Quadra Island Builds Seniors Housing

The Quadra Island Seniors Housing Society has begun construction of affordable, duplex rental units, specifically designed for seniors, in Quathiaski Cove. Until now, many seniors have been forced to move off Quadra when they could no longer maintain their home and property. These independent living homes will allow seniors to continue to live in and contribute to their community.

Thanks to a Job Creation Partnership with the Ministry of Housing and Social Development sponsored by the Canada - British Columbia Labour Market Development Agreement, the Society expects to complete one duplex for low to moderate income seniors by this year end. After many years of dedicated fundraising and volunteerism, the Quadra Island community is very happy to have received this Job Creation funding to begin the much needed housing. The Society is in the process of seeking additional grants to complete a second duplex this year.

The one acre property was donated many years ago by Bill O'Connor of Quathiaski Cove. The Strathcona Regional District and the former Comox Strathcona Regional District have been very supportive of this project, both financially and through permits and zoning. The

Development Permit allows a total of three duplexes (6 units) to be built. The Coastal Community Credit Union has donated a substantial grant through the Quadra Branch's Legacy Fund. Many of the tradespeople working on this project will be donating a portion of their time. A unique fundraising strategy was used when the \$1000 Club was established - thirty six community members to date have joined this special Seniors Housing Support Club.

The Society would like to thank the Ministry of Housing and Social Development, the Strathcona Regional District, Coastal Community Credit Union, the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 154, Quadra Island Seniors Br.91 of BC O.A.P.O., the Real Estate Foundation of BC, Telus, and the community's generous donors of cash and services.



ISLAND FORUM

Enbridge, cousin of Enron: another disaster coming soon to a beach near you.

Remember: whatever the name of the legislation or the headline touted, the opposite is always true. And I was reminded of that fact recently reading the Campbell River Mirror and Pender's Island Tides.

Enbridge Northern Gateways (an oil pipeline company) is advertising in some selected local papers along the coast: MAKING BC's NORTH COAST SAFER. They are not doing so, of course. Instead, they are using full-page 'info-ads' to 'educate us' into accepting increased oil tanker traffic in our waters. They are not selling anything but misdirection and false security. It is oil company propaganda designed to comfort us regarding the tanker traffic risk along and down the west coast. This effort at diminishing the danger is, of course, ludicrous. Read British Petroleum's similar statements to local residents regarding their operations in the Gulf of Mexico prior to this year. Making it safer is what they are saying. Imperiling the coast is what they are doing.

Enbridge promises third party inspections of ships adhering to their own stringent high standards. You know, like the Exxon Valdez or even BC's own Northern ferry lived up to their high standards? They promise advanced radar systems. They believe that radar will effectively deal with the Graveyard of the Pacific (a name by which the west coast is often referred). They promise to build custom tugs (is there any other kind?) to tether both ends of the ship when it is underway along coastal shipping routes which should make for interesting new forms of marine disaster. They will add new navigational aids (since our government won't do it and has reduced safety standards on the coast in every way including eliminating manned lighthouses). And they will add container booms around ships when in harbour which have proved completely inadequate in virtually every instance where spills have occurred.

They are proposing all this with government's approval, of

course. Enbridge proudly points to Transport Canada as their overseer. You know, like fish farms proudly point to DFO? Like log exporters proudly point to the Ministry of Forests or General Electric proudly points to the Ministry of Energy? It's like having Tinkerbelle monitor the Hell's Angels. One comforting fact: according to the ads they are employing master mariners on their ships. I guess all those other sinkings, groundings and accidents on the coast were because of amateurs at the helm, eh?

And Big Oil is saying that their increased business will foster sustainable communities along the coast. How? If the ship and it's contents never touch any aspect of our shore, it may prove financially sustainable for them since they are part of the Big Oil monopoly. But how will it foster anything like that in local communities? And, should they have an accident and all the oil hits our beaches, how will they restore life to the sea, replicate the species killed and sustain community as we now know it on the coast? It could be another lie. Waddya think?

Propaganda. PR. Spin. It was called Newspeak by Orwell. It was called Bullshit by my father. I can't find the right word because it is more evil than that.

What kind of nincompoop would advertise this nonsense? What kind of fool would believe it? And, worse, why do we have politicians who even consider imperiling our coast in this or any way?

Salmon Aquaculture -The Real Opportunity

With a growing human population and overfished oceans, there is an ever-increasing global demand for aquaculture products like farmed salmon.

In recent years, the salmon farming industry in B.C. has been unable to fully realize the benefits of this growing demand because of legitimate environmental concerns associated with raising salmon in open net-pens.

By farming salmon in these open net-pens, as is the current industry practice, fish waste passes directly into the ocean. Published, peer-reviewed science overwhelmingly supports that by having a large number of animals together in these open systems, naturally occurring diseases and parasites can increase in number and be transmitted to wild species such as juvenile wild salmon.

As a result, industry has lost its social license to expand, jobs are insecure and British Columbia is missing out on an economic opportunity.

The opportunity is that B.C. is uniquely positioned to establish a viable, sustainable industry by moving from open net-pens to closed containment production systems.

Closed containment production systems essentially place a solid wall between the farm environment and the marine environment. Diseases and parasites can't pass through and waste is captured. By being better able to control conditions for the salmon, growth rates would likely accelerate and the nutrient laden waste can be captured to grow aquaponic crops like lettuce and tomatoes. See www.saveoursalmon.ca for discussion of the technology and economics related to land-based closed containment salmon farming.

Projects to apply this technology to commercial scale operations are now under development. In fact, the technology and equipment are already in use to raise juvenile farmed salmon for the open net-pen industry.

B.C. is in a very strong position to assume world market leadership for sustainably raised farmed

salmon given the province's existing resources and experience: plentiful clean water; favorably priced hydroelectricity; the ability to reasonably lease Crown land and an existing workforce skilled in salmon farming techniques.

Better regulation and a move to closed containment systems will restore public confidence in B.C.'s salmon aquaculture industry and allow B.C. to lead in meeting the increased

global demand for sustainably farmed salmon. Industry would have more certainty in decisionmaking and more job opportunities would result.

Closed containment aquaculture is a real opportunity - the solution whereby British Columbians can have their wild salmon and farmed salmon too.





City responds to Catalyst Elk Falls closure announcement

"It's not the kind of news the community hoped to hear, and our first thought is for the employees and their families whose lives are most affected by this announcement," said Mayor Charlie Cornfield after learning that Catalyst Paper had confirmed its intention to permanently close its Elk Falls mill.

"Council agrees we can't take the loss of a major employer lightly, especially when we factor in the economic spin-off created by that employment and the multi-millions of dollars they've paid in tax revenue over the years," the Mayor added.

The company was clear that a combination of factors led to its decision to close the mill.

"Council is confident that between a steady reduction in taxation for major industry since 2002, and efforts to work with the company and the provincial government to keep the mill viable, the City did everything reasonable to prepare for this day," the Mayor affirmed.

"While it's difficult to reach the end of an era, the company's decision opens the door for new initiatives at the site, and we can now move forward with certainty," the Mayor concluded. "We live in a resilient community, and we look forward to working with Catalyst to explore other options for the mill site."

At last night's meeting, Council passed a resolution directing staff to provide a report on anticipated taxation implications of the mill closure.



Strathcona Park's 100 Year History Unfolds

CAMPBELL RIVER - It was July 7, 1910 that the Hon. Price Ellison and his party of keen adventurers arrived on the quiet shores of Campbell River to begin a landmark journey in British Columbia's history.

Ellison, his 20 year old daughter Myra and an assortment of timber cruisers, naturalists, packers and canoe men from the Cowichan First Nation were dispatched by the Premier Sir Richard McBride to explore the Strathcona Reserve and assess its suitability for a park. Over five weeks they paddled and poled tons of supplies up the turbulent Campbell River, assailed the steep forested slopes and craggy summit of Crown Mountain and arrived triumphant in Port Alberni on August 11, 1910.

When Ellison made his report to cabinet the result was the Strathcona Act of 1911 bringing into legislation the province's first Provincial Park on March 1. To celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of Ellison's adventure, members of the Strathcona Park Public Advisory Committee and BC Parks have organized a re-enactment that will depart Campbell River on July 22 to retrace the steps of the 1910 party.

While the wild waters of the Campbell River have been tamed by dams and modern navigation aids give a much better picture of the task ahead, there remains a great sense of adventure ahead for the 25 or so British Columbians engaged in this exciting project.

Expedition organizer and local mountaineer Philip Stone says the idea for a recreation has been hatching for some time. "So many people, ideas and energy had to come together to make the Strathcona Centennial Expedition the successful celebration of British Columbia's history it deserves to be" Stone said. "Everyone involved have come from a wide range of places and backgrounds, but we all share a deep sense of pride and awareness of the importance of Strathcona Park. Special thanks goes to NVI Mining Ltd. and Strathcona Park Lodge for all their help and support".

The expedition will spend three weeks making the same trip and although much of that will be spent in the backcountry there are several points where the public are invited to join the party to celebrate and find out more about the history and trek. First is the departure day on July 22nd, 2010. The expedition group will be welcoming well wishers

at the Tyee Spit in CampbelL River between 9:30 and 11 am before setting off.

Next is an official ceremony hosted by BC Parks at the Buttle Narrows Parks HQ on Sunday, August 1, 2010. Everyone is invited to join in a dedication to the 1910 expedition and celebrations at 1 pm. the Parks HQ is just south of the Highway 28 bridge on Western Mines Rd. 50 km west of Campbell River. Wrapping things up are events at the Alberni Valley Heritage Centre at 7 pm Saturday, August 7 and a final farewell at the Fairmont Empress in Victoria at 11 am Monday, August 9th, 2010.

Be a part of BC's history this summer and join the Strathcona Centennial Expedition as they explore our first Provincial Park and watch for details of BC Parks 100 throughout 2011.

BC Hydro announces fiscal results for 2010

VANCOUVER - BC Hydro today announced its financial results for fiscal 2010, including a consolidated net income of \$447 million for the year ended March 31, 2010, which is \$82 million higher than the prior year's net income.

"Overall, our financial results for fiscal 2010 were in line with expectations," said Charles Reid, BC Hydro Executive Vice-President and Chief Financial Officer. "In spite of difficult economic conditions during the year, the impact on results of weaker domestic demand and low commodity prices was mitigated by BC Hydro not being required to purchase as much energy from the market to meet domestic load needs as was the case in the prior year.

Mandatory Smoke Alarms in Older Dwellings

For your information, changes to the BC Fire Code have now come into effect requiring every private dwelling, motel and hotel room, including those built before 1979, to have working smoke alarms. These smoke alarms are required to be installed and maintained according to local bylaws. They may be viewed at http://www. housing.gov.bc.ca/building/consultation/smoke_ alarms/index.html

Buildings used as dwellings built after 1979 have already been required to have working smoke detectors. Smoke alarms should be tested monthly to insure they are functioning properly and detectors more than ten years old should be replaced.

HALLIDAY'S VIEWPOINT

IME TO GROW UP

s at the time of writing Canada has lost 150 men and women serving the Canadian Armed Forces in Afghanistan since Private Nathan Smith, 26, of Tatamagouche, NS became the 1st, on April 18, 2002, in a most unfortunate "friendly fire" incident. The latest, Master Corporal Kristal Giesebrecht, 34 years old from Wallaceburg, Ontario, was killed June 26, 2010 by an improvised explosive device, more commonly known as a bomb.

In almost every one of these deaths we know the when, where and how they came to die...in none of them do we really know why. Why were they there? I mean, what's the real reason - not the Osama bin Laden/Taliban smokescreen. Why are we an occupying force in Afghanistan? This is the type of question that I was asking myself on July 1st as Canada celebrated its 143rd birthday, and this thought morphed into a question of who we are rather than why we are there. After all, Canada has never gone to war on our own initiative, only at the behest of others, be it the King, the UN or in the case of Afghanistan, the US President.

Canada in 1867 was more of an idea than a country, in some respects very much like a young child in that we were only capable of tentative steps, everyone around us was much bigger, and we really had little idea of who we were and why we were here. All most "Canadians" knew was that they would rather be here than there, whether "there" was the UK, the Ukraine, the USA or Southeast Asia, which were the originating regions for most of Canada's immigrant population. Our then- Prime Minister was born in Glasgow, Scotland. So the concept of Canada was very vague then...in fact even our name was in doubt. It was still under discussion as late as 1866 - writing in 1865, Thomas D'Arcy McGee spoke to the

Quebec Legislature of the subject. "One individual chooses Tuponia and another Hochelega, as a suitable name for the new nationality. Now I would ask any honourable member of this House how he would feel if he woke up some fine morning and found himself, instead of a Canadian, a Tuponian or a Hochelagander?". The same year, in that same legislative chamber, arose a discussion of what our emblem should be. Sir Henri-Gustave Joly de Lotbiniere passionately (and I would suggest presciently) addressed the House with his vision.

"Since we cannot find a comparison on the poor earth emblematic of our future greatness, let us borrow one from the heavens at the risk of losing ourselves in the clouds with the advocates of Confederation; I propose the adoption of the rainbow as our emblem. By the endless variety of its tints the rainbow will give an excellent idea of the diversity of races, religions, sentiments and interests of the different parts of Confederation. By its slender and elongated form, the rainbow would afford a perfect representation of the geographical configuration of Confederation. By its lack of consistence - an image without substance - the rainbow would represent aptly the solidity of our Confederation. An emblem we must have, for every great empire has one; let us adopt the rainbow."

An especially accurate depiction of our country was penned by George Monro Grant after accompanying Sir Sanford Fleming's expedition across Canada in 1872. "Travel a thousand miles up a great river, more than a thousand along great lakes and a succession of smaller lakes, a thousand miles across rolling prairies, and another thousand miles through woods and over three great ranges of mountains, and you have travelled Ocean to Ocean through Canada. All this Country is a single Colony of the British Empire; and this Colony is dreaming magnificent dreams when it shall be the

"Greater Britain", and the highway across which the fabrics and products of Asia shall be carried, to the

East as well as the Western sides of the Atlantic". Some 60 years later, in 1936 W.L. Mackenzie King spoke to the House of Commons about Canada, with a somewhat different view than Grant. "We are fortunate in both our neighbours and our lack of neighbours. It may be that this fortunate position is not due to any special virtue on our part, that it is an accident of geography and of history, but one has only to be in any European country a day to realize how relatively fortunate a position it is, and what folly it would be to throw it away. It is equally true, I should add, that if some countries have too much history, we have too much geography."

It was clear to all that Canada was a special place, a place like no other on earth, and had a destiny far beyond that envisioned by its founders. In 1939, on the eve of global war, Sir Winston Churchill described Canada thusly in a speech to the Canada Club in London; "That long frontier from the Atlantic to the Pacific, guarded only by neighbourly respect and honourable obligations, is an example to every country and a pattern for the future of the world." This at a time when Canada was still regarded as backwater in most respects. Even Adolph Hitler had an opinion of Canada. In a 1940 speech Hitler said "In Canada, for example, there are 2.6 persons per square mile; in other countries perhaps 16, 18, 20 or 26 persons. Well, no matter how stupidly one managed one's affairs in such a country, a decent living would still be possible." Apparently Hitler underestimated Canada, as he did many other things.

Bruce Hutchison, newspaper writer and author, wrote perceptively about his native country in 1942, in words that hold true today as they did then - "No one knows my country, neither the stranger nor its own sons. My country is hidden in the dark and teeming brain of youth upon the eve of its manhood. My country has not found itself nor felt its power nor learned its true place. It is all vision and doubts and hopes and dreams. It is strength and weakness, despair and joy, and the wild confusions and restless strivings of a boy who has passed his boyhood but is not yet a man." I think Hutchison's words accurately describe Canada as it is today, even though they were penned almost 70 years ago. We are a young country compared to most, and we are not yet sure of our place in the world. We want to do good, we want to be liked and respected, and we want to succeed. We want to live in peace with all of our neighbours, and we want the best for the rest of the planet. We want to be the good guys. Hell, we are the good guys - ask anyone! And by now we're old enough to make up our own minds, and take responsibility for our decisions.

So could someone try to tell me again why Canada is letting her children die in Afghanistan?
