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BC's Inland Temperate Rainforest Nearing Ecosystem Collapse Threshold

Prince George, BC - A team of international scientists conducted an assessment of the status of ecological conditions within BC's Interior Wetbelt (IWB) and Inland Temperate Rainforest (ITR). Their findings will be published in a special feature on Imperiled Ecosystems in the journal Land.

The project is part of a global set of case studies on Earth's dwindling primary (unlogged) forests led by scientists at Griffith University and includes case studies in Canada, USA, Russia, Europe, and the tropics. Several BC researchers were involved in the assessment, with the spatial analysis performed by the US-based Conservation Biology Institute.

The international team used a set of criteria developed by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) for ranking the status of ecosystems based on their conditions over time. Remote sensing imagery, government data, and published species accounts were used to determine primary forest conditions across the 16.4 million-hectare IWB bioregion nestled along the western flanks of the Rockies and Columbia Mountains. The bioregion includes very old redcedar and hemlock rainforests, as well as endangered spruce snowforests.

The main findings include: • Industrial logging (3.2M ha) represented 57% of all human impacts, reducing primary forest by 2.7 million ha for the Interior Wetbelt (IWB) bioregion and 524,003 ha for the Inland Temperate Rainforest (ITR) subzone over the past 50 years.

• Logging rates nearly doubled from 5.3% in the 1970s to 10.2% in the 2000s and have risen more recently as wood demand pushes into upper elevation spruce forests and pressure to log is mounting from biomass pellet manufacturing.

• Several IWB watersheds were assigned 'Vulnerable' to 'Endangered' rankings based on loss of habitat for rare plants, old-growth birds like northern goshawk, habitat for Southern Woodland Caribou (Rangifer tarandus caribou), sensitive fish like bull trout, and old-growth lichens.

• Overall, the IWB bioregion was ranked 'Endangered' and the ITR 'Critical'.

• If logging rates continue at current levels, ecosystem collapse is imminent within 9 to 18 years for the ITR, considered one of the world's most imperilled temperate rainforests. One of the study authors, Michelle Connolly of

Conservation North explains, "these alarming findings come as the BC government enables more primary forest logging in the Interior Wetbelt for sawlogs and bioenergy while promoting these products as clean, green and renewable."

Dr. Dominick A. DellaSala, Chief Scientist of the US-based Wild Heritage, a Project of the Earth Island Institute, was lead author on the study, adding, "thousands of scientists have been sounding the alarm about the need for governments to act swiftly in addressing the global biodiversity and climate emergencies accelerating around the planet. We need BC to do its part while there is still precious little time remaining to save this unique bioregion."

Great Bear Rainforest has rightfully received considerable conservation attention, the IWB is paying the price by not being part of a province-wide network of protected areas that envelope remaining old-growth forests for their climate and biodiversity benefits. DellaSala chose the IWB as the global case study because of widespread neglect by the BC government compared to the Great Bear.

There are only two other inland temperate rainforests in the world,, in the Russian Far East and Inland Southern Siberia. The ITR perhaps the highest concentration of rainforest lichens in the world, along with endangered woodland caribou, numerous old-growth birds, and the full suite of forest carnivores, a global gem in a sea of clearcuts.

DellaSala adds that while the

Funding for Active Transportation Projects will help people get around Sayward and Cortes Island, says NDP

SAYWARD - New Democrat MLA Michele Babchuk says new funding from the BC NDP government will help local governments create active transportation development plans and encourage more people to cycle, walk, skateboard, and use other forms of active transportation.

"For people in Sayward and on Cortes Island, getting around on a bike is nothing new," said Babchuk, MLA for North Island. "By investing in active transportation planning in partnership with municipalities and regional districts, we can help keep people safe while they keep staying healthy and reducing emissions."

The Village of Sayward will be receiving a grant of \$18,617 for Active Transportation Planning, and the Strathcona Regional District will be receiving a grant of \$20,000 for the Cortes Island Active Transportation Planning Research and Data Collection Project.

This funding is part of \$600,000 that will be available from 2020-2022. These grants are awarded to local governments and administered by the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM).

MLA Babchuk says this initiative is part of Move. Commute, Connect., B.C.'s Active Transportation Strategy, a plan to make walking, cycling and other forms of active transportation as safe and convenient as possible. By facilitating more clean and sustainable methods of getting around, New Democrats are supporting a healthier, more resilient natural environment.

E-Comm Warns of Continued High Call Volumes and Lengthy Waits on Police Non-Emergency Lines

With 36 per cent of police non-emergency calls needing to be redirected, new E-Comm campaign urges people to 'make the right call.' July 28, 2021, Vancouver, B.C.—

Extraordinarily high demand for emergency services has led to longer wait times on police non-emergency lines answered by E-Comm, as call takers prioritize a record-breaking number of 9-1-1 calls from people in life or death situations.

A number of major incidents across the province, from gang-related shootings and the ongoing opioid crisis, to the historic heatwave that swept across British Columbia and the earlier-than-normal wildfire season, have resulted in increasing 9-1-1 call volumes. Now, with the province nearing the end of COVID-19 restrictions, E-Comm, the emergency communications centre responsible for answering 99 per cent of B.C.'s 9-1-1 calls, anticipates continued challenges with long wait times on police non-emergency lines.

"Heading into the busier summer months, we always expected to see increased call volumes," says Oliver Grüter-Andrew, President and CEO of E-Comm. "But the current strain on emergency services, including 9-1-1, is extraordinary. This recordbreaking demand has led to increased wait times on police non-emergency lines, as E-Comm call takers must prioritize answering

life or death emergencies coming through on 9-1-1."

E-Comm has been struggling with increasing demand and longer wait times on police non-emergency lines for the past few years, but the problem has been greatly exacerbated by higher call volumes on 9-1-1 and ongoing staffing challenges. Adding to current issues with wait times, E-Comm is reporting that up to 36 per cent of police non-emergency calls do not belong on these lines and must be redirected to other, more appropriate resources. This is a huge drain on police dispatch services and takes up valuable call taker time that could otherwise be spent on helping people needing to report actual nonurgent police matters.

"For many of the calls we receive on nonemergency numbers, a police call taker is not the right person to action the caller's concern. Knowing when to call 9-1-1, when to call the non-emergency line to report a non-urgent police matter or when to call elsewhere doesn't just free up these critical resources – it also means callers can get the help they need faster," explains Grüter-Andrew.

Of the 36 per cent of calls that cannot be handled on police non-emergency lines, some of the most common redirects are:

Local police agency

Visit your local police agency's website for information about finger printing services, criminal record checks or requests for copies of police reports.

• Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre

Call 1-888-495-8501 or report fraud online if you have experienced fraud or a fraud attempt but did not lose any money.

• ICBC

Call 1-800-910-4222 or make a claims report online if you were involved in a motor vehicle incident where there are no injuries or imminent threat to public safety and all vehicles are drivable.

Local civic services

Visit local municipal websites for all questions or concerns related to city bylaws including dumped garbage, parking-related complaints or concerns about traffic lights.

• BC Residential Tenancy Branch

Call 1-800-665-8779 to ask questions about tenancy laws or to get help with landlord/ tenant disputes or apply for dispute resolution online.

For those who aren't sure if their call belongs on the police non-emergency line, E-Comm has a list of alternative resources and information on its website. Meanwhile, many non-emergency concerns can be reported online, at the caller's convenience. Otherwise, calling on a weekday outside the hours of 7:00 a.m.—7:00 p.m. can help reduce the wait time to speak with a police non-emergency call taker. A full list of links to online crime reporting and non-emergency phone numbers is available at nonemergency.ca.

E-Comm appreciates the public's support as it continues to navigate the busy summer months and wants to remind the public that everyone can do their part by keeping 9-1-1 lines free for police, fire and ambulance emergencies only.

Centennial Pool House Design Survey

The City of Campbell River is inviting residents to provide feedback on two potential design options for rehabilitation of the Centennial Pool change house facility.

One design would see the current layout mostly retained with modest improvements. A second design would see the facility modernized to a largely universal style changing village concept open to the pool deck with individual changing stalls.

High level costing for both options is included for information. The City has currently allocated \$350,000 in capital funding to the project and is seeking senior government grant funding for the remainder.

"The Centennial Pool is beloved by the local community... We would love to hear from residents about the new design options" says Amber Zirnhelt, Director of Planning & Recreation.

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First Nations' Land Claims Settlement

The first of the 14 recommendations of the Old Growth Strategic Review (OGSR), which the BC government has promised to implement, pertains to the relationship between the province and the Indigenous people who live here:

1. Engage the full involvement of Indigenous leaders and organizations to review this report and any subsequent policy or strategy development and implementation.

The priority given to this recommendation concurs with the rights to title that Canadian courts have determined are the legal claims of First Nations. It is also supported by a BC legislated act that recognizes the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, and is part of the redistribution of power that is taking place throughout the province. Land claims settlements are not specifically mentioned in the OGSR, but they are undoubtedly part of the subtext. Quadra Island will likely be affected.

Low profile negotiations have long been taking place between the three involved "nations": provincial, federal and First Nations. Locally, these negotiations have



reached Level 5 of 6 Levels, with the last being implementation of the agreements previously reached. This means that the terms of an agreement on a land claims settlement are effectively in their final stage. How long they will continue and how long the implementation will take are unknown. But three seemingly unrelated events may provide useful information.

On March 18, 2021, the Campbell River Mirror (March 23, 2021) had a Zoom interview with Aboriginal rights and title lawyer, Jack Woodward. He has acted on behalf of First Nations in court, believes major changes will be coming to the province, and suggested that we prepare for an adjustment to the jurisdiction of significant areas. Some of the Crown land that is presently contracted as Tree Farm Licenses may find itself "with a different landlord," said Woodward. "It's going to be a local landlord, not a foreign landlord," he added, alluding to First Nations' control from the corporate management of many of BC's Tree Farm Licenses. "Over the next generation," he concluded, 'we're going to see a replacement of ownership of large parts of the province."

The second event was the provincial government's media presentation of The Forestry Intentions Paper on June 1, 2021. It was an announcement of the legislation scheduled for the autumn of 2021, preparatory to the "modernization" of the forest sector, which could include an enactment of some or all of the recommendations of the Old Growth Strategic Review. Noteworthy was a doubling from 10 to 20 percent of forest tenures available to First Nations.

On Quadra, the Crown holdings that are conspicuously available for land claims settlement is Tree Farm License 47. Occupying most of the Island, it is licensed to TimberWest, whose logging interests are is now being managed by a corporation called Mosaic. The obvious claimants to this land would be the We Wai Kai Nation, whose ancestral home has been Quadra Island.

The third event that provides useful information was a joint disclaimer by the We Wai Kai Nation and Mosaic Forest Management printed in Quadra's The Bird's Eye on January 13, 2021. It denied that any "negotiations" were currently underway with the Open Bay Society regarding the proposal for a conservancy comprising about 3,370 ha of TFL 47. But the disclaimer was issued jointly by the We Wai Kai and Mosaic intentionally or otherwise— revealing that they were in some kind of negotiations, presumably in connection with an eventual land claims settlement.

The public is not privy to any of the crucial negotiations that are almost certainly underway and, at least locally, are in their final stage before the implementation process begins. The implications for the future of both the We Wai Kai and Quadra Island are enormous should most of the Island transfer from Tree Farm License management to Indigenous ownership.

This inevitable change offers promising possibilities. First Nations have an honoured tradition of being stewards of the land, and unlike Mosaic's notion of management, Islanders would unlikely be fighting with First Nations to protect the salmon-bearing potential of the Hyacinthe Creek watershed. Venerable old trees might be regarded as ancestral friends rather than cubic metres of profitable wood. And forest ecologies might be valued for their spiritual wealth rather than their logging potential.

Additionally, as Jack Woodward explained, legal precedent under Canadian trust law has established a limitation on Indigenous title that prevents them from destroying the land. "When First Nations do assume ownership of their land, they, unlike federal and provincial governments," he said, "are not allowed to destroy the fundamental economic value and productivity of the land, so, they're forced by our legal system to be good stewards." Should this legal control combine with their tradition of ecological sensitivity, then the environmental prospects are promising.

So it would seem that the inevitable unfolding of circumstances will require The Quadra Project to consolidate its vision of the future with the aspirations of the We Wai Kai Nation, a auspicious process that just might make the Island truly whole.

July in Real Estate

Busy long weekend came to an end and the sun keeps smiling. I can't believe what I'm about to say... but I miss the rain (for my garden). My garden is feeling the stress of super hot sun but I'm still loving the heat and enjoying the time spent at the lakes.

July was a busy month across the board, maybe not as busy as we have seen recently but that's probably due to the stress test changes and also summer vacations. A lot of people are taking some time off and enjoying the summer.

Campbell River

The Vancouver Island Real Estate Board reports that;

"Inventory remains extremely tight in the VIREB area, tracking at a 21-year historical low. Active listings of single-family homes and row/townhouses dropped by 51 per cent from July 2020. In the condo apartment category, inventory decreased by 60 per cent from one year ago. Based on the demand VIREB is seeing, there is no doubt that sales would be higher if there were sufficient inventory."

VIREB's heated housing market continues to impact prices, which continue to increase throughout the board area.

The benchmark price of a single family home in Campbell River area is 639,100 up from \$588,800 just 3 months ago.

Apartments in Campbell River area benchmark closed the \$336,300 mark and Townhouses \$465,700.

"Unless demand drops significantly or more housing supply comes online through new construction, the needle for VIREB's inventory situation will not move by much," states Mackay. "BCREA, VIREB, and other real estate boards continue advocating with policymakers at the provincial and regional levels to speed up the development process so that municipalities can expand supply more quickly to meet demand."

In the month of July we saw:

Quadra Island had four new listings, and five pending sale (received offers and are waiting for completion)

Cortes Island saw one pending, one cancelled and two new listings.

Seems like a very busy month in such a small market.

Calgary

Price growth slows as supply to demand balance improves.

July sales totaled 2,319 units, which is well above long-term averages and the best July on record. The pace of sales growth has eased over the past few months, but so too has the pace of new listings growth. This has helped prevent any further monthly gains in inventory levels, and while overall supply remains slightly higher than last July, it's mostly due to gains in apartment and row product.

The benchmark price of a detached home in the city of Calgary is \$539,900, apartments: \$254,100, semi-detached: \$428,400 and row houses: \$299,600.

Vancouver

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Trading 'likes' for injuries: BC Hydro links rise in public safety incidents to social media

VANCOUVER: A new BC Hydro report finds a rise in trespassing and public safety incidents involving infrastructure could be tied to the pursuit of the perfect social media post. The report titled "Living on the edge: British Columbians taking more outdoor risks for social media glory" suggests a 200 per cent increase in trespassing incidents at BC Hydro dams, reservoirs and recreation sites. The increase in incidents ranges from climbing transmission towers to swimming in restricted areas at dam sites.

The rise in public safety incidents involving its electrical system is likely motivated partly by the public's desire to post experiences on social media. The report found nearly half of British Columbians have witnessed someone doing something risky outdoors to get the perfect photo, selfie or video. And while only about 15 per cent admit to participating in this behaviour themselves, the evidence on Instagram, YouTube, Facebook and other social media channels suggests the problem is likely more widespread.

The biggest social media risk-takers are younger British Columbians, and men are twice as likely as women to engage in this type of behaviour. The most dangerous things British Columbians have done to achieve the 'perfect' shot include standing at the edge of a cliff (16 per cent), knowingly disobeying safety signage or trespassing (12 per cent) and taking a selfie from a dangerous height (9 per cent).

This behaviour should not be taken lightly, as it can result in some very serious injuries or death. In fact, about 2 per cent or an estimated 80,000 adult British Columbians admitted to injuring themselves while trying to get a photo or video, and each year people across the world are killed in selfie-related incidents – many involving water, electrical equipment or falling from heights.

BC Hydro's top priority is public safety and it recommends the following to stay safe near dams, reservoirs and electrical equipment:

• Stay clear of generating facilities including dams, powerhouses, power lines and electrical equipment.

• Obey all warning signs and keep out of fenced, gated and restricted areas.

• Never contact or climb transmission towers.

• Stay on designated trails and within observation areas, they are clearly marked.

• Stay well back from the edge of a waterway where footing may be slippery or the bank unstable.

• Listen and watch for sirens and strobe lights. These are warnings that water levels are changing.

• Stay outside of public safety booms and buoys.

• Keep in touch – if hiking or heading out on the water, do not go alone and let someone back home know where you are or use GPS if in range.
