Quadra Island Emergency Programme

The 2016 Fort McMurray Wildfire Tuesday, November 8, 2.30pm, Community Centre

On May 1, 2016, the wildfire began southwest of Fort McMurray. On May 3 it swept through the community destroying approximately 2,400 homes and buildings and forcing the largest wildfire evacuation in Alberta history. Over 80,000 people were evacuated from the Fort McMurray Region. The fire spread across approximately 590 000 hectares before it was declared under control on June 13, 2016. On June 1 re-entry to Fort McMurray commenced, 29 days after the mandatory evacuation order. It is the costliest disaster in Canadian history.

Immediately following the evacuation the Red Cross began responding to meet the needs of individual families and entire communities. On Tuesday, November 8 at 2.30 pm Derrick Harvey from the Canadian Red Cross will give a presentation on the wildfire and its aftermath at the Quadra Island Community Centre. We all watched the numerous news reports on the fire knowing this could very easily happen in our community as it has done in the past, the last major fire being 1925 . Come and find out what the best response would be, what support is needed for evacuees and how it would affect us. Everyone is welcome.

Advanced Care Directive: An Introduction

Monday, November 7 from 1 to 3pm at the Cape Mudge Band Office

AN ADVANCED DIRECTIVE is a legal medical document in British Columbia that is a statement of an individual's wishes regarding ongoing medical care should they be in a situation where they are unable to speak for themselves. This is used in circumstances both in hospital and at home to assist health practitioners and family members to make important decisions regarding care of the individual that is consistent with their values and philosophy.

While everyone should have an advanced directive regardless of age, it becomes more important as we enter our senior years.

SEASONAL INFLUENZA, often called the flu, is a serious, infectious and contagious respiratory illness. You can spread the flu 24 hours before showing any symptoms, and five to seven days after symptoms begin. Every flu season is different, and influenza infection can affect people differently. Even healthy people can get very sick from the flu and spread it to others.

Getting immunized is one of the best ways to protect yourself, and others, against the flu.

Commonly asked questions: When is flu season? The flu seasons typically runs as early as October and as late as May. How long does the flu shot last? The flu shot lasts one full flu season.

Should I get the flu shot if I never get sick? Some lucky people get the flu and don't even know they have it. They can still pass it on to others. We give the flu shot to younger, healthy people so that they will not be able to infect young babies and the elderly. Is the flu shot safe for pregnant woman? Absolutely, the flu can be dangerous to expecting mothers but the flu shot is safe. Do I have to have the flu shot? Receiving the flu shot is a personal choice every person has to make on behalf of themselves and those around them, especially the young and the elderly. How much does the flu shot cost? The flu shot is free to Canadian citizens. Who should not get the flu shot? If you have an allergy to eggs you should talk to your doctor before receiving the flu vaccine.

Emily Millard celebrates the release of her new album *By Heron & By Season* with a special concert in collaboration with fellow solo singer-songwriter David Simard.

Emily Millard is a Canadian singer/songwriter currently based in Montreal whose unique blend of art-folk has been called "inventive," "haunting" and "beautifully ethereal." Alchemically combining poetry with vintage keys, steel strings and found- instruments, Emily braves the space between silence and sound with her unmistakable voice.

Written over five years as a resident of Quadra Island's Bold Point community, Emily's new album By *Heron & By Season* is a colourful journey into the depths of memory and dreamscape. Produced by Sandro Perri, the album features some of Canada's most innovative instrumentalists including violinist Jesse Zubot (Tanya Tagaq), cellist Peggy Lee (Veda Hille), drummer Dan Gaucher (Fond Of Tigers, Woodpigeon) and bassist Colin Nealis (Andy Shauf).

David Simard has always imbued his work with a sense of space and a hint of nostalgia. Simard's arrangements evoke the landscapes he's studied and lived in, while his lyrics intimately relate the stories of characters met and imagined, along with more than a few of his own experiences.

The lyrical and musical makeup of The Heavy Wait is an effortless combination of gilded European elegance and small-town noir. Simard and his band recorded most of the album in a charged, live-off-the-floor session in Arcade Fire's old "Petite Eglise" studio. They dug in hard and deep to produce a quiet intensity so palpable and persistent that the album builds in strength with each passing track. Waves of horns and lap steel guitar, sparsely placed piano, and haunting clarinet lines, recorded later in Vancouver, rush to complement the live performances. "The Heavy Wait" was the band's chosen mantra during that first session and it persisted until the final note was captured.

Damn The Dam: Site C



UNESCO in the Peace: Shining an international light on Site C

The eyes of the world were focused on Site C this week as UNESCO just spent 10 days in the Peace River valley. The international agency was there to investigate how Site C endangers a UNESCO World Heritage Site — Wood Buffalo National Park. Canada has international obligations under international treaties to protect this park which is being threatened by Site C. International media scrutiny is intense and pressure is mounting both at home and abroad which could force the federal government to stop or at least put a moratorium on further construction.

What Canadians across the country have to know is that Site C is not a done deal. First Nations and Peace Valley landowners are suing BC Hydro and there are five legal cases in court right now, four of them by First Nations. Site C is strongly opposed by a wide cross-section of the B.C. citizenry. While First Nations point to violation of Treaty rights and destruction of cultural sites and traditional hunting grounds, ratepayers are waking up to the fact that Site C's hefty price tag – \$10 billion and counting.

If you have a family to feed, you might also be interested to learn that Site C would destroy some of the most productive farmland we have in this province – a food oasis in the middle of the boreal forest that can produce heat-loving vegetables and fruits, sufficient to feed 1 million people. Fruit and vegetables are getting more expensive, while technologies for renewable power are getting cheaper by the day. This fact was not lost on B.C.'s mayors and councillors: at their annual gathering in September, they called for a full review of Site C by the utilities watchdog, the B.C. Utilities Commission. Meanwhile, the disconnect between the enormous cost of the project versus unproven need, and the B.C. government's failure to consider alternative ways of generating power, recently prompted the B.C. auditor general to investigate Site C (inquiry is currently ongoing).

Join Sierra BC's Executive Director Bob Peart, Ana Simeon, Peace Valley campaigner for Sierra Club BC, and Julian Napoleon of the Saulteau First Nation who will be speaking about the Site C development in the Peace River Region. This beautiful area can feed over a million British Columbians. Is the dam necessary? Napoleon will share stories and images of the Peace River and his people's perspective on this development.

Update on Rural School Review

Following up with the 10 year Facility Plan for Campbell River School District, 5 recommendations were to be addressed in the next 2 years.

In September, senior management proposed that 3 of the recommendations be dealt with this year, and 2 dealt with next year.

The board supported the recommendations, and the review of outlying / rural schools (which includes Quadra. Cortes, and Surge Narrows as well as Sayward) will be looked at next school year, Sept 2017.

This decision seemed appropriate because the government has commissioned a group to develop a Rural Education Strategy for BC, and to present a report in Feb 2017. There may be recommendations and follow-up from this report that are relevant for our district. Minister Bernier has invited Campbell River to participate in this study so we hope that opportunity will materialize sometime this fall.

We haven't heard any more at this point but will keep you posted.
