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The Lure of Summer... at the Library

Summer is almost here and our island communities are so beautiful at this time of year, it's difficult to lure people from their gardens and the great outdoors. But your local library has many seasonal attractions, and one very special summer program for children.

The theme for this year's Summer Reading Club is Undercover Reader, with an exciting variety of booklists, activities, incentives, and prizes for children who participate by signing up (free!) at your local library at the end of June.

Summer Reading Club reaches out to all ages: Read to Me for pre-schoolers; Summer Reading Club for independent readers up to Grade 7; and new this year – an on-line Teen club for readers 13 and up at www.teensrc. ca.

Last year, for the first time, budding writers had the opportunity to sound their opinions by writing book reviews, posted on the VIRL website. In 2004, more than 5300 children participated in the Summer Reading program throughout VIRL's service area. We have many witty, wise and talented readers, and we want to do everything we can to promote their skills and interests.

This year we'll be doing the same, plus offering online literacy games and activities relating to the theme of Undercover Reading on the VIRL website at www.virl.bc.ca.

The more a child reads for the Summer Reading Club, the better their chances to win prizes in the weekly prize draws at their local library. But that's only a small incentive compared to the long-term benefits of keeping reading skills and interests sharp over summer vacation.

If you're planning a family trip, don't forget that children can borrow from and return books to any of VIRL's 37 branches, from Haida Gwaii in the north to Sooke in the south, and Bella Coola on the central mainland coast.

On May 7 I indulged in my annual presummer, all-day literary event – the 19th annual Vancouver Island Children's Book Festival, held at Malaspina University College. The day was perfect for the outdoor events, happy children were everywhere, and Canadian authors were abundant. This year's event drew more children from outside the Nanaimo area than ever before, and I could tell from the bulging bags of author-signed books at the end of the day, that once again, the magical connection between authors and children had been made.

May Day Dance

This year the May dance is fortunate to have Doundounba a band from Guinea. Aboubakar Camara leads Doundounba in performing West African amasumbou music – a mingling of musical traditions – including ancient Guinean rhythms and popular West African dance-driven melodies of mandeng guitar.

Their instrumentation is equally diverse, incorporating the balafon (xylophone), djembe (hand drum), doun doun (bass drum), kirin, (slit log drum played with sticks), and gongoma (gourd) alongside electric and bass guitars and the drum kit.

The result is dance hall world music alongside traditional percussion, a combination that gets everyone on their feet dancing or moving in their seat. On Stage, Aboubakar and his sister, Sekou Sylla, both from the Guinea national dance company, perform extraordinary dance moves, with speed, energy and style, which are thrilling to watch

Many of Aboubakar's original lyrics promote qualities such as kindness, unity and joy, and others make inquiries into the human condition and the challenges that face a diverse society.

This range and excellence in African music make Doundounba's sound stand out in the World Music community. Their compelling presentation and the vibrant atmosphere make this group one you won't want to miss!

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Women's Healing Circle

Hello ladies, I am announcing the birth of a new concept: Please pass this on to your friends, those of you who came to my first workshop, or wanted to but couldn't, and have been confused about what happened since then, etc....

I am starting a group for women who want to be supported in their journey as healers, mentors, parents, and just ordinary human beings in relationships! Using hands on healing as a metaphor, we are learning how to grow in our integrity in all of our relationships. This is a combination of giving and receiving hands on healing (supervised by me), with time for a check in and feedback on your own personal goals. Examples of a goal might be learning to manage your own energy around dependents, or how to hold a 'healers stance' without becoming drained, or how help without taking on other people's negative 'stuff'. This is a very safe setting with no more than 8 women. In summary, the idea is we have a little more personal/"spiritual" (don't be put off by that word, I mean it in the most generic possible sense!) journey of the healer check in and discussion, but still some hands on practice and getting worked on like we have in the workshops!

This Women's Healing Circle will meet every other week for 2 hrs for 3 Monday evenings, take a break (unless you contact me to spontaneously meet in July or August), then resume in September.

Here is the schedule:

Monday May 30th, Monday June 13, and Monday June 27th, from 7 to 9 p.m. in my cabin on the south end of Quadra. The cost is \$15-20 sliding scale for each evening.

We would tentatively restart on Friday Sept 9th, 7-9 p.m., and Friday Sept 23rd, 7-9 (I suggest you mark your calendars with a question mark for now).

I am also hoping to bring someone up here to teach CranioSacral Levels 1 and 2 in the Fall, and my group would be really ripe for that.

We have to have enough people interested to make it happen! currently. I am qualified to supervise CranioSacral students who have taken official CST (CranioSacral Therapy) classes, and will eventually be qualified to teach all levels of CST (hopefully by next Spring).

Mitlenatch Marine Park

Mitlenatch Island appears to drift with the tides, floating and shimmering in the middle of north Georgia Strait. This illusive quality is captured in the Salish people, stranslation for the First Nations name for the island, which is said to mean "moves as you move." On May 28 the public will have an opportunity to visit this intriguing and beautiful little island on a field trip co-ordinated by the Cortes Island Museum.

Participants will depart from Cortes Island on the motor / sailing vessel ŒMisty Isles,. According to the naturalist and skipper for the tour, Mike Moore, spring is an excellent time to visit the island. "We,ll see stellar sea lions on the rocky south shore, where they stay for a few months during their coastal migration." Another highlight on a spring visit, says Moore, is the profusion of wild flowers in the bloom.

Mitlenatch Island was designated as a provincial park in 1961 to protect the hundreds of wildfowl that nest off the rocky headlands of the island. 3,000 pairs of glaucous-winged gulls nest there, laying their eggs directly on the rocks. Visitors to the island will also see pelagic cormorants nesting on the steep south cliffs, pigeon guillemots, oystercatchers and countless other birds.

The park, which is the largest bird sanctuary in the Strait of Georgia, is protected from predators. Another attraction is the dry, warm climate, lying as it does in a "rain shadow." Rain bearing clouds drop more than half their moisture on Vancouver Island. As a consequence, Mitlenatch receives only 75 cm (30 inches) of rain per year compared to 153 cm in Campbell River. In the resulting warm environment prickly pear cactus, sporting soft yellow blooms, grow on Mitlenatch.

Mike and Samantha Moore, your naturalist guides, will provide a wealth of background information on the birds, mammals and plants on the island. They will be joined local historian Jeanette Taylor, who will entertain participants with tales of First Nations myths and the Native people,s use of the island. On route she,ll describe the lifestyle of the British and Spanish mariners who explored and mapped this area in 1792.

Participants will travel on the 8:30 a.m. ferry to Quadra Island to link with the 9:05 ferry to Cortes Island for a 10:30 a.m. departure from Cortes Bay. The fee for this day trip is \$90. Quadra Philippines Connection News

The following is a recent letter from Elena Malindao. local coordinator of the IAT daycare/preschool programs in the northern Philippines that Quadra has been supporting for the past decade. Dear Carol Greetin and Quadra Island Community, gs of peace from the Philippines! It is already our vacation time and our daycare programs had their closing exercises on March 29th . I attended all of them and Mr. Sisan Paut, president of IAT Philippines, was their guest speaker. It was a success and I could see the excitement and happiness of all of the parents. There was an obvious difference in the children's attitudes/performance

during the ceremony from when they first started last June 2004. They now show confidence, excitement and an eagerness to participate. The parents appreciated very much the children's knowledge of counting, writing names and their joy of singing. Although they learned only basic numbers and alphabet, the parents felt this was a big achievement.. I am quite happy at hearing the parent's positive reports saying that our efforts have helped their children. From our Nambaran and Lacnog daycare programs, 35 children are going on to grade 1 and 18 children will remain in preschool for another year. Because of tribal conflict, some children had to drop out during the school year and return to their barrios (villages). A few children dropped out because of parents' unwillingness to contribute a very minimal amount either in money or rice towards the teacher's salary. But mostly we have been receiving positive support. Manv other villages are requesting daycare programs in their communities but our funds are not sufficient to accommodate them all. We are planning to add one this coming June and hopefully it will be okay with our budget. Please know that your financial support to our programs is really a big, big help to the children here. There is a real need to establish daycare centers but our department of education doesn't cater to preschool and parents cannot afford it. We know that money is difficult to raise and we appreciate so very much your efforts in providing our child care budget as well as your concern towards these children whom you do not know and have never met. Who knows-maybe in the future they will thank you in person! Thank you very much and may God reward all of you for the love and generosity that you extend to the children here. Me and My Shadow

I have this bag I carry around and in it I put all the undesirable aspects of myself. Some of them are considered 'negative' traits unacceptable in our culture, others, well, my friends made fun of me so I decided to tuck that part of myself away to avoid abuse and ridicule. This bag of mine gets heavier and heavier.

What I know about life is that my thoughts create my reality. What I am wondering, since I have learned to be such an agreeable person, why on earth do I meet such irritating individuals? I guess they just aren't like me! Right?

Wrong. If I recognize situations or individuals that I disregard, the truth is I am projecting a part of myself I have thrown away and put in my bag. At first when I learned this principle I thought it to be impossible. "How could I even come to being as negative as them!" After years of study I have found it to be the most profound part of my conscious development.

There is a natural order to human development and it is interfered with by our direct environment. Each family and culture's value system has it's own list of 'negatives' and 'positives' and we learn to hide away that personality which does not fit. 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Area J Regional Director's Report

May 22, 2005

returned home from holiday a few days ago and it is amazing how much can pile up in a two week period. I would like to thank all of you for not leaving voice mail messages for me while I was away. The emails still came in and I am close to finishing the replies after two days of intensive work! This next week is going to be a busy one with two public meetings in a row along with the other meetings in Courtenay. By the time you read this we will have had a presentation regarding a development proposal for a shellfish aquaculture hatchery site in Q. Cove and the next night will have been the public input session on our Emergency Preparedness Planning process. I'll report on those two issues in the next issue.

Lucky Jim Mine update

I alerted you to the possibility that the Energy and Mines Ministry of the Provincial government is proposing to fill in the Lucky Jim Mine shafts due to "safety concerns". I also informed you of the conversations that I had with their inspector and the ideas that I put forward as an alternative to filling in what is a popular tourist attraction and historic site on Quadra Island and part of the heritage of the island. The inspector did take the time to consider my suggestions and even went so far as to look at the steel grating that I suggested using to cover the hole. He also agreed that it is a viable solution and alternative to filling, but made it clear that they want the Regional District (RD) to assume all cost and responsibility and that they will not pay for any of it since it is not a "complete mine closure". Their proposal for the complete closure is to bring in 24 dump truck loads of gravel and a specialized "rock slinger truck" (to place the 24 loads of gravel) and then they will pay for it all ... This seems rather extreme and very expensive compared to the alternative.

I would personally prefer to see this as a community effort to save a site that benefits our island in many ways. The grating at Harper's Recycling in Campbell River, is thirty cents per pound as scrap steel and enough could be purchased and delivered to the site by any of a number of trucks (including mine) that might be coming this way. The concrete footings required are minimal and could easily be done by a work party in a days' time. The few timbers that might be needed to fasten the grating to, could be donated or purchased locally (perhaps TimberWest would like to get involved as a good corporate citizen since the site is, I believe, on their TFL).

All of this would be far less expensive than the Provincial alternative and should, in my opinion be paid for by Energy and Mines. Once it is installed to their specifications, I would see no reason for the liability to be held by anyone other than the Province. The RD cannot insure for liability on a site that they do not own or lease, so that is not an option, as the Province would suggest, unless they were to remove the site from TFL and deed it over to the RD. This last point is not likely!

So, this is what I intend to pursue and I am hoping that I will get lots of calls from interested islanders to help solve this problem as soon as possible. See my contact info at the end of the article.

Evans Bay Wharf Divestiture (Read Island)

I mentioned this issue in an earlier article and will not go into the details again. However, I will say that I am getting a considerable number of calls and letters regarding this issue. The wharf was sold by Transport Canada (T-C) to the upland owner with no consultation with the community that is effected by this sale. I feel that the upland owner has innocently been caught in the middle of this flawed process. The next step in the process is for the water lot lease (Provincial jurisdiction) to be transferred to the upland owner and the Read Island community wants to have a say in this before it takes place.

I have met with T-C officials in Vancouver to try to negotiate a compromise for the community, but they consider the sale a done deal. Land and Water BC will probably be a little more agreeable to meeting with the Surge Narrows Community Association on Read Island to discuss the issue. I am in the process of facilitating that right now. There seems to be a road access issue also involved in the overall process and I will be meeting with Ministry of Transportation and Highways officials this week on that point.

This may seem unrelated, unimportant or irrelevant to many of you, but I can assure you that it is not. There are other T-C wharves in Area J that could be faced with the same fate. The Federal government is operating under a policy of divestiture to the private sector at this time and some of our public docks could be the subject of the next divestiture. This is of concern to me, since these docks are, in many cases, the only public infrastructure in some of our remote areas. We have all paid for them with our Federal tax dollars over the years and it is my opinion that the Federal gov't. does not have the right to basically give them away to private interests without a full and open public process. More to follow.

Campbell River Recreation Facility Funding

A few years ago, I asked via this forum, how many of you actually use the recreation facilities in the City of Campbell River. I am not talking about Strathcona Gardens (pool and ice rink). The facilities would be ones such as the CR Community hall, the Sportsplex, the ball fields, etc. The reason I bring this up is because I read an article in the CR paper upon my return from holiday that says that the City has turned down the annual grant in aid that I give them to keep them from charging an "out of area fee" to non-residents (that's us). I have been doing this for years since it made more sense than having an exorbitant fee tacked on to all of the user fees for Quadra users when they went to CR facilities. At that time, my informal survey did verify that the payment of such a fee was warranted due to the number of users. I would like to ask the same question now. "HOW MANY OF YOU USE THE FACILITIES MENTIONED ABOVE IN CAMPBELL RIVER?". Please let me know as soon as possible, by email if possible. If there is still a demand, I will gladly pay the price. If there is not and if CR is not happy with the amount paid anyway, then there is no need to continue the payment. I was quite shocked that CR felt that they were being underpaid without at least telling me so. I am investigating the situation this week and will report back to you at a later date, if the media doesn't beat me to it. The media article was quite a surprise also, since I was away and unavailable to supply the other side of the story.

redit Union Central of BC has recently issued an economic analysis focussed on Vancouver Island, and as many would guess it is quite a rosy forecast. They make an interesting observation that the Island is in many ways a microcosm of the Province, with about 1/2 the population concentrated in one centre, being Victoria, and an economy based heavily on service industries. The northern half of the island is oriented to natural resources and has a poorly performing economy, while other parts of the Island are very attractive to retirees and others looking for lifestyle changes. However, the Island differs from the province as a whole inasmuch as fishing and forestry are bigger components of our economy, and the lack of a direct road link results in higher transportation costs and accessibility issues.

Specific areas of note within the forecast are an acceleration in population growth, continuing decline in the unemployment rate, strong growth in housing sales and strong growth in residential construction. CUCBC makes the following forecasts for individual industry outlooks; forestry will continue to decline as lower annual allowable cuts are implemented coupled with weaker prices as US and Japanese softwood demand declines. Pulp prices are expected to slightly improve but this will likely be offset by a stronger Canadian dollar. Tourism is expected to continue to grow at around 3% per year, although there are risks from currency fluctuations and the anticipated US passport requirement for it's citizens travelling to Canada will dampen demand. Room revenues have rebounded from the SARS-depressed 2003 level, rising 7.5% last year and they are forecast to grow in the 5% to 8% range over the next 3 years. The fishing industry saw a decline in exports in 2004, and increased competition from Chilean fish farms could impact future growth in the industry. More shellfish farms are expected to be established in our region. Sportfishing has gained in importance to the region, with lodges generating about \$9 million in revenues. Construction

will continue to be the growth leader in the region. Employment has risen from 17,000 people to about 22,000 last year, and is forecast to grow to about 27,000 jobs by 2007.

Specific to the Comox-Strathcona region, the reduction in fibre availability will have a negative impact on production. The forest industry presently accounts for about 30% of all income in the Campbell River area versus about 10% in Courtenay-Comox, and there will be some job losses in coming years. Tourism is becoming a much more important element of the local economy, generating about 7% of the region's income, and relatively strong growth is anticipated. As home to the Island's mining industry our region is benefiting from the strength in metal prices, and the future outlook remains bright for this industry. It is anticipated the coal-bed methane gas field in the Comox Valley will be developed as high energy prices make the project viable. Housing prices are expected to continue to climb, though not at the level of the last few years, averaging about 7% over the next 3 years. Building permits in the region are forecast to grow from 2004's 5,200 to about 7,000 in 2007. Overall our economy on Vancouver Island is expected to grow moderately over the next 3 years but will lag the rest of the province as a whole.

Given the relatively upbeat assessment, it is interesting to speculate how the political changes of May 17th will affect the running of the province. With the Liberals still holding a sizeable majority it is unlikely we will see any change in their policies. While the NDP has certainly regained opposition status, it is unclear how much of an impact they will make on the business of the House, other than slowing passage of controversial legislation via extended debate. It remains to be seen whether Mr. Campbell will view the loss of so many seats as a natural fall-out from some of his more unpleasant legislative moves, or understand that it is a message from the constituency telling him to be more

inclusive in his style of government. Time will tell. In the meantime I'm sure that the next legislative session is bound to be lively, as Carol James has shown she is no wallflower and can be expected to ask some very tough questions.

This is something that has been missing from the house for the last 4 years and the return of serious political debate is welcome news indeed.

On a further political note, I'd like to congratulate Claire Trevana on her victory. It was a tough campaign and I was pleased to see both Quadra Island candidates perform so well. Being the 1st MLA that resides on Quadra offers a unique challenge to Claire, as the makeup of her local constituency is vastly different from her constituency as a whole. Competing interests abound and she will have her hands full trying to please us all - a daunting task awaits her. In any event I trust she will become intimate with the wants and needs of her Discovery Islands constituents and will be a more familiar face than that of her immediate predecessor. And on a final note, during the campaign Philip Stone showed that he could handle intense political debate with the best of them, and I encourage him to keep up his interest in politics. He has the makings of fine politician, although that label bears a little tarnish nowadays.

In closing, between a strong economic forecast and a more balanced political climate the future for the region appears to be bright. A caveat, though – our economy is vulnerable to outside influences that are highly unpredictable, such as exchange rate and interest rate fluctuations. The US economy is in very poor condition and could have a tremendous impact on BC's economy should it thoroughly tank. While most economists would like to see a soft landing for the US, most are seeing that possibility becoming more remote as the Bush administration continues to cut taxes while spending skyrockets.

A hard landing would bode poorly for BC, and make the rosy forecast just discussed a wish rather than reality.



Business Profile A New Vision for the Heriot Bay Inn

ll that is old is new again" aptly describes the Heriot Bay Inn these days. Big changes are afoot at the historic Inn, thanks to the vision of new owner Lorraine Wright.

"What we're trying to do is take all the good parts of the Heriot Bay Inn from the past and integrate them into a successful future," said Lorraine over the phone on May 2.

Lorraine added that her goal is to retain the Inn's character and its pivotal role in the Quadra Island community, while merging it into a competitive resort operation.

During the summer of 2004. Lorraine launched the Island Adventure Centre at the Heriot Bay Inn. At the time the Inn was under the ownership of Julia Ferrall, and had been on the market for some time.

Lorraine decided to buy the Inn when a passenger on one of her adventure tours told her he wanted to purchase the property and turn it into an upscale, seasonal resort.

"When I heard his plans, I was encouraged to make a decision sooner rather than later. The Heriot Bay Inn should be shared by everyone, not restricted to high end guests for only part of the year," she said.

To that end, Lorraine's motto for the Heriot Bay Inn is "inclusiveness." Affectionately known to locals as the HBI, the Inn is a place where "everyone can come and have fun."

Fulfilling her vision has entailed a huge renovation effort and general sprucing up of the Inn.

Structurally, the HBI is in the process of a major facelift. General manager Steve Addison gave me a tour on April 30. Steve has worked at the Inn for more than 20 years, under three different owners, and speaks very highly of the recent changes.

"It's exciting to work here. The place is looking great and it's changing every day," he said.

As we toured the Inn, several locals working on the renovation stopped to say hello. Paul Puddy, coordinator of construction, said the project has attracted a great deal of interest and support ever since Roy Dahlnas excavated the site in January.

"We've tried to utilize local talent as much as possible, and with so much talent on the island it hasn't been hard to do," Paul said.

We began the tour upstairs, where the Inn's rooms and executive family suite are undergoing a detailed makeover.

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Special touches include handmade artist's tiles in the bathrooms, hemlock flooring, new furniture, and all new paint and moldings.

On the main floor, the former dining room is being transformed into a lounge. The new, much larger dining room, located where the deck used to be, is a bright and welcoming space.

Hefty new beams to match the original ceiling beams were milled by Greg Hewitt, and fir French doors with a unique curved design were made by Roger Link. Stained glass windows by Lasha Mutual add to the coastal theme.

The French doors open onto a new deck overlooking the maple-fringed view of Heriot Bay. Marie Sutherland is landscaping the area in front of the deck, and new tables and chairs will provide the finishing touches.

Ocean-inspired designs in the main floor bathrooms created by artist Steve Trayler are a must-see, as is his orca painting on the large propane tank next to the parking lot. Steve also hand painted the one-of-a-kind signs on the property, and designed the graphics for the dining room menus.

A new kitchen and serving area will add to the improved dining facility. Chefs Jessie Porter and Laszlo Boros are launching an exciting new menu. Steve observed that these changes are necessary to keep up with volume.

"Our current kitchen is maxed right now. If we are going to be as busy as we anticipate, we will need a much bigger kitchen."

On the lower floor is the Island Adventure Centre, where locals and visitors can book their choice of tours. Eye-catching brochures and posters by Robyn Mawhinney

invite adventurers to experience Orca watching tours, grizzly bear expeditions, and tidal whitewater and wildlife tours.

Kayak and mountain bike rentals, full-day and half-day kayaking tours, guided salmon fishing, and fly fishing lessons are also available.

"We've doubled the number of kayaks in our fleet," said Steve, adding that once people see the view they'll want to go kayaking.

Contractor Matt Knoedler and the painting crew were working hard to get the new space ready. By mid-May the adventure centre's covered aluminum Eaglecraft boats will be cruising the waters once again in search of whales and other wildlife.

Adventure centre tour boat operator Vic Nacci can't wait. "I'm chomping at the bit. It sounds like we're going to be busy. Adventure tourism is such a growing industry and people really enjoy seeing the wildlife."

At the end of a day working or touring the Inside Passage, islanders and guests can enjoy live music in the pub. Local and visiting musicians, chosen to please a variety of musical tastes, are featured four nights a week.

"Our live entertainment is a real asset to the island and fun for the community," said Lorraine.

As the new owner of the Heriot Bay Inn, Lorraine admitted to having a lot on her plate, but said she is greatly enjoying the challenge. "It's a privilege to be here and to be doing this."
