# **Creative Writing Workshop**

#### at the Museum at Campbell River

October 15 & 29, Nov 12 & 26, Dec 10 (includes Remembrance Day weekend)

Writing a memoir, family history, biography or fiction requires story crafting, editing savvy, and planning structures. The Museum at Campbell River once again offers a five-session creative writing workshop to inspire and motivate aspiring writers, October 15 through December 10. Session timing, 1:30 to 4:00 pm, links with the Quadra ferry.

Instructor Jeanette Taylor enjoys working with people of diverse skill levels and intentions. She has four non-fiction books in print, including 'The Quadra Story,' and she's currently working on a biography of a Vancouver Island settler and a novel for young adults.

Taylor believes learning to write both fiction and nonfiction requires an understanding of the craft and great storytelling. "Whether you're writing for family or hope to publish a novel, it's all about presenting a memorable tale and characters who grab the reader's imagination," says Taylor.

She takes participants through all the phases of a project, from research and creative writing tips to publication options. While the class is geared to those new to creative writing, it's also applicable to experienced scribes who want to get recharged for the winter ahead. Registrants should have a subject in mind, with the basic research done



as fodder for class exercises. The bi-monthly format allows time for writing between classes.

# **Celebrate Humpback Whales**

Internationally acclaimed Whale researcher and photographer Jackie Hildering will show a multi-media presentation on Humpback whales. These gentle giants are frequenting our local waters now more than in recent history. Learn why they are coming here and what they find. Jackies' presentation is full of stunning and spectacular footage of Humpbacks, feeding and breaching in BC waters and around the world. In Jackie's own words. "They're big, they're beautiful, and they're back from the brink of extinction! Everyone welcome! # What is Group Lodging?

If you have been following the unfolding disaster in Houston, Texas, you will have read about and/or seen various large Civic Centres where people are sheltering. Volunteers are there to help with food, family reunification health related issues, etc. People are provided with the basic necessities.

In BC this type of shelter is called a Group Lodging Facility. If you are evacuated in an emergency, you will be directed to register

Facility was set up in the gym of an Elementary School which had one indoor toilet, not wheel chair accessible, a wash hand basin and little else. Port-a-potties provided two other toilets outside. We all survived but sleeping was difficult. Every time you moved on the cot it sounded like Chinese firecrackers going off!

Please take a few minutes to plan where you would go if we had to evacuate from Quadra Island. Contact family and friends and perhaps



#### Group Lodging Facility, Port Hardy, August 19, 2017

at a specific Reception Centre in your area. Not doing so can jeopardise your ability to receive support. If you have no insurance coverage for being out of your home due to an emergency situation (fire, flood, etc.) and nowhere to go, Emergency Management BC through Emergency Support Services (ESS) can provide vouchers for accommodation, food and the other necessities of life for 72 hours starting from when the emergency was declared. If you go to stay with friends for the duration it can provide a billeting allowance for the three days. If no accommodations are available a Group Lodging Facility will be set up. This will most likely be in a gymnasium or similar structure. The Red Cross will supply a cot and two blankets per person. The cots will be laid out in a grid and each person will be allocated a floor space of 40 square feet. The room will have an area for families, women and men but no real privacy. It will not be the most comfortable situation.

Recently members of the QIESS were deployed to Port Hardy to assist that community's ESS team by setting up a Group Lodging Facility. This was necessary because there were no hotel rooms or bed and breakfast beds available for people displaced by an apartment fire. The Group Lodging

set up a reciprocal arrangement. You can go to them for shelter or they can come to you if the situation is reversed. Be prepared. Remember your pets. Only service animals are allowed in Reception Centres or Group lodging Facilities.

# REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT • News from Area C by Jim Abram

I will try to keep this report short, as I have had a bit of an accident with my little finger that is limiting my typing.

**T**n my last report I mentioned a topic that seems to be on everyone's minds, year L round, being the condition of our roads. I see in the Campbell River media that the contract for road maintenance is coming up in the near future. I have known this for some time and have had many visits by the Ministry of Transportation and toured our entire island's road network more times than I have had time for. But it needed doing. I am going to reprint here part of my last report only because of the importance of your input to the road maintenance issue and because I am getting calls and emails regularly asking me for the addresses and names of the people that need to be written to. I do refer everyone back to these reports, but the requests continue to come in. So here is what I wrote:

#### 'Highways' tour of our roads

As most of you know, I have been working on trying to get some improvement to our road conditions for many years. We have seen a steady decline and our local contractor (Emcon Services) has not been able to keep up with the decline with the personnel, equipment and supplies that they are given. I deal with them on a very regular basis as they will attest to. They do try to accommodate our requests, but our road situation is too far gone for anyone to keep up with unless they get some additional help. I have met with Ministry people on more occasions than I care to remember and they are always very receptive and all agree that the standards are not even close to being met. I just recently (July 18) toured the entire island with the two top people in charge of compliance in this area (and twice more since this was written). They are appalled at the condition of the roads, the shoulders, the ditches and the brushing. All need serious work. They will be taking that information back to their supervisors to see if there is some way of improving the situation as soon as possible. They also noted a number of times that the contract that they have with Emcon comes up this year for renewal. This will be the time where real action will be able to take place. All of the complaints that have been filed with the Ministry will be taken into account when making decisions on that contract. I receive regular complaints about road issues and they should rightfully be sent to the Ministry at Kevin.Carter@gov.bc.ca and to Anne.

#### Internet connectivity

As I mentioned before we are applying as a Regional District for a huge Federal/ Provincial grant to create our own internet system. The deadline for consideration of the successful applicants is rapidly approaching. We are in waiting mode, but as soon as I know, so will you. Keep your fingers crossed!

#### Q. Cove Pathway

Staff and I met with property owners in the effected area and have come to agreement on the path that will run along the side of the road (OFF the road) from the Library area all the way to Aroma eventually. We all seemed to be in agreement and ready to go... we will now look at clearing the path and doing the construction in the near future. This is part of the "walkable" Q. Cove Village Plan that we put in our OCP. I continue to work on other areas of the island and paths that really need a separation from vehicle traffic. I cannot believe how something that seems so simple can be so convoluted and complex. I just have to keep pushing!

#### Golf Course subdivision proposal

After a number of cancelled meetings of the Board, the issue is scheduled to be determined on Sept. 20th at the Electoral Area Services Committee at 9:45 in Campbell River. Of course, I cannot speak to the issue but I wanted you to know that it has not been lost in the shuffle. It is a public meeting.

#### Bed and Breakfast use

We have been getting a number of questions and complaints around the Bed and Breakfast issue. It seems that there is really no zone that it fits into according to our staff. So I have asked for a staff report to be brought forward on how to fix this since so many people on Quadra earn their incomes from Bed and Breakfast operations. I have asked that we look at just simply adding it to the Home

Molony@gov.bc.ca and to our MLA Claire. Trevena.MLA@leg.bc.ca and of course, to me at jimabram@xplornet.ca If you want your road conditions improved, please take a moment and act upon your wishes. Thanks!"

I don't think I can be much clearer than that. This is a Provincial jurisdiction, contracted to

a private company. That company's contract is coming up for renewal. Your input is needed now! I have so many other issues to deal with and I could spend all of my time on roads alone. Please contact the people above and just copy

Occupation provisions in our existing bylaws. This seems to be the most straightforward way of doing it. The request for a report will be on the Sept. 20th agenda. So I am hoping that this will solve the problem for all of the B & B operators!

#### **Dog Bylaw**

This is still a very active file and our Chief Administrative Officer is taking all the info that I have been working on with the animal control people and has been trying relentlessly to contact the owner of the Animal Control business. So far he has not returned Dave's calls. He has been calling him almost daily... We will not give up on this file as I know how important it is to the island.

#### **UBCM** Annual meeting in Vancouver

So I will be heading to Vancouver on Sept. 23rd for the entire week after and will be dealing with dozens of topics on your behalf ... I have meetings with seven different Ministers and a number with Ministerial staff to deal with our issues here in Area C. I mentioned in my last report that I had met with our Chief Administrative Officer here on Quadra and that we discussed a number of issues, such as but not limited to: Surplus school site acquisition on Stuart Island; the Dog Bylaw; issues at Granite Bay Park; Hoskyn Channel Wharf engineers' report (or lack thereof!); correspondence and future meeting with Chief Brian Assu about the Mt. Seymour Recreation Area proposal; the seismic upgrade of Quadra Community Centre; meeting with South Quadra Island Fire Trustees, etc., etc. Most of these issues will be discussed with the Ministers responsible while at UBCM and I am looking forward to it. We have an inordinate number of issues on the go here in our area and I have to keep all the balls in the air, so to speak! Otherwise, if I lose my place in line, I have to start all over!. So you will not see another report in Sept. Hopefully I will have lots of good news in October.

Since most conditions, including muscle and joint pain, limited mobility and poor posture, have been learned and habituated, they can be un-learned and corrected. Anyone can take charge of their bodies, their health and their wellbeing – for themselves with

Somatics! It can create long-term lasting change. Somatics movements and exercises are gentle enough for most body types to do without risk of injury. It does not require intense stretching to try to release muscle tension. Instead, Somatics involves the brain and nervous system to lengthen and re-educate

involuntarily contracted. With Somatics, we can identify and resolve particular muscle reflex patterns that our bodies may be locked in. Patterns that cause misalignment resulting in functional limitations and pain. This method of neuromuscular

muscles that have become

re-education can increase mobility, range of motion and allow the body to function more efficiently. The natural outcome of this is more energy and increased vitality. Minimal effort is encouraged, rather than pushing or striving. Somatics can be effective in resolving back pain, sciatica, shoulder issues & TMJ.

My elevator pitch can't contain my enthusiasm for Somatics. Every curious ear in that lift will be listening and wondering about their own aches, pains and other complaints. Why have they not heard about this before now? And can Somatics really help them with that achy hip, sore neck and cranky knee?

My answer is a resounding YES! It is no surprise that Somatics cannot be adequately described during the short span of an

elevator ride. The elevator pitch is an ironic metaphor for the expansive, relaxed nature of Somatics. The very essence of this practice is learning to slow down, create space to feel and experience sensation that has been diminished or lost. Rushing or abbreviating that process is counterproductive and will only inhibit the results.

The way to really know Somatics is to take the ride. Have the experience to see and feel for yourself. Like the slow steady climb of the elevator car, or the safe smooth descent, Somatics is a journey worth taking that will surely move you and your precious body to a new and healthier place.

Over the past 2 decades Quadra islanders have supported a total of 7 preschool programs and over 1,100 children through a partnership with

the small NGO called IAT or International Association for Transformation. Many of the original daycare children are now successful professional graduates working either in their own villages or abroad and offering support to their families. Đuring Quadra's sponsorhip, the dedicated teachers from these programs have been able to show the benefit of positive daycare over time and thus, over the past year the goal to have local government assume this responsibility has finally been met. The Quadra community is now supporting a new innovative initiative through IAT called the Gift for Peace Program. This is a program for which IAT has received an international award and that that will have far reaching effects. It promotes self sufficiency and economic stability for the tribal people in the Kalinga area of northern Luzon which in turn creates a spirit of cooperation and unity among tribal people that have had a past history of conflict and violence.

Quadra continues to contribute to the Gift of Peace project by supporting the village of Cataw. The community of Cataw consists of 40 families that relocated from the mountains to the lower mainland area of Tabuk for economic benefit. Twenty families from this village will receive 20 carabau to pass on over a three year period to 20 families of another tribe where there has been past conflict. In addition to animal dispersal, training seminars on leadership, savings, animal health management, agro-forestry, health and nutrition and composting is being provided through IAT.
