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

Friday Flicks -Rosenstrasse

In Rosenstrassse, the most recent feature film by famed German director Margarethe Von Trotta, our attention is turned to three generations of women who are tied to each other through some lesser-known events of the Holocaust. Von Trotta zeroes in on the events of 1943 when a group of Aryan women confronted the Nazi authorities on the Berlin street, Rosenstrasse. Their Jewish husbands were being detained in prison pending deportation to concentration camps. Through the vigorous protest by these brave women, the men were finally released - a miracle given the repression of the time.

Although the story focuses on the dramatic events of the Rosenstrasse protest, the film begins at a much later date when thirtysomething Hanna begins to explore the past of her mother, Ruth, whose residual anger and resentment comes surprisingly to the fore following the death of her husband and Hannah's engagement to a gentile. Her quest for answers is the entry to the story of Ruth's turbulent past., which includes a journey to Germany and a visit to 90 year-old Lena.

Lena is a highborn woman of aristocratic background, who fell in love with and married a brilliant Jewish musician, much to the horror of her parents. Through Lena's reminiscences, we see the wives gathered in vain hope of freeing their spouses against the disturbing backdrop of facism. It is on Rosenstrasse that Lena finds the abandoned Ruth, an eight-year-old girl whose mother has also been detained by the Nazis and whose Aryan father has forsaken his family in order to save himself.

Rosenstrasse endures by continually returning the viewer to sharp and troubling questions. If it were you on the streets of Berlin, could you stand up against what was happening, or would you say it's none of your concern? If your loved one was on the train, would you put on that star and join him, or would you turn away and save your own skin? Rosenstrasse never wavers from looking those issues in the eye, and in doing so it imbues its characters with thoughtful grace. Packed with detail and meticulously photographed.

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CSRD Tsunami Risk Mapping Takes Lead

The Regional District of Comox-Strathcona's (RDCS) plan to do detailed mapping showing flood risk from a tsunami in the Pacific Ocean will be the first work of its kind in any coastal regional district in BC.

"Right now there is no contour mapping below 20 metres available from any source." says Brian Pearson, the RDCS' Manager of Information Services. "Flooding related to a tsunami would most likely affect lands below 20 metres on the west coast of Vancouver Island and below 10 metres on the east coast."

Contour mapping is a process of digital photo interpretation. Contours are the lines of elevation from a known point, such as sea level. By developing detailed contours for the coastal areas of the RDCS, there will be a way to determine tsunami flood risk to the populated areas of the regional district.

"We will generate mapping that we can make available to the communities within our borders to help all local governments within the regional district understand and plan for the risks associated with a tsunami," said Jim Abram, chair of the RDCS board of directors. "We expect the mapping to take approximately three months to complete."

The provincial government has made \$20,000 funding available to be used to develop mapping, plans or protection for a tsunami. The RDCS will map the populated areas of the west coast, as well as the entire east coast within its borders.. The east coast mapping will also include Quadra, Cortes, Denman and Hornby Islands and populated portions of the islands of Desolation Sound. When the mapping is complete it will be available to the general public on Imap found on the RDCS website at www.rdcs.bc.ca.

The regional district will apply for further funding to complete the contour mapping for the entire west coast of the RDCS.

The RDCS is a partnership of nine electoral areas and eight municipalities providing nearly 100,000 residents with over 140 services - from parks to full-service sports facilities to regional solid waste systems.





She awakens our gardening passion with the brilliant flower colours of the cultivated varieties, or for some, the subtler tones of the species. The texture of her evergreen leaves contrast so nicely with the native trees and ground hugging ferns. On Monday November 14th 7 pm, the Garden Club presents Paul Wurz, local Rhodo expert, and President of the North Island Rhododendron Society. Paul operates a small nursery, Hidden Acres Rhodos on the north side of Campbell River, near Mystic Woods. He will teach us about propagating, and caring for Rhodos including fertilizing, mulching, and pruning. He will also discuss how to manage or prevent disease (mildew), and pests (root weevil).

Adopt a U.S. War Resister

I met with five U.S. war resisters and their families last week in Nanaimo. All the guys had been to Iraq and refused to return to Iraq. Their horrible experiences in Iraq (really beyond words!) have transformed them from volunteer career soldiers to outspoken and articulate antiwar activists. The problem they face is Canada has denied these U.S. war resisters refugee status in Canada, even though they face a 3 to 5 year prison term or redeployment to Iraq.

Their case is being appealed to the Supreme Courtof Canada. But clearly, Canada is no longer the "refuge from militarism" that Trudeau proclaimed. As a Vietnam war resister, I came to Canada with 50.000 like minded friends & we had no problem coming. Today, times are different and times are tough. Today's war resisters are in a very scary political and economic position. Only one of the five former soldiers has a work permit, which takes six monts to obtain.

So, the other four have no way to make a living and welfare has refused to help so far. For example, Josh and Brandi and their four kids have been living in a one bedroom basement apartment in Victoria for 5 months rent-free. But now, they have a place more suitable for 4 kids but it's \$800 a month rent. The rent was due in one week and of course, the anti-war Canadians at the meeting came up with the money but it's not easy. That's why a request was made for North Islanders to help. Rents are cheaper up here.

Most resisters come in Couples (husband & wife) with one or no kids. Can Quadra Island or Cortes Island each adopt a War Resister and their family. Is there anyone who has a cabin or a trailer on their property that can provide shelter for a war resister until they can get a work permit and/or win their case at the Supreme Court? Rent is the main expense. Our Quadra Food Bank, the community lunch, the medical clinic, the free money program and odd jobs should be able to take care of most of the other needs. Wild Horses – Unconquered People

David Williams is President of the Friends of Nemiah Valley, an area in the Chilcotin Plateau. He will talk and show slides of the the Xeni Gwet'in people, one of the six bands in the Chilcotin Nation. Part of the Xeni Gwet'in territory includes the Brittany Triangle which is the home to approximately 250 wild horses roaming the area in bands of 10-17 animals. Today there is a major court case in process to determine the rights and title to the Xeni Gwet'in lands and the subsequent future of these wild horses which have been there since before contact with white men. David's slides capture the stunning wild beauty of the horses. He will also discuss the relationship of the Xeni Gwet'in people to the horses and their land.

The Xeni Gwet'in have stood up for their land against intrusion by the white men. First they stopped the construction of a road into Butte Inlet in 1862 and more recently in 1991, they blockaded logging roads into the Brittany Triangle, home of the wild horses. As a result of this action they are now in court with the federal and provincial government defining who has rights and title to the lands.

This promises to be a fascinating evening of wild animals, BC's history and the issues of a people fighting for their existence.

Area J Regional Director's Report

November 7, 2005

would like to thank all of the people who wrote very nice comments in the last issue and those who sent congratulatory emails and phone calls regarding my serving another term as your Regional District (RD) Director for the Discovery Islands - Mainland Inlets, Area J. It is an honour for me to represent you once again. I love doing this work and it amazes me every day how, through cooperation and lots of hard work, we are able to accomplish most anything we put our minds to. There are always some disappointments, but they are not in the majority. This points to a maturing community (i am not talking about our ages, folks!) and a far more responsive local government. I am proud to have been part of that evolution, both within the community and at the Board table, and will continue to work towards further positive development at both levels. Once again, thanks so very much for your support!.

Safety Committee

I was pleased when I received a call to attend the re-birth of the Safety Committee that I had been part of establishing back in 1990. Cpl. Rick Fraser of the RCMP chaired a meeting that included representatives from all of the safety service providers and various other organizations from the island. It was a very good introductory meeting and a good opportunity to talk over the past, present and future needs of the island. Our emergency planning process at the RD was a lengthy topic of discussion. We are legislated to have a plan in place by Dec. 31st of this year at the regional level. We will meet again in the new year and go from there.

In the meantime I have put pressure on the RD to get on with island involvement in the plan.

Road Issues

I cannot believe the number of issues that are brought to my attention for action regarding issues with roads. Roads are a Provincial jurisdiction and we pay handsomely for them as you will see on your annual tax notice (Provincial Rural Tax - includes roads and policing). Having said that, our local contractor for road maintenance, Emcon Services, do not have the staff, equipment nor budget to keep up with the expanding needs of this island. They DO try, with what they have. So this is where I get involved. When things don't get done to the satisfaction of the public, our local government representative (that would be me!) gets called and I have to try and get the Ministry of Transportation and Highways to deal with the needs of the community. I have received excellent cooperation from the people whom I have to deal with in Courtenay but they too, are short of funds... So, where does all of this end up? It all points to the obvious.. the Provincial Government does not provide enough money to the local Ministry officials nor to the local contractors to deal with the increased needs of a developing island.

I do my best to lobby on your behalf to get all items looked after. Some take longer than others (Granite Bay Road/Kanish Bay Road), but eventually we get results. I will be asking for a tour of the island roads with Highways and Emcon officials to mark all of the spots that need immediate and future attention.

Raven Bay

The RD application to keep this in the public domain has hit a snag. The Ministry of Forests is apparently in discussion with the Cape Mudge Band over the awarding of a wood lot in this area. I have met twice with Band officials regarding the use of

the area that the recreational/tourism sector needs for their use and we will meet again to see if we can come to an agreement on how to make this work. I will keep you informed as this develops.

Post Offices and Wharves

I will have met again with the federal Minister's Regional Office in Vancouver to discuss the above and other issues, by the time you read this report. The Federal government bureaucracy continues to take away services from rural areas and yet we see no reduction in our taxes paid to them for those services. They have a responsibility to maintain these services for rural residents if they expect people to live in these areas and contribute to the economy. The politicians at the highest levels understand this but somehow it gets lost in translation at the lower levels. So, I am working at the highest levels to get them to take control of their bureaucracies. This was exactly the same with the lightstations and the foghorns.... bureaucrats not listening to their political bosses. I'll let you know how that works out. A number of post offices and wharves in Area I are effected by these short-sighted initiatives.

Court Rules PEI May Sue D.F.O./Feds

PEI Supreme Court Justice Gordon Campbell (not our Campbell) ruled today that PEI can sue the federal government for federal mismanagement of the fishery.

The PEI government - obviously more concerned about the fishing industry than holding hands with Paul Martin - is suing the federal government for abusing its licensing authority; for failing to protect and encourage the fishery as required by PEI's Terms of Union (virtually identical terms to BC); and for breach of public trust i.e. the public right to fish.

The PEI Provincial Government claims as part of the grounds for its case:

"The fishery in Canada is a common property resource that is managed by Canada or the Minister, or both, as trustee, or fiduciary, and for the benefit of all Canadians, as beneficiaries. As such they are required to comply with all common law obligations that pertain to that role. Those common law responsibilities include the duty to act in good faith, to act in the interests of all the beneficiaries and to avoid conflicts of interest, to preserve the fishery, to act prudently, to treat all beneficiaries impartially and with an even hand and to furnish information and reasons to persons affected by his decisions, to Islanders and Canadians generally, about the management of the fishery. For ease of reference, these obligations are referred to as the public trust obligations."

The federal government tried to have the case dismissed on a number of grounds but failed though some of the grounds of the lawsuit were curtailed.

The Court quoted Lord Denning from a 1976 English decision:

"I regard it as a matter of high constitutional principal that if there is good ground for supposing that a government department or public authority is transgressing the law, or is about to transgress it, in a way which offends or injures thousands of Her Majesty's subjects, then any one of those offended or injured can draw it to the courts of law and seek to have the law enforced, and the courts in their discretion can grant whatever remedy is appropriate."

This decision will be appealed through the system and we will keep you posted as we get more results. In the meantime, the decision is encouragement for those of us who are preparing to sue FOC for its long reign of chaos and destruction in the BC fishery and its abuse of the people in our industry.

Tips to make high tech work on Island time

Keep it Clean Under the Hood

our trusty computer sits in the corner or under your desk, whirring away (fairly) reliably, so that you don't even think about it or about what's going on under the cover. However, sometimes there are unusual sounds coming from the there, and you know it isn't the result of the slice of pizza you had for lunch. Actually, looking under the hood and doing some basic maintenance a couple of times a year can extend the life of your computer and avoid a \$\$ trip to the repair shop.

Most of the computers we put on our repair bench are clogged with dust and excess files - they need physical and virtual cleaning. A computer box is generally outfitted with three fans (in the power supply, on top of the main processor--CPU, and somewhere in the box) to allow cooling around and over the system's electronic components. However much you clean and dust your house, your computer will suck in tiny bits and deposit them, mainly on the places that need cooling. For instance, the fins (heat sink) on top of the CPU often accumulate enough dust that the heat created by this component cannot dissipate. Overheating can cause system crashes (or worse burnout of the CPU).

The good news is that you don't need an engineering degree to clean the dirt out just a vacuum cleaner that can work as a blower and a Philips screwdriver to remove the screws at the back edge of the case. (Dell. Hewlett Packard and IBM have their own interesting ways to access the innards, check the manual). Once you get the lid off (you did remove the power plug first, right?), carry the box outside, plug in your reversed vacuum cleaner, and give the insides a good toot (try not to breathe in the dust.) Before you put the lid back on, you might also check that the cables and adapter cards are properly seated. First, touch some metal part of the box (to get rid of any static electricity you may be packing), and then gently push down on the top of any card that's plugged into the main board. While you're at it, check that the cables are seated in the hard drive, cd, and floppy. Refasten the lid, hook the keyboard, mouse, etc. back up (you do remember where they all go, don't you?), and power up.

Next, delete useless files. As always, back up your important files first. Windows and other programs create temporary files; when you save your work and exit, this temp file is supposed to be deleted. Program glitches, power blips, operator error can all result in a temp file being left to occupy space on your hard drive. As well, your excursions on the Internet are preserved in the "Temporary Internet folder" in order to make it quicker to access the information on those sites when you go back there again. All this stuff accumulates, and may even cause the system to operate strangely (to say nothing of leaving a trail of your computing habits).

Getting rid of many useless files can be as simple as using the Windows "Disk Cleanup". Open "My Computer," right click on your C: drive and then select (left click) "Properties." Click the "Disk Cleanup" button and you will soon get a windows showing unnecessary files and an estimate of the space on your drive that will be recovered by deleting these. Restart the computer and go on to the next part - checking the hard drive for errors and defragmenting the files.

First turn off your antivirus program (right click its icon --somewhere near the time stamp in the lower right corner- to temporarily disable it); otherwise, the disk checking program may endlessly restart because of the virus checker's constant surveillance. Start "My Computer" again, right click the C: drive, go to properties and left click, and this time select the "Tools" tab at the top of the window. You want to check for errors (tick the "Automatically fix disk errors" box). You may have to restart to perform the scan, but when it's completed, go back to the "Tools" area and select "Defragmentation" which will reorganize the drive's file system for more efficient operation. After this is done, your computer will run better, and you can take your special friend out to dinner because you just saved \$50.

For those who want to try deeper cleaning I can recommend Easy Clean, a free utility that eliminates many different kinds of useless files and settings.

BC Hydro program supports Aboriginalowned businesses in BC

\$150,000 in grants available to Aboriginal business ventures

PROVINCE-WIDE - BC Hydro has relaunched its Aboriginal Business Partnership Program, designed to support Aboriginalowned business ventures in British Columbia. The program provides grants of up to \$10,000 to help existing businesses expand their operations and get new businesses started. The application deadline is December 16th, 2005, and the successful applicants will be notified during the first week of February, 2006.

"If we can support a number of viable First Nation businesses with seed funding to a point that one day these Aboriginal businesses will supply their communities and beyond with services, I would consider this program a success," said BC Hydro Aboriginal Relations and Negotiations co-ordinator, Darrell Mounsey.

Now in its sixth year, the ABPP has provided support to more than 120 Aboriginal businesses in B.C., including Musqueam, Salishan Catering services and Lavinia's Bed and Breakfast in Gingolx.

To be eligible for a grant, a business must be at least 51 per cent owned by an Aboriginal person or persons and have a viable business plan and meet BC Hydro's Aboriginal Business Partnership Program compliance criteria. The applications will be evaluated by an impartial evaluation committee, and must include a detailed business plan and budget. Applications will be accepted until December 16, 2005, and successful recipients will be notified on February 1, 2006.

Tips to make high tech work on Island time

Coffee to Go

n July 1st, 2005, Len Wolfe celebrated his 10th year in business in Q Cove serving a fine cup of espresso. Len recalled that while waiting for the ferry one day, he thought, "Man, I wouldn't mind a coffee right now" and the idea for Dockers was born.

"When I was in the movie business a guy used to come around with a mobile coffee and sandwich shop. Later, when I decided to start my own business his example came to mind."

Len bought a flatbed horse trailer and built his coffee shop on top of it. "Since it was going to be a one-man operation I had to design it for efficiency."


Inside the compact space, everything is close at hand. The end result is an insulated, mobile unit equipped with a heater, skylight and a sliding window.

Key to Len's business concept was his desire to serve excellent coffee. For this he needed a top of the line espresso machine. Len began looking for machines and found an ad for a 'La San Marco'.

La San Marco has been making espresso machines in Italy since 1920. Len's model, the 85-S, has been called the Cadillac of espresso machines. He maintains it himself and can vouch for its quality and reliability.

The 85-S is a partially automated two-station machine. It has an external pump, allowing room for a dedicated 12-litre steam boiler and separate heat exchangers for each station. This system optimizes temperature control by keeping water for brewing at the ideal temperature, while freeing up the boiler for uninterrupted steaming.

Len builds each coffee individually by varying the amount and density of the grounds. This means he can customize your latté or cappuccino to taste while making coffee

quickly. Many of the modern commercial machines are pre-programmed and dispense a standardized cup of coffee.

Anyone who has seen Len at work just before the ferry departs can attest to both his efficiency and skill while serving a top quality espresso.

Bob's Hair Services

uadra resident Bob Cameron considers his business, Bob's Hair Services, to be a community effort. Since moving here six years ago, Bob has experienced great support from islanders while working for other business and, most recently, in his selfemployment.

"I'm very grateful. The influence and support of the Quadra community has been almost overwhelming," Bob said.

Islanders may remember Bob working at People's Drug Mart and the Heriot Bay Store. He cooks brunches and gourmet dinners at the Gateway Café, and his oil paintings have been featured in island art shows. For a time, Bob offered a service called 'Consider It Done' that specialised in odd jobs.

"People have responded positively to everything I've done here. Every time I've had an art show, every catering endeavour has been well supported."

Going into hairdressing involved a big career change for Bob, and he was grateful to have the community behind him. It all started when his hairdresser, Karina Rose at Village Hair, suggested that Bob's people skills and knowledge of colour theory from painting would combine well in the hairdressing field.

Bob did some research into training institutions and found out about the Comox Valley Beauty School, which offers a 10-month, hands-on program in Hair Design.

"I started school from scratch, not even knowing how to put a roller in someone's hair. It was a tough course and involved a lot more theory than I expected, but I really enjoyed it from day one. Hairdressing is a great fit for me."

The school operates as a teaching salon with students offering discount haircutting services to the public while they are learning.

"I realised right away how happy I could make someone just by washing and cutting their hair," Bob commented.

Bob arranged a weekly rental in Courtenay and weekend rental on Quadra through Sandy Spearing. This unique living arrangement allowed him to return home for Saturday and Sunday each week.

Thanks to a student loan, a loan from Quadra Credit Union for supplies and equipment, and income he generated by cooking brunches at Gateway on the weekends, Bob was able to put himself through the 1,500-hour program. He also had the assurance of his former boss, Gerry Enns from the Heriot Bay Store, that his job would be waiting for him if hairdressing didn't work out.

Bob practiced his new hairdressing skills on various "brave islanders" during his days at home. "I was booking 10 or 12 clients every Saturday. I would tell them, 'You're my third haircut.' I also did some work experience at Village Hair. My going to school was definitely a community effort."

He completed his studies on September 1, 2005, with a 97% average and seven awards for outstanding academic achievements and professionalism. Several of Bob's "guinea pigs" have now become regular clients.

Bob said he was very happy to come back to Quadra full time to set up his business. He developed a business plan, and Quadra Credit Union came through again with financing.

"Quadra Credit Union has been very supportive. I'm really focused on creating my own business here on Quadra. Living and working here is the major advantage," Bob told me.


Bob's Hair Services offers hair cutting and styling, straightening, roller sets, updos, and scalp massages with a special vitamin E cream.

One thing that sets Bob's business apart is his mobile service. Bob's clients have the choice of coming to his home-based salon on Gowlland Harbour Road or arranging for him to come to them. Another unique aspect of Bob's business is that he offers flexible hours. He is happy to cut a client's hair early in the morning or in the evening. Bob stated that clients who work full time or irregular hours find this very useful.

or the last few days I have been wracking my brain for the subject of this column, given that I wanted to write something with some punch to it. I reviewed my collection of material saved for later commentary, and surfed my way around my favourite websites looking for that particular spark I needed. In the end, out of sheer curiosity I looked back at my stacks, a collection of Discovery Islanders. "20/20 Hindsight" was the title of my piece in the November 7/03 (#304) issue, a review of progress in the Iraqi war, then in its relative infancy. We had not yet heard about Abu Gharib, reconstruction was beginning, and at that point the published US casualty count was 359 dead young men and women. At the time, criticism of the war was considered unpatriotic in the US, though questions about the conduct of the war were becoming much more commonplace. I wrote, "Such a situation clearly calls for objective and critical analysis, which some falsely label unpatriotic and unsupportive of the troops. Wearing blinders is no way to learn from mistakes, as much of the US population are now coming to see the situation in Iraq. Further, the responsibility lies squarely with the White House, making it a legitimate target for criticism...". Hindsight is indeed 20/20.

The current published count is now 2,043 American service people killed in combat, and 15,353 wounded. We don't know how many Iraqi civilians have died, but the most conservative estimate I could locate put the number at 26,797. I personally have little faith in any of these numbers, believing them to be much higher. What is worse, the US at present has no plan for departure from Iraq. It takes no crystal ball to foresee continuing (indeed, likely worsening) casualties on all sides so long as Iraq remains essentially under US occupation, newly minted Constitution or not. This quagmire (as it is now commonly and accurately labelled) has been getting worse these last 2 years, no matter the spin emanating from White House and Pentagon press briefings. Fortunately, the number of Americans speaking out has been steadily increasing, and current polls show that the public is getting very tired of the second Bush administration agenda.

I googled my way to Gallup's website, and found the following current poll numbers. 63% of the population surveyed were dissatisfied with the state of the country, versus 26 % in February of 1999. Only 41% of those surveyed approve of Bush's performance, the worst rating since Nixon's just prior to his resigning in disgrace. Only 29% are confident in the economy, versus 74% in August of 2000. 64% disapprove of Bush's handling the situation in Iraq, whereas 75% approved in April of 2003. Finally, 60% felt the Iraq War was not worth fighting - only 27% expressed such an opinion two and a half years earlier. I'm no statistician but I can sure recognize a trend when I see one. The unwinding of the Bush administration is occurring before our very eyes. Unfortunately the cost to the USA of the misadventures launched by this administration is huge; in dollars, lives, credibility and confidence lost. Worse, Bush will admit to nothing, will not change course, and will not listen to others. This is a train wreck in progress.

While we in Canada suffer a government that is mired in corruption and political inaction, the American public is being treated to a government mired in corruption, bureaucratic incompetence, cronyism and most recently perjury and obstruction of justice.

While we in Canada suffer a government that is mired in corruption and political inaction, the American public is being treated to a government mired in corruption, bureaucratic incompetence, cronvism and most recently perjury and obstruction of justice. 2005 has been a far worse "annus horribilus" for Bush than that suffered by Elizabeth II some years ago, and it would surprise me not at all to see 2006 deliver more blows to this already reeling lame duck presidency. The "Plamegate" affair is far from over, and the evidence trails reach the offices of both the President and the Vice-President. Worsening relations in the Middle East are bound to hamper any progress in that region, and as we learn more about the recently "outted" information regarding US interrogation centres in East Europe the reputation of the US as a shining beacon of democracy will tarnish even further. The US economy is suffering under a crushing burden of debt and deficits, and rising interest rates will only exacerbate the problem. It may be hard to believe, but it is almost inevitable that worse is yet to come for the long suffering US public.

It boggles the mind how fast things have gone so wrong. In November of 2000 the USA boasted an expanding economy, growing budget surpluses and excellent external relations. Clinton was greeted warmly wherever he travelled, and he travelled a lot to avoid the "Monica" scandal. Today, Bush is sheltered from the protests that erupt wherever he travels, including to some destinations within the US itself. Trade issues have strained Canadian and American relations, though the "war on terror" has contributed to the stresses as well. When speaking to US relations, the global response by people around the world has been "We have no problem with the US people - but we have a real problem with your government."Twenty

years ago no one could have predicted such a state of affairs - nor, more remarkably, even a scant 5 years ago. George W. Bush has indeed done more damage in that time than anyone could have believed possible upon his scandal ridden election victory in 2000.

You will be reading these words around Remembrance Day, a day we set aside to remember those who gave their lives in order to allow us to enjoy the freedoms we now take for granted. Called Veteran's Day in the US, the day will have a much deeper meaning to many Americans, particularly those who have husbands or wives or children serving in Iraq, and especially to those who have lost a loved one in this increasingly questioned war. It must be horrible to lose someone to war. It must be doubly awful to lose someone in a war that should never have happened, and worse yet happened under the rubric of invented circumstance.

Yes, hindsight is 20/20, but is of absolutely no value at all unless one learns something from looking back. Many have learned some hard lessons over the last few years, but those in ultimate power seemed to have learned nothing at all. But we can hope that those who put these people in power - the US electorate - have learned, and learned well enough to enact change to end this train wreck of an administration. The mid-term elections in November 2006 will tell the tale.
