




Interview with Alexandra Morton, Green Candidate for North Island in BC's Election 2020

Interview with North Island Green Candidate Alexandra Morton

Q: Why do you think you will be a good MLA?

A: I have spent 30 years in relentless efforts to protect wild salmon, the backbone of this coast. I have learned what small communities need and have seen these communities devastated by provincial policies that favour an economy our communities are not part of. I have learned about the rights and interests of First Nations and how to confront corporations who are not interested in being good corporate citizens. I have learned to fight hard no matter how overwhelming the odds. I have honed my ability to listen. I am interested in working with North Island communities to find the best solutions and figure out how to achieve them.

Q: What issues would you like to comment on?

- **A:** The policies that are killing our salmon are also harming our communities.
- I am reaching out to forestry workers to see how they feel about the current state of their industry.
- Having lived off-grid most of my adult life, I know the enormous potential of clean energy sources.
- This BC NDP government has increased subsidies to fossil fuel companies by 79% compared to the Christy Clark Liberal government. This has to change; we need to invest in clean energy.
- The Covid-19 pandemic has made it clear that government must be much more involved in setting standards for care homes. We must protect our elders from neglect from for-profit care facilities.
- I would work very closely with the First Nations emerging as powerful local governments and caretakers of our environment. Before standing as a candidate, I sought and received the blessings of many First Nations chiefs
- I would work closely with the tourism industry whose potential as an economic powerhouse for our local economies has yet to be fully realized.
- We need to be aware that people are leaving cities and heading our way. As an MLA I want to participate in planning for this, so we benefit and are not overrun by this migration that is already underway. We need to solve the housing crisis.

Communities in poverty destroy the environment around them. We will never protect this world until our communities are sustainable and thriving. I deeply love the North Island. I will not change what I say based on whether or not it is popular. I plan to hold public Zoom meetings to hear your concerns. If you elect me, I will work for you 110%. How to Vote in BC's Provincial Election 2020

ELECTION DAY IS OCTOBER 24

WAYS TO VOTE AND WHERE TO VOTE

• ADVANCE POLLS are open October 15th to 21st, from 8am to 8pm. For residents of Quadra Island and Campbell River, advance voting will take place at the Campbell River Commons in the mall at 1444 Ironwood, the mall where Thrifty's is located.

Note: For advance polls, do *not* go the district electoral office of Elections BC which is two doors away – but to the facility that will be set up in the Campbell River Commons.

• **VOTE BY MAIL:** Any voter may vote by mail. Follow the instructions in the Vote-by-mail package or download the instructions from https://elections.bc.ca/

Request a Vote-by-mail package from the Elections BC website or call 1.800.661.8683. For your vote to count, Elections BC must receive your completed package by 8pm on October 24th. You can deliver the package to a district electoral office or mail it. If you mail it, do so as soon as possible so it will be received by October 24th.

Elections BC recommends you request a Vote-by-mail package by October 17. After this date voters will not be able to request a vote-by-mail package online or by phone.

After October 17, however, you can still get a Vote-by-mail package from a district

electoral office. This Vote-by-mail package can be completed and dropped off at any voting place, district electoral office or participating Service BC office. The phone number of the district electoral office in Campbell River is 250.850.1700.

• **VOTE IN PERSON:** Advance polls are open October 15th to 21st in Campbell River – see Advance Polls section. Any voter can vote in advance polls; you don't need a special reason.

To find out the locations of the polling stations closest to you go to https://wheretovote.elections.bc.ca

For Quadra Island on October 24, voting will be at the Quadra Community Centre at 970 West Road. On Election Day you can vote at any district electoral office in BC up to 4pm. Campbell River's district electoral office is in the mall at 1444 Ironwood.

• **VOTE BY PHONE:** People with underlying health conditions, COVID-19, or other disabilities are able to vote by telephone. Call 1.800.661.8683 and ask if you are eligible to vote by phone.

WHAT TO BRING FOR IN-PERSON VOTING

• You will receive a 'where to vote' card in the mail. By the time you read this, you should have received one. This card goes to registered voters and while it is not mandatory to show


your card when voting, it does make the process faster and easier.

• A valid piece of ID with your current address COVID-19 Precautions

TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF COVID-19,

voters are encouraged to wear masks and bring their own pencils. You will not be asked to remove your mask to vote. Polling locations will have hand sanitizing stations, protective barriers, and capacity limits. Election workers are trained in pandemic protocols. Voting by mail or going to the advance polls at a time not likely to be busy are also good ways to avoid encountering crowds of other voters.

Ripped Off in Hyacinthe Creek

QUADRA ISLAND SALMON ENHANCEMENT has had tremendous support from the Quadra community over the years. We've been around as a society for almost forty years now, with many changes during that time. One ongoing project since 2005 has been the droughtproofing work in Hyacinthe Creek. The aim is to hold back reserves of water in Mud Lake, Reed Lake and a large wetland to use during the summer to help support a healthy coho fry population. We use 2-inch PVC waterline to siphon water downstream as needed.

Recently, I discovered that approximately one hundred feet of our waterline, along with a brass shutoff valve on the end, was cut off and removed from the creek below the large wetland. Two years ago we had a similar incident when someone stole a 75-foot length of line near the pullout on the Walcan Road at the same wetland. In that case, we assumed that someone had parked at the pullout, saw the pipe lying along the creek and lifted it. This time, the perpetrators either climbed down the steep bank or walked downstream about 35 meters to cut off the pipe and carry it out. It's heavy enough that it would have taken at least two people to manage that, and stuff it into the back of a truck. I have filed a complaint with the RCMP. Walcan Road is a fairly busy road. If anyone remembers seeing any suspicious activity relevant to this incident, or has noticed someone with a new chunk of waterline and shutoff valve, please report your observations to the RCMP. It could have taken place anytime between mid-August and the end of September.

It's a few hundred dollars out of the society's coffers, but beyond that, it's disappointing that a long-standing and hard-working Quadra non-profit group has been ripped off. To replace the line, we must haul a heavy 200-foot roll of pipe from town and assemble several volunteers

Old Growth Trees, a Ten Year Update

TEN YEARS AGO I began (and continue to) locate old growth trees on Quadra Island. An old growth tree is accepted by the Ministry of Forests and environmental groups as 250 years or older. I've developed a diameter to age chart based on counting dozens of tree stumps. In a broad statement, trees with a diameter at breast height of 1 metre / 3.3 metre circumference or larger, get measured.

Aware of my earlier reports, woodlot owners correctly disagreed with my diameter to age measurements. They pointed out that the number of growth rings counted by diameter at breast height will vary greatly depending on whether the tree is in a valley bottom or on a steep slope. Also needing to be taken into account is the elevation and north/south orientation of the forest. Trees at the

lower elevation (500m to sea level on a flat slope) would be faster growing than those at 1000m on a 70% slope of stone/gravel soil.

I've counted trees with 1cm growth rings at low elevations with good moisture and fertile soils as being 200 years old. The same species of tree at 750m above sea level could be double that age, about 400 years. The diameter difference could vary from 1m DBH (diameter at breast height) down to .75m DBH at an upper elevation.

Interesting Findings About Coastal Trees

One hundred and thirty years ago Moses Ireland, one of the area's earliest timber cruisers, determined that Quadra and surrounding islands were home to some of the tallest, straightest, widest forests on the Pacific Coast. Discovery Island trees were No.1 A grade: straight, tight grained and construction grade strong.

Over the past decade, I've come to conclude in my citizen science field hours that there are a few reasons why Old Growth trees were not harvested here in the past 100 years. Rebecca Spit trees are full of canker and heart rot. This is evidenced by the number of bumps on the trunks of the trees and the frequent weeping of sap from the trunks, pooling at the base of the tree. Other trees were not harvested because they had a spiral twist in their trunks. Other trees had a bend just a few metres above the forest floor, before becoming straight and growing skyward. Some trees had many limbs starting perhaps 5 to 10m up the trunk. In a good number of cases, the trees were growing along a steep slope with a creek 20m below. If they were cut and fell into the small gully, it would have cost more in labour to get them out. It was more profitable in all cases to let them grow rather than pay to cut them.

Articles about logging from 100 years ago say that better than 50% of the volume of the trees cut never made it to market. When a tree trunk began showing branches, they immediately lost A grade value. Their value was as fuel to fire up the steam donkeys. These machines powered the cable hauls taking logs off the slopes and down to the landing. It was the Granite Bay Fire of 1927, caused by the explosion of a steam donkey, that burned flat so much of North Quadra Island down to Heriot Bay.

Starting in the mid 1990s the Quadra Island Woodlot Owners met for hundreds of hours with the Quadra Sierra Club, the Forest Watch Group, and members of the Quadra Trails Committee to write up a Community Forest Plan. It was included in the Ministry of Forests report Special Management Zone 19 (SMZ 19). This agreement is still in place, and accepted by the Provincial government / Ministry of Forests / Woodlot Licensing office

In 10 years I have personally measured 273 trees. Only in recent months have I learned of a forest-centered aerial survey being conducted over Quadra in the past three years. A drone traversed more than 400km of flight lines. More on these findings will be made public in the coming months.

Call for Support

These original 273 trees were given an identification tag which has proven to be totally inadequate, as they have lost their paint / felt ink notations in a few seasons.

In 2020, I acquired professional "etch-able' metal tags. A ballpoint pen can leave an etch into the metal plate. As such, notations should be visible for decades, the same as old time Mineral Survey tags were written then nailed onto claim posts.

I'm looking for hikers / mountain bikers / private property residents to join in a new tree and old tree tagging project. I have 300 tags available. If you have a GPS device, I would like these coordinates written into the new tags and again into the existing Ancient Tree spreadsheet.



CR's Rising Seas Project Wins National Environmental Award

CAMPBELL RIVER, BC HAS RECEIVED

national recognition for its Campbell River Rising Seas project from the Canadian Association of Municipal Administrators (CAMA). The City has been presented with the 2020 CAMA Environment Award, in the 20,001 to 100,000 population category, during a Virtual Awards of Excellence Ceremony.

"CAMA is pleased to recognize Campbell River for its proactive action plan," said Jake Rudolph, president of CAMA and Chief Administrative Officer for the City of Nanaimo, BC. "This project will help the city face the daunting challenges presented by a rising sea level."

The Rising Seas project led to Council's recent adoption of its first ever Sea Level Rise Action Plan. This project took a broad view of flood risk posed by future sea level rise and engaged the public in choosing appropriate responses that also promote shoreline values such as ecology, access, and views. Public outreach, youth engagement, and dialogue with First Nations have been key project components.

The City hired coastal engineers to perform technical analyses, modelling extreme marine and weather conditions before factoring in future sea level rises. This resulted in a set of flood construction levels being defined for the entirety of the urbanized coastline, on which a future flood bylaw will be based. Analysis then went further and evaluated different feasible flood mitigation measures in various locations.

A design firm was also retained to produce public engagement materials. The City created a significant process to present options to the community and evaluate preferred future approaches according to public values, ensuring community buy-in.

By implementing the action items in the plan, the City can work toward protecting as many human and natural assets as possible, and the community benefits from being prepared and informed.

MP Blaney: Pesticides in forestry and a green new deal

NORTH ISLAND-POWELL RIVER MP Rachel Blaney has tabled two petitions from her constituents on environmental issues.

The first petition was addressed to the Minister of Environment and Climate Change and pledged support for a made-in-Canada "Green New Deal." NDP MP Peter Julian introduced a motion in the first session of the current Parliament which Blaney seconded calling for a Green New Deal. The motion wasn't voted upon prior to parliament being prorogued in the summer, but has recently been reinstated for the current session. The petition was signed by people from all across the riding.

The second petition focused on the use of herbicides in the forestry industry and is addressed to the Minister of Health. In it, the petitioners from Powell River and the qathet Regional District raised concerns about the impact on biodiversity, water sources, climate change and wildfires. Blaney, along with Nicholas Simons, have worked closely with local residents who wanted the issue raised with senior levels of government.

"I really want to thank those who do the work to put these together, with a special acknowledgement to Pesticide Free Powell River," said Blaney. "I hope the Federal Minister of Health will heed their concerns and make the necessary policy changes."

The government is expected to table a response to each petition within 45 days.

"Petitions are one of the ways I can help people in the riding be heard in Ottawa" said Blaney, "It gives me an opportunity to stand up in the House of Commons and raise those concerns, prompts the government to respond, and if other MPs are hearing similar things in their ridings we can work together towards real solutions for people."

Please Don't Let COVID-Cats Have Kittens!

WITH SO MANY FAMILIES adopting pets during the COVID-19 pandemic, Quadra Cat Rescue is putting out an urgent plea to remind people to spay and neuter early – before pets have a chance to reproduce.

"Traditional fundraising methods are currently unavailable, so we have even less money to help pay for surgeries," says Janet Massey, one of the rescue volunteers. "Because cats can reproduce so quickly, it's very important that people make arrangements to spay and neuter early – by six months of age – so that, together, we continue to work toward reducing the number of homeless cats and kittens on Quadra."

She points out that it's been approximately six months since the pandemic started a wave of pet adoptions, and that kittens adopted earlier this year could be ready to reproduce by now.

"If pet owners don't act quickly, we could be dealing with a major overpopulation problem again, and that would be devastating, for the cats, and for the rescue volunteers, after all the hours and hours and hours of work to deal with almost 1000 cats and kittens since 2009," she says.

"One unfixed pair of cats and their offspring can add up to 500 kittens – within just three years," adds volunteer Valerie van Veen. "Even a few kittens left unfixed can have multiple births (two litters a year with an average of five kittens per litter), which would set us back years."

Fundraising at events like the Saturday Market, the Fall Fair and running the concession during performances at the Community Centre won't likely be available for a long time yet, which will leave even less money to help manage a population boom.

"It's not reasonable to expect the same level of donations when so many people are struggling with financial difficulties due to the pandemic as well. As a community, we simply can't afford to go backward," van Veen says, adding: "We are extremely grateful for the ongoing support and funding we have received this year so we can continue our work."

This year, the SPCA provided a \$700 grant, and Area Director Jim Abram arranged for \$1500. Together, the funding provides basic vet care for approximately 11 cats or kittens.



"We'll keep doing what we can to help the island's homeless cats and kittens, including trying to continue to subsidize the cost of fixing local pet cats and kittens, but we expect to be short on funds for some time," van Veen sums up. "We're putting out an urgent plea for everyone to do what they can to slow the overpopulation problem. Please help us make sure kittens get fixed as soon as possible, including any kittens offered 'free to a good home'."

In 2019, Quadra Cat Rescue:

- arranged 55 spay and neuters
- adopted out 15 kittens
- transported 32 kittens to a partner adoption organization in Victoria
- took nine older cats into foster care
- paid for extensive emergency care for two cats


- arranged to feed and look after eight poorlysocialized pet cats left on their own after their owner died
- Quadra Cat Rescue continues to support approximately 17 fixed community cats in five colonies.

We live in a seismicallyactive area here on the west coast, and while we're not at risk of significant damage from a tsunami, we do need to prepare for the effects of a potentially catastrophic earthquake.

Each year on October 15th at 10:15am, millions of people worldwide practice how to 'Drop, Cover, and Hold On' - the immediate steps to take if you feel the earth shake.

Between now and October 15th, the Quadra Island Emergency Program will provide more information about how to stay safe before, during, and after an earthquake. They'll also tell you how to enter a Shakeout contest for awesome prizes just by sharing how you prepared for an earthquake!

Important planning steps for an earthquake include:

HOW TO SAFELY USE NON-MEDICAL MASK OR FACE COVERING
