# FROM THE EDITOR

s recently reported in DI 596 a coalition of local trail users and supporters have been busy over the past year or more developing a Quadra Island Trails Strategy. Amongst the goals of the strategy is a desire to attain "provincial approval and [develop] guidance for future trail construction and maintenance".

As an avid trail user I've been a small part of this process and a firm supporter of the efforts and goals, albeit with a touch of dismay at the inevitable red tape that always consumes so much time and energy.

Looking at trails strategies from other jurisdictions it is clear to see that the finished product will be an asset to the community and help user groups, volunteer trail-builders and other stakeholders get the most out of our excellent trail network for many years to come.

But looking at the bigger picture I can't help feeling that more is needed.

As Quadra Island positions itself evermore successfully as a tourism destination and especially as one with exceptional outdoor activities the need for greater local control over our land base becomes more apparent.

A little over two years ago a quiet meeting was called between TimberWest and local stakeholders to discuss TimberWest's proposed logging around Morte Lake. Their forester was told in no uncertain terms that this would not be acceptable to the community and the company seemed to back away from the plan.

But there is no guarantee whatsoever that as their clearcuts grow elsewhere that eventually they will be eyeing the forest around Morte Lake ever closer. Given that they are the legal TFL license holder, the community only has the goodwill of the company to keep the forest intact until such time as the market and

other available timber supply forces their hand.

And Morte Lake is only one part of a larger area that has very high recreational and visual values for Quadra Island.

Next time you are at Rebecca Spit take a look at Chinese Mountains and the south and east slopes of Mount Seymour and imagine a new patchwork of clearcuts and logging roads criss-crossing the view. It won't look pretty.

Most of Quadra's popular hiking trails and mountain bike trails are concentrated in this area which is also quickly becoming known for high quality rock climbing. Leaving the security of these assets and the ecological significance of the forest to TimberWest is not a sound long term or even mid-term strategy.

So I'd like to suggest that Mount Seymour is an ideal candidate to have turned over from Tree Farm License to become a Regional Park.

An approximate boundary could be outlined by the Walcan road to the south, Hyacinthe

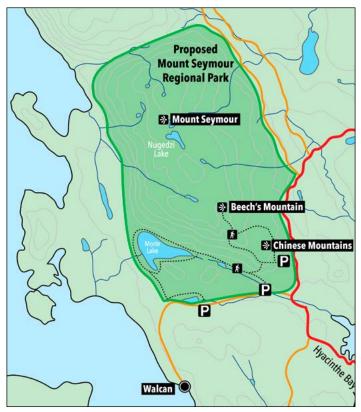
Bay and Granite Bay roads to the east and approximately the 80 metre contour line to the north and west. The details aren't so important now but gauging the scope of community support for a new park is.

Summer isn't typically a good time for meetings and launching new projects so for now the intent here is just to raise the idea. If there are people out there that want to seize the idea and run with it all well and good. Maybe there are some who don't think it's a good idea. Will a Regional Park add to our local taxes? Possibly, but sooner or later some facilities are going to be required at least at the Morte Lake and the Chinese Mountains trailheads and the RD is the perfect body to oversee that.

Either way, if you have an opinion to share on the idea of a Mount Seymour Regional Park drop the DI a line and let our Regional Director know while you're at it. As always it's news@discoveryislands.ca

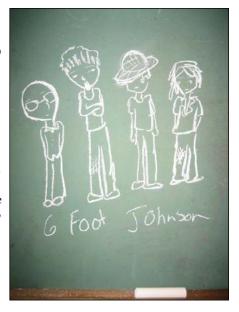

# Water water everywhere!

One of the challenges the Quadra Island Trails Committee faces is water and its impact on trails: how to get through it, around it, over it, and how to minimize its impact and keep it away from the trails.

# **QISES Review and Update**

t Quadra
Island Salmon
Enhancement
Society's recent AGM, we had the opportunity to reflect on the 2014 events and accomplishments of our dedicated board members and volunteers.

A good deal of our board meeting time was spent discussing the future of the counting fence at the outlet of Village Bay Lakes. The present system is very labour intensive during adult salmon migration, with twice daily visits by committed individuals, particularly Larry Hafemeister and Lauren Miller. There are also safety issues since the fence must be accessed by boat during all kinds of weather in October and November. We are looking at options for a land line powered camera system in this remote location. Since any viable options we have found so far are very expensive, we are proceeding cautiously. We continue our research and discussion around this issue in 2015.

Good rapport was maintained with relevant agencies regarding issues of mutual interest. We continue to review and comment on any TimberWest blocks that may have stream issues. At our request, Emcon promptly cleans the large woody debris blockages at the Hyacinthe Bay Road culverts. We met with Tom Rutherford from DFO, and other like-minded groups, to discuss the ongoing problem of the absence of a permanent DFO Community Advisor, despite a series of excellent temporary ones. The CA assists groups such as ours in the implementation of habitat enhancement projects.

The EcoCenter was open during July and August last summer with the help of HRDC funding. Cole Houlihan staffed the center, with 155 visitors stopping in. We have received 2015 funding for another student interpreter; therefore, the EcoCenter will likely be open this summer pending the successful application of an enthusiastic and outgoing student who has an interest in salmon and watershed ecology. The annual release of coho fry from the pond at the

EcoCenter took place as usual in late spring, and 500 new coho fry from the Quinsam Hatchery were added to the pond, thanks to Leah Carlson at DFO. Doug Richardson, Larry Hafemeister and other volunteers kindly made upgrades and repairs to the EcoCenter building. After books and files were moved from the old office to the EcoCenter building, they were sorted and organized for future display.

As usual, the droughtproofing program on Hyacinthe Creek was active, and proved invaluable by using stored water in Mud Lake, Reed Lake and the lower wetland on Walcan Road to maintain adequate flow during the summer for both coho fry and trout. The large volume of water stored at the site #3 (lower) wetland, due to beaver activity, was used to our advantage during a very dry summer. We inserted a 4" pipe into the dam and were able to siphon water downstream at an even flow, without disturbing the beaver.

The Village Bay Lakes watershed feeder streams survey continued in 2014, with encouraging results. We hope to explore more streams, and carry out more fry trapping in 2015, using standardized field, mapping and recording protocol. Habitat enhancement work continued on Luoma Creek, headed by Frank Gleeson. A-frames built in 2013 on Luoma Creek had been damaged by high stream flows that winter. Last summer, these were repaired and a large log jam was cleared. Earlier in the year, trees provided by DFO were planted at the outlet of Luoma Creek to provide shade for

salmon. Meanwhile, the Granite Bay group of keen volunteers was busy carrying out invertebrate surveys, water quality studies and juvenile sampling on Granite Creek.

Many volunteers were out on the streams weekly in October and November counting salmon returns in Granite, Drew, Village Bay, Open Bay and part of Hyacinthe Creeks. Chum and coho returns remained good for another year. And surprisingly, approximately 200 pink salmon showed up in McKercher Creek. The counting fence at Village Bay Lakes was operational, with volunteers counting and releasing coho and chum into the lake system.

It's easy to overlook how much this group of volunteers accomplished in a year, but total volunteer time given to the society was 875 recorded hours, with likely many more unrecorded. I'd like to thank our volunteers, and particularly the board of directors, who gave many hours of their time attending meetings and stepping up when work needed to be done.

Last fall we were able to carry out a membership drive, thanks to the efforts of Eileen Sowerby. If you haven't already done so, please consider becoming a member to support QISES' efforts. 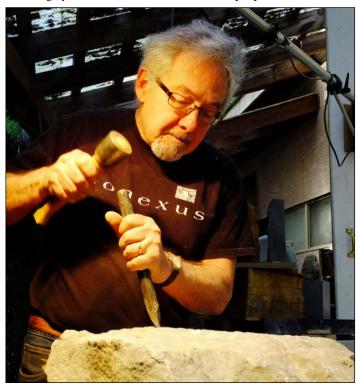

# Rebecca Spit Broombash A Success!

A very big thank you to the wonderful, cheerful crew who came out this year, our 10th no less, to mop up the remaining broom.

It did feel like a mop-up because we managed to get around to all the infested areas and clean them up.

Plants were definitely much sparser this year, which makes me hopeful that the seedbank is thinning out.

Anyway, I hope we never get another flush of germination as in years six and seven.

Below are some suggestions for those battling broom on their own properties.

# **Broom Tips**

- 1. If you have mature old broom plants with thick, woody-looking stems, just cut them off 'at the knees', i.e. about a foot above ground (not at ground level). About 95% will die. It is good to cut them as they start to bloom as all the life force is going into reproduction.
- **2.** If you have mature plants with thick, still green stems, you could also try cutting them as above, but more will re-sprout. If you've left a stump, the resprouting will not happen at ground level and you can just re-cut the next year.
- 3. Pull anything you can.
- **4.** Remember: Preventing seed drop is the long-term strategy. If seedpods are still green and very small (about 2cm or less) feel free to just 'cut and drop' plants, as the seeds in tiny pods won't mature.

If seed pods are sizeable and green or already turning brown, you'll need to 'pile and burn'.

**5.** Don't compost anything with mature seedpods. The seeds will survive your composting and you don't want to spread them around. Good luck.

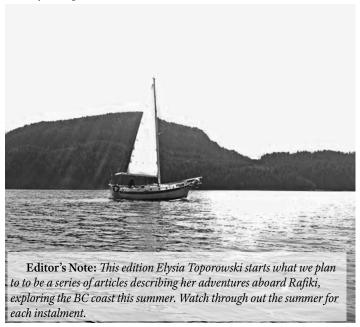
Wandering hither and thither together over recent history, we decided at some unclear point in time that the optimum vessel for discovery would be a sailboat.

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# **Quadra Philippines Connection- GIFT FOR PEACE**



hank-you to all those who attended our recent Quadra Philippines Connection presentation. It was a joy for Michael, Steve and Danielle and I to share with you our recent travels and adventures in Tabuk in the northern Philippines. We would like to welcome the new supporters to IAT's sponsorship program. As was discussed, it is now the hot season and summer vacation in the Philippines with students resuming their studies in June. There are many children in need of sponsors and it was timely that our information evening inspired a local couple and the Quadra Film Club to support two lovely high school girls that we met during our visit who had recently lost their sponsors. During our trip, we were continually impressed with how conscientious, earnest, dedicated and hard-working all of the students were that we met, as well as being optimistic and confident. Sponsoring a childs education for \$400 annually (just over \$1 a day!) not only provides supplies, transportation, food and lodging but also includes youth leadership and empowerment training programs. The latter was definitely evident through our interactions with these inspiring young people! If you would like to sponsor a child but have financial limitations, consider inviting another family or friend to share in

this positive opportunity! Monthly payments are certainly an option. One observation during our stay was a shortage of computers at the IAT dorm for high school and college students. We, therefore, are gathering old lap top computers to be revamped as well as digital cameras to send in the next container shipment to the Philippines. If anyone has either of these to donate, please contact Carol or Michael at 285-3035 or Danielle or Steve at 285-3323 and we will gladly accept your contributions! As well as meeting and being graciously hosted by sponsored children and their families, we also had the opportunity to attend a special ceremony called Passing the Gift . As mentioned in earlier articles, after 20 years of Quadra's support, the daycare programs in northern Luzon are finally receiving local government support. This enables our Quadra community to participate in an exciting new project that will have far reaching results in the northern tribal area of Kalinga province. Because this area is so remote, Kalinga has been isolated and underdeveloped up until about 30 years ago. Tribal people lived in a traditional manner and historically, inter-tribal war was the norm. IAT staff and students continue to play a major role in creating peaceful solutions to conflicts between villages that would have caused bloodshed in the past. This innovative new

project is called the Gift for Peace and Sisan Paut, an ex-sponsored IAT student who now coordinates IAT's Philippines projects recently received an international award for its success to date. The Gift For Peace project is a positive way of promoting self sufficiency, economic stability and thereby a spirit of cooperation and unity between tribes in Kalinga. With cattle provided by ngo, Heifer International, Sisan initiated a program whereby heifers or pigs are provided to specific families with the understanding that the recipient will then give their first offspring to a family from another tribe or village in which there has been a past conflict. In addition to animal dispursal, training seminars on leadership, financial savings, animal husbandry, agro-forestry, health and nutrition and composting are provided. This is now the third phase of the program and a rigorous examination has shown undeniable results which are positively impacting the future of these communities. Two hundred twenty families from 6 villages have so far benefitted with indirect beneficiaries amounting to about 30,000. Over the past few years, the Gift for Peace Project has also become a model for other countries including Thailand and Nepal. Quadra will be participating in the Gift of Peace Project by supporting the community of

Katau. Katau is a small relocation community of 40 families that recently moved from a more mountainous area for economic benefit. In this new location near Tabuk, the men of the village are able to obtain work on nearby kaingins (farms). Danielle and Steve visited Katau in February and were hospitably received. They were able to meet some of the families including elders of the community and fed a humble but tasty, traditional meal. Upon leaving they were gifted with bags of sticky rice, beans and friendship. Through Quadra's support, twenty families in this village will receive 20 caribou to be used for ploughing fields and other work. Over the next few years, the first offspring from these animals will in turn be passed on to 20 families from another tribe where there has been past conflict. The Katau community is very enthusiastic and has already begun their cornerstone training as well as setting up a savings account which is one of the crucial requirements. Our Quadra community will receive ongoing feed-back from Katau as to the progress of the Gift for Peace Project and we look forward to an ongoing relationship. Quadra will also be sponsoring two children in the village from whom we will receive regular contact. To date, there have been no children in Katau that have had any assistance with schooling and so this will also be an added boost to the community. Life in the northern Philippines continues to be challenging. IAT's programs reach the poorest of the poor with the intention of uplifting conditions of tribal people. Education is particularly essential to the progress of this area of the Philippines. It is the belief of IAT that through consciousness raising and education of youth there will be hope for the future. We have certainly become a global community. By expanding our wonderful community of Quadra beyond its borders we are contributing to creating a better place for our children and their children.
