As I see it,

Quadra Island people have a long tradition of thinking about our island and trying to keep it pleasant and beautiful. We have volunteers to repair hiking trails, volunteers to clean up beaches, and amongst other citizens' groups we have an open forum to guide and plan Quadra Island's future growth and coming changes. A lot of effort and hours and hours of discussion went into planning a good future for our island. The result is the Quadra Island Official Community Plan (OCP). We happily live by our Community Plan. The first OCP was brought out in 1969, that is over 40 years ago, and we have a fresh new edition just finished in 2007, a thorough and very clear document. The introduction says:

"One of the primary functions of the Quadra Island official community plan (OCP) is to provide Quadra Island and surrounding peripheral islets ('plan area') with a guide for future land use and community development. The plan is an important statement of community values and goals."

And so it is and so it stands now. Note, it is a *"guide for future land use"*.

Mr. Schellinck acquired the D.L. 208 after complicated transactions. He had a troubled history as logger on Denman Island. He is proposing a subdivision on D.L. 208, a mainly Silviculture land on a peninsula at the south end of Gowlland Harbour. I am especially interested, as I love Gowlland Harbour. So I checked the OCP against the proposal and the Regional District's Staff report that is offered to our Directors.

It is good to remind ourselves of the process of altering

the zoning on a property. Everybody has the right to ask to amend zoning bylaws and the RB is obliged to accept applications. In the first phase of dealing with a request for zoning change our elected representative (Jim Abram and other Directors of Strathcona RB) are only making sure that the correct process is followed. They are - as they should be - uncommitted on the merits of any request. The RB staff examines and then reports on the application. Once the report is done and is published (at the moment on the website of the RB only) the application becomes public. Following the publication the Directors can receive comments and advice from all sort of sources. The final source of advice comes from the public at a statutory public hearing and the written submissions received up to the closing of submissions. At that time our elected Directors metamorphose into our elected judges, who on our behalf weigh the pros and cons, and allow or reject the application.

In this article I write about OCP versus the proposed subdivision.

The RD staff report on Mr. Schellinck's subdivision plan say that this proposal somehow fits in with the OCP. It says that:

"may be supported based upon general OCP policies"

"may be viewed as a natural transition in density..."

"may be considered an extension of existing settlement areas"

"may be viewed as supportive of the OCP aswill incorporate larger lot sizesalong the shoreline "

"it may be of some concern that the OCP goes father than the potential over-designation of Silviculture lands"

"the designation of Silviculture may have inadvertently limited the usability"

"although the proposal is in conflict with existing OCP designation, support can be found within the OCP policies that may justify an amendment to the existing designation."

This is obviously stretching it and most Quadra Island folks may conclude that--IT MAY NOT BE VIEWED AS SUCH --. After all the OCP clearly stated that:

"Mobile home parks shall not be permitted within the plan area."

"Country residential lands will not be designated on land designated Silviculture."

"Rural residential lands will not be designated in –skip-- lands designated Silviculture."

"Quathiaski Cove and Heriot Bay –skip- two areas have been defined as village containment boundaries"

"To recognize the shoreline as a ribbon of shared aesthetics, heritage, and biological diversity, and to preserve the Island's scenic landscapes"

"To discourage high-density settlement patterns on the shoreline."

"To support the continuance of large lot sizes for shoreline areas, and to direct small lot densities to residentially designated areas in the interior of the Island."

The core design of Mr. Schellinck's plan is to get something like a seasonal Mobile Home Park and make plentiful "view lots" lined up on the top of the shoreline. These lots are narrow, long and rectangular. Mr. Schellinck wants lot size averaging too, so that in exchange for larger lots inland, smaller lots may be put on the shoreline.

It is clear to me that this plan cannot be reconciled with the existing OCP and the existing designation of the area as Silviculture. This must be clear to Mr. Schellinck and his facilitator too.

So, let us nudge the OCP - after all "it may be of some concern that the OCP goes further than the potential over-designation of Silviculture lands" and the designation of Silviculture "may have inadvertently limited the usability".

There is a possible way out - a brand new Zone and a brand new land-designation for our Quadra Island, the amazing "Comprehensive Development Area"! that would let us re-designate D.L. 208 as a Comprehensive Development Area. HMMMM!!!

This would defeat the OCP counsel on desirable developments and would allow on our shores the cramming of view lots and something that could grow into a Mobile Home Park. It would permit lot size averaging and other goodies that run contrary to the OCP guidelines.

As I see it, this project is bad and needs to be defeated.

Gowlland Harbour Views Development (GHVD): - Update

Last year following the two public information meetings held on Quadra Island, we gathered feedback from many individuals and we have made several positive changes to our development plans. There will be another public information meeting happening soon at the Quadra Community Centre hall to provide an update.

As our rezoning application advanced through the early steps of the rezoning process we learned the SRD planning staff had proposed a legal document for a stronger control structure in order to ensure clear direction of action. This legal document is called a "Master Development Agreement" and will be explained in detail at the next information meeting .

Our (GHVD) original plan was to do 4 strata plans in phases with sewage treatment plants on site. We had found good soils that would accommodate the treatment plants. However recently we learned that the SRD was working on a sewage treatment review and were planning expansion and upgrading. This important information is what triggered the first change in our plans. We now have the added option of creating fee simple lots connected to the local sewage treatment plant

Within the next month or so there will be a well advertised announcement for a public meeting on Quadra Island to present the proposed updated development plans. This open house meeting will be co hosted with the Strathcona Regional District staff (SRD) and the GHVD consulting team.

Our development plan has changed from the original proposal that was displayed to the public back in September and October of 2009. There are an additional 5 lots, a more detailed plan for the commercial area and an additional 4 acres of park, but our total layout with roads, trails, park and greenspace is basically the same.

We have had some negative feedback and a few letters to the local Discovery Islander paper against our proposal. We have always told the individuals with concerns that we are available to meet and discuss the issues. We have welcomed constructive criticisms to help us evolve through this process and we have offered to all the negative authors an opportunity to sit down with us and discuss their concerns. At the open house coming soon we hope to have all the answers to meet everyone's concerns.

For all the Quadra residents who have written letters of support and met us on the site for a tour we thank you and invite you to come to the public information meetings to hear the latest updates.

ere we are at the last day of January! As cold as it was today, the signs of spring are all around. Soon it will be time to think about gardens again, although I am still thinking about mine from last year and all the things I didn't get time to do in the way of preparing for winter, let alone spring!

So, on to the topics for this report.

Rumours

It sometimes really surprises me at some of the things I hear though the "kelpvine" on this island. I write a detailed report twice monthly in this publication and on line with all of my contact information: phone number, fax number, email address and mailing address. And yet I am rarely contacted by people who have questions or concerns about rumours that they have heard about local government business. It baffles me. I am available. I return calls and answer emails as soon as humanly possible, usually in the same day. However, somehow, rumours seem to circulate that are not necessarily accurate or true. For those of you who read my reports, I would hope that the first thing you would do when a question comes up, is call me! Ask me what I know on the topic. Ask me anything that you like. I will tell you what I know or direct you to the person who might know more. No one seems to have a problem calling me up about pot holes, parking issues, animal issues, RCMP issues and anything else you can imagine (none of which are in the jurisdiction of local government). I always do my best to help out no matter whose jurisdiction it is.

So, please, when you hear something that seems incredible or wrong or questionable, give me a call! I'll try to help you out. There is nothing more disturbing than to see my name in a letter to the editor suggesting that I am doing something that I have not done. I then need to wait two weeks to clear up the misconceptions. And who knows if the same people that have read the first bit of misinformation will read the correction?

Don't be shy. Call me!

Gowlland Harbour Views (Schellinck) proposal

This is the proposal that prompted me to write the above passage. There sure is a lot of "rumour" out there on this one. I have written I don't know how many articles on this proposal to try to keep people up to date. And I heard the other day that I was "shepherding" this application through. WRONG! I am trying to inform the public of what is being applied for and trying to make sure that due process is followed.

Just so you are aware of the latest, the proposal did not receive first and second reading at the Board



So I would like to clear up some commonly held misconceptions about our Official Community Plan (OCP) that I received in the meeting with the planners:

Since OCP's are policy documents, they cannot prohibit. They can strongly discourage or other similar language, but they cannot prohibit. That comes in the zoning bylaw, which is regulatory. Language to prohibit would fetter the discretion of the Board, and that is not allowed

Anyone can apply to change an OCP at any time. The staff then will tell the person if it is a good idea or not, but it is up to the person applying to decide if they will proceed. So, to say something is against our OCP, while factual, does not mean that it cannot be amended through the process. That is what this applicant has decided to "pay his money and take his chances" at: an amendment to both the OCP and the bylaw.

All applications must be considered by the Board as individual applications. So if the language in the OCP must be changed, to meet the requirements of the Act, that does not mean that all Silviculture land is open to the same provisions being applied for by this applicant. Each one would need to be considered on a case by case basis on its merits.

According to staff, amendments to the Residential Rural and the Country Residential designations in the OCP are required since the existing polices are regulatory in nature and belong in the zoning bylaw, not the OCP. Any amendments that might be made, in no way mean that any applications will automatically be supported. The discretion remains with the Board.

And last of all, I will just mention that there is no "trailer park" applied for (as you will read in another letter to the editor) in this application. It is a campground, just to be clear.

I am sure that there will be plenty of discussion about this application and this is great. But let's have it in the open and please feel free to ask me any questions that you like about the process. I will be glad to assist you in staying informed.

Upcoming Public Meetings - Please make note!

In an effort to make sure you know what meetings are coming up so that you can plan them into your calendars, I provide the following:

Thursday, February 17th, there is a meeting tentatively scheduled for the Steering Committee members only, concerning the draft plan for the Quathiaski Cove Local Area Plan. This is not a public meeting. That will happen in the next month or so.

Thursday, February 24th, there will be a meeting to explain the Quathiaski cove sewer taxation issue. Senior staff from the SRD will be in attendance. This meeting will effect those people within the Q.Cove Sewer Specified Area. The meeting will be held at Quadra Elementary, time to be announced (evening)

Countdown to Emergency Power at the Quadra Community Centre



After more than three years and the support of dozens of people and several organizations, a 50 kilowatt portable generator was officially unveiled at the Quadra Community Centre on January 19. The generator, which is a joint undertaking of the Quadra Emergency Program and the Quadra Island Recreation Society, will power a Reception Centre in the event of major storm, earthquake, wildfire or other disaster. The purpose of a Reception Centre is to provide a safe place where people evacuated from their homes can find help with food, transportation, housing, clothing and other practical support.

The generator project cost nearly \$45,000 which required a sustained commitment by Quadra volunteer fund-raisers. Starting with a kick-off donation from the Ken Munn Memorial Fund, local fund-raising included a contribution by the Quadra Garden Club, and several well-supported events including a barbecue, spud gun shoot, silent auction and raffles. Many individuals and businesses contributed raffle and auction items as well as cash donations and services. The Campbell River Christian Ministerial Association, the Quadra Legacy Fund of the Coastal Community Credit Union, the Joint Emergency Preparedness Program, and Strathcona Regional District all made grants for the project. Several representatives of sponsor organizations joined Judy Hagen, Director of Quadra's Emergency Program and Jim Abram, Area C Regional Director, at the Community Centre to help celebrate this important community project. 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Study shows: Racism Persists in the Country

Campbell River and Area Multicultural and Immigrant Services Association (MISA) hosted an Anti-Discrimination Response Training workshop on January 15 with great success. Many participants shared their experiences and feelings and the community should pay more attention to these experiences. Canada admits many immigrants from different parts of the world every year, which is why Canada is regarded as a multicultural country. Ideally, if we could transform our country into what British social philosopher, Thomas More, called "Utopia", where everyone can live peacefully and equally, Canada would definitely be an unbeatable attraction. In reality, we are quite far from that.

A recent survey done by the Association of Canadian Studies and Canadian Race Relations Foundation shows an interesting trend. 46% of interviewees believe racism is on the rise, while 45% disagreed. When they were asked if they had witnessed a racist incident in the last year, 38% of Canadians in this survey said yes.

In fact, during the A.R.T workshop, all participants also expressed they had experienced racism. The Project Coordinator of MISA Vienna Yeung says, "All participants have faced discrimination, including Caucasians, First Nations and visible minorities. Many participants agreed that the community should pay more attention to fighting against racism. Sometimes, they are not sure what to do when they witness discrimination. Education and awareness are very important in the community."

Racism is found more often than many people think. Some people like making racist jokes and find these funny, but in fact they are not. Vienna Yeung also expressed that some First Nations participants are really disappointed with the fact that many people have bias against them. "They feel frustrated when they experience discrimination. We cannot ignore the fact that they also have contributed to the country. And they are as important as everyone in the country. They deserve respect," Vienna Yeung continues. "Why do we discriminate people when we don't want to be discriminated?"

The Annual Walk Away from Racism will take place in March. It is time for everyone to think about what effects racism have on us, and what we can do to completely eliminate it.

Friends of Strathcona Hosting Meeting

The Friends of Strathcona Park (FOSP) are hosting a meeting in Courtenay for several groups concerned with protecting our environment and parks. Executive members from the various groups will discuss ways and means for encouraging governments to deal better with fragile natural areas.

Some recent happenings which have prompted the coming discussion are threats of increased logging and mining in Clayoquot Sound, and harmful commercial activity in the Bedwell Valley area of Strathcona Park. Discussion topics will include possible court proceedings against the government, alliances with native groups, and the pros and cons of civil disobedience. Non-violence workshops will be on the agenda. One thing that won't be on the agenda is politics. Karl Stevenson, a director for FOSP, says FOSP is strictly non-political because no government, at least so far, has shown itself to be much better than another when it comes to respecting the environment.

In 1988, the Social Credit government threw open large areas of Strathcona Park to commercial/ industrial exploitation. This sparked a blockade lasting several months and resulting in huge publicity and a subsequent reversal of government actions. In the election which followed, the Socreds lost to the NDP. Ironically, the NDP promptly went down an almost identical path and suffered much the same fate when they announced major logging plans for Clayoquot Sound. The public once again turned out in force, hundreds of arrests attracted worldwide publicity, and the NDP reversed its position, but not before it was badly hurt politically. Although these civil disobedience actions had favourable results for the environment, they were very costly for all concerned, including the governments, and no one wants a repeat. One major purpose for the upcoming meeting is to fully explore all other possible options.

In regard to non-violence training, Stevenson says, "One of the biggest truths about the Strathcona Blockade is that it was absolutely no fun. We tried very hard to avoid that blockade, and we definitely don't want another. But one thing that kept things so totally peaceful in 1988 was the non-violence training we received beforehand. If people feel compelled to stand up for the park again, there may be little time for training. If we train now and never need it, that's great. In fact, we couldn't hope for anything better."

The January meeting is intended as an intensive strategy and training session, involving only the executive members of FOSP and other participating groups. It will form the basis for future workshops and meetings, open to all who wish to attend.

ur family journeyed to South Africa this winter where we worked, played and visited family for three wonderful months. Traveling as a family was a special time; seeing the landscape through five pairs of eyes, rather than just my own. My mind and my heart were opened to so much, I could fill many pages, but for now I will tell you about one of our many great farm visit experiences.

One of our main missions in traveling was to meet, in person, our Honeybush tea farmer, inspect the farm and understand the process that the Honeybush goes through from "field to cup". Previously, our Rooibos farmer was sourcing our Honeybush for us, sometimes from this farmer, as we now know, and occasionally from other farmers. One of our most valued company mandates is "knowing the farmer" or more accurately "shaking the hand of the farmer". We feel this is crucially important and what is lacking in the global food movement. Knowing our products intimately, seeing first hand that they are 100% organic, ethically sound and always the freshest harvest is the most rewarding part of our business. We can deliver to you, our customers and friends, the absolute highest quality product and if there is ever a question about it, we can pick up the phone and call the farmer. This farmer-direct relationship is the backbone of our business.

With Honeybush as a main pursuit on the trip, the Langkloof Valley was one of our first travel destinations. After touring and meeting numerous Honeybush farmers, we can say that the farm that impressed us the most and is now our permanent supplier is Nooitgedacht Farm owned by Quinton and Eunice Nortje.

As we traveled over three mountain passes to get to their farm, on single-track dirt roads with no railings, we realized just how remote this farm was. After the third white knuckled pass, we came into a beautiful valley, with a meandering river and a few dwellings. We wondered where to stop, but were soon greeted by a smiling farmer

on the side of the road. Happily giving us a tour, he showed us his Honeybush processing facility, which was the cleanest work building I had ever seen. You could eat off the floors!

They brought us to their home for a delicious, all farm lunch and of course numerous cups of Honeybush tea! Over lunch they shared with us detailed information about Honeybush, and their farm, an absolute education in a few hours.

There are actually three varieties of Honeybush. The one they produce is called Cyclopia Intermedia and is known as Mountain Tea, as it grows wild on the slopes of the mountains in the Kouga Mountain Range. Mountain Tea is the cream of the crop, with the best flavour and overall antioxidant and mineral content of any of the three varieties. It is a slow brew tea, meaning you have to brew for some time or simmer it on the stovetop to get all the goodness of the plant into your cup. After lunch, we climbed into Quentin's 4X4 or bakkie, as they are called in South Africa. The kids in the back, we started to drive up and up, all the way to

the top of the next mountain. We stopped there, with an incredible panoramic view and examined the first plants of Honeybush we had seen in the wild. The farmer pointed three mountains further and explained that was where he harvested the Honeybush. A place where there is no houses, no roads, just a dirt track and wild Honeybush everywhere! All their tea is wild crafted and hand harvested by traversing mountain slopes. They rig up 1km zip lines to transport the tea from the high slopes down to a waiting tractor and trailer. When asked how much tea he wild crafts in a year, Quentin told us 20 tonnes. He said he could harvest double that, but doesn't want to over harvest the wild stock and delicate ecosystem, as the land has been in his family for generations. We were all amazed and impressed by this farm, by far the most sustainable we had seen. Two words described our experience, "Beyond Organic". We thank our lucky stars for organic farmers, for farmers who care for the earth, for farmers who footsteps are the best fertilizer.

Enjoy the Honeybush, knowing a bit more about this wild and earthy, caffeine free, high mineral and antioxidant tea. Thank you, as always for supporting our family business!
