, took advantage of that... all sectors. Profits were high.

*Now, due to habitat destruction, changing ocean conditions, overfishing and political mismanagement of the fishery for too many years, stocks have declined.

*Fishers and conservationists are now keenly aware of the situation and have added the introduction of fish farms to the list of reasons for that decline.

*And maybe fish farms are part of the problem...

*I don't know the answer.

*But I do know that we have an opportunity in this present rezoning to find out more information on the topic; to do much needed testing; and to leverage this industry into more sustainable practices such as closed containment systems.

*Two sites have been applied for in my area.

*What I am proposing, is the following:

*That only one site be approved at Gunner Point.

*That Greig Seafood voluntarily include in its DFO "Authorization Agreement", the following:

1. That the timing of introduction of fish and harvesting of fish from their pens will be done as outlined to us in detail. (see Public Hearing #2, letter from Grieg).. include all points in the resolution

2. That the juvenile fish will be "lice free". (same comment as above)

3. That extensive and ongoing monitoring of sea lice on wild salmon will be carried out among the wild migration routes in the proximity of this site (same comment as above)

4. That all data gathered will be publicly available.

5. That the program for lighting, as outlined to us, will be adopted. (same comment as above)

6. In addition to the above, a separate "Letter of Undertaking" be provided by Greig: That the site will be converted to closed containment technology as soon as it is commercially available. (the word "viable" was never used by me. intentionally.)

7. And that this condition will be met prior to final adoption of the by-law.

8. Should the producers of the containment technology require a test site/pilot project we would encourage that this site be selected for that purpose.

*The sooner the better.

*I have talked a lot about halance

*Well, this is one more example. *I represent members of a

community, some of whom are strongly opposed to open-net cage fin-fish farming and a community that is very dependent on the fish farming industry.

*Walcan seafoods is one of the largest employers and they depend on both commercial and farm fish. And their workers and their families are also my constituents. *Greig Seafood has asked for what they want.

*I have proposed something that will give them some of what they want and that will support the workers and families at Walcan.

*My proposal will also give us a push towards innovation. A push that I heard the public say that they want and that wild salmon need. *I propose a balance.

*This industry is not going to go away. This provincial government will not allow that.

*It is up to us to find a way to work with industry and government to make this work for wild salmon and for my constituents. This is our chance!

*I have put every ounce of my energy into trying to do the best job that I possibly can for my area for 20 years. I have tried to protect the beauty of this place and tried to protect all that is here. I have also tried to keep us diversified and economically viable.

*I continue in my efforts to balance these issues.

*Only those of you around this table know how difficult the position I am in really is. I wish the public could walk in our shoes from time

to time and feel what it is like to be put in the position of making difficult decisions that take all points of view into consideration. This is one of the more difficult decisions I have had to make. It is not an easy one, nor is it easy for my fellow directors.

*New science comes in every day that must be considered. I view this site as a test as well as economic opportunity for Quadra residents and the surrounding area. It is a test that could advance fish farming into a new era of closed containment OR it could prove that wild and farm fish cannot co-exist.

*Quadra Island and the area I represent is used to being on the leading edge of that breaking wave of innovation.

Once again, this is our chance to achieve balance.

So, that is what I had to say to the board of directors and I am now passing it along to you.

Your support of my efforts to continue to try and do the best that I can to represent all interests would be greatly appreciated. This is a difficult position, to say the least. I do my best and that is all that I can do. I hope that this report at least helps you to better understand the situation.

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BC Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and Emcon Services Announce

11km of road rehabilitation and re-surfacing **Cortes Island**

Emcon Services and the Ministry of Transportation are pleased to announce over \$540,000 in road rehabilitation and re-surfacing on Cortes Island is moving forward over the summer months.

Over the next several weeks, residents and visitors to Cortes Island will see significant work and improvements being undertaken on the network of roads on Cortes Island. Working closely with the Ministry, Emcon Services has identified and prioritized nearly 11 kilometers of road infrastructure for rehabilitation and re-surfacing this season.

Using a combination of several road rehabilitation techniques and working with a variety of contractors, improvements to the road surface will consist of asphalt paving, asphalt pulverization and base strengthening, followed by a double application of graded aggregate seal.

Greg Ehman, Operations Manager for Emcon Services remarks, "One of the greatest challenges on Cortes Island is the weak road base associated with the nature of the existing soils on the island. This weak base leads to ongoing and recurring road failures. Over the last five years, Emcon has worked closely with the Ministry to improve these roads largely with asphalt and graded seal applications. This innovative approach using a pulverization technique should provide increased strength, durability and improve the life expectancy of these roads."

Over the next several weeks, residents and tourists will see increased contracting activity, arrival of a wide variety of maintenance equipment, coupled with the arrival of several barges of graded aggregate seal material. Emcon has worked closely with local residents to minimize disruption. However, during the next few weeks, travelers to the Island can expect some minor delays during daylight hours.

During this construction, Emcon asks that drivers respect the signage, slow down in construction zones and obey all flag persons. Notices will be posted locally advising of current road conditions and any expected delays.

\$10,000 Funding for **Age-Friendly Community** Planning

Cortes has been awarded funds through the Union of BC Municipalities 'age-friendly' grant program to augment our Official Community Plan (OCP) review to ensure that both our planning process and our final plan are inclusive and reflective of senior's needs and ambitions. Climate Action Funds

Core Funding for Manson's and the Gorge Halls?

For years, Manson's Hall has been calling for core funding support through Regional District taxation and the Gorge Hall is also interested. Most other community halls in the region are supported this way and I will soon be asking you to consider whether you are willing to do the same for your community centers. Over the summer, the SRD will be conducting a feasibility study to evaluate the financial need and funding possibilities for our halls. An update will follow in the fall.

Health Association, Friends of Cortes Island, Cortes Island Seafood Association, Museum at Campbell River, Mountainair Avian Rescue Society, Cortes Island Potters Guild, Campbell River Beacon Club, & the Campbell River Art Gallery. Thank-you all for your excellent work!

Fish Farms

I will not often report on issues specific to other areas within the regional district, however, the recent application by Grieg Seafood for two new open-net fish farms off Sayward has raised much attention, and I think it only fair to share with you the reasoning for my supportive vote. The health of our coast and indeed of our wild salmon that bind this ecosystem together are of the utmost importance. After 5 months of reading, meeting, listening and touring, after two public hearings in Sayward with packed houses, and after reading hundreds of letters of submission, Brenda Leigh, Jim Abram and I voted, with majority, to approve rezoning for one of the two proposed

sites with many conditions. The most compelling condition is that this fish farm site will move to closed containment as soon as it is commercially available, which according to Middle Bay Sustainable Aquaculture who is developing this technology, is about two years away. Early adoption of closed containment by one of the three largest players in the fish farm industry I trust will be the thin edge of the wedge of change, and it is rare that we have this kind of leverage to demand the use of closed containment. I believe that this is the best deal we could make for the wellbeing of the coast.

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Historic Kayak Tour of Cortes Island



July 17th

The southwest coast of Cortes Island is one of the most scenic spots on the mid-coast. It is also loaded with historic interest. On July 17th Misty Isles Adventures teams up with the Cortes Island Museum to offer a day tour by kayak through the protected waterways from Mansons Lagoon to the Gorge Harbour and towards Smelt Bay.

Misty Isles provides all the equipment and training for this easy day trip that guide Brian Fryer describes as the perfect place to try out kayaking or learn new techniques. The deep bays and shallow waterways make for ideal paddling.

Historical sites along the way include First Nations pictographs (paintings on stone) on the sheer rock face at the narrow entrance to the Gorge Harbour. A bit further south, there is a petroglyph (a carving in stone), which is said to have been created by a young man who gained tremendous skill as a hunter on a spiritual quest. Brian will also describe some of the commercial activities on this part of Cortes, from whaling in the early days to modern oyster aquaculture.

The trip will depart from Mansons Landing Marine Park at 1030 a.m. Participants will cross from Campbell River to Quadra Island on the 8:30 a.m. ferry and leave their cars in Heriot Bay for the 9:05 a.m. crossing to Cortes.

They will return on the 5:50p.m. ferry to Quadra Island. The cost for this day tour is \$105 (GST included) or \$117 with lunch provided.

Recycling Cans

Cans which are acceptable at the Quadra depot are those which come from a household. Commercial businesses need to seek their own recycling options. The bin is intended for only those containers which once contained dry goods, alcohol or food products. It does not include paint cans, disposable propane bottles, cookie sheets, ancient electronic hardware, auto parts, old pots and pans, broken cell phones or cameras, aluminum containers or trays, steel chairs, basketball hoops or any other sundry metal objects. The can bin is for CANS only. It is not a metals bin. All other metal objects must be taken to a metal recycling depot, picked up at home by a local metal recycler or put in the trash. If possible, cans should be rinsed and crushed to save space in the bin.

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Gold Award Kayakers Visit Quadra

This week twelve Grade 12 inner city students from Vancouver Technical's Duke of Edinburgh Award Program arrive on Quadra Island to earn their Gold Award by completing a kayaking expedition in the Okisollo and Hoskyn Channels. Quadra resident Shriley Turner, who is also Van Tech's Mini School Director and Science teacher, leads this expedition for the second year in a row. "Quadra's marine environment provides us with a wonderful opportunity to teach inner city youth outdoor survival skills, leadership skills and a sense of responsibility for their community," says Turner. "Those of us who live here can take the beauty of this place for granted sometimes. It is a real privilege to be able to share it with inner city kids who otherwise don't get the opportunity to move out of their comfort zone and experience the challenge of travelling in the wilderness as a close knit group."

"This is where the tides collide," adds John Martin, who teaches the navigation component of the trip. Students are provided with a compass, tide tables, charts and given the opportunity to learn how to use them. It's not easy to earn the gold. They have to show a great degree of effort and committment."

This year, Shirley's students garnered 50 % of the Gold Awards given to public schools in BC. In recognition of this exceptional achievement, Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex, paid a Royal Visit to Van Tech (June 4) to present this year's awards in a unique ceremony.

"Shirley is a very dedicated teacher and an excellent role model for her students," offers Martin, who is himself a teacher.

Shirley has been nominated for the Prime Minister's Award for Teaching Excellence, 2009. "My students tell me this experience changes their perspective on the world forever," she says. "That's my biggest reward." <u>Halliday's Viewpoint</u>

Duo of Evil?

otwithstanding the dominance of Michael Jackson's death in the news, Iran and North Korea continue to remain worthy of society's future concentrated attention and present comment – events in their respective quarters have only gotten far more dangerous in the past few weeks. North Korea and Iran are poles apart in pretty much every comparison one could muster, from religion to economic strength to infant mortality, but they are both easily the most unpredictable and menacing countries in southeast and southwest Asia respectively, and certainly the most notable members of George Bush's Axis of Evil, however inept the label.

North Korea (DPRK) has been a political hotspot, at least for South Korea, China, Japan and the USA, for over 50 years. For much of this time, under the leadership of the Kim Il-Sung (who, though dead since 1994, is still the "official" leader of the country, after receiving the posthumously-awarded title of "Eternal President") the country was heavily veiled by the Iron Curtain after their partition in 1953, and only received sporadic and generally unfavourable comment by western media. Since his son Kim Jong-Il took power he has actively sought the media spotlight, provided it casts him and his nation in a favourable light. That could not possibly happen, given the collective damage done by Jong-Il and his father to North Korea's economy, its peoples well being and the national psyche.

Kim Jong-Il has attempted to gain the world's attention by developing a big stick with which to threaten those whom he distrusts or dislikes...sort of like a petulant child, albeit a very dangerous one. Ironically, the big stick (or nuclear missile) his country threatens to use was colloquially known as "no dong"; after a couple of flawed launches and hasty consultations with his advisors his big stick is now called "long dong". This would be almost funny were he not stuffing his "dongs" with nuclear material and threatening South Korea, Japan and now Hawaii with his radioactive retribution for making fun of his hair, or platform shoes, or whatever. Meanwhile, millions of North Koreans waste away physically from starvation and mentally from deprivation, all due to the actions of a dictatorial dynasty that has just seen its 3rd generation be installed in a position of high power. Kim Jong-Un, youngest son of Jong-II, has at age 26 been anointed probable successor and elevated to head of the North Korean security apparatus. Little is known about the younger Kim, as he has been raised under a cloak of secrecy and whose only exposure to the world outside the DPRK has been clandestine, under an assumed name and origin. There is little reason to think he has escaped the megalomania that has infected his father and grandfather.

Recently my wife commented on North Korea, after reading the latest threats being flung about out of Pyongyang, the nation's capital. She said she was "starting to worry" about the situation, which I felt was an unhealthy waste of worry given everything else there is to worry about. My argument against worrying about North Korea was mainly buttressed by the fact that the country has absolutely no allies...no. not even China would use the term ally as regards the DPRK. The country has existed (barely) under various UN sanctions for decades, and lost its only putative allies with the collapse of Communism as a credible power block. Should Kim Jong-Il or his successor decide on the nuclear option, for whatever reason, the response will be rapid, devastating and final. In a somewhat selfish observation I noted to Norma that the only likely candidate for damage from the DPRK is South Korea (ROK), which is both militarily and mentally prepared for such an eventuality - and reactive support from the US and Japan will be immediate, and the DPRK well knows this...it's the main reason they have "behaved" in the past. The world as a whole has nothing to fear from North Korea, but its immediate neighbours have plenty to worry about, likely for several years to come, since in the "Kim" family it is pre-ordained that apple will not fall far from the tree.

Iran, on the other hand, has the capacity to do widespread damage within the region it inhabits; further, they have real economic clout and command wide-spread authority by virtue of their constitutionally enshrined Shia religious theocracy, authority which extends to several countries bordering Iran, most importantly, Iraq. Iran has had a long and interesting history that goes back some 7,000 years. They were a regional power as Persia, and the country has undergone a turbulent century that culminated with the 1979 Revolution and the people's rejection of the Reza-Pahlavi's dynastic rule in favour of theocracy. Since then Iran has fought a costly military war with Iraq, supported contemptible terrorist activities throughout the Middle East and Europe, and successfully repressed democratic reform forces within the country. The country, in recent years anyway, appeared to be loosening up in terms of human rights and political dissent, but that movement

under a cloak of secrecy and whose only has likely suffered a significant setback of late.

The recent civil disruptions that erupted as a result of the contested presidential election results are going nowhere. With the blessing of Grand Mullah Ali Khameini, Supreme Leader of Iran, questions regarding the election have been deemed irrelevant, protests will be suppressed at whatever cost and "dissidents" should be severely punished. For a few days after the disputed election Khameini kept the world in suspense by remaining silent, and the protests against the government increased steadfastly. With his condemnation unrest ceased almost overnight, which is no surprise in a country where unsanctioned protest can cost you your liberty or your life, as thousands of Iranian citizens can attest - those that remain alive, anyway.

The seemingly bizarre behaviour and mutterings of Iran's president Ahmadinejad have been tolerated by the ruling Mullahs over the past few years, and their increasingly clear support of him, in spite of significant public opposition, is a strong indication that Iran will remain intransigent as regards internal and external policy for the time being. This presumably means they will continue to develop nuclear technology, ostensibly for peaceful purposes, which in and of itself is not an issue, but many nations (most notably the US and Britain) fear that they are developing nuclear weapons in pursuance of jihad, with Israel as Target Number One amongst many.

Iran, unlike North Korea, has plenty of friends in the region, those that aren't simply fearful neighbours anyway (such as Jordan, Saudi Arabia and most of the "emirates" of the region). Lebanon, Iraq, Syria and likely Egypt could be considered "friendly", while at the other end of the scale we have Israel, its putative guardian the USA, and Russia, which is not-atall crazy about Iran's coziness with the former USSR's many ex-captive neighbours whose names end in "stan". Iran, unlike North Korea, has the potential to cause serious regional disruption that could significantly impact the rest of the globe, and unfortunately is not sending out clear and substantive assurances they intend no such thing. If Norma needs to worry (and she, like all of us, has enough on her plate as it is) then Iran is definitely the place to watch, not North Korea. But until both of these countries are willing to open a dialogue leading to "normal" relations with the rest of the world, keeping an eye on both is certainly prudent, if you don't already have enough to worry about.

3. Providing informal settings for people with adequate literacy levels to enhance their skills

1. Promoting early learning and literacy outreach

2. Supporting access to literacy for children and families
