Paul Nimmon, of Lapomme Orchard in Granite Bay will be talking about Organic Approaches to Fruit Tree Growing. Paul has worked for many years in orchards on Gabriola and in the Cowichan Valley. He is currently preparing to plant a new orchard this spring, using fruit trees suitable to the coastal area. His approach is purely organic and he has much to share about disease control, always a problem on our damp, mild coast. Come and learn more about how to recognise and organically control cancer, the bane of fruit trees on the coast. If you have some samples to bring for disease identification, please bring them, then burn them.

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



" Nora" - based on Brenda Maddox's 1988 biography of the same name - sheds light on the odd pairing of James Joyce and Nora Barnacle.

(the woman who became his lover, wife and muse) presenting a wealth of details about the emotional side of Joyce's life.

Their story begins in Dublin in 1904. Nora has run away from home in Galway to avoid the convent, and works as a barmaid. Joyce is a struggling writer and a drinker. Their attraction is immediate, but mocked by Joyce's peers. After all, he is a rising author and Nora is considered beneith him. Truth be told, Nora herself admitted to never having read any of Joyces works, though that didn't appear to come between

Their courtship begins innocently and in turn of the century fashion, but soon leads to a passionate and tumultuous relationship. "Nora" looks intimately at the fears and flaws, the fights and the loving that kept both Nora and Joyce in each other's grips for over ten years.

The film's atmosphere, including the terrific period sets and costumes, and the lushness of language and ambiance, is a real turn-on, over and above the fact that this is a candid story of turn of the 20th century rebel lovers.

"Nora" covers the period in Joyce's life before he became famous. It's an interesting notion, to examine the artist's struggle and the warts 'n' all scenario that took place before his transformation into a public figure.

Last week at Heriot Bay public dock, I was distressed to see many new blocks of raw styrofoam, obviously to be used as flotation for some local dock or aquaculture operation. I wondered who would be doing this and contemplated putting a note on the foam. "Raw" (uncovered) styrofoam is a very unfriendly substance in our marine environment because as it ages and with wind/wave action, it disintegrates into small foam pellets which are nasty in a number of ways.

I've seen raw styrofoam pellets in the feces of river otters and have heard that birds and fish also ingest foam--at best, this is not nourishing! The broken styrofoam collects with natural debris at tidelines. These styrofoam pellets do not decompose, and increasingly litter our beaches with seemingly endless supply of an unsightly plastic that can't be picked up. Nobody knows what are the long term effects of styrofoam in the environment, nevermind the effect on wildlife which eats it. It is of interest that raw styrofoam flotation is flat-out illegal in the US.

Many local citizens aquaculture operations make a conscious choice to pay a little more for other types of flotation which are longer lasting. Yesterday I saw where the foam blocks are going. I question whether the Quadra Island public would support use of raw styrofoam in "their" public dock facility. Why then has the QI Harbour Authority chosen this for flotation repairs at the HB dock?

I went to pay Mr. Visser a social call on All Hallows Eve with a number of other arts related groups. I suspect it was less scary for Mr. Visser than it was for me. While he was polite, accommodating and transparently helpful, he made it quite clear that he had little influence with anybody in the government who might be in a position to help the arts in British Columbia as far as financial support goes.

In essence, he was saying that his job is not to represent us to the government but rather to represent the government to us. This is not Mr. Visser's fault; it's just the way all political systems work. His ideology, however, is his fault. While there is certainly room in the world for most ideologies, there is a clash between his ideology and the ideology of most art groups. This clash makes it difficult for arts groups to communicate with the government.

Arts groups place greater value on people than they do on money. They think, "This is what we would like to do. How can we manipulate the money to do it." Governments, in a capitalist society, place greater value on money than they do on people. They think, "This is how much money we need. How do we manipulate the people to get it."

This failure to communicate makes it very difficult for art groups to access government money. If arts groups demonstrate how much the arts do for people s health and happiness, the governments tune the arguments out, as it is too difficult for them assess economically. If the arts groups point out how much they contribute to the economy, the government says, "Why do you need our help if you are doing fine already?" If the arts groups say, "We need this much money to help sustain ourselves," the government says, "Why should we support you? If you can't make a go of it through public support then maybe you shouldn't exist anyway."

Letter to the Community

The planning process for the Quathiaski Cove Local Area Plan brought residents and neighbours out to the Quadra Community Centre during the October 13th - 14th weekend. Several workshops and open houses were conducted, with staff from the Regional District of Comox-Strathcona along with the help of community planning consultants, Cecilia Achiam and Jennifer Kay. The weekend activities focused on community visioning, a public process through which communities identify their purpose, core values and vision of the future. The products of these efforts were then transformed into a feasible set of community goals. These goals will help guide land use decisions and shape the policy statements that are articulated within an action plan - the Local Area Plan.

Participants to these sessions were encouraged to introduce and discuss their visions and ideas for the future of the Q-Cove area. The following common themes emerged from the visioning sessions and will form the basis of the 'design workshop,' the next stage in the LAP process:

- Recognize the three key nodes in the Q-Cove area (the waterfront, the commercial village centre and the community centre)
- Formalize linkages (trails, greenways, open spaces) to connect the key nodes
- Community diversity and affordability by providing a variety of parcel sizes, greater densities, housing types, live/work opportunities, mixed-use developments, and limited expansion of existing commercial and industrial uses
- Build on the marine-industrial, and First Nations heritage legacies to develop stronger community identity
- Provide appropriate services to facilitate community development (e.g. adequate water supply, potential expansion of sewage treatment system, infrastructure such as sidewalks, etc., and promote coordination among various groups/societies that have embarked on community projects)
- Promote community and culture (e.g. meeting places, enhance tourism opportunities, etc.)

The next step in the planning process is a weekend community design workshop, planned for the November 23rd – 25th weekend, where residents will have the chance to transform their visions into land use patterns "on the ground". Participants at the workshops will be challenged with the task of drawing and sketching how they envision their community to look in the next 5, 10, 20 years. Residents are reminded to bring their creativity and enthusiasm – along with photographs and ideas from other communities that represent some of the vision for Quathiaski Cove!

y mother made a very insightful prediction when I was still very young, that I would never be a "city boy". Living on the border of Vancouver, she noted that I spent most of my time exploring the wilderness around our home, or cycling up the valley to check out places like DeRoche, Dewdney and Sylvester, even as far as Cultus Lake, while almost totally ignoring the pleasures offered by Vancouver, New Westminster or Burnaby. Her early call was proved starting at age 19, when I jumped at the chance to escape the Lower Mainland to take a position in Williams Lake. From there I moved on to Whitehorse, followed by a stint in Victoria. After several years living and working in what is arguably one of the most beautiful cities in the world, I simply couldn't take it any more - too many people, things moving way to fast, and a distinct callousness towards others were the prime motivators for a move back to a simpler, smaller existence. From there I went on to take my first plunge as an Islander, in Alert Bay, on Cormorant Island, just north of us. 9 years went by, and my opportunity to move here to Quadra presented itself, and in 1997 I arrived here...in what I hope to be my final and permanent


What is it about the Islands that attracts newcomers? Is it the breathtaking beauty of the Islands, relatively unspoiled when compared to other areas? Or is it the quality of the environment, which far surpasses that of most of the world around us? Perhaps it the people, who show a far greater concern for the good of their neighbours and the community as a whole, when compared to urban counterparts? In my case it is all three, but primarily it is the people with whom I live and work. Everyone who makes the Islands a home are here for their own reasons, but there is a tremendous commonality of satisfaction with one's life that is evident here. And that

unique attitude is one of the most attractive features of rural living, and of Island living in particular. Oh sure, we have our share of curmudgeons and characters, but as the saying goes, they just tend to stand out a bit more in a small community. But in general we have a population full of interesting and unique people, all of whom exhibit a strong sense of individualism and strength of character. Most I know are passionate in their love of the Islands, and many have given up something, be it career prospects, the excitement of urban culture, or even family and friends so that they might make a home on the Islands. Since I have lived here I have had the pleasure of working with someone whose passion for the Islands is boundless, to an extent the likes of which I have rarely encountered.

Ray Marean moved to Quadra from an area that comes close to rivaling ours in scenic beauty, Salmon Arm. Ray was born in the United States, and grew up as a self-described nerd. In Ray's words "I graduated from high school, and was regarded as a nerd. Not brilliant, but still a bit of nerd. I have since outgrown that. I also wear stylish ties to this day." He lived there until he (along with many thousands of others) had a serious disagreement about the government's intentions for him, which was to go to a foreign land and shoot people. He managed to reach a compromise with the government, and was allowed to serve in an alternative capacity. Starting in 1969 Ray commenced a career in finance, moving through a variety of positions in the banking system, until in 1981 he had an opportunity to join the Credit Union system, which he found to be a breath of fresh air after being stifled for years by banking bureaucracy. When an opportunity arose with our local Credit Union, Ray applied for the position, writing "There are several aspects of living on the Island and working with the Credit Union which I find overwhelmingly appealing. Living with the intimacy of a small town, particularly somewhat isolated, suits my nature well. Working with a smaller Credit Union with a closer focus on a true cooperative spirit matches my personal philosophy". Ray got the job and moved here in the summer of 1995.

Running a loan department in a small town is an incredibly challenging job, as I can personally attest to. It requires a variety of skills, not the least of which is a tremendous sense of empathy. People often run into hard times, and it is important that the Loans Manager be able to ensure that his employer gets paid while working with the borrower to get through their difficulties, thus maintaining a positive relationship. This is not to say that Ray is a marshmallow. In fact, his in-house nickname is "Bull Dog", due to his relentless and tenacious attitude towards anyone who attempts to "stiff" the Credit Union, as several former borrowers have learned. But it is my observation that Ray has maintained an incredible level of goodwill and cooperation with the vast majority of the Credit Union's 3,300 plus members, and has brought it a lot of new members over the last 6 years. But the job does come with a price.

Ray will be leaving the Credit Union on November 6, 2001 for medical reasons. Ray held off as long as humanly possible, but his doctor finally convinced him that he was aggravating his condition by continuing to work as hard as he does. So Ray will be spending time at home with his faithful hound "Nolie", hopefully recuperating in a timely manner. He is grateful that he lives in such a wonderful place, surrounded by great people, which will surely help accelerate his recovery. Until then, all of his colleagues wish him a speedy recovery, so that we might soon enjoy his wonderful wit, enthusiasm and optimistic outlook once again. Not to mention his stylish ties.

Friday Flicks: Three Decades of Fabulous Film on Quadra

Tow that the days are shorter and colder weather is upon us, indoor activities like watching movies have added appeal. Thanks to the Friday Flicks Film Club, Quadra movie buffs can enjoy a quality entertainment experience right here on the island.

Now equipped with a video projector and cappuccino machine, Friday Flicks has come a long way since its beginnings in the early 1970s. However, the film club's goal to bring films to the island not necessarily available in theatres and to show them at an affordable price remains the same.

A few years after moving to Quadra in 1969, Hilda and Maynard Van Orden decided to start a film club. They brought in films from Pacific Cinematheque and the National Film Board, showing them on a 16-mm projector in the old school library, now the kindergarten.

"We decided to start a film club to provide winter entertainment for ourselves and other islanders," said Hilda. "We bought two projectors at an auction. If one was broken we'd use the other, and we used parts from one to fix the other."

The Van Ordens were actively involved in the film club for approximately 12 years. David and Claire Oppenheim were also key players in the early days of the film club. David's skills in fixing the projectors came in handy on several occasions, Hilda recalled.

In the mid-1980s the film club's venue moved to the recently constructed Quadra Community Centre. The Van Ordens donated a projector to the community centre and the film club volunteers propped an eight-foot screen up on a table for viewings.

Longtime Friday Flicks volunteers Gordon and Martha James, Jeanette Taylor, and Gerry Cote became involved in the club at that time. The four had been enjoying attending film club screenings at the library, and wanted to ensure the film club continued when the Van Ordens and Oppenheims decided to put their energies into other activities.

Gordon noted that the film club's technology has improved in stages over the years. The club has used money raised above expenses for new equipment, with matching funds donated by the Quadra Recreation

Society. After raising enough funds for a second projector, the film club was able to show movies without a five-minute break between each reel.

Gordon recalls many humourous moments in the days of the old projectors.

"It was always very precarious with those old projectors. We were always on edge, wondering if there would be a mishap," he remembered.

One night someone forgot to latch the windup wheel to the projector. Consequently, the wheel fell off halfway through one reel.

"There was nothing we could do except watch miles of film spill all over the floor," he said with a laugh.

On more than one occasion the reel stopped turning for some reason, causing the bulb to melt the film. This produced some interesting effects on screen but did nothing, however, to further the plot.

"Quite often we had to send the projectors to Vancouver to have them repaired," Gordon noted.

It was with a sigh of relief that Friday Flicks purchased their video projector a few years ago. The money used to buy the projector came from film club fund raising, Quadra Recreation Society, and a grant from regional district director Jim Abram.

Not only has the new video projector greatly eased the club's technical difficulties, it has also allowed the film club to bring in a wider range of current films.

"Bringing in current films has meant an increase in the size of audiences," Gordon observed. "The 16 mm films tended to be

classics, and back in the old days we had a few nights in winter when only three or four people showed up to see a classic."

Friday Flicks films come from Pacific Cinematheque's travelling picture show. The film club typically shows six movies in the fall and six in the spring, and has the option of choosing extra movies from Pacific Cinematheque.

Gordon said Friday Flicks breaks even if more than 25 people come to a movie, so anything over that amount is considered a good turnout. Between 35-40 people is average, but there have been some exceptional turnouts for certain films like Noam Chomsky's 'Manufacturing Consent' and the outdoor summer films.

The second outdoor summer film was rained out and had to take place indoors, but the first was a huge success.

"It was a cheesy science fiction film projected onto the south wall of the community centre. The turnout was excellent and we raised a few hundred dollars that night," Gordon remembered.

Another memorable screening was an indoor 3-D movie. The film club had ordered 100 pairs of 3-D glasses for the event, but 120 people showed up. Quick thinking film club volunteers handed out red and blue stage light gels to those without 3-D glasses. Holding the gels over the eyes produced the same effect as the glasses.

Tasty baked goodies, cappuccinos, and popcorn are a big part of Friday Flicks' appeal. Moviegoers come early to enjoy the treats and socialize. Over the years the film club has



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successfully raised funds for the cappuccino machine, coffee grinder, and movie theatrestyle popcorn machine.

Jeanette Taylor recalled a time when making cappuccinos for Friday Flicks was a little less professional.

"We had an espresso machine at home and I would make lots of espresso and transport it to the community centre in thermoses. We heated up milk and made café lattes—nobody complained. When we bought an espresso machine in Vancouver for Friday Flicks, we told the guy who sold it to us how we had been making lattes. He was horrified!" she

A core group of volunteers has built up over the years, making Friday Flicks a smoothly running operation.

"We're all flexible, so if someone can't make it another person can cover," Gordon observed.

Prior to the showing of 'Protection' on October 26, Friday Flicks volunteers took some time to tell me why they enjoy being involved in the film club.

Carol Yole and Sehleeah Schevers spoke to me as they were cutting up baked goods for serving. Carol said the volunteers all like movies and enjoy the social aspect of Friday Flicks. Sehleeah added that they often have good discussions about the films afterwards when cleaning up.

Randy Mellanby, who was operating the projector, said he likes the diversity of films the club manages to bring to the island.

"We sometimes get international films and we appreciate what the international community does in the film industry," he

Looking ahead, Gordon said the film club would like to replace the current sound system and may switch to DVD from video at some point.

"You just never know what's coming with technology. As more films are released on DVD, it might make sense to switch. Our goal is always to duplicate a real movie experience," he said.

Friday Flicks take place every two weeks. Films in the upcoming lineup include 'Nora' on November 9, 'Parsley Days' on November 23, and 'With a Friend like Harry' on December 7. Doors open at 7:30 and show time is 7:45. Regular admission is \$4.50 and students/ seniors' admission is \$3.50.
