

# Island Forum

### Minister Opens Barn Door to Horses in BC's Oldest Provincial Park

#### Dear Sir,

In the last while a new Visitors' Center and connector trail have been completed in the Paradise Meadows area of Strathcona Provincial Park. Almost none of the funding for these projects came from BC Parks, instead it came from private and corporate donations, matching grants and lottery money with countless hours of meetings and volunteer work over years by Parks' staff and stakeholders. I believe the success of this creative funding proposal has indirectly led to the subsequent approval of a Master Plan Amendment. Let me explain.

About 5 years ago Clayoquot Wilderness Resort proposed they be allowed to bring horses into the Bedwell Valley in return for upgrading the trail there and building a campsite. A strong case was made for this not being allowed by the Parks' Master Plan except in three specific areas where it has always been allowed, so an unclear, muddled public process was conducted which resulted in about 90% of the public emphatically stating they did not want more horses in Strathcona Park.

BC Parks could not be seen to allow an exclusive use of the Bedwell Valley by one resort owner. This area is very isolated, and impractical for any member of the public to take a horse to, so what was done was to open any area of the Park to horse use where there used to be an old road subject to some criteria vet to be explained. This opens new areas of the Park for horse use contrary to public opinion, which will benefit private commercial interests which have the funds to do a favour for Parks in return for being allowed to operate in the Park. This is a further example of the privatization of our public assets to benefit friends of the government.

I am deeply opposed to the recent decision by Minister of the Environment, Barry Penner, to open Strathcona Park to private, for profit, horse use. I believe the minister's decision to be oppressive in that it arbitrarily ignores overwhelming public opposition to the whole idea. The Level 2 assessment. commissioned even before the faulty Master Plan amendment process was complete, notes the "high level of public concern regarding the appropriateness of horses in protected areas, and the potential environmental impacts, with particular concern about the impact of allowing a private, commercial operator to have a horse use permit within the park". The author of the assessment proposes these concerns can be mitigated by "public education". I propose the Ministry of Environment be renamed the Ministry of Truth, in the best spirit of George Orwell, if a penny wise, dollar foolish government believes it can brainwash us as easily as it tries to sell out our parks.

### Re: We Wai Kai Nation Scallop Farm - Sutil Channel

#### **Dear Editor:**

I am writing to set the record straight following the misinformation campaign waged by Michael Stahnke (and others) against the We Wai Kai Nation's application for Provincial Government aquaculture tenure and Regional District zoning of waters in Sutil Channel.

I can assure everyone that activities involved in the submerged line growing and harvesting of scallops in Sutil Channel will have many positive effects on the Quadra Island community, and will result in very low negative impact to the nearby residents, environment, or wildlife. Most of all, as a Quadra Island resident, and for the benefit of those who don't know much about the Cape Mudge people, I want to express how fortunate we all are to have such hospitable, prosperous, and knowledgeable First Nation neighbours. I feel Mr. Stahnke's conduct and tactics to block this application and confine the We Wai Kai to the Reserve is ignorant of historical and modern day legal realities, and perpetuates prejudicial attitudes against First Nation citizens.

I do not wish to refute each of the falsehoods from Mr. Stahnke in this forum; we will do this at an open community information session to be held within the next 2-3 weeks (announcements will be forthcoming on the date and time).

The suggestion that the We Wai Kai Nation has, or will, create an industrial zone in Sutil Channel is fear-mongering rhetoric by Mr. Stahnke. The best evidence of the care and attention to mitigate the effect on the community and nearby residents is the fact that in one year of operation, there was not a single complaint about the farm sent to the Regional District or the Province. Not until Mr. Stahnke incited people with inflammatory suggestions of multinational corporate control, and that future expansion would disrupt the peace.

This is a 100% owned venture of the We Wai Kai Nation. Our neighbours and community member. Employment and economic benefit generated by this venture will be (and already have been) enjoyed by many Quadra Island suppliers, fabricators and vendors. The activity involved is environmentally sound and sustainable. The farm uses the skill sets of many Quadra Island residents that have lost income and employment due to changes in the commercial fishery. I have been blessed over the past 30 years to have worked very closely beside many of the Cape Mudge people in their fishing and marine endeavours, and am witness to their abundant abilities, as well as their community-mindedness. I hope that people will consider the facts before joining Mr. Stahnke on his latest crusade.

# **Editor, Discovery Islander Re: Price Gouging?**

#### **Dear Sir:**

We heard, last week, that the inflation rate in Canada had risen; 1.7% year-on-year, in August. We also heard that one of the main contributors to that was the rising cost of food, at 4% year on year. After I picked myself up off the floor and got back to reality, (some of your readers will recall the old saw about "lies, damn lies and statistics"?) I found, in a pile of old chuckits your August 1, 2008 edition, which contained, in the centrefold, a two-page advert from one of our two "local" food outlets. They discontinued those sometime within the last year; cost-cutting'd be my guess. After I picked myself up off the floor again, I decided it was time for some research. The price differentials at that food outlet, year on year, seemed to be about 20-35% up. But I don't accept that my recollections, speculations, or the like have much validity any more, so I hied me off to Nadine and Gail's throwaway bin, and got some current fliers from large CR "grocery" stores, and listed some items; then I visited our two local outlets to check on what their same/similar offerings priced out at now, in relation to that advert last year.

The results? I'll try to keep this somewhat under the length of War and Peace. And I can well appreciate that the length even then will try your patience. I've adjusted for metric/English where the pricing was differential. The prices/unit are taken from their packages, or adverts. I've averaged the prices at the two QI stores, and 3 CR stores. The CR stores did not include Thriftys, by far and away the priciest big store over there.

Now: I am not pretending that this is all scientific, and accurate to within 3.5 % four times out of 5 and etc. Nor am I avoiding that the stuff has to be ferried to Quadra. As it always has. Last August, diesel was about \$1.29/litre. Now it's thirty cents or more lower. Ferry fares have gone up some since then, year on year. But, it appears to me that some truths are inescapable here; first, our local stores started to jack up prices last fall. We all expected at that point that once our seasonal "visitors" departed, they'd come down. But they haven't. They've continued to rise, and both stores are in the game. Second; we - those who listen to the radio, watch TV, and read newaspapers that is, have probably heard/read the farmers banging on for months about how their crops are great in both quality and quantity, but they can't find buyers - wholesalers that is - to buy their product at anything near cost of production - fruit folks from the Okanagan, berry farmers from the Fraser Valley etc etc. Third, whether they like it or not; whether we like it or not, more importantly, our local stores are at the end of the food delivery chain; half of the perishable stuff they market is beyond its "best by" date by the time it hits the shelves. And fourth: If you're feeding a family of, say four, and have an "Experience" card, you'd be well advised to take your ride, and go to town and do a big shop one, or maybe even twice a week to avoid the "convenience" of shopping on-Island.

All of which is respectfully submitted. Maybe. John Grant

# **Cortes Recycling Centre: Major Renovations Coming Soon!**

The Cortes Recycling Centre, a product of so much local dedication & volunteerism, will soon undergo a major upgrade.

Dova, her crew and you have identified key changes that would improve our ability to use the centre. Our use of the recycling bays, so lovingly built many years ago, has outgrown the existing building and more space is needed to accommodate increasing use. The traffic congestion on site, which is at times both hair-raising and a safety concern, needs addressing.

This winter the recycling bays will be replaced with a larger building on the same site and extending back into the bush. This space will house new recycling bays, bails of recycled goods and the bobcat.

Site clearing for the new building behind the existing recycling bays will get under way this fall, with tree falling and rock blasting. Rock cleared from the new site will be used to make a ring road around the existing garbage dumpsters so that you can drive up, unload, and then continue driving on in the same direction. This will alleviate some of the current traffic congestion, which gets particularly nuts in the summer months.

The building of the new facility will go out to tender this fall and I hope that local builders will make application. For those interested in more information, contact Drew Hadfield, at 250-334-6025 or dhadfield@comoxvalleyrd.ca

\$150,000 was budgeted for this project in 2008, just as the Comox Strathcona Regional District split into the Strathcona RD and the Comox-Valley RD, however, due to internal turmoil this project is just now getting underway. That amount is still fully available. When the district split, solid waste (garbage and

recycling) remained a joint service shared by the former CSRD areas and is now administered by the CVRD. Funds for this Cortes project are generated not through general taxation but rather through tipping fees at all regional waste management facilities including Courtenay and Campbell River. Although Cortes contributes to this fund through our garbage pick-up fees, high populated areas do 'supplement' lower populated areas. In this way, the project turns out to be a financial good deal for


# **Mushroom Talk**

The meeting, called by the Stuart Island Community Association (with assistance from Friends of Bute Inlet and the Wilderness Committee) was to inform residents, guides, lodge owners and guests about impending developments -- and to create new alliances.

About 50 people gathered to learn more about Plutonic & GE's plans for the area that is backyard to this small but influential community. We heard presentations about environmental and political issues related to BC's river diversion goldrush, and up-todate news about the many organizations and community groups working to de-rail the megaprojects proposed for 17 rivers in Bute -- and 780 other rivers in BC.

## **Alexandra Morton** charges Marine Harvest

#### If government is not going to apply the laws of Canada to fish farms, it is up to the people to do so

(PORT HARDY) Biologist Alexandra Morton laid charges under the federal Fisheries Act against fish farm giant Marine Harvest for illegal possession of wild juvenile salmon from an endangered stock.

On June 16, 2009, hundreds of small salmon were seen spilling onto a dock in Port McNeill during a transfer of live Atlantic salmon brood stock from the fish farm vessel M.V. Orca Warrior into tanks on a truck. The vessel's registered owner is Marine Harvest.

"When I received photos of the incident minutes later," says Morton, "I was really surprised the fish lying on the road were young pink salmon, I could not understand what were they doing in Marine Harvest's boat."

"Marine Harvest emailed stating that the young wild salmon had come from the Potts Bay fish farm, just west of Glendale River in Knights Inlet," says Morton. "They were apparently in the pens and were scooped up with the Atlantic salmon. We have no idea how many pink salmon ended up going down the highway in the tanks on the truck."

When Morton took her boat to the Potts Bay fish farm she saw large schools of pink salmon leaping inside the pens. "While millions of tax payers dollars and environmental donations have been spent to protect the Glendale River pink salmon from fish farms, 2008 was the lowest return yet. These are the offspring from that generation and far from safe, they are right in the fish farm and in their packer," said Morton. Morton has published 15 scientific papers on juvenile pink salmon.

Morton's lawyer, Jeffery Jones corresponded with DFO for 6 weeks about this incident but the Department still has not taken any significant action.

"I have received many reports over the years of herring, black cod and wild salmon in farm pens. The escaped Atlantic salmon that fishermen bring me often have wild fish in their stomachs. Are Norwegian farm salmon fattening up on wild BC fish? What happens to the wild fish when the nets are pulled? What happened to the pink salmon that may have been in the truck? DFO often charges commercial and sport fishermen with illegal possession to protect wild fish, why won't they charge these Norwegian companies? " asks Morton.

Morton asks that anyone with information on wild fish in fish farms to contact her at www. adopt-a-fry.org. 18,000 people and counting have signed a letter on this website saving the laws of Canada must be applied to fish farms.

# **Recycling Glass**

Glass which is acceptable at the Quadra depot includes clear and colored liquor bottles, food jars and clear, single layer sheet glass. It does not include automobile safety glass, light bulbs of any kind (these contain metals), pyrex cookware, teapots and cups (or any other ceramic item), old TVs or any other item which has glass and metal or plastic together. Metal tops on jars and bottles and corks in wine bottles should be removed before recycling.

Please remember the recycling depot is not a swap shop. If you have old dishes or glassware which need a new home, please take them to your favourite second hand store. If they are left on the ground or on top of the bins at the recycling centre they are considered to be garbage and will be disposed of accordingly.

# **Cardboard** Recycling

Now that the tourist season is over it seems like a good time to remind the winter population what is appropriated for cardboard recycling on Quadra.

Cardboard of most types is recyclable on Quadra if it is clean, but plastic windows and styrofoam inserts must be removed and disposed of in the garbage at home. Remove liners from cereal boxes. Please open and flatten boxes as even with our small population, we often run out of space. Remove tape if possible.

Remember that items such as used pizza boxes, paper coffee and other drink cups, cardboard dairy containers (or any other container which is waxed or plasticized), boxes which have contained meat and any other cardboard products which are stained or dirty are NOT acceptable.

# **Sustainable Development Proposal Goes Public**

#### By Dan Bowen

The owners of the 158-acre waterfront property in south Gowlland Harbour held an information meeting for interested Quadra Island residents on Sept 12th as previously announced in the Discovery Islander. We were pleased with the turnout (about 40 people) on a particularly, lovely sunny afternoon when people undoubtedly preferred to be soaking up the last of the summer weather.

Owner Rick Schellinck and I would like to thank those who attended the meeting. We tried to anticipate the community's interests and concerns and attempted to speak to those issues in our presentation. There was a lot of information to assimilate, probably too much for a single meeting.

Still, we managed to address or answer many of the questions and comments raised in the public forum.

The vision we hold for this property is a truly sustainable development that will be an example of good planning, contribute additional facilities for parks and recreation on the island and align itself with the values expressed by Quadra's OCP.

I was sincere when I told the group that the owner and I are strongly committed to deliver the plan presented. We have every intention of walking the talk. We plan to hold further information meetings and provide updates on the progress made. In the past week we met several groups with special environmental concerns and conducted on-site walkabouts. We are happy to continue these walkabouts on request and get to know the community better, letting people see first-hand how our vision could be realized.

As the meeting began some people assured us that the Quadra community would never support this kind of development. I'm happy to report, however, that by the end of our presentation on the proposed sustainable development, there appeared to be a change in their perception, a sense that "maybe this can work!" Many were very impressed and

supportive of what we hoped to do.

In a nutshell, for those not in attendance, our proposal is to work with the OCP designation of "Country Residential." In that designation the zoning would allow a 2.5-acre density which would permit large tracts of land dedicated for parks. This would allow 49 lots in the "Country Residential" zone to be developed over the next 5-10 years. Based on Quadra's demographics and the historical absorption rate over the past 20 years, these numbers are conservative.

Our plan is to dedicate 2-15 acre waterfront parks that have a total of 2,350 ft of forested waterfront. Within the property we plan a trail system that will link the Blenkin Community Park down the existing Orion Road to the Gowlland Harbour shore to our first park then through our property to the second proposed Park in Goose Bay and out to April Point Road. We plan to put a trail along April Point road to improve the safety for hikers and bikers. Over 4000 ft of new trails would be added.

We have a master vegetative plan to protect the existing view-scapes along April Point road as well as our 10,000 feet of waterfront property with either parks, geotechnical covenants and vegetative management restrictive covenants. The tree line view from the ocean to the property will be changed very little.

Before we started the process of planning the sustainable development of this property we set a goal for at least 50% greenspace. I believe we can achieve this figure and perhaps exceed it.

We plan a sustainable development regarding infrastructure as well. Our sewer systems will be state of the art sewage treatment plants that will be meet VIHA standards with onsite systems. Our proposed water system will be provided by deep well that will generously supply our lots. We plan for a dedicated well to be drilled to be used for fire protection in the April Point area. A standard fire hydrant will be connected to a holding tank capacity and will be available to the local fire department.

Within our 158 acres we are considering 1-5 acre waterfront lot for Commercial 2 zone. We plan a small RV park with about 10-12 units. This is in Goose Bay and will be accessed off April Point Road.

We are working on a webpage and hope to have it up and running within a few weeks. Our next public meeting will take place on Saturday Oct 24. at Quadra Community Hall.

# Friday Flicks - Fifty Dead Men Walking

FIFTY DEAD M EN WALKING is a streamlined, adrenalized thriller that treads a retrospective political tightrope. Based on Martin McGartland's 1997 memoir of his years as a spy infiltrating the Irish Republican Army, it deals with explosive passions and perilous lifestyles.

Martin McGartland (Jim Sturgess) was a petty hustler and incipient criminal, selling stolen clothes and shoes door-to-door when the British came to town. He makes an ideal informant for Fergus (Ben Kingsley), the intelligence agent tracking Republican activities in Belfast. Fergus knows how to wheedle a formless but devil-may-care guy like Martin... money, a car and white-knuckle thrills.

Martin juggles two father-son bonds: one with an I.R.A. chieftain and the other with Fergus. His double life is further complicated by his relationship with Lara, the mother of his children, and Sean, an I.R.A. colleague and a close childhood friend. To say Martin is conflicted is an gross understatement.

For director Kari Skogland, an Ottawa native, the film is a significant step in her burgeoning international career. In it she blends the thriller and action genres she's familiar with and the more dramatic concerns of her previous movie, the big-screen version of Margaret Laurence's The Stone Angel. This film met some challenges along the road. Before filming, Skogland and her team had to gain the trust of the Belfast community, still raw after three decades of conflict. Then there was controversy prior to the '08 premiere at Toronto International Film Festival, when McGartland denounced the movie and threatened to sue. He backed down after some scene tweaking and a closing-credits disclaimer.

The final product is a compelling character study that packs a "high-caliber performance by Jim Sturgess and enough thrills to start a theme park." Production values are strong, notably the "gritty, ash-blackened look of Jonathan Freeman's cinematography." (review sources: Variety, New York Times)



# **Dbama's Mission Impossible**

anadian health-care costs are artificially lowered, and life expectancy artificially prolonged, by the lack of gunshot wounds, a direct consequence of the nation's centrist-liberalist-socialist-Marxist-Stalinist-type suppression of the constitutionally guaranteed right to kill and maim." So writes Bruce McCall in the September 19th issue of the Globe and Mail.

McCall, a freelance author and humorist resident in New York City, does a wonderful job of illustrating the collective lunacy that has taken hold of our southern cousins in their present debate about health care provision. Reading his brief column provides some hilarious relief in what is otherwise becoming an astonishingly uncivil debate, one best illustrated by the media attention paid to deep thinkers such as Sarah Palin. Canada's health care costs run at about 10.6% of our GDP, while in the US health care spending amounts to 15.2%. Obviously, 100% of Canadians are able to access

medical care for a nominal monthly fee, while in the USA, and in spite of spending almost  $50\,\%$  more, at least  $16\,\%$  of the population has no health care coverage. And in terms of quality, something Obama detractors continue to insist is substandard in Canada, the USA is ranked dead last amongst the G8 nations in infant mortality and life expectancy while expending more than double the average to pay for it. Many of you have probably seen Michael Moore's film "Sicko", which while one of his poorer efforts, does effectively portray the plight of uninsured Americans, in addition to debunking right wing myths regarding Canada and Britain's government funded systems. In the summer of 1946, a slight, young woman named Hilda Neuerberg arrived from Holland at

This greeting baffled the girlishly innocent young athlete, who unbeknownst to her, had become a dark horse in the annual European rowing championship, and was attracting the interest of the European sculling community. To her own amazement, Hilda rowed to victory in that one kilometre race, placing first not through strategy and treachery, but rather through good manners—she moved aside to allow others under the bridge before she rowed through herself, sheer athletic prowess and gritty determination. Hilda's abiding strength, the strength which that memorable day delivered her to the pinnacle of the European Rowing Championship, the strength which has seen her through the numerous challenges and obstacles of her productive and generous life, is, simply put, to stay the course.

Staying the course has been the single most important factor in Hilda's success as Quadra Island's own cultural impresario, success which has blessed us with a cultural richness which truly rests on this one champion's shoulders. Between the years of 1962 and 1986, Hilda co-organized the Quadra Film Club and various other theatrical and musical events. In 1986 at the modest age of 63, she finally got serious about her cultural commitments and became the sole co-ordinator of the fledgling Quadra Cultural Committee. This role included

This is a very special honour in the arts community, invisible to the average British Columbian, but very much on the radar of both performers and presenters in the performing arts world. This award capped many years of endless problem-solving, decision-making, and sheer plodding hard work.

Hilda, please don't think that our acknowledgment and gratitude lets you off the hook. Your knowledge of Quadra's cultural history, along with your invaluable contacts with the arts community, your passionate commitment to good programming and your willing leadership, will continue to be essential to the cultural health of island life. But even above all these, we will continue to look upon you as that shining example of one who, when all was said and done, triumphed, simply because she stayed the course. Thank you Hilda, for all you have done for us.


