

Beached Logs Come and Go

If you have been to Rebecca Spit, or similar beaches along the B.C. Coast, in the past few stormy days, you likely will have spent more than a few minutes mesmerized, watching as well as listening to logs crashing onto the shore. Has this activity always happened on the B.C. Coast?

Prior to the early 1900's there would have been no logs blanketing the coastal waterfront. From the 1920's to the 1950's there were short haul railway lines, moving logs from the upland forests. The logs were dumped into Drew Harbour, Royston, Comox Inlet and most other shoreline communities. Industrially, in the coves and bays, sufficient lengths of loose logs were chained end to end to form flexible barriers. The remaining logs were corralled into log booms. In the 1980's some of the logs began to be loaded onto barges. They were hauled by tug, down the coast to waiting mills for processing into chips for pulp and paper. Other logs were sawn into dimension lumber, for sale throughout North America and Japan.

With the arrival of the annual winter storms, and waves, getting the logs to the mills was a moment to moment gamble. Decade by decade the logs have washed ashore becoming the normalized beach front decorations.

The logs crashing storm by storm have had huge impacts to the natural inter tidal life and shore line vegetation. At the inter-tidal, the rolling, pounding, grinding logs have powered into the beach gravels and larger cobble stones... grinding stones have crushed snails, limpets, sea stars. These small creatures are the historic year round feed for the resident and migrating sea birds. Without seasonal foods, whether springtime chicks or as fall migrating adults, generations of birds have been starving to death. Bird inventory numbers are down 50+%.

The near shore, upland vegetation: Salal, Beach Pea, various grasses, all have horizontal, webbed, roots interlaced with other vegetation including Douglas Fir and Sitka Spruce trees. The extreme high tides in the past 20 years have thrown the logs well into the brush line. The tearing by the logs has ripped apart the web of roots. As a result, the shorelines have been eroding into the ocean.

What can be done about the beach logs crashing along the 1,000's of kilometers of BC coastline?

Environmentalists, wanting the natural shoreline and inter-tidal species to recover could take up the cry on behalf of the Feathers, Furs, Forests and Fins! They could begin action campaigns working towards an Environmental, Social, Government, and Corporate alliance to fund habitat restoration projects, specifically the removal of the logs. Staff could be the unemployed Forestry Workers,. As in generations past, the removed logs would be processed locally, making for respectful, profitable employment, helping all communities.

The Forest Companies, wrote off the storm lost logs decades ago as an unavoidable cost of doing business. Over the past 20 plus years, they have been BURNING, NOT PROCESSING, about 50% of the trees cut. They won't likely be motivated to invest a dollar to research innovative uses of the logs e.g. bio-thermal energy. Existing BC Government Salvage regulations do not (as yet) encourage an entrepreneur with a boat to haul logs from the beaches, without immense

volumes of paper work and specific drop zones.

Maybe there should be a new, targeted levy / stumpage for logging existing crown / public forests. The dollars collected would go to direct funding of the Coastal Beach employment retraining and business development initiatives, suggested above.

The Peoples Republic of China has been funding resource start-ups, known as State Sponsored as well as State Owned Enterprises, around the world, for over 25 years. The NDP - B.C. Government with the Ministry of Forests, just returned from its 2nd business development junket with China, this past November, 2019.

Were they discussing the economic potential of China ent repreneurs starting up a Coastal log salvage business, with appropriate zerotax as an incentive? Foreign Worker Visa Programs are easy to get, if a Canadian doesn't apply for the job!



Garden Club - All About Roses!

with Jason Croutch February 10th, 2020 - 7-9 pm at the Quadra Island Community Centre

The presentation is free for all current Garden Club members and \$3 dollars for non-members.

Learn how to add passion, fragrance and beauty in your garden while enhancing the natural environment! See first hand how to propagate roses! Purchase some wonderful roses for your garden!

In Jason's words:

Roses have developed a bit of baggage over the last two thousand years. People associate the rose with passion, fragrance and beauty, and that's all good. On the other hand, roses are too much associated with formal gardening and have picked up a reputation for being difficult to grow. Current gardening trends of sustainability, food security and small-space gardening have left roses a bit "out of fashion." I think that's a shame, because roses have so much to offer as functional, even informal, garden plants for most any garden size or site.

In this presentation, I'll focus on some of the useful varieties of roses that have been abandoned by the nursery trade. I'll offer up varieties that make wonderful companions in mixed plantings, those that thrive in difficult locations, and others that provide outstanding forage for bees. or winter food and shelter for wildlife. With some of these uncommon varieties of roses now quite endangered themselves, I will give a demonstration of how to propagate by semi-hardwood cuttings, a technique that can be used for roses, or adapted to many varieties of shrubs and perennials.

My roses have heard about this road trip to Quadra Island, and



I'm afraid I won't be able to get off the farm without a few tagging along for the ride. So I'll be offering roses for sale at the presentation. I'm selling them for \$15 each, well-rooted in a 1 gallon nursery pot. I'll provide a list of varieties to the Quadra Island Garden Club (see www. Quadra Island Emergency Support Services Reception Centre Exercise

Sunday February 23rd, 2020

Campbell River, BC – Please be advised that The Quadra Island Emergency Support Services Team (QIESS) will be conducting an Emergency Reception Centre exercise on the afternoon of Sunday February 23rd at the Quadra Island Community Centre.

An Emergency Reception Centre is a facility or location that can be used for many different purposes, such as gathering during temporary displacement, information sharing, or a staging site for volunteer disaster relief workers. Although every resident is encouraged to have their own plan and an emergency kit, **Emergency Support Services** (ESS) is there to help. In an emergency, people who are forced to evacuate their homes may be directed to a Reception Centre to register and receive assistance.

A Reception Centre is a safe place where people can go to receive:

- Information about the emergency;
- Assistance meeting their basic needs (food, clothing, shelter); and
- Help planning their recovery from the disaster.

A Reception Centre is usually activated when the number of evacuees generally exceed 12 and the event typically involves multiple dwellings. (e.g., neighbourhood or apartment block).

"In 2019 the Quadra Island Emergency Program volunteers put in over 3,500 volunteer hours which is an outstanding commitment from a wonderful group of volunteers" says Jim Abram, SRD Electoral Area C Director. "Members from the QIESS team have also recently deployed to assist Emergency Support Services responses in Port Hardy and Dease Lake".

"This exercise is important for QIESS members to have a solid understanding of the steps involved in activating a Reception Centre, and to practice those steps. The exercise is also an opportunity for our team to prepare for an emergency scenario, including the processes and procedures set out in our ESS Activation Plan" says Judy Hagen, Quadra Island's volunteer ESS Director.

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT • JIM ABRAM • JAN 24

Happy January everyone! I will try and touch on a few key issues and list the rest in point form to bring you up to date on what is going on in Area C!

Weather, Weather!

Hey! So how about that weather we have been having?.... I have spent the majority of my time since the first flake fell a week ago trying to get the roads maintained properly by the people whose job it is to do so! It's not my jurisdiction, but I represent you and I will go to bat for you when you are not being served by the people that are in charge! The Province and the contractor are totally responsible for the roads, the ditches, the shoulders, the brushing, etc., etc! The management at the Campbell River and Cumberland offices are not serving us well in anyone's opinion. They do not seem to have a clue about the needs of Quadra Island. We are under resourced. Not enough staff and not enough equipment.

And who was it that heard about the problems, day and night by phone, email and FaceBook??? Yours Truly!... Well, I don't know about you, but I am getting tired of trying to get other jurisdictions to do their jobs. The storms were well forecast and were pretty much as predicted. So where was the plan of attack? Didn't exist, in my opinion. Our crews could only do so much with what they had.

I have received notification from professional drivers who need the roads and from residents from all points of the island. They are disgusted. No offence to the Foreman or any of the people on the ground at Mainroad, Quadra Island, but this cannot happen again. Equipment sitting in the yard while the Mainroad FaceBook page is telling people that all equipment and crew are working 24/7 to keep up! They need to know that each person can only use one piece of equipment at a time. So, obviously they don't have enough staff for our area!

People called me about that grader and plow in the Highways yard! The management at Mainroad was not telling us the facts. Roads that are normally plowed the first day were plowed on the fourth day. This is not acceptable! I know our guys work hard at their jobs, but they need proper resources. Please save the following contact information!

I have posted the numbers to call many times and here they are again. Your MLA (the Minister of Transportation), Claire Trevena, Claire.Trevena.MLA@leg.bc.ca, 250-287-5100, in Victoria, 250-387-3655; Ashley Cousins, Supervisor for Quadra at the Ministry in Courtenay, Ashley.Cousens@gov.bc.ca, 250-334-6955; and my favourite, Mainroad Contracting Reporting Line at 1-877-215-7122 This number is recorded and they can actually get through to the workers. We will have this as a topic at our next Safety Council Meeting. Ok, enough about road maintenance!

UBCM Age-Friendly Communities Grant Program

I am extremely pleased to announce hat I was able to help move this through the SRD Board meeting last week. It is a grant from the UBCM. The really nice part about it is that though the amounts were to be divided equally between the two islands I made a case for why Quadra was more in need of this specific funding and the final split was \$12,500.00 to Quadra and \$2,500.00 for Cortes. It was amicable!

The original motion read as follows:

"THAT submission of a grant application to the UBCM Age-friendly Communities program in support of a \$7,500 grant for each of the Electoral Area B Cortes Seniors Association and Electoral Area C Quadra Island Health Society project, be approved, and

THAT the Regional District provide overall grant management for the UBCM Age-friendly Communities project(s) contained within the application"

North Quadra Fire issues

I am pleased to say that i managed to get the Board to agree to fund a survey of all north Quadra Island residents concerning what it is that they might wish to see in the north island for some sort of fire restrictions or regulation and a cost estimate of each option. After that survey is complete, it will be compiled and the SRD will try to take appropriate action according to the wishes of the majority. This issue has been on the books for a very long time and most possibilities have been found to not be feasible. We will see, after the survey.

Assessments

I asked our Chief Financial to please help me out in explaining the Assessment process to all of you. Please, first of all, realize that Assessments are done by the Provincial Government and the SRD has nothing to do with them. The following is what he sent to me and I am forwarding it to you as info (I know, clear as mud!):

It's not so much the change in your home's assessment, but rather the change of your

home's assessment relative to the average change in assessment.

- If the overall requisition is constant, and your home changes in value at the average rate of all other properties....then your taxes will stay flat.
- If the overall requisition is constant, and your home assessment increased at a faster rate than average....then your taxes will go up.
- If the overall requisition is constant, and your home assessment increased at a lower rate than average...then your taxes will decrease.

So you can have a situation where there are increases to both the overall requisition as well as your homes assessment; but if that's at a much slower pace than your neighbours, you could actually see your taxes decline.

Perhaps the best tool for explaining this to the public would be BC Assessment's Youtube channel; they have a quick video that exactly addresses this topic: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=kEhzXBNfkOc

BC Ferries info

So, the first of the 47' ferries are in BC. Ours will be coming in the next year or two. At this time, BCFS is planning to hold a public drop in, information session on Feb. 4th from 3pm to 8pm at the Community Centre to inform you of all they know, including the berthing of the new second vessel.

On the 5th, our FAC will be having an Operational Meeting with the BCFS staff regarding all issues concerning our ferries.

Lounge endorsement

I am pleased to inform you that Southend Wineries were successful in getting approval from the SRD for the selling of wine and beer by the glass under the Liquor Control Board rules. They will still need that final approval, but I supported our local small business and I wish them well.

Miscellaneous

I have been lobbying for our bylaws and OCP to be revised so that they actually work together lke they are supposed to. I have also been pushing hard for the OCP and bylaws to be developed for the outer islands. The following is what I presented to our Chief Administrative Officer as my requests for the budget process and he feels it can be done within the existing budget.

"The the Area C budget be amended to reflect a complete review and, where necessary, correction to the wording to bring it into compliance with the OCP and to make it legally enforceable in all sections.

AND FURTHER THAT, The Desolation Sound Rural Land Use Bylaw #1460, be reviewed in 2020 to create a proper OCP and regulatory bylaw in the same fashion as above (staff, consultant, law firm)"

NOTE: This can be done by staff or consultant, but I would prefer that it be handled by a Municipal Law firm to make it binding.

MOTION #2

"That the work plan for Area C be adjusted to Include the above noted items in Motion #1" Since this can possibly be done by outside sources, I see little effect on our staff plans. That is what I presented to him and I am hoping we can get moving on it soon.

I have been continuing to contact the premier's office and numerous Ministers concerning the Bute / Toba Inlet IPP

premier's office and numerous Ministers concerning the Bute / Toba Inlet IPP proposal. They are still saying it won't go through but I am still saying "Put it in writing!"....

I have spoken with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs about our pending Infrastructure Grant for the work that needs to be done at Surge Narrows to help develop their community wishes. The Province has done their review and sent it off to the Feds and are being told they will have an answer by the end of this month. Fingers crossed!

We passed a motion to apply for a multimillion dollar grant to replace the existing Quathiaski Cove sewer plant. It really needs it and putting more money into it is just throwing good money after bad. So, keep those fingers crossed on this one also.

Conclusion

Lots more going on locally, in Campbell River and Courtenay and Vancouver, but I am extremely late getting this report in, so it will need to wait until next time! So, onward to other tasks on your behalf! 
