REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Area C

hope you all have had a great long weekend and are about to enjoy another annual Mayday with all of the traditional festivities. Let's hope the weather is good to us!

I have not written for awhile due to too many things pending. Now I can pass on what I know about some topics that you are interested in.

High-speed internet

This topic probably comes up more often than most in my daily conversations with people and I can finally give you some very good news at this time. I met for one more session in Victoria with the General Manager of the Vancouver Island Region just yesterday. I have been waiting for this meeting for about a month and needed to have it before I could say anything about the progress I have been making with Telus.

I am still unable to give you too many details due to confidentiality within the corporation. What I can tell you is that Telus has us totally in their plans for the future. We can expect three things over the next year. First we will be getting immediate improvements to cellular services in the area. Secondly we are being assessed for far greater improvements in the very near future that will include both cellular and

internet services. Thirdly, Telus has a number of communities that have some infrastructure in place but are not being fully serviced. We are in that category and are being seriously considered for the highest level of upgrades. This is all part of the general Telus master plan.

They liked the business case that I presented and that has gone a long way for them to base their decisions on. My relationship with the General Manager has been very productive and I hope to be able to tell you more by the next issue. Joint announcements will be made with Telus when plans are finalized. I hope that all of you will be patient and realize what a frustrating situation this puts me in. However, I must keep my word to the people that I am working with so as to not jeopardize our possible outcomes. So, let's all be patient and keep our fingers crossed.

Quathiaski Local Area Plan - OCP changes

After two and one half years of intensive meetings with a very diverse and representative group of islanders and the Regional District, we have finally gotten through all of the ground work and are ready to bring this plan to a public hearing. The Regional District

and I decided that we should have one more public meeting to insure that everyone was able to have open discussion about the plan, prior to going to the public hearing which is so much more formal and does not allow for back and forth discussion. That public meeting was held last Wednesday night, May 16th, and gauging by the low turnout I would say that there are no really burning questions at this time. Of course, it is hard to tell. The turnout could mean a number of things: lack of interest, complete satisfaction, people are "meetinged out", or they are saving their comments for the actual public hearing. One just never knows! The Public Hearing is on Wednesday, May 23rd, at 7:00 pm at the Quadra Community Centre. I hope to see you there.

Gowlland Views -Schellinck proposal

The Regional District has had no contact with the proponent and neither have I. I have no clue why this has not come back to us at this point. Where it was left was that the applicant needed to fulfill a long list of requirements prior to coming to a public hearing. I insisted upon that and the Board agreed. So, I am assuming that he has not finished with the list and when he does he will come back to the SRD.

I will ensure that the public hearing, if it ever happens, will not happen during the summer months when people are away or otherwise distracted. The hearing would be in the fall at the earliest and I will keep you informed.

Quathiaski Cove sewer expansion proposal

I do not have the final word from the planners on the final outcome of the Petition process to add a number of properties to the existing sewer project but I did hear from the planning department that they will have a full report before the board next Thursday. They also said, unofficially, that the "numbers were not looking good". The report will be on the SRD site by Wednesday for all (including me) to see. This expansion is a key element in servicing the Cove area and in helping to keep the annual user fees at a lower rate, not to mention to remedy the systems that were failing in the area. We'll see!

Quathiaski Cove sewer user fees

Speaking of the user fee issue for the sewer, during our budgeting process this year it became obvious from staff that the system is unable to continue operating using the existing formula for fees. I was shocked at the rate of increase needed and told staff that they will need to hold a meeting with all of the users and with all associated staff to explain the increases. Staff are in the process of setting up a meeting with all of the users and all of the associated staff and it will be held in the Cove. Each of the present users will be notified by letter to attend and hear the rationale for the increases. I heard two years ago, loud and clear, that the people that are in the service area that are not serviced should not be taxed on their property taxes to offset the user fee. I absolutely agreed and during our budget process insisted that the taxation component would not be part of the 2012

budget. And it is not! The only people paying for sewer service are those hooked up to the sewer. I do hope that all of the users will attend the meeting with staff. It will be very soon.

Ferry fares and new legislation

I am sure that all of you know that I have been on a committee of all 14 Regional Districts on the coast, including the Island's Trust, for the past year. Our goal was to make sure that the commissioner wrote a good report to the Minister in favour of eliminating the Coastal Ferry Act and lowering fares substantially and putting the ferry system back in the highway system and to treat it as part of the "marine highway".

I have met with the Minister personally numerous times and as a large group with the Premier and the Minster. We also met with the Commissioner twice. We wrote a discussion paper that commented on the Commissioner's report and made our own recommendations.

I am not going to try to recount all of what has transpired here but please go to the following site to read the details:

Essentially we got hammered once again. An increase in fares this last April 1st. No consideration of being put back into highways. More increases to come. Substantial service cuts on their way. How is that for a responsive government??? I have talked with the MInister twice in the past week, and he is unable to get anything more past his cabinet. There is nothing worse in the human condition than the situation of complete helplessness. How do we change this? What is next? I look to you to come up with another creative solution that will convince government to change their minds. Let me know when you have a solution. I have spent years on this topic. The only thing that worked was putting 500 islanders on the legislative building steps. They rolled back the fares then and they can do it again.

Highways issues

The Safety Council and myself have been trying to get the lines on the island repainted for the past two years. Fortunately we now have a new Area Manager and I have taken a tour of the island with her and had a number of conversations over the past months. She has also taken the time to meet with the Safety Council. She called me this week and let me know that she has gotten approved 12 km's of line painting for the island; not as much as she asked for but all that she could get. The lines from ferry to ferry will be done and I have asked that Heriot bay Rd. from West Rd. up the hill to at least Smith's Rd., make up that "leftover" distance from ferry to ferry. She says that they will continue as far as they can go on Heriot Bay Rd. So, at least a little good news to end on.

There are many other issues on the front and back burner right now, but I think I have taken up my alloted space, so I will stop here. I have been inundated with issues ever since November (and before!) and I am doing my best to deal with them all and will continue to work hard on your behalf. Purple Martins

Purple Martin nest boxes were first installed at the pilings at the Heriot Bay launch pad in 2005 and in 2006 we banded our first 4 nestlings. The colony has gradually expanded and last year all 7 boxes around the wharf showed nesting activity.. With last year's cold wet spring , some of Quadra and Campbell River babies didn't survive, but in August we successfully banded. 10 nestlings. The past winter was hard on the pilings so now we're down to 5 boxes at Heriot Bay . Fortunately, John and Bev Barclay started another housing complex last summer, this time at the Spit near the boat launch, where John erected 2 posts with 8 new boxes awaiting occupants. Bev reported seeing some returning martins there more than a week ago - it's usually about the middle of May when we hear their beautiful warbling again, so keep your eyes and ears open. The birds look like large swallows and the mature males are bluish purple and the females milk chocolate brown.

Quadra Cat Rescue volunteers will also accept "pennies for paws" during the garage sale.


Quadra Cat Rescue has fixed more than 200 cats and kittens since March 2009 - and found homes for many that turned out to be strays or abandoned.

Quadra Island Salmon Enhancement Society At Granite Bay In May



Coho travel as they will through Granite Creek, a north Quadra stream so named by counting enthusiasts and geographers. I have taken a personal interest because I live here. I know the flow as "Larson Creek," a reference locals use. I could say my husband and I "own" property the water travels through. However, ownership, something like names, connotes "rights", and I have no right to this place, which lingers in the words of one visiting scientist, "...it doesn't get more beautiful than this." My memory treasures another gentle voice, that of a then 90-year-old Mr. Dubois. He was describing a happening on the creek, some time around the '50's. He had just recollected "being a part" of the massive obliteration of trees along Granite Bay. Loss. He regretted the loss in destruction. But as well, he remembered the returning salmon, "...by the "hundreds, thousands?" He paused, smiled at me, and described how beginning at the mouth of the creek, just at Granite Bay water, he, in strong company of lumbermen, also wives and children, walked the creek, tossed debris, and always followed by salmon. "Puppies," he said. "Like puppies, they followed us all the way up.

The water was so backed up with cut wood, they needed us." Today our century has turned and the nearly 80 acres on which I live is young again, all shades of green. While the beautiful portion of creek of which I speak is frequented by the likes of a father and young son, a great little giggler, fingers dashing here and there, engaged with so much life, others arrive, significantly to take a more measured interest. These folks are mindful of past and future, and view a creek of all times within its present. These are a small group of volunteers trying to ensure viable habitat for returning salmon throughout Quadra, not just at Granite Bay. They, as did Mr. Dubois, trod bush in all sorts of weather, caring as he did, but now to count and measure and document, then offer an understanding of salmon to people such as me and my grandchildren. I expect Mr. Dubois would be pleased. The Quadra Island Salmon Enhancement Society (QISES) offers learning experiences, Ecocenter tours, and volunteer opportunities between now and the end of salmon runs occurring in October and November. 

Quadra Island Salmon Enhancement Society 2012

At the recent Annual General Meeting, the Society's accomplishments were reviewed and new plans discussed for Quadra Island's salmon population. The President's Report reiterated QISES 2011's 2-pronged focus: 1) to maintain, monitor, and enhance watershed and fish habitat; and 2) to provide public education as well as raise awareness. Therefore, last year's work by the 100% volunteer organization targeted droughtproofing on Hyacinthe Creek; manning of the Village Bay Lakes counting fence; field reviews and consultations with TimberWest; participation in the Provincial Stewardship Workshop at North Island College; continued renovations of the hatchery side of the EcoCenter and completion of work on the sand room. The EcoCenter was open five days per week last summer with approximately 150 visitors viewing the Center's displays hosted and interpreted by student Shayla Sopracalle-Tait. As well you might have encountered dependable volunteers weekly in October and November counting salmon returns on several local streams. Final numbers indicated that chum were abundant, but few coho were seen. Volunteers always are welcomed and and needed as we stretch through the 2012 field and EcoCenter seasons. Additional expertise and energy are essential to clean up and refinish the hatchery side of the Eco-center building; to develop displays and signs; to facilitate connections with locally schooled children and homeschool groups; to work on stream field projects and to count salmon in the fall. 

Nation, who then introduced the elders in attendance, and Ken Hanuse, who sang two traditional songs to open the Festival.



Next Steps For Library Services On Cortes Island

NANAIMO - Vancouver Island Regional Library (VIRL) has been unsuccessful over the past eighteen months, with the Expression of Interest process for a new library on Cortes Island. The most recent proposal made by the Southern Cortes Community Association falls outside the scope of the original Expression of Interest which was for rentable space for the library. Vancouver Island Regional Library staff has not been authorized by the VIRL Board to negotiate outside the scope of the original Expression of Interest. Regretfully, negotiations with the Southern Cortes Community Association have therefore ceased.

"We will be recommending a Request for Proposals (RFP) process to the Vancouver Island Regional Library Board at their June 9th Board meeting," said Rosemary Bonanno, Executive Director of Vancouver Island Regional Library. "This RFP process will allow the Board to make a decision consistent with sound procurement practices and will ensure a fair, open, and competitive process."

The Request for Proposal process will identify a long term solution for library services on Cortes Island as quickly as possible. In the meantime, the search for, and work towards, a temporary location for library services continues.

Vancouver Island Regional Library (VIRL) is the fourth largest library system in British Columbia. We serve over 417,000 people on Vancouver Island, Haida Gwaii, and Bella Coola on the Central Coast through 38 branch libraries, a virtual branch, and a books by mail service. Administrative offices are located in Nanaimo.






