Politics and Reality

Just How Complex is Abiding by the O.C.P.?

A young fighter returned to his corner at the bell. His manager said you're doing great, you about have him beaten. The fighter responded, "You better keep an eye on the referee, someone's beating the crap out of me."

Quadra residents concerned about the proposed Gowlland View subdivision perhaps need to keep an eye on the referee.

Any impartial person who has read the staff report prepared for the Strathcona Regional District (SRD) board would be excused for questioning the objectives of the report.

To suggest, "the approval for this application may be viewed as consistent with the objectives of the OCP [Official Community Plan]", could make one wonder if the author was smoking something without a label. The Quadra Island OCP document is not ambiguous. Perhaps the SRD lead planner did not have time to read the document before reporting the proponent's interpretation to the SRD board. The proposed Gowlland Views development in reality is in complete contrast to the Quadra Island OCP for such land use.

Of equal concern are the following opinions forming part of the report. "The proponent has retained as much of the harvestable timber as possible on the land, with the exception of some 'blow down' area that occurs as a result of extreme weather and storm events." It then goes on to say, "The proposal will retain much of the forested area that is currently present." After having made the questionable observation that the 'blow down' having been removed leaves "a cleared area near the centre of the area proposed for strata lot development."

The lead planner may have shot past the truth in a Lamborghini at some time, but the reality is the property was clear cut several years ago, retaining only immediate foreshore trees.

The accumulation of mathematics for areas set aside for parks and open space needs clarification, as it is claimed parks, park buffer, green belts, common open space and conservation covenant areas total from 38.87ha to 41.87ha and that is without accounting for 3,000 to 5,000 feet of greenway tracks. There seems to be very little space remaining from around a total area of 52ha for 46 residential lots and 2.1ha of commercial development.

It is likely the area claimed to be provided for parks and open space is clouded by blending in open areas of residential lots outside building envelopes, which of course is misleading.

The smell test, apart from stinking like Moby Dick died under the house, could make any concerned observer believe a conclusion has already been reached – it is only a matter of grooming the path that reached that conclusion.

The regional director's commentary in the August 27th Discovery Islander is unlikely to overwhelm most readers with confidence on his position on the issue. Quote, "I realise that this is all getting very complex. Just try and imagine being on my end of this! It is like a juggler trying to keep six balls in the air at once ... no, make that flaming swords!" Stay with the balls Jim, unless they are already gone.

There seems to be an unscrupulous suppression of facts in dealing with this contentious issue. Members of the community are suckers for the truth, perhaps the SRD could give that a go.



t the same time as a cheque makes its way to the two Quadra sponsored preschool /daycares in the Philippines, letters and drawings from the teachers and children have arrived for us in the mail. The following is news from Josie Killa, teacher of the Basao Dilag daycare as well as an accounting for the year 2010 for the Quadra Philippines Connection.

Dear Carol Foort and Quadra Island Community,

Sweet greetings! How are you now? I always wish for your good health, happy life and peaceful mind. Here I am again to send you my letter for this month of

serving Quadra since 1982

October. The most important reason is to say "I thank-you!" Thank-you for choosing our barrio to support a daycare centre for our children. My pupils and I are doing fine. I am so happy that during the past month none of my pupils contracted the worst situation of dengue fever. It was declared by the Department of Health that we have a "Dengue Calamity" here in our country. When I visited my grandfather in the hospital recently, the nurses told me that most of the patients were there because of dengue.

Here in our town our animals, particularly the pigs have been experiencing something we call "panno". It means pigs are getting sick and dying. Hundreds of pigs have died including one of my piglets. Of course many of us are sad, but happy that this disease is

not contracted by humans since a human life cannot be replaced.

In regard to our country situation, I am disappointed for what is happening now. Most of our commodities/products like sugar, cooking oil and detergents have had their prices become higher and higher. Our president, Benigno Aguino III said during his campaign that his program would be "no corruption" and that he would help our people/farmers to improve their lives. But most of us have really been feeling the crisis we are having here, especially for our daily needs. In short, those most affected have been the

Fortunately, with our climate, the rains have begun which is positive since parent s have planted their rice/palay in their rice fields and vegetables and legumes in their backyard gardens.

The children have been enjoying coming to preschool. I am so happy for the parents' feedback.

They have become more independent, love coloring and singing and have even been using water colors as you will see with their enclosed paintings of trees, birds, butterflies, fruits and vegetables like squash, okra and eggplant, as well a their houses and prints of their hands which they enjoyed making.

Again, on behalf of the Basao Daycare Centre I would like to express our gratitude to all of you. Thank-you for being there, for offering my honorarium as well as materials and supplies. I will never stop wishing that your journey through this world will be touched by kindness, inspired by wisdom, graced with understanding and kept safe from harm. Regards to all of you there. More power to you!

Politics and Religion!

The educator Robert Hutchins noted, "Education is a kind of continuing dialogue, and a dialogue assumes different points of view." We learn and develop both ourselves and our community through respectful dialogue. The Museum at Campbell River will offer its final Evening Dialogue on Thursday, November 18, from 6:30pm – 8:30pm. Once again our popular host Michael McIvor will facilitate the evening. The topic is sure to be an intriguing one: "The Role of Politics in Religion". The last twenty-five years has seen a global rise in the political activism of religious groups to the point where they are having a major impact on both national and international affairs. The evening will explore why religion is taking an increasingly proactive and sometimes violent role in politics, and discuss the consequences. On the international level, the rise of Islamic fundamentalism causes deep concern in conservative Arab nations and forced a change in security priorities for many nations. Religion coupled with ethnic nationalism was at the root of conflicts in places as Bosnia, Chechnya and Kashmir, Nigeria and China. Christian fundamentalism is strongly influencing the policy development and initiatives of US political parties. There are movements to allow Sharia law to replace portions of civil law, such as divorce, in some countries including Canada. Here also in some provinces lobbying by religious groups has lead to public funds being spent on religious schools. as it already been two weeks since my last report? The fall is just zooming by. Anyway, I want to bring you up to date on a few issues.

Lightstation De-staffing attempt by Fed's

I am in the midst of writing presentations to the Senate Committee on Fisheries and Oceans on the de-staffing of BC's lightstations for delivery in Campbell River and a separate one for Ottawa this month. I will be going to the Senate hearings that will be held in Victoria, Nanaimo and Campbell River. They will be over by the time you read this. Then I will be going to Ottawa on November 29th for a Nov. 30th presentation to the full committee and then to the BC Caucus of Conservative Ministers, MP's and Senators on the next day. We have a strong Strathcona Regional District position on maintaining staffed lightstations, three of which are within our borders and two more which are very close by. The Union of BC Municipalities and the Federation of Canadian Municipalities have both endorsed our SRD resolution unanimously. I'll let you know how the meetings turn out.

Woodlots and Dry-land sorts

Island Timberlands (Timber West) has applied for a rezoning of the existing dry land sort in north Gowlland Harbour. This use has been the topic of much discussion since 1991 and a number of memorandums of understanding have been put in place over the years between the regional district and the company to deal with the operational issues. Most recently meetings have taken place between myself and the woodlot owners and between the company and the woodlot owners to try to make sure that all operational issues are ironed out prior to going to the full rezoning process. The issue was before the committee last week and we felt that after reading the letters from both parties that we had received, that a few issues were still unsettled and should be dealt with one more time prior to giving the by law first and second reading. So we deferred the issue until the January committee meeting to give the woodlot owners time to deal with the company. The issue will be back on the agenda in January so I hope the meetings are productive between the parties.

High-speed Committee

I put out a suggestion for any individuals that would be willing to help me in my never

ending attempt to spread high speed internet throughout the island, to contact me. I have had three generous offers from well qualified people. If there are others interested, please contact me and we should be able to get together at the beginning of January. I would love to meet sooner but I am booked solid until Christmas. So, let's plan on a meeting in the new year

The Library

The Vancouver Island Regional Library Board (VIRL) is in charge of the libraries in this area. They set the budget, they set the priorities and they develop the capital plan. The SRD board has a representative on the board to bring our concerns forward. That director is Brenda Leigh of Area D, Oyster River - Buttle Lake. She has reported to our board recently that the Quadra and the Cortes libraries are both at the top of the list for replacement and that it is due to the conditions of the buildings not meeting the conditions required by the library board. There was a call for proposals advertised recently and as I am told by Brenda, it is now completed and there are a number of proposals that have been presented for the Quadra library in both Heriot Bay and in Quahiaski Cove. I have not seen the proposals and have only heard third hand about a couple of them. The reason I am bringing this up in my report is because it is an issue that affects our island communities; Quadra and the outer islands.

At some point the VIRL will need to make a decision on the proposals. It is my understanding that the current building is not an option. So, where will it be? I do not know and I do not want to see our community divided by a decision that will be made by another body than the one that I represent. I think it would be good to look at the proposals when they are available and see what makes the most sense. How can we best serve our community? I will keep you posted on what I hear at the board level.



We have been more fractious as of late than is regular for Cortes, and I commend this ever changing and expanding group of people who are grappling with how to shift this dynamic in support of more functional and pro-active community communication about important issues as they arise. Thank-you all!

Official Community Plan Review

We are now approaching the final leg of the review of our official community plan, which started a year and a half ago. There have been many community meetings, surveys, and input opportunities and many have shared. 250+ copies of the OCP work book were picked up in October, so that means almost every household this time of year has one – and at some level is, at very least, taking information in. The next step is to review the first draft amended OCP, which the Focus team intends to present publicly in early December. I would strongly encourage constructive critique with an eye for improvement.

SRD Budget Process & Community Meeting

Partially in response to community concerns about SRD tax spending and partly out of a desire to be fully transparent and genuinely seek your input about the spending of your property tax dollars, I requested of SRD staff that they host an open community budget presentation and discussion for Cortes, which they did. Thanks to the 20 or so people who attended. If you want to continue to follow the budget preparations between now and march, check in with the SRD website at www.strathconard.ca. I have met with staff at the recycling centre and the board of the fire department to gather their input on budget priorities, and will be doing the same with organizations that have received 'grant-in-aid' funds. I am open to your input as we craft next year's budget.

Riparian Area Regulations

The Provincial government has brought in new regulations regarding development in riparian areas adjacent to streams, lakes, wetlands etc. All work proposed to be undertaken within 30 meters of a fresh water-body will now require an assessment by a qualified environmental professional prior to that work being undertaken. In order to bring all the zoning bylaws throughout the rural areas within the SRD into compliance with these provinciallymandated changes, the same changes are being proposed region-wide. Usually any public hearing for a bylaw amendment that affects Cortes would be held on Cortes. However, given the relative straightforward nature of this change and our requirement by the province to do so, the SRD board decided to combine the Quadra and Cortes public hearing, frankly to save money. The public hearing is scheduled for December 8th at 7pm at the Quadra Community Centre. If you have a comment on this proposal and are not able to attend, you are encouraged to make written submission to the SRD. To balance this with the value of a government that sits in Campbell River is a constant challenge. Although Cortes has put me through the ringer on many issues, I am grateful to serve you as best as I can while maintaining some degree of sanity.


While this is certain to be an on-going work-in-progress, a few basic tools are essential, including generating some artwork to distribute to participating
