New Life on Quadra Farms

You may have enjoyed some "Quadra beef" at the Heriot Bay Inn this winter. There's a refreshing story behind that local meat that involves some of the island's oldest farms being brought back into production.

At the turn of the last century 36 families, out of population of 342 non-Native island residents, said they earned their keep as farmers. That number plummeted over the years that followed, as other sources of work became available and food became easier to buy off-island. By the 1950s only a few family farms remained.

And so it continued until recent years when a new generation of farmers emerged, predicated upon the strong market for ethically raised local food. These new farmers are serious about the business, to which they bring a blend of old-fashioned know-how and values, along with current ideas about sustainable agriculture. Market gardens have been the main thrust to date, following the lead of islanders like Theresa O'Brien and Brian Simons and the Dennisons of Quadra Dirt Co, who produce a stunning choice of flowers and vegies.

Newer residents Ryan Nassichuk and Jessica Hammersmark, certified horticulturists, offer weekly produce boxes and the Ankerholms on Heriot Bay Road will have vegies for sale through summer. Ripple Rock Farm, in the hands of the third generation of the Rousseau family and friends, sell most of their produce to local restaurants.

Étienne Côté has added a new option to local food production. He and his childhood friends Amanda and Noah Stewart-Webb got into stock raising last summer on the island's oldest homestead, Hillcrest Farm, with thanks to the Remfert family. They raised five beef cows, borrowed old equipment and drew upon the skills of men like Roy Dahlnas to cut 1,200 bales of hay from various old farms, harvesting what had become "lawns" and overgrown fields. Étienne also bred and overwintered the start of a beef herd under the watchful eye of John and Joan Hewison of Sunnyside Farm—another of the island's oldest homesteads.

Noah and Amanda will continue on their own this year, as The Quadra Farm, while Etienne expands his stock raising enterprise under the banner of "Hillcrest Farms." He'll cut hay in association with Dennis and Brenda Ankerholm; and he'll raise fifteen Hereford-Red Angus-cross steers through summer, along with turkeys, pigs and a few lambs.

The advantages of buying pasture raised meat are many, says Étienne. The animals live a more natural and healthy life that negates the need for chemical treatments or hormones. The steers are raised and finished on Quadra Island grass to produce a lean and flavourful product that has less calories and cholesterol than conventionally farmed cows. Also on the plus side, is that cows raised on grass absorb vitamins and minerals more readily, a benefit that's passed on to us.

Étienne takes his cue from a variety of inspirational examples, like Joel Salatin of Polyface Farms, who advocates the concept that stock farmers are actually in the business of raising grass. With that view in mind, the farmer's job is to develop and enhance the soil. Mixed farming, says Étienne, is the best way to achieve that end, moving a variety of animals and their manure across the fields as the season progresses. Étienne will work several Quadra farms this year on this "management intensive grazing" method. "This mimics the way wild grasses evolved to be grazed," says Étienne, "and creates a healthier stand of grass." Étienne also plans to experiment with growing some of the cereal crops he'll need to raise grain-dependent stock such as poultry, to further localize his operations.

Watch for the launch of Étienne's blog soon, to keep abreast of this exciting development and to find out what products he has available. Étienne will pre-sell most of his meat and has already begun to take orders.



Re: Salmon Confidential

Dear Editor,

It is obvious to me that we need to take action on the answers to a number of questions.

Why didn't the Government and industry embrace the research being done by Alexandra Morton? Research is expensive.

Why didn't the fish farms and DFO send diseased fish samples to many different labs and collaborate on the results of their findings?

Why does the head of the BC Salmon Farmers Association continue to insist that all is fine in aquaculture-land in the face of all evidence to the contrary?

The answer to all these questions is that they do not want to negatively impact the corporate agenda of the aquaculture industry which they consider to be of greater importance than the wild fishery.

It can not be denied that there are some very serious diseases in the fish stocks that are shared with the wild and farm fish. It's bloody well time that a collaborative investigative and open research program be put into place to quickly identify and find the mode of transmission of these diseases so that remedial action can be taken before it's too late.

In the meantime a proactive approach which has been suggested many times, would remove salmon farms from the east coast of Vancouver Island. This is a good idea because the Harrison River sockeye use the west coast and are not impacted.

There are fish farms on the west coast of Vancouver Island which have to be located in sheltered inlets. These farms do not do not impact the returning Harrison sockeye as they move by fairly

quickly, at some distance off shore. The Harrison fry leaving the Fraser may well avoid the west coast farms altogether as the pass southwestward out through the Olympic Archipelago.

History of SEAFEST on Cortes Island

For the past eighteen years the Cortes Island Seafood Association (CISA) has put on a seafood festival to celebrate our heritage from the sea. The purpose of the festival is to bring together those Cortes Islanders who make their living from the sea with the larger community, to promote a mutual understanding and appreciation of the work, and to celebrate the bounty of the ocean. The CISA is a non-profit society whose mandate is to monitor the water quality of the area surrounding Cortes Island.

The gathering began as The Seafood Festival and was held at Smelt Bay Park for many years. It migrated to the lower lawn beside the Cove restaurant as The Oyster festival, and two years ago moved to the field beside the Squirrel Cove Store as SEAFEST. Although there have been years when the spring skies gave more than a few sprinkles, and once when it was moved indoors to a community hall because rain seemed imminent, and once when the wind blew over a few tents, so far with the blessings of the sky deities, the festival has never been cancelled due to



poor weather conditions. Seafoodies are a hardy lot who in years past have stood under dripping trees as well as in the hot sun for a chance to eat poached oysters in Miso sauce, oysters with fermented black bean sauce, oysters drizzled with jalapeño, Pico de Gallo or Pernod sauce, oysters panfried in corn flake crumbs, mussels steamed in white wine, oysters Rockefeller and Angels on Horseback on the barbeque, steamed clams Bordelaise, oysters glazed with lime marmalade and mustard, and prawns in a sweet chili Thai sauce served with shrimp chips.

With the help of some 45 volunteers drawn from the seafood workers, a yearly changing charitable organization, and the community at large—approximately 450 gourmet lunches are served to islanders and guests on Saturday of the Victoria Day weekend. Each year, in an ever closer relationship, members of the Klahoose First Nation have offered salmon and fry bread prepared with traditional and family recipes. When the festival has been located at the Squirrel Cove site—the Cortes Craft Store has used this holiday Saturday for the opening of the store for the season. For the past several years the Island teen organization: TeenZene, has joined in the fun by offering non-sea food and soft drinks. The festival is becoming known for the live music played throughout the day, the desert and craft tables, the spectacular beach setting looking out to Desolation Sound, and of course, for the food.

Last year a long standing challenge of where to park all the cars and how to get off island visitors to the festival was relieved when the organizers offered a free shuttle by reservation, operated by the Cortes Connection and sponsored by the Cortes Community Credit Union. Riding into Freedom

s is often the case with children on the weekends, rather than hang out with mom and dad, they make arrangements for a playdate. My nine-year-old son Dominic is no exception; he loves being with his friends. And so it came to me as no surprise one sunny Saturday in March that he'd made plans to hang out with his friend Benji. On this particular Saturday rather hopping in the van and chauffeuring my son to his friend's house, I suggested that we ride our bikes.

"Hey! Lets see how long it takes us." I exclaimed with excitement, trying to convince my son that biking all the way from Q Cove to Quadra Loop was a worthy challenge. Much to my surprise, he didn't put up much resistance. I guess he really wanted to see Benji.

The ride took us 35 minutes. We went up West Road, across the Community Center Trail, and down Smith Road. As we pedaled our bikes, I suddenly had a realization. My son is on the cusp, I thought. As I contemplated this idea, I realized that he's almost at that stage in his life where he will want to venture, unassisted, beyond the confines of his home and backyard. And nothing complements that impulse quite as effectively as the bicycle.

Indeed, as we can attest to from our own childhood experience,



the bicycle makes freedom happen. The bike extends one's range far and beyond what legs and feet alone can do. This simple mechanical tool enables the body to cover a vast territory, and the only fuel needed is a peanut butter iam sandwich or a chocolate bar. The bike turns the abstract idea of freedom into something concrete and measurable in kilometers.

The radius around our house that defines Dominic's world is doubled or tripled because of the bike. Whereas on foot, he would venture only to the school playground or the library, now he's able to cover most destinations in South Quadra. Very shortly, the adventure and joy of preadolescence will begin.

Watching my son explore his territory by bike makes me think of my adolescent explorations. In particular, my three-day bike tour around New Brunswick as a fourteenyear-old in 1986. I had only arrived in Canada three months earlier, and my first acquisition in my new country was a red ten-speed from Canadian

Tire. That summer, my friend Lubo and I decided to do a loop from Fredericton to St. Andrews to Saint John and back. The combined distance for the journey was over three hundred kilometres. We pedaled through what seemed like endless forests, along the gorgeous Bay of Fundy, and the stunningly pastoral Saint John River valley. We didn't have panniers, so we brought minimal supplies: a sleeping bag each, a tarp to lie on, a windbreaker, and a sweater. We slept underneath the stars on a discontinued country road, and in a city park in north Saint John.

I could never have gone on such an adventure had it not been for my bicycle. My parents were broke and too preoccupied with starting over. I could only go so far on foot, and didn't have the money for a Greyhound. However, my red ten-speed allowed me to explore the new territory of my adopted home.

More importantly the experience gave me confidence and strength. It affirmed in me the fact that I had

the power to make things happen, the determination to persevere, and the wits to troubleshoot any challenges that came up along the way. The experience came just at the right moment when as a teenager I was craving a sense of independence and an opportunity to test my limits. As I watch my own son approaching the golden and turbulent years of early adolescence, I want the same for him.

The bicycle is a wonderful tool for many reasons. It is a relatively fast and energy efficient vehicle, keeping one healthy and fit to boot. But more than that, it grants freedom, power, and the possibility of adventure. And unlike the car, it doesn't discriminate based on age or income when it grants those gifts. The most important lessons in life are learned through experience. For a young person like Dominic, or my fourteen-year-old self, the bicycle is an ideal instructor. It is a tool that can teach time management, awareness, responsibility, self-knowledge, perseverance, and self-reliance. If we want our kids to develop these traits we should get them out of the car, and set them free on a bike.

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

hat a beautiful spring day! I have literally just walked in the door from the Association of Vancouver Island and Coastal Communities Annual General Meeting (AVICC), held this year in Sooke. It was a three day event inclusive of all local governments from Vancouver Island, the Sunshine Coast and the Central Coast. It was a great opportunity to deal with our issues so close to the timing of the election.

Advisory Group

The Area C informal Advisory Group met last week and the main topic of discussion was "how are we going to deal with the ongoing problem of harm caused by our ferry system". Very good discussion took place and lots of innovative ideas were put forward. As a result it was decided that a media advisory should be put out to all possible media advising them of my upcoming meetings in Sooke and that we are available to comment on the platforms of the various parties as they are released. This was, of course, to pique the media interest in what coastal communities are concerned about. The group discussed a number of topics including forestry and view sheds, our economy, our loss of families, young and older and, of course, you guessed it, ferries! One of our members took on the initial draft and others commented on it. It was finalized and released to all media within 48 hours of inception. So far CHEK -TV news and the two Campbell River radio stations have responded. More will as we get closer to release of the platforms. We intend to make this an election issue that cannot be ignored.

AVICC

There were many resolutions that were debated at the convention but the one that fits most closely with our current coastal priority is the following:

R23 - BC FERRY FARES - Powell River RD

WHEREAS coastal communities consider that ferry services are an integral part of the provincial highway system; AND WHEREAS increasing ferry fares are crippling coastal community economies: WWW.DISCOVERYISLANDER.CA

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the AVICC and the UBCM lobby the provincial government to recognize the coastal ferry services as essential extensions of our provincial public highway system and to ensure that ferry fares are reduced and core service levels are maintained at current service levels until such time as the provincial government implements legislation that recognizes our coastal ferry services as essential extensions of our provincial public highway system and creates equity between BC's terrestrial and marine, interior and coast highway systems.

This resolution passed unanimously! I also had the opportunity to read it verbatim to the representative for Adrian Dix who spoke to the convention in his place. I speak of MLA John Horgan, the Finance Critic at this time. He and I also met for about forty five minutes on Friday. He gets it, as do some of the other MLA's including ours, Claire Trevena. So, should the NDP form the next government, which is anyone's guess, we are already a long way into providing them with the information that they need to do things differently and try to save our coastal communities. We need help!

Telus

I thank all of you for your patience on this topic. A long string of emails between the person in charge of this project and his contractors arrived a number of days ago. Progress is happening! Have any of you by any chance looked at the signal indicator on your phones and seen LTE at the top??? (Hint, hint!). I am still awaiting the area Manager's permission to formally announce the installation and for the service to come fully on line. Telus wants to be the one to do the media and I must respect that wish. So hold on for a bit longer. News is coming soon.

Well Water Study and information session

I received an email earlier today and thought you would like some prior notice of the possible upcoming workshop. Also provided here is a web site with information on the program.

North Island Labs (in Courtenay), routinely tests private well water and find that many of their clients have a lot of questions about ground water quantity and quality. To address this issue The Regional District of Nanaimo developed an excellent programme called WellSmart. http:// www.rdn.bc.ca/cms.asp?wpID=2284. Part of their programme has been to hold evening workshops in various communities where public and private experts are in attendence to present information and answer questions. North Island Labs would take the lead and reproduce RDN-type work shops in areas of the SRD with high concentrations of private drinking water well water ownership.

The first go at this, is going to be on Quadra Island, Saturday July 6th, 2013 at the Quadra Community Centre. They will be working together with Anne Milne (Last Drop Water Systems), Red Williams Well drilling and maybe a few other local businesses. They will also be contacting the Campbell River VIHA office to see if they are interested in participating. I have forwarded all of this information to our planners at the SRD to ensure that we are a participant in the process.

Q. Cove Sewer User Fees

The last few months have been spent trying to resolve the irresolvable regarding the huge and unacceptable increase to the user rates for the Q. Cove Sewer. After many meetings with users, the SRD staff, the SRD Board, The Ministry and even the Minister, I was able to secure a one time contribution of \$40,000.00 to defray the costs of the user fees, from the Ministry. The official words that I am allowed to use

"We gratefully acknowledge the financial support of the Province of British Columbia through the Ministry of Community, Sport and Cultural Development."

And I do gratefully acknowledge this contribution as it will help lighten the burden for this year. The removal of \$18,500.00 from contribution to reserves should further reduce the user fee.

The challenge now will be to add more users to the system so as to eliminate this ongoing problem. We are running at about 10% capacity and there is lots of room for additional properties to join in the service, such as the 50+ properties that were proposed last year. The next proposal that comes forward to add properties will be hard to refuse since the one time cost of joining has been approximated at around one third of the original proposed amount, due to the availability of Community Works Funds (Gas Tax Grants) which we are actively pursuing as a way to bring down the cost of adding properties to the system. We are also looking at proposals for development in the Local Area Plan (the Q. Cove Village proposal). Every additional user of the system brings down the cost of running the system.

We have come a long way on this file and we still have work to do. It is my hope that we will have it done in the next few months and we can then concentrate on other issues that need solutions. Lots of problem solving going on these days and it pleases me to be a part of the solution.

Forestry practices throughout the islands

A great deal of publicity has been generated recently by tourism operators concerning forest practices that are effecting their businesses throughout Area C. I have worked with one of the operators, the TFL holder and the Minister on one issue in one area about changing plans so as to not effect the tour operators and their long time business. Moderate success was achieved but now others are having the same type of problems and there needs to be a comprehensive review of the practices and the effects on existing and future business opportunities. Compromise can be achieved. View-sheds can be protected. Old growth stands can be preserved. Forestry operations can continue. We just need to put the right people in a room and understand the issues and then come up with the solutions. It can be done although it all takes a lot of energy to make it happen. One thing we are not short of on these islands is energy.

I am going to stop here for this report. Hopefully you will have read some of it! 
