RCMP Beat

On January 14th 2016 at approximately 11:15PM Quadra RCMP responded to a report of two people dressed in dark clothing sneaking around a residence at the Cape Mudge reserve. The police and several neighbours searched the area with negative results. Please keep an eye out for your neighbours property and report anything suspicious right away.

On January 15th, 2016 Quadra RCMP received a report of a male causing a disturbance at the Peoples Drug Mart in Quathiaski Cove. Police later located the male and had him return to the store where he apologized for his behaviour. No charges will be laid in this matter.

On January 16th, 2016 at 430am Quadra RCMP responded to a report of a Break and Enter in progress into the Quathiaski Ferry Terminal. Police located 7 people inside the building (4 young adults and 3 youth) who stated that they were trying to get out of the rain by crawling through a window at the Ferry Terminal.



Lord William (Adult male): He is King Henry's lord regent, and best friend since childhood. He is always giving the king the best he can in all matters.


Sir Stanley (Adult male): He is the king's best knight. He is a fine fighter, devoted to his king, and will do anything for him.

Notice the coho count from Hyacinthe. By sheer luck members of QISES were out on a field trip and happened to spot 24 coho at the outlet of Mud Lake where previous QISES volunteers had placed spawning gravel. We consider ourselves quite fortunate to see any coho (except for the V.B. counting fence) because they leave the ocean and "rocket" up to their spawning grounds. The coho will migrate up Quadra creeks until they hit barriers to further progress. The Granite Bay gang bushwack a long way up their creek to get the coho count. Chum and pink tend to stop much lower down the creeks in areas suitable for their spawning activity.

On a recent field trip along Stramberg Creek we found the waterfalls which are a barrier to adult coho migrating up into the lake. On Luoma Creek we opened up two big log jams that had prevented spawners from accessing the upper creek. These log jams will be inspected annually as they trap branches and other floating material thus closing off the creek to migration.

Also notice the small count in Drew Creek. Kudos to Gary and his friends for their regular trips up this creek. Access to the banks of Drew is most difficult and takes dedication and perseverance.

E-Comm's 2015 Top-Ten List Of Reasons To **Not** Call 9-1-1

Vancouver, B.C.—To help raise awareness about the impact on emergency services, E-Comm has released the top calls that shouldn't have been made to 9-1-1 in 2015.

"We want to remind people about what's at risk when 9-1-1 is used as an information line or for other reasons that do not meet the test of a true emergency: A police, fire or medical situation that requires immediate action because someone's health, safety, or property is in jeopardy or a crime is in progress," explains Jody Robertson, E-Comm's director of corporate communications.

Almost 3,400 9-1-1 calls flow through E-Comm every day. Robertson says while the majority of people use 9-1-1 responsibly, calls like the ones on this year's top ten list waste valuable emergency resources by tying up 9-1-1 call-takers' time.

This year's top reason not to call 9-1-1? Requesting the number for a local tire dealership.

2015 top reasons to not call 9-1-1:

- 1. Requesting the number for a local tire dealership
- 2. Reporting an issue with a vending machine
- 3. Asking for the non-emergency line
- 4. Because a car is parked too close to theirs
- 5. "My son won't put his seatbelt on"
- 6. Coffee shop is refusing to refill coffee
- 7. Asking if it's okay to park on the street
- 8. "My roommate used my toothbrush"
- 9. Asking for help getting a basketball out of a tree
- 10. Reporting that their building's air system is too loud and they can't sleep

"We hope that our message that 9-1-1 call-takers can't answer questions or manage non-emergency situations on 9-1-1 lifelines will encourage people to learn more about 9-1-1," adds Robertson. "There's lots of information on our web site—ecomm911.ca—about when to use 9-1-1 and when to use non-emergency numbers for police, fire and ambulance, along with easy access to those numbers and free education materials available for order, including learning tools for children."

Counting (More Than) Crows..

Annually, during the coldest and darkest part of the year, people all over North America rise early in the morning and head outdoors to participate in a seasonal ritual. They are not in search of the perfect Christmas tree, or even going for a chilly swim in frozen water - they are looking for birds.

There are two areas counted on Quadra as part of the Campbell River count zone. The northern Quadra count area lies roughly between the north end of Gowland Harbour and Milford Road and goes south to Noble Road. The southern count area covers the island south of Noble Road. On Quadra this year, six people counted 54 species and a total of 2,011 individual birds



In 1900 a man named Frank Chapman (a member of the newly organized Audobon Society) initiated a hunt for birds for the purpose of a population census. This was done as a reaction to the established tradition of hunting for them with guns during the holiday season (known as the Christmas Side Hunt). On that day in 1900, 27 people from Ontario to California observed and counted about 90 species of birds. This effort to go out into the woods and count as many birds as possible in one day has grown year by year until now the event takes place in many locations throughout North and Central America.

The Christmas Bird Count does not take place on Christmas Day, but on varying days scheduled between December 14 and January 5. The differing dates in various locations allows keeners to participate in multiple counts at different sites. The Quadra Count was to have been on December 27th this year, but the weather caused it to be moved to January 3rd, which turned out to be a beautiful day for looking for birds.

during the day. Some of the highlights included an Anna's hummingbird, a Brandt's cormorant, four killdeer, a Pileated woodpecker and a very high number of Red-winged crossbills.

Seeing higher numbers of crossbills may be part of what is known as an "irruption". On some years, some species such as crossbills, Purple finches, Pine siskins and Snowy owls are found outside their normal wintering zone as a response to changes in their food supply. These "irruptive years" are exciting for bird watchers as species not frequently sighted are suddenly present in an area.

In Canada the data from the Christmas Bird Count is collected and processed by Bird Studies Canada. The information is used as one of the tools for determining the health of various species populations and is a factor in decisions regarding conservation. Since the CBC has now been taking place for well over a century, the data collected offers important insight on population trends.

Investigating Ocean Plastics - Locals Acting Globally

et me preface this with the fact that this is my third attempt to write a follow up to my adventure with Exxpedition. It has proved impossible thus far to summarize the experiences and lessons that have been learned. I highly recommend visiting exxpedition.com/blog/ and read "24 hr. living", "Slow living", "Exxpedition vs. Vacation", and "Drama in Guyana", "Looking Back on Exxpedition", as well as any others, provide a far better account and offer far more embellishment than I seem able to muster at the moment.

February 1, 7-9pm @ Quadra Community Centre there will be a screening of the documentary EXXPEDITION, followed by a slide show of photos from my trip as well as a Q&A. Suggested Donation of \$5-\$10 to help cover hall and any proceeds will go to supporting Local Exxpedition Projects.

Back from adventures in Brazil and 18 days on the high seas aboard Sea Dragon. The purpose of the adventure was to help collect scientific data for 11 separate scientific studies. 14 women from, 5 nationalities and various professions made up the crew. I did not know what to expect having also never really travelled abroad before. In the week I spent in Brazil prior to boarding Sea Dragon, we got to meet and collaborate with the outgoing Exxpedition Ascension group as well as members of our own crew as they arrived. During this time, we participated in a beach clean-up in conjunction with a local University, as well as presenting on ocean plastics and toxics to 3 schools (two universities and a grade school). It was incredible to feel amount of enthusiasm and interest each time.

The morning of Dec 3 the Amazon crew moved on to Sea Dragon. I had never sailed before. Boarding Sea Dragon, a 72 steel hulled yacht designed to race in the 2000 Global BT Challenge (against trade winds circumnavigation race) was surreal and has likely ruined me for ever enjoying small scale boats.


As we began our journey there was so much excitement as we busily familiarized ourselves with life aboard, and adjusted ourselves to sharing such a small space with so many others. Sitting on deck those first days watching the ocean big and blue slipping by beneath us, we learned about the upcoming science we would be preforming (once outside the 200 mile Economic Trade Zone), and we talked about what inspired each of us to come on this journey. With the help of our amazing skipper Imogen Nash, First Mate Emily Caruso, and Second Mate Holly Vint we learned how to helm Sea Dragon, our floating home and life line.

By day 5 or 6 we were starting science. This was an all hands on deck activity. A trawl was used to collect samples of particles on the water's surface (plastic or organic). After collection the daily catch would be screened, examined under a microscope, identified and catalogued. The trawling related to 3 of the ongoing studies. Water sampling of various types related to most of the other experiments. Some of these test results were immediate for example temperature, salinity and ph. Others samples we will be waiting the best part of six months for results. These relate to persistent organic pollutants (POPs), nano plastics, eDNA (analysing the markers that will indicate a higher taxonomic level ie genus level, so that density and diversity of species can be analysed), and "bioassays" such as YES (related to estrogenic receptors). Most of the time science would take the best part of 3-4 hours/day.

As with most things there were ups and downs along the way. I personally struggled with seasickness as did a few others on the crew. It was insanely hot, with little reprieve. I worried before leaving that I would become tired of looking at the same horizon for that length of time. The reality is that it was so incredibly beautiful and fulfilling. The Ocean has a pulse and a rhythm. Watch duty forced me reconnect with my place in the world. I will never forget on my first watch witnessing the moon rise out of the Ocean, into a sea of stars, flanked by Venus and Jupiter all while helming a 50 tonne yacht though the waters of the great Atlantic. It moved me.

At the end of it all I have learned some things.

- 1. Living on a boat in a beautiful analogy of sustainability and living on a budget. Your life depends on not depleting your resources or over consuming.
- 2. My technology has disconnected me more than it has connected me. I am not throwing out my cell phone but I am prioritizing my time differently.
- 3. Toxics are unseen but very real, as are the ways that they are fundamentally changing our bodies and environment. I am personally going to spend the next year learning more about the issue and reducing the toxic overload specifically in regards to personal care.
- 4. Lessons are so much sweeter when learned through adversity For those that contributed to this trip either directly or through the raffle at Amped on Nutrition, thank you for your support.



Featured Ingredient

Organic Ocean salmon fillets

 4×5 oz Salmon fillets, skin on

2 Tbsp unsalted butter

2 shallots, minced

¹/₄ of a small butternut squash, peeled and cut into ³/₄-inch (2 cm)cubes

1 garlic clove

4 sprigs of fresh thyme

11/3 cups chicken stock

sea salt

4 oz wild mushrooms, cleaned and sliced

4 tsp extra-virgin olive oil

1 Tbsp lemon juice

12 cherry tomatoes, cut into quarters

4 sage leaves, finely chopped



Melt 1 Tbsp butter in a large pot over low heat. Add the shallots and cook until they are soft but not brown, about 4 to 5 minutes. Add the squash, garlic, and thyme. Cook for 5 minutes, stirring frequently, without browning. Add the chicken stock and bring to a gentle simmer. Season to taste. Cook covered until the squash is tender but not falling apart. Remove the garlic and thyme. In a medium frying pan, melt the remaining 1 Tbsp butter over medium-high heat. Add the mushrooms and sauté until soft. Season to taste and add to the squash mixture. Preheat the oven to 400°F/200°C. Heat the oil in a large, preferably nonstick frying pan that can go into the oven. Season the salmon and place in the pan skin side down. Cook without turning for 3 to 4 minutes until the fish is lightly browned around the edges. Flip the salmon and then place the frying pan in the oven and cook the fish for 7 to 10 minutes until cooked through.

Re-warm sauce mixture & add lemon juice, cherry tomatoes, and sage. Spoon into warmed bowls & top with salmon fillets. Serve immediately.
