World Music - Jou Tou

Shake your booty or relax and enjoy - New World Music group Jou Tou is going to raise the rafters for both sitters and dancers at Quadra Community Centre on Saturday, March 20th at 8pm. If a picture is worth a thousand words, a photo of Jou Tou is akin to reducing the peoples of the world to the glance of a raindrop. In the persons of Andre Thibault, Qui Xia He, 'Pepe' Danza, and Amy Stephen, the continents of North America, South America, Asia, and Europe are concentrated into this tiny snapshot. And the musical heritages of Ouebec, Ireland, Uruguay, and China are joined together in the sounds of Jou Tou, a play on the French expression joue-tout, which means 'play everything', the musical philosophy of this remarkable group.

Andre Thibault, a Quebecois multiinstrumentalist, specializes in Latin guitar styles, and has developed a unique sound on the Middle Eastern lute (oud), the Greek bouzouki, percussions, winds from the Shanii, and several more types of indigenous flutes. Andre's fiery rhythms and stunning technique express a distinctive character which makes him one of the most sought after players in Vancouver.

Chinese-born Qui Xia He is a pipa virtuoso who has played around the world as a soloist with North American and European orchestras, and as a 'jammer' with fellow musicians of all sorts. Under her sensitive hands, the pipa takes on new and thrilling shapes and qualities.

Canadian Amy Stephen's musical heritage springs from her Irish roots; a musical family inspired her in the pursuit of a broad instrumental base, including accordian, Celtic harp, flute, penny whistle. Her vivid performances reflect both these folk roots and her formal training at UBC in piano and voice.

Uruguayan native Danza has toured and studied in India, Japan, Africa, Europe, Indonesia, and Brazil, adding countless instruments to a dazzling assortment, including hand drums, shakuhachi, bansuri, guitar, sitar, and a dizzying array of flutes and percussion instruments.

For the last fifteen years, these four musicians have been in the vanguard of creating the unique world music scene coming out of Canada's West Coast. As leading players in the groups Silk Road Music, Asza, Drum Prayers, Mad Pudding, and Cordes en Folie, they have received nominations and awards from Musician of the Year to the Juno. They have been featured on major documentaries on CBC, CTV, and VTV, as well as countless radio performances. This musically simpatico group applies creative vision and diverse cultural heritages to create a truly global listening and dancing experience.

Advance tickets are available at **Ouadra Crafts**, Hummingbird Office and Art Supply, and Music Plant in Campbell River: cost is \$10 for adults and \$25 for families (parents and dependent children only). Coastal Communities to Receive Assistance with Economic Development

The Community Economic Adjustment Initiative (CEAI) program, created by the Federal government in 1999 to assist in longterm, sustainable economic diversification and development in coastal communities affected by changes in the salmon fishery, is now being restarted. The program will be administered by Community Futures Development Corporations in coastal British Columbia, using repaid funds from loans given to businesses in the first phase to fund new non-repayable contributions to eligible non-commercial projects in coastal communities in the CEAI Phase II.

Eligible applicants for the non-repayable contributions are any non-profit entity, such as an industry association, municipality, First Nation band council, regional district office, cooperative, society, community group or association. The maximum contribution per project is \$250,000; however, priority will be given to those projects asking for \$125,000 or less and which show the greatest leverage and long term economic benefits for their community. Projects must be not for profit, non-commercial ventures.

All projects must demonstrate strong local community support for the project, be consistent with their region's community economic development strategy and have tangible and direct results such as long-term sustainable benefits in the form of job creation and maintenance, new business formation and increased capital investment Projects must leverage funding from the community and other sources.

The first opportunity to have a project approved will be in the mid June 2004. The completed project proposal must be submitted to the local CFDC office before May 1st, 2004 in order to be considered at the June 2004 meeting. Applicants are now invited to submit their proposals to the manager of the Community Futures Development Corporation at as soon as possible. Friday Flicks – My Life Without Me

Attention moviegoers all! This is your last Friday Flick till fall, so bring your appetite for cutting edge viewing, chewing and chatting to "My Life Without Me;" a disarming and tender Canadian/Spanish hybrid production.

"My Life Without Me" is an intelligently pitched drama about a young woman becoming fully conscious as a result of discovering she is going to die. It avoids stereotyped heart- wrenching, homing in instead on one woman's valiant attempt to put her "house" in order.

Ann was married with two children by age 19. She lives with her daughters and her chronically unemployed husband in a funky trailer parked in her mother's backyard. She works as a night janitor to make ends meet. When Ann discovers she has only a few months to live, she draws up a list, "Things to Do Before I Die," and gets to work. The efficiency with which she accomplishes each goal is ironic; given the card life has dealt her. That her impending death brings her back to life from a state of sleepwalking is the larger paradox that drives the film.

Sarah Polley as Ann is brilliant, as always. Accustomed as we are to lacquered perfection in screen actresses, Polley's refreshing integrity in looks, acting and screen presence is a sweet glass of water. Her performance is matched by excellent casting overall, including Deborah Harry as Ann's disillusioned mother.

It doesn't hurt that the film is intelligent and beautifully written. "My Life Without Me" is an odd and wonderful mix of sadness and wonder set in a physical world that is alien from the jacked-up pacing and predictable melodramas of Hollywood. It exudes modesty and remarkable lack of self-infatuation.

There are all sorts of movies about people dying young, but none like "My Life Without Me. This one is about the living part, not the dying part.

Award Winning Gryphon Trio Returning To Quadra

The Gryphon Trio, winner of the 2004 "Indie" award for "Favourite Classical Artist/Group", nominee for yet another Juno award, and long-standing favourite of Quadra audiences returns to the Quadra Community Centre on Sunday March 28th at 7:00 pm with a programme of Beethoven, Shostakovich and Hatzis.

Celebrating its 11th anniversary, the Gryphon Trio is now recognized as one of North America's best chamber ensembles. The Gryphon Trio regularly tours throughout Canada and the United States, and has also performed in Mexico, Germany, France, Belgium, Russia, Poland, and Finland. In addition to their North American touring in 2003, the Trio will again perform in Europe, notably at Finland's renowned Kuhmo Chamber Music and the Brussels Philharmonic Society.

The Trio is named after the Gryphon, a mythical creature that is half lion and half eagle. The Gryphon is reputed to be a guardian of treasures and a symbol of the connection between psychic energy and cosmic force.

Since 1998, the Gryphon Trio has been Ensemble-in-Residence at the Music Toronto chambermusic series. The Trio's performances are heard regularly across Canada on the CBC national radio network, and they have been broadcast internationally on NPR (USA), Radio France, RTBF (Belgium), Radio Bremen, Hessischer Rundfunk (Germany), and Finnish Radio. The Gryphon Trio has also appeared on Canadian, Japanese, Korean, Chinese, Russian, and French television networks. In addition to their concertizing, the Trio gives frequent master classes, chamber music coachings, composition workshops, and school presentations.

The Gryphon Trio's Analekta recordings of Haydn Piano Trios and Mendelssohn/Dvorak Piano Trios have received unanimous critical acclaim and were nominated for Juno Awards. "Destined to become an indispensable reference" [Le Devoir], the Trio's third Analekta release features Mendelssohn's C minor Piano Trio, and the rediscovered Lalo A minor Piano Trio. More recent releases feature Beethoven Op. 1 trios, as well as new commissions by contemporary Canadian composers.

Advance tickets for the concert are \$15 and are available at Quadra Crafts and Hummingbird on Quadra Island and at the Music Plant in Campbell River. Tickets are also available at the door for \$18. Admission is free to students 16 and under who are accompanied by an adult.

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Coal Projects Heat Up

what the public needs to know

The public is invited to presentations sponsored by the Campbell River Environmental Coalition and the Quadra Island Sierra Club at which two coalrelated topics will be discussed - coal fired generation, and coalbed methane. Monday, March 29th,7:30 pm

Coal fired electricity generation is heating up in British Columbia.

The Quinsam generation project, promoted by Hillsborough Resources, is increasingly in the news on Vancouver Island.

The Quinsam project is not alone. Other coal-fired generation projects are being discussed across BC. And the provincial government clearly signalled support for an escalation of coal fired generation in their Energy Plan.

The appeal of coal is that it is plentiful and it is cheap.

But coal is the dirtiest of fossil fuels. Increasing its use in BC is turning back time, wilfully ignoring the health and environmental impacts. Industry claims that they can do "clean coal", but that involves expensive technological fixes. The cost advantage of coal can quickly evaporate.

The second topic is coalbed methane.

Potential for coalbed methane exists wherever there is coal, and coalfields exist all across BC. The gas itself is natural gas sourced from coal.

Two problems with coalbed methane production set it apart from other fossil fuels.

First, it industrializes the landscape. Profitable coalbed methane projects entail hundreds of wells in close proximity to each other, each connected by roads, and pipelines for water and gas, compressors and water disposal facilities.

Second, enormous volumes of water usually must be disposed of to release the methane. The water is often saline, and is sometimes toxic. But even if it is potable, this "produced water" is in such quantity that it can be profoundly damaging to local fields, streams and groundwater.

Expect a short video, presentation, and discussion. Arthur Caldicott from Dogwood Initiative will be the guest presenter. Quadra Community Centre, on Monday March 29 at 7 pm, and at the Campbell River Community Centre, on Tuesday March 30 at 7 pm.

Cortes Priority Loading To Continue

Quadra - Campbell River

Following an extended trial period, the Cortes traffic priority loading initiative will be continued indefinitely. The initiative is intended to address a long-standing issue of Cortes access to Vancouver Island.

Data gathered on the 10 month trial period was reviewed at the Spring meeting of the Campbell River/Quadra/Cortes Ferry Advisory Committee. Since the procedure, which applies to only two of 119 public sailings each week, was put in place last year, results show a very positive impact on traffic efficiency with few negative effects.

Based upon both statistical data and input received from customers, the review concluded in favour of continuing Cortes priority loading.

Cortes traffic will be given priority loading on two sailings a week departing Quathiaski Cove, as follows:

Plausible...Painful... Preventable?

recent report confirmed that the temperatures experienced In Europe in the summer of 2003 were the highest in 500 years. It is almost forgotten here in North America that almost 15,000 people, mainly elderly, died last year in France as a result of the summer heat wave. Normally pleasant cities such as London and Paris were stifled by the combination of heat and air pollution. Meanwhile, on a recent cruise to Alaska my wife and I were told upon the sighting a small iceberg near Juneau that, after several years on that route, it was the first the Captain had ever seen that far south. Further, while visiting the Hubbard Glacier National Reserve, the native elder who was brought on board as our guide stated that he had never seen the glacier retreating as fast in his 60 plus years of living in the area. These examples, among a lot of other things, have convinced me that "global warming" is a reality, and is probably much further advanced and more serious than thought by those who have been warning us about the phenomenon for years.

I'd be willing to bet that very few readers are aware of the report recently produced by an office of the Pentagon that suggests we are in very deep doo-doo. The reason you are not aware is that its existence has only been mentioned by a couple of newspapers in the mainstream media. such as the UK's Guardian which was where I learned of it. (Note: This was written prior to the publishing of Ray Grigg's recent "Shades of Green" column in the North Islander) Curious fellow that I am, I downloaded the entire report entitled "An Abrupt Climate Change Scenario and its Implications for United States National Security - October 2003". Granted, the report was prepared as a worst case scenario, but the authors state clearly "We have created a climate change scenario that although not the most likely, is plausible, and would challenge US national security in ways that should be considered immediately." Note the two key words - plausible and immediately.

Under the scenario created by the authors, the current warming trend we are experiencing will accelerate, creating erratic weather patterns that will affect agriculture and causing an increase in the hydrologic cycle (evaporation, precipitation and runoff) that traps even more heat, as water vapor is the most powerful natural greenhouse gas. This in turn causes higher surface temperatures, leading to accelerated death of forests and grasslands, which causes an increased carbon dioxide buildup, further increasing surface temperatures. Naturally occurring forest and grass fires help create higher temperatures, leading to faster snow melt and glacial thawing. The date of this scenario? 2005. As this is occurring, severe ocean storms create higher storm surges and coastal flooding, and by 2007 the risk of flooding affects roughly 4 times as many people globally as in 2003. "As the melting of the Greenland ice sheet exceeds the annual snowfall, and there is increasing freshwater runoff from high altitude precipitation, the freshening of waters in the North Atlantic and the seas between Greenland and Europe increases. The lower densities of the freshened waters in turn paves the way for a sharp slowing of the thermohaline circulation system."

The global thermohaline conveyor (known commonly as the Gulf Stream in the North Atlantic) will start to cool, initially causing catastrophic changes in fisheries and eventually causing significant average temperature declines in Europe and eastern North America. This is estimated to occur as soon as 2010. Average temperature declines of 6° Fahrenheit are experienced in northern Europe, and precipitation declines by nearly 30% while winds are 15% stronger. Conditions are more severe in the continental interior regions of Asia and North America. Widespread and prolonged droughts result, and by the end of the decade (2020) northern Europe's climate resembles that of Siberia. For Asia, interior drought and coastal flooding makes famine a near certainty. In North America, water becomes much more precious. Lesser affected nations become much more protective in an attempt to feed their populations from declining sources of food production while attempting to stem the flow of refugees streaming to their borders in search of sustenance. By 2018 North America becomes Fortress North America, and wars are fought globally for control of resources. "Disruption and conflict will be endemic features of life, and once again warfare would define human life," the authors conclude.

Can this really happen? Scientific evidence indicates it has happened in the past, and researchers at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute report that the North Atlantic is experiencing declining salinity. Are we contributing to the problem? Undoubtedly, especially as the earth appears to have a human population far exceeding its carrying capacity (presently almost a billion people receive insufficient sustenance worldwide). Global demand for oil is expected to increase 66% in the next 30 years, exacerbating the atmospheric problem. The sponsor of the report, 82 year old Andrew Marshall, is the head of the Pentagon's Office of Net Assessment, which is dedicated to weighing risks to US national security, and is called Yoda by Pentagon insiders who respect his vast intellect and experience. And yes, this report has been delivered to the White House.

The United States is not a signatory to the Kyoto Protocol, and the present administration seems blissfully ignorant of the implications of global warming. "You've got a President who says global warming is a hoax, and across the Potomac River you've got the Pentagon preparing for climate wars. Its pretty scary when Bush starts to ignore his own government on this issue," states Rob Gueterbock of Greenpeace. However, it is hoped that this report may finally get some action out of the White House. Bob Watson, Chief Scientist for the World Bank, states "Can Bush ignore the Pentagon? It's going to be hard to blow off this sort of document. It's hugely embarrassing. After all, Bush's single highest priority is national defense. The Pentagon is no wacko, liberal group; generally speaking it is conservative. If climate change is a threat to national security and the economy, then he has to act. There are two groups the Bush Administration tend to listen to, the oil lobby and the Pentagon."

Unfortunately even a positive reception by the White House (which has not occurred) would not lead to a US led initiative to stave off this disaster. Instead it would result in a re-orientation of defense planning that incorporates the implications of the scenario - sort of getting a head start on the problem. The report does make a small attempt at a mitigation scenario – "Alternative fuels, greenhouse gas emission controls, and conservation efforts are worthwhile endeavours." However, the paragraph concludes - "In addition, we should prepare for the inevitable effects of abrupt climate change - which will likely come regardless of human activity." Besides, even though the US is the world's leading producer of greenhouse gasses, they are not omnipotent and cannot on their own do much to unwind the damage already done. But what they can do is take their head out of the sand, and turn their technological superiority towards reversing their gluttonous dependence on fossil fuels, and exporting that technology globally in the hopes of preventing other nations from following in their oil-fueled growth of the past. The time for mere words has passed - it's time for action...by all of us.

Island Report

Emergency Planning Underway for the Islands

Last summer's devastating fires in the Interior of BC highlighted the need for emergency planning across the province. Quadra and Cortes do not have official emergency plans at present, but the regional district has begun the process of developing plans for both islands.

"We're actively moving towards establishing emergency plans as a service for both Quadra and Cortes," confirmed regional district Administration Officer Bob Vanderzwaag in a phone interview on March 15.

Following the advice of the provincial Firestorm Report, released on February 15, 2004, the Regional District of Comox-Strathcona is making emergency planning a priority for areas without official plans in place.

The Firestorm Report, issued in response to last summer's fires, points out that while municipal governments are required to have emergency plans in place, regional governments are not. It recommends the BC government "ensure that emergency plans are developed for the entire area of the province."

Bob Vanderswaag explained that emergency plans are very important

because, without them, "local areas can be left on their own when a disaster happens."

According to Emergency Social Services, a disaster is a calamity caused by accident, fire, explosion, technical failure, or the forces of nature, and results in serious harm to the health, safety, or welfare of the people, or widespread damage to property.

Quadra Fire Chief Murray Johnson said potential disasters on Quadra include forest fires, earthquakes, plane crashes, marine emergencies, severe windstorms, and school bus accidents.

Interface fires, defined as fires that occur where wildland meets urban development, are perhaps foremost in people's minds after last summer. According to climatologists, this summer is predicted to be as dry or drier than last.

Since a group of islanders put together a disaster plan for Quadra in 1997, emergency planning has become more formalized across the province.

"Part of emergency planning today is to be able to mesh with all levels of government. If you look at the fires that happened last summer, help came in from all areas of the province," Murray pointed out. "The BC Emergency Response Management System (BCERMS) provides a province-wide framework for emergency planning."

Area 'J' Director Jim Abram observed that the regional district will save money by working on emergency plans for Quadra, Cortes, Oyster River, and the Sayward Valley as a joint project. The District of Campbell River will also be included, as it is the hub for medical services, telecommunications, and other necessities.

"We're all going to work together on it, and any emergency planning that has been done in the past will be looked at. Each area will have its own tailored details, but there will be an overall framework that will be shared. It makes sense to share resources to cut down on expenses," Jim asserted.

He went on to say that agreements will be drawn up between different areas, so that emergency services can respond to disasters outside of their boundaries when needed.

Bob Vanderswaag said emergency planning for this area will be modeled on the Comox Valley, where service agreements are in place with outlying areas.

"We're trying to transplant that model to Campbell River and have it extend to the islands," he said.



As part of the planning process, an emergency program coordinator will be appointed for each area. These will be paid part-time positions.

Bob explained that the fire chiefs are the de facto emergency planning coordinators at present, but that isn't the right approach "because they need to concentrate on managing their department's response during an emergency."

Also included in the planning process is the designation of public buildings for various roles in an emergency. Quadra's new #1 firehall, designed as a post-disaster structure able to withstand a hurricane or large earthquake, will be the Emergency Operations Centre.

"As well as being a postdisaster structure, the firehall has the facilities and communication systems needed in an emergency," said Murray.

Murray added that the Quadra Community Centre will likely be designated as the reception centre, where people would be registered, sheltered, and fed in a major emergency.

Reception centres are typically where Emergency Social Services (ESS) are provided. ESS are provided on a short-term basis to preserve the emotional and physical well being of evacuees and response workers in an emergency.

The emergency planning process also involves listing resource people and equipment in each community, as well as steps to follow in specific emergencies. Education and training is an important step in the planning.

Once Quadra's emergency plan is in place, the fire department plans to apply for a Joint Emergency Preparedness Grant from the federal government. The money will be used to purchase an emergency generator for the firehall.

Jim Abram said he's very pleased that the emergency planning process is underway.

"It should go fairly quickly because a lot of the work has already been done in other communities," he predicted.

The next step in the process at the regional district is to break down the costs involved and then establish bylaws to implement the service, Bob Vanderswaag confirmed.

"We plan to complete those steps in time for the 2005taxseason.Emergency planning is not an expensive undertaking, yet it provides the community with an excellent service," Bob said.

Murray said he's looking forward to being involved in the emergency planning process.

"I'm very glad to see the process begin. This project has been on the back burner for a few years now. Emergency planning is very important because it allows you to respond in an effective manner and recover as quickly as possible."
