## **Chamber Notes**

The Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce has reconvened after the summer break and have drafted an action plan for the 2004-05 session. Four projects to be pursued in order of priority are:

1) Promotion & marketing - directed at potential tourists and relocating families.

2) Visitor Info Centre - ideas include expanding and relocating to include chamber offices and gallery space.

3) Membership - increasing enrollment and improving services.

4) Crusie-ship Readiness - what impact will cruise ship traffic in CR have on the islands? How will this be managed?

The Chamber's first priority, promotion & marketing has got off to a great start with members and the Regional District contributing a total of nearly \$4000 that will go toward the placement of magazine ads encouraging tourists to visit and families to relocate to Quadra and neighbouring islands.

The future economic and demographic makeup of Quadra Island in particular is a frequent topic at the Chamber table. Encouraging economic diversification and sustainable practices in existing sectors is seen as essential if Quadra is to offer a liveliehood and home to young families. Declining enrollment at Quadra Elementary is just one bell weather that the trend is against this vital part of our community.

The Chamber has written a letter requesting a dialogue with TimberWest concerning harvesting rates on Quadra Island. The return to local contractors and the style and rate of harvest are some of the points the Chamber would like to address with our corporate neighbour.

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#### The McDades Come to Quadra



From Edmonton Alberta comes the exciting McDades Celtic Band. The group: two brothers and a sister, and two honourary McDades who originate from Montreal, perform everything from modern bluegrass to Tuvan Throat Singing in a style that has developed somewhere between modern Celtic, traditional French Canadian and jazz. # **Friday Flicks**

#### Goodbye, Lenin November 5th, 2004 at QCC Doors 7:30 – Showtime 7:45 Admission: \$4.50-\$3.50 stu/snr

Hailed as Best European Film at the 2003 Berlin Film Festival, "Good Bye Lenin!" seems destined to become one of Germany's biggest international hits.

It's 1989 and Berlin is in turmoil. East Berliners are heading west in droves. Christiane is loyal to the virtues of socialism, her activist fervor fueled years ago by her defecting husband. When she sees her son Alex marching in an anti-government protest, she suffers a heart attack and ends up in a coma. It's mid-1990 before she awakens and the Wall is down. "Mother slept through the relentless triumph of capitalism," says Alex.

Christiane has a weak heart and her doctor warns that any shock could kill her. In order to save his mother, Alex decides to hide the fall of the Wall from her. He creates a fictional world for her benefit and the deeper he delves into this fiction, the more uneasy he, and complicit others, become. Is Alex betraying his mother's trust? What will happen when she is well enough to get out of bed and explore the world outside of her room? Her life hangs in the balance, and so may the viewer's attitudes about socialism and capitalism.

All this is fodder for the pointed satire of opposing 'isms.' Taking potshots at the monolithic ideologies of Communism and Capitalism, *Goodbye*, *Lenin* turns a family's crisis into a symbol of Germany's attempt to heal old wounds and rebuild. Writer/director Wolfgang Becker's film about one man's attempt to make history stand still is a tragicomic journey into political upheaval within personal lives. He aims his satire not only at Germany, but at the entire world of change.

# A Living Wage?

hile on a recent trip to Victoria, my wife and I stopped at a nongovernment liquor outlet to purchase some items. During the transaction the clerk divided his time between ringing up the sale, chatting with us and watching a television show. When paying using my debit card, I was distracted and simply punched the keys, paying no attention to the total. After we returned to our hotel room, a nagging doubt made me check the slip. Sure enough, our purchase was processed at the wrong price, to our benefit in an amount of over \$50. Now, some people might view this as a fortuitous event for us - after all, had I not looked at the slip we would have never realized the error. But my conscience is strong enough that I cannot enjoy any satisfaction from such an event. Further, my wife used to manage a hotel with a liquor outlet, and I knew that the clerks generally make little better than minimum wage, and cash shortages usually come out of their own pockets. Consequently, this \$50 shortage would have wiped out the poor kid's pay net pay for the day. I went back to the store, announced to the young man that "I'm here to make your day", and explained the situation. He was flummoxed to say the least, and after checking his tape found he had indeed messed up. That was one grateful clerk when I paid him the difference, and I felt good about it for the rest of the day. The event also certainly set me thinking about how tough life must be on minimum wage.

In the US election race one issue is receiving little attention, but each candidate has firmly staked out a position. The minimum wage in the USA is US\$5.15 per hour, and has been stuck at that level since 1997. John Kerry is in favour of increasing it to \$7.00 per hour, while George W. Bush opposes the change. According to the Economic Policy Institute, 7.4 million American's earn minimum wage, and that large of a voting block could swing the election results towards Kerry, but only if they vote, which historically they do not. In British Columbia, we have the  $3^{rd}$  highest minimum wage in Canada at \$8.00 per hour (behind Nunavat at \$8.50 and the NWT at \$8.25).

So the US minimum of \$5.15 is worth \$6.55 Canadian, which is higher than the minimum wage in Alberta (\$5.90), Newfoundland (\$6.00), New Brunswick (\$6.20) and Nova Scotia/PEI, both at \$6.50 per hour. But setting aside all of the differences, the simple fact is a person is expected to clothe, feed and house themselves on about \$260 Canadian per week. Canada has no established "poverty line", but Statistics Canada offers a measure called the Low Income Cut-off (LICO), which in 2003 established a single person's minimum annual income needs at \$13,680 for a rural dweller to \$19,795 for a person living in the city. Therefore, someone earning the average Canadian minimum wage, which coincidentally is the same as the US equivalent at CDN\$6.55, earns \$13,520 for a 52 week workyear, or \$160 a year less than our own government's minimum poverty level. This is a shameful statistic, and Canada has over 16% of it's population living on this much or less that are commonly called the "working poor".

Barbara Ehrenreich is an American author with a Ph.D. in Biology and 12 titles to her credit. Her most recent work is entitled "Nickle and Dimed: On (Not) Getting By in America" (Henry Holt & Co. - ISBN 0-8050-6389-7) and is a damning account of how we, as a society, treat our working poor. Ehrenreich was convinced by Lewis Lapham, Editor of Harper's Magazine, to pursue a project whereby she would enter the world of the working poor, and so she "moved from Florida to Maine to Minnesota, taking the cheapest lodgings available, and worked as a waitress, hotel chambermaid, house cleaner, nursing home aide and Wal-Mart salesperson. She soon discovered that even the "lowliest" occupations require exhausting mental and physical efforts. And one job is not enough; you need two if you intend to live indoors". This piece of undercover journalism is a tough read, at least if you have a modicum of sympathy for the people Ehrenreich encounters. You learn how people become trapped in a vicious circle of overwork, poor nutrition and general stress that leads to ill health. and of course these people have no access to medical care, nor can they afford the time off work to be sick.

Tips are often the only way that some service workers can make ends meet, so Ehrenreich started her project as a waitress in a small restaurant, in Key West, Florida. She started at \$2.43 per hour. Yes, that is <u>two</u>

dollars and forty three cents an hour! It seems that "According to the Fair Labor Standards Act, employers are not required to pay "tipped employees", such as restaurant servers, more than \$2.13 an hour in direct wages. However, if the sum of tips plus \$2.13 per hour falls below the minimum wage, or \$5.15 an hour, the employer is required to make up the difference. This fact was not mentioned by managers or otherwise publicized at either of the restaurants I worked". In her book, we meet plenty of employers who abuse their workers, most often financially, sometimes physically in some cases, and certainly mentally when it came to Wal-Mart. And unfortunately there is no end of willing bodies to fill the jobs, and recent economic indicators indicate more people will be looking for a job, any job, even one that pays less than a living wage.

On at least two occasions the Canadian government has researched the implementation of a Guaranteed Annual Income (GAI) for all Canadians, aimed at ensuring that every Canadian is able to earn at least a living wage, based upon StatCan's LICO. In 1994, Lloyd Axworthy, then Canada's Minister of Human Resources, tabled a discussion paper to completely revamp Canadian social assistance programs to a more workable single GAI, which many argued could actually save taxpayer's money while improving the lot of Canada's poor. It was ignored. In 2000, Prime Minister Chretien assembled a committee to study a national Basic Income, largely the same as 6 years prior, saying "The fact is that our prosperity is not shared by all". Nothing substantive came out of the committee. And at this moment, nothing is anywhere near being on the table. So the working poor can expect little relief other than a minimal CPI adjustment of maybe 3%, or \$0.24 per hour here in BC.

Ironically, the only country that was successful in providing it's population with a decent minimum standard of living was the former USSR, until it's economy imploded as a result of the Cold War. Some Scandinavian countries offer "cradle to grave" baskets of social services, but only with crippling high tax rates. With a recent \$8 billion budget surplus, we can do better in Canada. We have to do better, because past instances of gross imbalances between the rich and the poor always end the same way...with a messy revolution.

All it means is that we haven't changed all that much since we were slaughtering the Neanderthals.

Brecht's power comes not from his

ability to see forward but from his ability to see backwards. Let's take a look at a few excerpts from his From a German War Primer written in the 1930's and we can see that his ability to look back helps him see forward. THE WAR WHICH IS COMING/ Is not the first one. There were/ Other wars before it./ When the last one came to an end/ There were conquerors and conquered./ Among the conquered the common people/Starved. Among the conquerors/ The common people starved too./....WHEN IT COMES TO MARCHING MANY DO NOT KNOW/ That the enemy is marching at their head./ The voice which gives them their orders/ Is their enemies voice and/ The man who speaks of the enemy/ Is the enemy himself.

The Strathcona timber supply area covers an area on central Vancouver Island and the adjacent mainland that includes the communities of Campbell River, Courtenay, Comox, Gold River, Tahsis, Zeballos, Sayward, Cumberland and Kvuquot.

The Timber Supply Review provides the chief forester with information to determine the allowable annual cut (AAC) the allowable rate of timber that can be harvested from a specific area of land - for the next five years.

once composed a dance together in honour of the Oueen Mum, who Scottish danced after both her hip replacement surgeries. They named it 'Hip, hip, hooray, the Queen Mum's Strathspey' and sent her the steps, receiving a letter in reply from her secretary.

Eve, who has been dancing since she was a child in Scotland, pointed out that not only is Scottish country dancing an enjoyable activity, it's also good exercise.

One member of the group, Jack Boyes from Black Creek, told me he lost 30 pounds during his first year of Scottish country dancing. He has now been dancing for five years, and attends the Quadra and Courtenay groups.

Appreciative clapping and smiles all round followed each dance. Before starting the taped music for the next one, Shirley walked the dancers through the steps each time.

"You will recognize this one as soon as we walk it," she told the group. "Set! Change places with the right hand. Set! Dancing couples 3/4 turn."

"Dancing is good for your memory," pointed out Joan Sell. "It's fun too. We have a lot of laughs sometimes, especially when we end up with the wrong partner!"

Several members said they appreciate the informal atmosphere of the Quadra group. Kilts are generally only worn on special occasions, such as the annual potluck dinner dance.

"I don't spend much time panicking about technique. We're here to have a fun, social evening," Shirley told me.

A Scottish country dancer for 55 years now, Shirley has taught and performed with several groups. Her daughter and granddaughters are also Scottish country dancers.

Shirley affirmed that Scottish country dancing is a popular activity in many countries. At one time the largest amateur group was located in Tokyo, and attracted large numbers of Japanese citizens as well as expats.

Based on the court dances of France, brought over by Mary Queen of Scots, Scottish country dancing is the traditional social dancing of Scotland. Some of the dances practiced today hark back to the early 1700s, while otherslike those composed by Shirley and other contemporary dancers-are new.

Although the dances are formed by interactive patterns in a group, or set, of couples, there is no need to bring a partner.

"Unlike some other types of dancing, you don't dance with one partner. We all dance together," Shirley said. "We have a good time and new dancers are always welcome."
