# **1st Islands Agricultural Show Report**

# Trip 'Down Island' Leads to New Idea - Local Farm Store



he first annual Islands Agriculture Show was held on February 3rd and 4th at the Cowichan Exhibition Park near Duncan, and it was definitely worth the early wake-up and the long foggy drive to be there. The goal of the IAS was to provide a unique opportunity to showcase, celebrate and grow the agriculture industry on Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands. As farmers we seldom get the chance to share our experiences with other farmers - we set our own goals, devour library books and magazines on the latest horticultural practices, and plan our gardens, cooped up in the remotest areas of the Island. Although cooperative work between small-scale growers would be extremely beneficial in helping us make a living, most of us are simply too busy to organize and attend meetings. So when a friend told us about the Agricultural Show, we simply had to go.

When we arrived at the fair and saw tractors of every vintage, information booths on chicken rearing, market gardening, livestock feed, 4H clubs, how to get Organically Certified and where to get pasture lime, we knew we were in the right place. We felt a bit lost until we saw the older couples with that weathered look and younger people with the healthy glow that only working outside provides. With much anticipation we registered for the promising seminars and opened our ears and listened. There was a range of information offered such as the Ministry of Agriculture helping participants starting new agricultural business, renewable agrienergy, and expert advice on how to regain control over crop pests. The talks were extremely enlightening and motivating. We heard from Kevin Koopmans, a Community Economic Developer who spoke to us about the concept of Incubator Farms – making it possible for farming dreams to come true for young people who don't have the land or money to get started. A passionate Gwen Simpson, owner of the award-winning "Inspired Market Gardens", taught us about the important link between storytelling and sales, and, at a later seminar, gave us a sobering look at profit margins on a small farm - it's all about counting and costing, EVERYTHING.

There was an excellent seminar by Dr John Fast, sought-after inspirational speaker. His psychological approach to succession planning for a family farm and the importance of being an adult about it resonated with a lot of us who had or had not given it much thought before. Jaymie Collins, an experienced agent in sales and the general manager of Vancouver Island Produce, wrapped the conference up with an informative presentation on how to approach retailers. He quoted a friend who once told him: "Getting farmers to work together is like trying to herd cats", yet he insisted that as small-time farmers with a limited supply of produce, the key to competing with big corporations is just that, team work. And looking around, seeing all of us gathered in one place, it sure felt like the seeds of something important were being sown, especially when, at the end of this seminar, a group of small-scale cattle farmers agreed on the potential of working together to offer retailers Island-grown, grass-fed beef.

# No Relocation Without Consultation

I'm writing about the Library letter in the last D.I.

Over the years I've learned two important lessons about public affairs. First is the importance of adhering to **Proper Process**. It's a lesson learned long ago and it's served me unfailingly. Adherence to proper process in the Quadra Library issue would have quickly focused on the matter of location.

At that point the benefits as well as drawbacks for both Quadra's two communities could have been openly discussed. Quadra Islanders were denied that opportunity, partly because nobody from Quadra Island had a seat on the Library Board. A seat there [on the VIRL Board] is probably not generally necessary, but at that critical moment it was vital to have someone present who knew, and would represent, Islander's views.

Another thing I suspect contributed to the storm was because the Library Board perceived relocation from Heriot Bay to Q Cove as simply a *"Quadra Island Library"* matter - to them, a non-issue. Others clearly saw that determining the library's location was a "Community Planning and Library" issue, calling for open consultation between this Community and the Library Board. Once location issues were

If it's too long it may be chopped! Please be concise settled, further management would be the Board's responsibility alone.

Any member of the Library Board, it's Chair, or Brenda Leigh (the delegated representative for Quadra at the time) or even just one member of staff - could have paid attention to the Library's own Mission Statement. There could have been the "Collaboration & Partnership" and "Leadership ... and Open Communication, Teamwork and Cooperation" it speaks of. The whole sorry fiasco need never have happened.

About the comment "the 'new' library's a great gift". How can it be a "gift" when taxpayers pay for it? When the Library's Board's financial manager told me the cost of the proposed "new" library would be around \$4.00/year, I got a warning signal. I cringed when it dawned on me he hadn't mentioned the \$4.00/year would be added to everyone's taxes in the area served by Vancouver Island Regional Library, up and down the whole length of Vancouver Island. He said nothing about having some 40 libraries in the system. Or, when they're replaced or renovated, that \$4.00 when multiplied by 40 becomes \$160 added to our taxes. Costs usually escalate, so it may easily exceed that.

I queried the accountant about this later. He confirmed the maths, but thought \$4.00 was so small an amount, concern about others paying our library costs was unimportant. I think it's unethical to compel folks in Kyuquot & Sooke etc. to pay for our library and vice versa.

Also, the cumulative amount of each \$4.00/year collected throughout the Library Board's whole Vancouver Island taxation area, is important. OH - I almost forgot, the other thing I have learned is: when it comes to government, be ever vigilant.

# **BC Ferries & Biodiesel Fuels**

Thirty-one out of 36 vessels owned by BCF are using a B5 diesel fuel, which is a blend of 5 per cent canola-based biodiesel, making BCF one of the largest consumers of biodiesel in British Columbia. The company states that this strategy "helps us reduce our fleet emissions." This is undoubtedly a true statement for BCF, but at what expense is this really to the environment as a whole? An independent study by Nobel Laureate, Paul Crutzen, has found that most biofuels produce more greenhouse gases than the fossil fuels they replace due to the emissions of Nitrous oxide being seriously underestimated. According to EPA, Nitrogen oxide gases are 310 times more effective in trapping global heat than carbon dioxide. Also since the energy content of pure biodiesel is 9% less than that of petroleum based diesel, to compensate results in more fuel consumption.

The US National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL) states that energy security is the number one driving force behind the US biofuels program, with the primary goal to reduce dependence on foreign oil imports. The United States spends about \$6 billion a year on federal support for biofuel production through tax credits, tariffs, and other programs. Canada currently exports 85% of the canola oil it produces and the US is our largest customer. The model for the development of biofuels includes a wide diversity of methodologies, some bad, some good. One could only hope that government' subsidies and tax incentives stay focussed on the more promising technologies such as wood debris conversion to cellulosic ethanol.

However, there is no stopping of the Biofuel Industry now. It has a strong lobbied foothold, and its life and existence is now about jobs and the potential to strengthen rural economies. Agriculture lands are switching from food to fuel, helped by government subsidies, higher prices with larger net profits then can be attainable from growing wheat. This gives political enthusiasm for growing biofuels and makes it a feel-good diversion from steps that would really make a difference, such as significantly higher efficiency standards. According to the David Suziki Foundation web site "Substituting just 10 per cent of fossil fuels to biofuels for all our vehicles would require about 40 per cent of the entire cropland in Europe and North America. That is simply not sustainable."

Also, by employing biofuels, we are indirectly supporting deforestation, promoting soil erosion, decreasing biodiversity, adversely impacting global water resources while consuming limited nitrate fertilizers. The problem is that instead of finding ways to use less or no herbicides and a lot less fuel and synthetic fertilizers, we are promoting a crop that is very difficult to grow organically. Most importantly, by supporting biofuels we are harmfully affecting the supply and demand factors on world food price. Biofuel production was accountable for a 30% of the increase in food prices in just one year (2008). World Health has estimated that 1 billion people are starving, and that poor nutrition plays a role in at least half of the 10.9 million child deaths each year (30,000 children died each day in 2011).

The hot topic for the ferry industry is the upcoming International Maritime Organization (IMO) regulations concerning low sulphur fuel, which will come into force in 2015. Many ferry companies are looking for alternatives as there will be a lack of 0.1% sulphur fuels causing higher fuel costs or penalties if companies do not comply. An alternative BCF will be looking at is increasing biodiesel fuel usage 4 fold, with alternatives such as B20 biodiesel fuel, a strategy Washington State Ferries is presently undertaking.

The question to answer; is the trend to introduce stronger biodiesel fuels in the best interest of the Ferry User who is now paying 13 cents on every ticket purchase price (Quadra vehicle & passenger) for biodiesel. In the Commissioners' new role, I personally hope to see enforced a mandatory requirement that all Ferry Providers must report their fuel sources, complete with a review of the social and environmental impact from these choices. Armed with this information, I have full confidence in the Commissioner to do the right thing.

# CORTES DIRECTOR'S REPORT

## Island Timberlands

- On January 23rd I took a small delegation to meet with Island Timberlands and presented them with a binder of Cortesgenerated information, including your letters, preceded by a summary of the input gathered a prior community meeting. IT expressed a willingness to consider land purchase proposals but they do value both land and timber at a higher price than most. IT also agreed to a joint follow-up meeting in February between the Cortes delegation and petition representatives to discuss operational level issues. Your input will make the basis for our suggestions at this second meeting and we will report back to the community afterward.

Some of the Island Timberlands forest lands proposed for 2012 harvest are of 'provincial ecological significance' and house old growth douglas fir stands that are very rare with less than 1% remaining in the endangered 'Coastal Western Hemlock – Very Dry Maritime' biogeoclimatic zone. One usually only finds individual fir veterans making intact stands very rare, and whole stand clusters as found on Cortes, truly provincially significant. These lands also contain red and blue listed species and plant communities as well as many sensitive ecosystems.

MLA Claire Trevena and I have written to the Minister of Environment and the Minister of Forests requesting their support and stating that "We are actively looking for solutions to what could become a divisive and confrontational situation which would provoke international activism, civil disobedience and subsequently substantial media attention." I have also written the Strathcona Regional District Board requesting their support in finding a resolution to this escalating situation.

## Garbage Transportation

- On Cortes, we have always paid for the transport of our garbage off island (now to the tune of over \$50,000 per year), whereas just about every other community in the region does not pay transport once garbage arrives at a 'transfer station' such as our recycling centre. For over two years, I have been advocating at the board that we equalize this discrepancy and make this regional service fair. At the last Solid Waste board meeting it was decided to make this change which, as well as benefiting the region in other ways, will save the Cortes taxpayer \$50,000 per year!!!!

## Highspeed

– I spoke with MLA Claire Trevena about our lack of high-speed internet access on Cortes again given that this issue is now one of her top priorities. I have sent her a synopsis of the current Cortes situation. She is compiling information from North Island communities and we will make a concerted effort on this front in the next short while. There is also a detailed SRD staff report on the status of Cortes and Quadra internet service on this week's committee agendas, and attached to this article on line.

## Klahoose Gorge Shellfish

- The Strathcona Regional District's 4 electoral area directors voted unanimously to approve of the Klahoose Shellfish Limited Partnership's deep water shellfish application in Gorge Harbour at the January SRD board meeting. Klahoose now has all their required licensing and I wish them all the very best in their operations, and indeed to their Nation's economic development activities.

Submissions to the SRD public hearing were split. Most, if not all, the submissions received from Gorge waterfront property owners were in opposition. Obviously, further work is required to improve the dynamic in this small basin. Most of the other submissions from Cortes resident s were supportive. Other Gorge aquaculture operators have indicated a willingness to sign a similar operational agreement to the one signed by Island Sea Farms, and I commit to following up on this matter. There was also interest expressed about enacting a Gorge-specific noise bylaw, which would be applicable to, and funded by, water licensees and property owners alike. This too I commit to following up.

## Grant-In-Aid

- Although these grants comprise a relatively small part of the overall Cortes SRD budget, it directly supports so much Cortes notfor-profit community activity that serves so many of you. This year's spring deadline for GIA submissions is April 2nd. Please mail or email your submissions to me for May fund disbursements. Forms are available on the Regional Director's page at www.cortesisland. com, or by phone request.

## **Radio Show**

– I am now hosting a radio show 'People's Place in Politics' aired live alternate Tuesdays at 11 am and repeated Saturdays at 2 pm. Each show has two main components, an update of regional district issues and a feature chat with a guest that represents some facet of Cortes political life. Victoria Smith will join me this week for a conversation about Cortes Radio, the first in a series with local organizations that make the backbone of local governance.

## Ferries

- I'd like to thank Bob Tracy and Uschi Koebberling for joining the Ferry Advisory Committee. Also, the BC Ferry Commissioner submitted his final report to the Provincial government in January after his community consultations, including Cortes. A link to that as well as the Ferry Advisory Committee Chairs response is on my webpage.

## **SRD Budget**

- It is budget time again at the Regional District and this year's community consultation will be held within the next few weeks, so keep an eye out for that date soon. Shall we continue to contribute to the parks acquisition reserve? Do you want to better fund bylaw enforcement? Are you happy with how we spend your half million dollars each year?

The Regional Solid Waste Plan is coming to Cortes for community consultation on April 12th. The draft can be found for your review at www.cswm.ca/plan.

## Roads

- I spoke recently again with Highways expressing our request for a centre line as well as for a posted 40km/hr speed limit and associated signage on either side of Beasley Rd in Manson's. The area manager will soon visit Cortes to review these issues with me and others interested. We still do have a commitment for two crosswalks in Manson's before late spring.

## **Phone Service**

- On the issue of loosing phone service when the power is out, Rob Hazlett from Telus recently wrote the following: "I have had several of my technicians involved in diagnosing the problem and we have now included some of our national and manufacturer support people in finding a solution. We have a couple of possible issues we are exploring and I will inform everyone as we get closer to resolving this."

North Island 911 – Representatives from five Regional Districts jointly form the board that is the North Island 911 Corporation which manages the funds for the 911 service in this area. I have been recently appointed to sit on the 911 board on behalf of the Strathcona Regional District.

"wild ones" of the island and may have been in the earlier years. In the past many years that I have known Al, he has proven to be one of the most gentle people I know. He was as honest as the day is long and as true of a friend as anyone could ask. He loved animals and the outdoors with a passion. He has run the Granite Bay Park wharf and ramp for the regional district since we opened it and has done a remarkable job of keeping it up. I am going to miss him, as will many others.

This report may be fairly scattered and I hope you will forgive me for that. I am sitting in my hotel room in Richmond preparing for meetings of the Pacific Coast Marine planning group all day tomorrow. I guess there is only one way to get on with it and that is to just jump in and start somewhere.

## **DI Items - Clarifications**

First of all, I would like to take a look at the last issue of the DI and make a few comments on some of the content.

On page 2 there was a notice entitled "Homelessness Coalition .... etc." This initiative came out of a grant that was to be given to the SRD in some manner. After discussion at the Board, all directors agreed to just put it into a project that was already underway in Campbell River. Upon further thought, I considered asking for our portion, based on assessment, to be given to our Community Kitchen and our Food Bank, since they work in a related field to homelessness. I am still having staff explore this option and see if it is possible. If it is, then we will have a fairly nice infusion of cash into two of our very worthwhile programs. I know there are other programs and maybe they will also benefit. We'll see.

**On page 5**, there was a letter, "Changing our Community Plan and Bylaws by a Contract... etc". This is not the case. It talks about the letter by Dan Bowen, the agent for the developer of the Gowlland Views proposal, from the previous issue. I have no intention of dealing with Mr. Bowen's letter or the comments therein. However, the author is correct in his statement about 100% support of the SRD for the proposal moving on to

1st and 2nd reading, not 100% support of the proposal. This is the process that needs to happen to get it before the public so it can be dealt with.

The major flaw in the letter is suggesting that the OCP and bylaws can be changed by contract. The contract that is being referred to is the Development Agreement, which usually happens after public hearing and third reading but before final adoption. I insisted that this process was flawed and I want the development agreement settled PRIOR to the public hearing so that the public will have every last tiny little detail of the proposal before them before they make up their minds on the proposal. This was an attempt to give you MORE information, not an attempt to twist the system. This way, you will know what you are really looking at in the final design of the proposal before the board votes on anything. This is for the benefit of the community, not the developer. So please understand the intent.

All advertising for this public hearing will be at the full extent of our ability as local government. Everyone will know. There will be no "subverting the normal process". The normal process will be enhanced if anything.

There are more items in the issue that deserve correcting, but you have probably had enough of that for now.. I know I have! So I will move on to some of the other things that have been going on.

## Ferry Commissioner Meeting in Victoria

I travelled to Victoria with 13 other Chairs of coastal regional districts and the Islands' Trust to meet with the Ferry Commissioner to discuss his report and recommendations. We were pleased with a few of them but had some serious questions about others. One that stood out was having local government tax, on our property taxes, to pay the Ferry Service additional money so that we could then lower the fare at the ticket booth! So... they will take our money at the booth and then take it again on our property taxes!?!?! That was just one example.

So, let's just say that what we have been hearing from communities for many years and what he heard directly from them was not entirely reflected in his report. So our next step is to meet once again with the Minister and the Premier to try and get our fares lowered, the system put back in Highways so that we are all treated equally regarding transportation and to get rid of the Coastal Ferry Act. I will be talking to the Minister personally tomorrow in addition to our group meeting later this month.

## Meeting with Minister of Jobs, Tourism and Innovation on Quadra

We had a great meeting on Quadra with Minister Pat Bell and his assistant about a week ago. I arranged the meeting to take place with the President of the Chamber of Commerce, and with Spirit of the West Adventures so as to showcase our tourism industry, potential, and real life problems. Then we had a good discussion about connectivity and high speed internet, since his portfolio is Jobs, Tourism and Innovation. I then took him for a tour of the proposed Quathiaski Cove Local Area Plan proposal so he could see the "innovation" that we have worked so hard to work into our community planning which will create jobs, encourage innovation and create various styles of housing for all generations. He was quite impressed.

I received a call from him a few days ago to tell me that he had already followed up with the forestry company that is potentially going to cause a great deal of damage to our tourism operators. He has spoken to the top person in the forest company and instructed them to deal directly with the forester in charge to iron out the problems. So, I believe our time was well spent.

## Meeting with Minister responsible for Connectivity

I will be going to Victoria once again to meet with Minister Margaret McDiarmid, who is responsible for Labour and Connectivity, on the 20th. I intend to give her the business case for connecting our entire island to high speed fiber optic and to also increase reliable cell coverage to all of our island and the outer islands. This will include wireless internet where there is no chance of fiber optic. She will work closely with Network BC and with Telus on our problems.

## Meeting with Regional Director of Telus

I will once again be meeting with the Regional Director of Telus for our area on the 27th in Victoria. I have now provided him with a complete set of maps and a written business case outlining the possible build-out for Quadra Island under the current OCP and bylaws. This gives him an idea of what our potential is for them to acquire customers. The SRD was very helpful in dropping everything and getting our GIS technician and our planners to work on this steady for a number of days. So when you question the value of our planning department, remember items like this. They did an exceptional job. Now when I meet with Telus I will have hard facts for them to bring to their superiors. I will also be asking them exactly what it is that they need to see on our survey. I don't want to go to all of the trouble to do a survey and give them useless information. I will fill you in after the meeting.

I have a whole list of other projects that I am working on but I think this is about as much steam as I have left for the night. I still have preparation for tomorrow's meeting.

Subject matter is disturbing.

Many films these days scoop the headlines for their subject matter. Such a film is The Whistleblower. The movie is based on the experiences of Kathryn Bolkovac, a cop from Lincoln, Neb., who in 1999 accepted a contract to work for the U.N. in Bosnia. Kathy shipped off to Sarajevo to head the Gender Office, working with local cops to investigate rape, domestic abuse and human trafficking.

Rachel Weisz excels as Kathryn Bolkovac, the Nebraska cop and single mom who thought the work gig in Bosnia would solve her financial problems at home. She arrives in Sarajevo to aid the local police, then finds that the cops, the diplomats and even U.N. employees are a major part of the problem. She finds allies in Madeleine Rees (Vanessa Redgrave), head of the U.N. Human Rights Commission, and Jan Van Der Velde (David Strathairn), an internal-affairs investigator. But corruption is rife and it seems impossible to stem the flow of the lucrative trade in human life.

Rachel Weisz's performance holds the viewer every step of the way. Her Kathy is fueled by a high-octane mix of human decency and fearless initiative. This is hard-hitting material, but it sheds light on a subject too long ignored. Shot over 36 days in Bucharest, Romania.

Francesca was born in London, UK, but emigrated with her parents to Canada at only one year old and was raised on Cortes Island. Here she studied piano with musician and teacher Mr. Bruce Hipkin and made her debut recording at 9 years old on on a song on his album 'Out of my mind'. When she was 14 Francesca and her family moved to Campbell River for more educational opportunities. It was here her parents gave her her first acoustic guitar and she started writing her own original songs. Soon after she bought her first ukelele which quickly became her instrument of choice. Far from typical teenage fare she wrote lyrical, imaginative stories with whimsical but catchy tunes which have strangely broad appeal. The same popular song was also used for a theatre ad for the online newspaper 'the Vancouver Observer' who wrote an article (feb, 2011) on Francesca calling her 'the freshest talent on the west coast'. Since graduating Francesca has been immersing herself full-time into her musical career. # The Fish Came Back

Chum and coho salmon were back in the streams last fall and Quadra Island Salmon Enhancement Society (QISES) volunteers were walking the stream banks counting the fish. Sixteen volunteers walked various sections of Drew, Hyacinthe, Open Bay, Village Bay, Granite and McKercher Creeks at least once and sometimes twice a week over a period of two months. Besides counting salmon, observers took note of stream flow, fish obstructions, presence of predators, stream bank integrity, water temperature, water clarity and any other information related to successful salmon spawning. Numbers of live and dead fish were totalled along with an estimate of how many fish were new each time. And finally, one tally sheet was filled out for each stream, with an estimated total number of fish coming into that particular watercourse. This information was sent to Department of Fisheries and Oceans for their records.

The final numbers are as follows: Drew Creek - 0; Hyacinthe Creek - 2323; Open Bay Creek - 1633; Village Bay Creek - 3153; Granite Creek - 657; McKercher Creek -60. Almost all were chum salmon. Coho numbers were very low except in Village Bay Creek where almost 800 coho entered the lake system. Let me stress that these are not absolute numbers, but a good estimate of returning salmon - a snapshot of what is happening in each stream. For example, in Drew Creek some coho may have entered under cover of darkness and moved swiftly upstream without being seen. High flows are critical for fish getting up some of the smaller streams, and timing may have been wrong for seeing them.

In addition, our counting fence was active at the outlet of Village Bay Lakes. The



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fence was manned by observers twice per day to count salmon and allow passage into the lake system. This is a huge commitment of volunteer time, and we were fortunate to contract local resident Lauren Miller for part of the work. The final numbers going through the fence were 796 coho and 144 chum. Although more accurate than weekly stream counts, this is still not an absolute total, since the fence was tampered with a couple times at the beginning of the season. The number of coho entering the lakes system was down from approximately 1300 observed in fall of 2010.

There are several other creeks on Quadra that the Society would like to monitor, but this will require further volunteer stream walkers. We would be very happy to bring new observers up to speed on the process before the next counting season of October 2012. I'd like to thank all of the volunteers who spent many hours in all kinds of weather, faithfully counting fish and filling out forms week after week. As well, a big thank you to the landowners who generously allowed us to carry out the stream walks on their land. Hopefully, our streams will remain in good shape and the salmon will continue to come back year after year.

# There Is A Celebrity Boat In Heriot Bay

On Febuary 13, 1950 the *Cape Perry* received a Mayday from a doomed B-36 bomber carrying a surplus nuclear bomb from Fairbanks Alaska to Fort Worth Texas.

The plane's engines caught fire and the crew had to bail out over Princess Royal Island.

The *Cape Perry* rescued 13 of 17 crew making headlines on the rescue.

The bomb was not reported missing as the USA did not want the Russians to know .

The broken arrow story and the rescue prompted the Canadian fishing company to hire Walt Disney to make cartoon characters telling of the rescue and Sammy the seal became a icon for the company.

62 Years later the *Cape Perry* now *Miss Terri* is being refitted for duties as a packer but may be chartered to protest the proposed tankers in her old territory near the proposed tanker route .

# Barenaked Lady? Steven Page Solo Concert on Quadra



Are you ready for a different sort of solitude? Steven Page, the legendary singersongwriter, guitarist and co-founder of the six-time-Juno-award-winning, Grammynominated, Canadian band, The Barenaked Ladies, is giving a solo concert on Quadra Island, Saturday, March 10th at 8:00 pm, at the Quadra Community Centre. Tickets are \$20, available at Hummingbird Office and Art Supply on Quadra and at the Music Plant in Campbell River.

Known for his intelligent, heart-felt lyrics and his up-beat song writing, this son of a drummer and father of three, has been expressing his unique personality and cutting sense of humour with a big voice for the past thirty years. Since re-directing his career in 2009, he has been playing solo acoustic shows, sometimes with cellist Kevin Fox, sometimes with the Art of Time Ensemble and sometimes with a full back-up band. Page continues to compose new material, available on his most recently recorded solo album, "Page One," released in 2010. This mix of power-pop, disco, big band Jazz and folk he describes as "...a genre-hopping tribute to the music I love, and the music I grew up with." Other recent events include touring with the Goo Goo Dolls on their Canadian tour and joining The Art of Time Ensemble, for their program "Take This Waltz," an exploration of the waltz throughout the last 150 years.

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# A New Declaration

We hold these truths to be self-evident:

That the real, physical world is the source of our own lives, and the lives of others. A weakened planet is less capable of supporting life, human or otherwise.

Thus the health of the real world is primary, more important than any social or economic system, because all social or economic systems are dependent upon a living planet.

It is self-evident that to value a social system that harms the planet's capacity to support life over life itself is to be out of touch with physical reality.

That any way of life based on the use of nonrenewable resources is by definition not sustainable.

That any way of life based on the hyperexploitation of renewable resources is by definition not sustainable: if, for example, fewer salmon return every year, eventually there will be none. This means that for a way of life to be sustainable, it must not harm native communities: native prairies, native forests, native fisheries, and so on.

That the real world is interdependent, such that harm done to rivers harms those humans and nonhumans whose lives depend on these rivers, harms forests and prairies and wetlands surrounding these rivers, harms the oceans into which these rivers flow. Harm done to mountains harms the rivers flowing through them. Harm done to oceans harms everyone directly or indirectly connected to them.

That you cannot argue with physics. If you burn carbon-based fuels, this carbon will go into the air, and have effects in the real world.

That creating and releasing poisons into the world will poison humans and nonhumans.

That no one, no matter how rich or powerful, should be allowed to create poisons for which there is no antidote.

Are you reading this? So are thousands of other Islanders on Quadra, Cortes, Read, Sonora &Outer Islands

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18 Discovery Islander #519 February 17, 2012

That no one, no matter how rich or powerful, should be allowed to create messes that cannot be cleaned up.

That no one, no matter how rich or powerful, should be allowed to destroy places humans or nonhumans need to survive.

That no one, no matter how rich or powerful, should be allowed to drive human cultures or nonhuman species extinct.

That reality trumps all belief systems: what you believe is not nearly so important as what is real.

That on a finite planet you cannot have an economy based on or requiring growth. At least you cannot have one and expect to either have a planet or a future.

That the current way of life is not sustainable, and will collapse. The only real questions are what will be left of the world after that collapse, and how bad things will be for the humans and nonhumans who come after. We hold it as self-evident that we should do all that we can to make sure that as much of the real, physical world remains intact until the collapse of the current system, and that humans and nonhumans should be as prepared as possible for this collapse.

That the health of local economies are more important than the health of a global economy.

That a global economy should not be allowed to harm local economies or land bases.

That corporations are not living beings. They are certainly not human beings.

That corporations do not in any real sense exist. They are legal fictions. Limited liability corporations are institutions created explicitly to separate humans from the effects of their actions—making them, by definition, inhuman and inhumane. To the



degree that we desire to live in a human and humane world—and, really, to the degree that we wish to survive—limited liability corporations need to be eliminated.

That the health of human and nonhuman communities is more important than the profits of corporations.

We hold it as self-evident, as the Declaration of Independence states, "That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends [Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness], it is the Right of the People to alter or abolish it...." Further, we hold it as self-evident that it would be more precise to say that it is not the Right of the People, nor even their responsibility, but instead something more like breathing—something that if we fail to do we die.

If we as a People fail to rid our communities of destructive institutions, those institutions will destroy our communities. And if we in our communities cannot provide meaningful and nondestructive ways for people to gain food, clothing, and shelter then we must recognize it's not just specific destructive institutions but the entire economic system that is pushing the natural world past breaking points. Capitalism is killing the planet. Industrial civilization is killing the planet.

Once we've recognized the destructiveness of capitalism and industrial civilization—both of which are based on systematically converting a living planet into dead commodities—we've no choice, unless we wish to sign our own and our children's death warrants, but to fight for all we're worth and in every way we can to overturn it.

# MLA Calls for Responsible Logging on Cortes Island

CAMPBELL RIVER - Local politicians are joining forces to try to prevent logging of old growth and sensitive ecosystems on Cortes Island.

North Island MLA, Claire Trevena, and Cortes Island Regional Director, Noba Anderson, are calling on the provincial government to help stop the logging of stands of old growth douglas fir.

Much of the community on Cortes Island is concerned about plans by Island Timberlands to log in old growth and areas of "provincial ecological significance."

"Stands such as these are extremely rare, and the clusters of trees found on Cortes is truly important for the province," said Trevena. "We hope that the government realises the value of them remaining and works with us to persuade the company to protect them. We recognize the need for forestry, but it should be done responsibly."

Trevena and Anderson have written to the Minister of Environment and Minister of Forests and Natural Resource Management asking for their assistance.

"I have met with Island Timberlands and will again this month. We are receiving very mixed messages from them about the details of their imminent logging plans on the island, and we want clarity" said Anderson. "Many residents are dedicated to the protection and responsible use of these lands, and are willing to go to great measure to ensure this outcome."

The stands are important as less than 1% old growth douglas fir remains in the endangered coastal 'Dry Maritime' biogeoclimatic sub-zone on the gulf islands and south-eastern Vancouver Island. The lands also contain red and blue listed species and plant communities.

The proposal to log the lands, which are owned by Island Timberlands, is gaining international attention. Trevena and Anderson are hoping an amicable solution can be found to the problem.
