(part of the Global Big Day)

May 4, 2019

A FULL DAY OF SPOTTING BIRDS ON QUADRA ISLAND!

The idea is to see and record as many species as possible within the 24 hour period. This is a part of a Global Big Day, when people will look for birds all around the globe. In 2018, more than 30,000 people around the world reported more than 7,000 species online on eBird! Let's see how many we can come up with on our island!



TO PARTICIPATE:

- get out and look for birds!
- keep a careful list of what you see
- report your results...

THERE WILL BE PRIZES!

You can enter the Quadra event, individually or as teams, under the following catagories:

- Backyard Birds - spotted from a single location (eg - from a fixed location in your yard)

- Unmotorized transport limited to foot, bike, horse..... no motors!
- Open anywhere on Quadra, any form of transportation
- Youth birders 16 and under
- Bird Photo (or Birder!) must be taken during this 24 hour period -
- pictures of birds or of people looking at birds

HOW IT WORKS

- To participate:
- no need to pre-register just get out and look for birds!
- keep a list of the species you see (and correctly identify)
- binoculars and spotting scopes are ok
- birds positively identified by sound may be counted
- no audio lures, please

- for unusual or rare species, please add a few notes of documentation: description of the bird, the location/habitat where it was seen, who else saw it, etc

- this event relies on the honour system - so please be honourable...

REPORTING RESULTS

- For the Quadra event - at the end of May 4, send your final list of species and/or photographs to kamanry@gmail.com - don't forget to mention which catagory you are entering.

- For the Global event (optional, but fun!) - post your results to an eBird account (easy and free to create). The eBird link is: www.ebird.org/ news/global-big-day-4-may-2019

- it would be great to have the results posted on the Quadra Birds FB group too...

(This is the 1st year of the Quadra event - we are figuring it out as we go - expect (minor) glitches...)

Gabbing About Gardens Quadra Island Gardeners Tell All!

Quadra Island Garden Club presents "Gabbing About Gardens", an interactive panel discussion featuring local gardeners experienced in a variety of gardening approaches and styles. Discussion topics include: composting, growing flowers, growing winter gardens, growing perennial herbs, building soil health, climate change challenges, hugelkulture and much more. This relaxed and entertaining event is on Monday, May 13 at Quadra Rec Centre from 7-9 pm. Garden club members are free; visitors pay \$3.

One thing is for sure. Every gardener has their own favourite way of gardening. Some gardeners double-dig; other gardeners have a "no-dig" approach. One gardener grows mainly perennial edibles while another one focuses on intensive planting of edible annuals. That gardener composts in a black bin; this gardener built a compost bin using recycled pallet. There are so many ways and means of gardening. "Gabbing About Gardening" will showcase some of the many approaches taken to gardening on Quadra Island.

Our gardener panelists include long-time residents and newcomers alike. The thing they all have in common is their love of gardening and their willingness to share their knowledge and their stories. Our panelists include: Karen Dunn (greenhouse tips, hugelkulture); Marc Doll (gardening in a changing climate; composting tips), Mimi Smienk (general Quadra Island gardening tips), Karen Richard (growing medicinal and culinary herbs), and Eileen MacKay (growing flowers; watering tips). Greetings from your Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce!

The Chamber (DICC), is a group of local business owners, managers, leaders of nonprofits and volunteer organizations who meet monthly to discuss the goings on for Quadra and surrounding islands, and is led by an elected board of volunteer directors. Each meeting is open to all members and we openly welcome anyone interested in becoming a member. Our current membership stands at over 100!

Aside from the opportunity to network with fellow islanders, there are other more tangible benefits of membership such as insurance, medical and health benefit programs for small businesses, brochure racking on our local ferries, stores, and Visitor's Info Centre. (See links below)

A sometimes heard perception about the Chamber is that it is strictly a tourism development board. While tourism is certainly at the heart of a lot of discussions, we are also working on: forestry, fishing, hiking and biking trails, seniors housing, rental accommodations, transportation and a multitude of other topics. The marketing activities of the tourism board (which was a sub-committee of the Chamber) in the past years have clearly had an effect, and we can all see the increase in economic activity on the island.

Tourism marketing has been put on a back burner for the time being while we focus more on broader economic development.

Aside from representation to local, regional and provincial governments, through membership funding, the Chamber has been able to offer financial support for various causes such as: \$1,300 towards the senior's housing initiative. \$10,000 for portable outhouses to be placed at various strategic hiking & biking trailheads.
\$1,000 annually for Canada Day celebrations.
\$500 Newcomers welcome meet and greet.
\$1,500 supporting the Visitors Information Booth.
\$1,000 Quadra Island Food Bank.
\$2,000 Quadra Island Cycling Coalition.

One of the hottest topics lately has been the desperate lack of rental accommodation for locals and seasonal staff required for various businesses. Without going into too much detail, there is an interesting new mechanism introduced by the provincial government, where the tourists visiting our region will pay a small surcharge on their accommodations. These funds go directly back to this community for marketing and development of tourism services, but most importantly; a portion of these funds can be used for the development of affordable housing. This has the potential to alleviate some of the issues we are currently facing.

Dear Sponsors at Quadra Island Community, Before anything else I would like to wish you the warmest greetings of love, joy and peace. I hope that everyone there is in good condition. I hope also that your weather condition is good. Here in the province of Kalinga province we have been experiencing very cold weather especially in the mornings and evenings.Sometimes it was so cold in the mornings that I could not wash the dishes until after lunch time. One day when I took a bath in the cold water I got a cough and so after that, began boiling the water first to avoid sickness. However, in March it started to become very hot in the afternoon and so we began using umbrellas even to go to school. Back in the middle of Februay we celebrated the 24th Kalinga Founding Anniversay and 3rd Badong festival celebrating success, peace and unity with continuing commitment to good governance. Update from the Quadra Island Young Musicians Fund

We have been around for just over a year now and have had quite a few people asking us what we do. So we thought we would share with the wider Quadra community as well!

It started after a conversation between a music teacher (Dave Blinzinger) and a parent (Jen Banks-Doll) about how to encourage more music education and enjoyment for young people on Quadra. We decided to start a fund and since then we have been working on our mission of increasing music education and awareness in our community by helping to fund music education and experiences for children and youth living on Quadra Island.

We began by organizing a Young Musicians concert and fundraiser which took place last April. It was a chance for aspiring young musicians in our community to play in front of an audience and gain much needed experience in performance. It also helped to connect them to other young musicians and to additional performance opportunities. It launched our efforts to raise funds for music education on Quadra. Twelve young musicians performed at our concert last year, as well as several adult musicians and groups.

After the concert we received several requests for performances by young musicians, and we were pleased to be able to bring young talent to the Canada Day celebration, the Fall Fair, the Winter Market, the Christmas dinner at the HBI, and the Seniors Group at the Quadra Legion.

In the summer we did more fund raising by holding a musical BBQ at Tru-Value in Q Cove. Thank you to everyone who donated their Spirit Board points to #310 and supported our BBQ. We were able to use our

gift card to pay for the food, and not only turn our points into cash, but double their worth! By the fall we had raised enough funds to launch our Gift Certificate Program. For this Program we accept applications twice a year from Quadra residents aged 18 and under who are looking for help to pay for music lessons. Successful applicants receive gift certificates which they present to their music teacher, who then returns it to us for payment. We plan to continue to run this Program every fall and winter.

As we thought about how best to achieve our mission and stretch our funds as far as possible, we decided to approach Quadra Elementary about starting an after school music program. We decided on a ukulele program as the school already owns the ukuleles and then found a teacher who was willing to teach it. Living with Wildfire - Part 2

In the first article, it was established how Quadra is no stranger to wildfire and its disastrous effects. Living under threat of one of natures most destructive forces can be concerning. There are simple low cost steps everyone can take to reduce wildfires impact and stack odds in our favour. Instead of the typical FireSmart monologue, I have chosen to describe preventative measures taken FireSmarting my own property.

My wife and I have lived on our property for 11 years. It's a small hold acreage filled with trees, two houses and several outbuildings. Our home is a walkout bungalow and constructed with typical Quadra materials.

I knew nothing of the FireSmart program when we moved here, only becoming aware of the program through the Quadra Island Fire Department. In active duty, I saw house fires and wildfires firsthand. This had a very sobering effect and I quickly embraced FireSmart program principals. When done properly, FireSmart elements work together protecting your home whether you are there or not. This passive protection concept is very important. In most cases during a major wildfire event, you will be asked to evacuate and QIFD will be engaged on multiple fire suppression fronts. This could mean your homes only defence will be the FireSmart precautions you have taken.

What I do and what I have done. The program starts at the roof. More than once a year (sometimes 3 times a year), I ladder the roof and clear debris from gutters, under any overhangs and from roof valleys. For this, I use a leaf blower and can have the entire job done in 15 to 20 minutes. This also gives me a chance to check the condition of the asphalt shingles looking for signs of premature aging. When I see its time, I will replace the roof with metal roofing. Metal roofing, clay tile or concrete tile are the best protection. Asphalt shingles are almost as good as long as they are in good usable condition with no turned up edges or pieces missing. Cedar shake is rated the lowest and should be changed at the first opportunity. While clearing the gutters and roof valleys, I also check how much moss has built up. If it's dry, the moss can also be done with a stiff broom and leaf blower. I want all roof surfaces to be free from fine fuel combustibles. I then check my screened

attic vents making sure they are intact, well attached and the metal 3mm screen mesh has no holes. Embers driven by high winds created during a wildfire can be pushed through mesh with larger diameter holes and enter the attic space. Once embers are inside, ignition usually follows. If it's the first time on the roof for the season, I will connect roof top sprinklers and test them. Although roof sprinklers are not an official part of the FireSmart program, they are well proven as an effective wildfire defence strategy.

Next is to clean up all debris surrounding the base of the home, which has been previously blown off the roof. To be effective, all items stacked up against the house must be pulled away. Over the winter months, quantities of fine combustible material have been collecting behind stored items very much like snow during winter blizzards. These are the same spots smouldering embers will land and collect during a major blaze. Combine burning embers with piles of fine combustible material and you have guaranteed fire ignition. During a wildfire, it has been estimated 50% of homes that catch fire do so due to accumulating ember piles. The leaf blower becomes a powerful ally and will make quick work of the problem.

Next, I make sure winter firewood is no longer stacked against the house. It's moved to a woodshed located at least 10 meters away. I have no gas cans, lawn mowers, ATV's, boats, motorcycles or cars next to the house. All are prime source fuel for fire and when ignited do so with explosive force. These are stored in outbuildings well away from the home. During the Fort McMurray catastrophe, many homes caught fire because of vehicles or gas powered implements next to the house. Household propane should be 10 meters away from the home and free of any plants or shrubs. I get a fail on this item as my propane tank is too close and needs to be moved. What I have done so far is making sure the tank is on the North side of the house and in the shade line. Out the suns glare, the tank stays coolest and plants adjacent the tank stay green and far less flammable.

I have removed 4 large juniper bushes from the front of the house. They were almost under the eave and provided the greatest possible threat. Under each of the junipers was a jackpot of dry dead organic material having collected for many years. If an ember were to land there, it would have taken nothing to ignite. Conifers are high in flammable resins and when dry, will literally explode with flame. If under an eave, the flames will spread rapidly to the remainder of the home. Any coniferous plantings directly adjacent a home should be transplanted or removed. Ornamental cedars, Moghul Pine and Low Junipers are not recommended. Deciduous landscape elements are a far wiser choice.

I have pruned, limbed or removed a number of trees near the house attempting to keep vertical and horizontal separation. I'm getting closer to the recommended 10-meter minimum for combustible vegetation. I attempt to ensure the tips of branches are 3 meters above ground and trees don't provide a continuous connected canopy. Pruning the trees to 3 meters above ground prevents fire from running up the tree (called candling) and extending into the canopy. Once the fire is in the canopy, very little can be done to control it directly.

On our property, it's always a debate weighing fire safety against aesthetic sensitivity. Where I have not won the discussion, I try to compensate with sprinkler protection.

Outside of FireSmart preparations, we have created numerous water sources around the property. Ponds can be used to irrigate gardens keeping many areas green when they would typically brown out. The ponds can also be used as water sources for defensive fire suppression. Alternatively, strategically placeing 45 gallon barrels with dedicated fire buckets on top is a great low-tech solution. These are easy to use and available 24/7. The trick to stopping any fire is knocking it down early. During a fires start up phase is when the least amount of fire suppression resource has the is largest possible impact. If a spot fire erupts, several buckets of water applied quickly will likely control it. Getting pumps and hoses to a specific location may take far too much time loosing the battle before it's even begun.

Another personal fail is using wood chip mulch next to the house. Although, great for plants, this is a terrible FireSmart solution. During the heat of summer, top layers dry out completely becoming highly volatile and

a haven for wildfire embers. On beds directly contacting the house, any organically inert equivalent would be a much wiser choice. As well, our siding is a combination of vinyl and or cedar plank. Fibre cement board, stucco, brick, metal or even thick wood plank are better choices. I have plans to make upgrades at some point in the future. We have a large attached cedar deck and it collects fine combustibles over the winter. Each year, I make sure the plank gaps are clear as well as the area directly below the deck. No firewood or building materials are stored below. The deck is higher than 1 meter above ground, therefore being sheathed in is not necessary. Below 1 meter from the ground, it is recommended to enclose it with a noncombustible finish. The windows are OK but I would like to upgrade them to energy efficient models with better fire protection ratings. Single pane windows offer very little thermal protection against interior contents igniting during intense wildfire conditions. Double or triple pane windows have far more thermal protection. I have no outbuildings directly attached or any wooden fences leading up to the house. Many times, wildfire will use flammable structures as pathways to a home even when there was no initial immediate danger. Creating separation reduces these types of ignition.

Starting a FireSmart property evaluation and taking corrective action does not have to be

a daunting or expensive process. Breaking the process up and doing one side of the house at a time is a much more manageable solution. The key is to start now and work at it methodically.



There are many other considerations to be evaluated all of which are covered in the FireSmart Home Owners Manual. Inside the manual, you will find a complete FireSmart survey form and recommended corrective actions. Copies of the manual are available online at https://firesmartbc.ca/resources/, the Quadra Tourist Information booth or Quadra Island Fire Hall #1.

SEAFEST 2019 is May 18 on Cortes Island

For several decades the Cortes Island Seafood Association (CISA) has put on a seafood festival to celebrate our heritage from the sea. The purpose of the festival is to bring together those Cortes Islanders who make their living from the sea with the larger community, to promote a mutual understanding and appreciation of aquaculture farming, and to celebrate the bounty of the ocean. CISA is a non-profit society whose mandate is to monitor the water quality of the area surrounding Cortes Island, and who uses funds raised from the festival to conduct a water testing program in local waters.

The gathering began as The Seafood Festival in the late 1980's and was held at Smelt Bay Park for many years. It migrated to the lower lawn beside the Cove restaurant as The Oyster Festival, and two years later moved to the field beside the Squirrel Cove Store as SEAFEST. Kristen Scholfield-Sweet and John Shook began cooking in 2003, and began coordinating the entire phenomena in 2011. Although there have been years when the spring skies gave a few sprinkles, and once when it was moved to a community hall because rain seemed imminent, and once when the wind blew over some tents--so far with the blessings of the sky deities--the festival has never been cancelled due to poor

weather conditions. Seafoodies are a hardy lot who in years past have stood under dripping trees as well as in the hot sun for a chance to eat poached ovsters in Miso sauce, ovsters glazed with lime marmalade and mustard. oysters with fermented black bean sauce, oysters drizzled with jalapeño, Pico de Gallo or Pernod sauce, oysters panfried in corn flake crumbs, oysters Rockefeller and Angels on Horseback on the barbeque, mussels steamed in white wine, steamed clams Bordelaise, and prawns in a sweet chili Thai sauce served with shrimp chips.

In 2014 SEAFEST moved to the lawns of Gorge Harbour Marina Resort to accommodate the increasing number of community members and off-island visitors who now make this a "go to event" to welcome spring and celebrate island life. SEAFEST 2019 will again be held at the Gorge Harbour Marina on Saturday May 18 with the help of more than 75 volunteers drawn from seafood workers, our organizational partner the Whaletown Community Club, and a very helpful Cortes community.
