

# It's BC Trail Day on Saturday June 4!

WE ENCOURAGE YOU TO CELEBRATE BC Trail Day on Saturday June 4 by enjoying Quadra's amazing trail system. BC Trail Day is part of a larger international celebration. Quadra is particularly fortunate to have an amazing trail system built and maintained over many decades by the Trail Committee. The Trail Committee dates back to the 1980s. Building the Morte Lake trail in 1986, with the assistance of Forestry and government grants, was a milestone in the development of Quadra's trail system, which grew to include other trails on Crown land using old logging roads. As the system has expanded, so has the volunteer base. Over the last three years, more than 2,000 hours have been devoted each year by 50 to 60 volunteers to maintain and improve the trails. The Quadra trail system has now developed to include a network of mountain bike trails and paths to access rock climbing routes. *Story continues on p2*

# World Premiere on Quadra

"Robert Brooks is the composer of *Stolen Sisters*, written for solo cello. He is American and resides in Mexico City where he composes and teaches. He is quite astute and sensitive about issues surrounding indigenous peoples," says Phil.

"As for my piece, I have longed to write a lively duet for violin and cello for my great friend and colleague Erin Furbee. We will play it together at the Southend Farm and Winery concert. The work is full of strong Brazilian rhythms which I've studied these last several years living down here. The nature of the piece is one of pure fun, with strong melodic motifs that I've created." ## Read Island Land Returned to Local First Nation

**HOMALCO FIRST NATION** has cause to celebrate following a historic land transfer agreement that saw a 47-acre property on Read Island, British Columbia, transferred to the Nation.

The former property owners, including Eileen Sowerby, Helen Turbett and the

late Suzanne Cook, officially "gifted" the Read Island property to Homalco earlier this year. The legal transfer includes several important agreements intended to preserve the property's natural landscape.

"Homalco First Nation is proud to see the return of a portion of our territory on Read Island," said Homalco First Nation Chief Darren Blaney. "We're grateful to have worked with Eileen and Helen through this process and are excited to work with our community to explore opportunities for cultural, recreational, and spiritual uses of the land."

The Read Island property currently houses a 25-year-old cabin, surrounded by naturally regenerated forest. The land transfer demonstrates an important step toward reconciliation and Homalco's

# **QI Studio Tour**

**AFTER A TWO YEAR BREAK** the artists are preparing to welcome you again to the Kick-Off Weekend on June 4 and 5, 2022.

This year the Studio Tour is paying tribute to the work and legacy of William Van Orden who departed in 2021. William did molding, casting and painting of the sea creatures of the Pacific North West. His work has been recognized by many as being among the finest replicas of our diverse marine life. William's family have graciously offered to open his studio for the tour weekend. The work will not be for sale.

The Studio Tour is a wonderful way to explore Quadra Island and discover the beauty that lies within many driveways that aren't always open to the public. Painters, printmakers, sculptors, potters, fabric artists, glass artists and more will have their work on display and many will be offering demonstrations of their techniques. In addition to the many studios, there are artist management of its territory.

"Colonialists have not done a very good job of protecting the land. It has not been passed on with, as Roderick Haig-Brown said, 'unimpaired potentialities,'" said Sowerby, one of three former landowners of the Read Island property. "So, our small group decided to officially transfer this property back to those who have been caretakers of this land for thousands of years."

At a community celebration held May 12 at the Homalco Community Hall, Homalco



honoured the former Read Island property owners with a special blanket ceremony, where Chief & Council also gifted Sowerby and Turbett with cedar hats woven by shishalh (Sechelt) Nation member and artist Shy Watters.



# What Price Golf, Indeed

I WOULD LIKE TO commend G. Murdoch for his insightful letter, "What Price Golf?", in the May 13 issue of the Discovery Islander. I agree that the original Quadra Links group should have considered the questionable financial viability of

such a project over ten years ago, before even starting it.

But now that Quadra Links has paid their mortgage with the sale of the subdivision properties at Fir Crest, I see no reason why they need more development, particularly if the many, many volunteers – listed by Les Rombough in "QI Golf Course Tribute to Volunteers" in the same issue – continue helping out. The timing and content of this





letter implies that the new Quadra Links proposal for an RV development has the support of this long list of Quadra Islanders. But does it?

Do all those volunteers agree to further over-crowding of our roads and ferries with RVs heading to the Quadra Links facility which, according to Murdoch, has already been cleared and numbered, before receiving approval? And does their insistence on a postponement of the public hearing until November suggest a political motive? – J. Baker

# **Next Steps**

**THE QUADRA ISLAND** golf course is a significant recreational asset, created for the enjoyment of both island residents and visitors. The public process to rezone the property took years, with significant input from the public and regional district. The project was improved by that process. The same process was used in the creation of the Fir Crest subdivision. Public input led to a park and a trail system that is an asset enjoyed year around by walkers and bikers. The same process, submitted by the same community-minded group, is currently taking place with the proposed RV site.

The public hearing date for the proposed RV park at the golf course has been set for November 23, 2022. It will be held at the community hall at 7pm. There will be several

Don't be afraid of face to face conversation, it's great for you! – Joshua Jakabosky

steps to be taken before we get to that stage.

First, we are planning to have a public meeting at the proposed site. We expect this to be scheduled for late July or early August. It is important for our community to have the opportunity to see the site for themselves and understand the facts before making a personal decision to support or oppose the project, rather than basing their decision on misinformation and rumor. We are considering significant changes and are prepared to listen to suggestions that will improve the proposal.

Second, we will incorporate the necessary changes and ask the regional district to amend our current application. The result will be a revised bylaw that is complete prior to the public hearing.

Every business on Quadra Island evolves within changing circumstances. Every owner is always looking for ways to improve their business. It is no different for Quadra Links Ltd. The public process is designed to review projects and make decisions on their merits. It was not intended to be a forum to divide our community or question the integrity of the applicant. ### It was great to have a couple of sunny days and now we are back to overcast with a few breaks! Let's hope for a sunny Mayday!

I am going to repeat something I wrote last issue due to its importance. If you want high speed internet, please read it and follow the simple instructions that will take you about three minutes to do. Here it is:

# **NOTE: THE MOST IMPORTANT ITEM** in this report!.... Connected Coast Initiative... Act

now!

As you all know, we have been fighting to bring connectivity to Area C for more than 20 years. So it finally is a reality and people are being asked (a number of times) to please sign up for the "Drop in", which is just your expression of interest to have the service of fibre cable to your home. It is absolutely free, carries no obligation and lets the company (City West) know that Quadra and area needs the service. They are tallying the numbers and percentages and they need 90% in order to proceed. We are sitting at around 50% so we are not even close at this time. We need your help! If we don't approach that 90% number they will not come to Quadra. That means that if you have not signed up, you may be depriving the rest of the island from receiving fast, reliable service for internet and TV. I repeat: You do not need to do any more than sign up. They will install the cable to your house for free, but will not connect you until you decide you want to connect, if you do. Otherwise it will just sit in the box on the side of your house being an extra incentive to buyers if you ever decide to sell your house.

If you don't sign up none of us will get this internet opportunity! Simple! If you don't sign up when (if) they do come here, then when you change your mind and want to hook up, it will not be free. So do it now. Even if you don't want it, think of your neighbours and your community!!! They need your support in reaching that 90% mark.

Please, please go to: citywest.ca/droppingin and fill out the form or call 1.800.442.8664 if you have any problems or questions. It is about four lines long and takes less than five minutes.

This has become an essential service for most people and City West's speeds are incredible and prices are great!

If you know of anyone who has not signed up, please convince them of the importance of this action. No cost, no obligation!

### A NOTE FROM YOUR ISLAND PARAMEDICS

I received the following note from the Paramedics on Face Book and have taken some (continuing) steps to try and rectify the situation. The issue is that BC Ambulance is hindering the process of having after hour sailings of our ferry. Everyone has been blaming the Ferry Service (and it has been due to lack of staff on the odd occasion) but it is mainly that the BC Ambulance Service will not approve the sailings so that BCFS can dispatch the ferry. Here is the note:

"It has continued to be very difficult for your Quadra Island paramedics to get patients off Quadra Island during the hours that the ferry does not run. Please, if you are feeling unwell during the evening, don't wait until 2am to call 911! By all means continue to call 911 for your medical emergency: we will be there for you, but there may be a possible wait until the first ferry runs in the morning before we can get you to the hospital, regardless of what your emergency may be.

"There have been many years of discussions about this less-than ideal situation, but solutions are few and far between and have not gone past the discussion stage. Until the PEOPLE of QUADRA ISLAND make having access to emergency ferry service after hours a reality, it will remain a wishful pipe dream. Please make more noise until we are heard. Thank you,

I met with Mark Collins, CEO of BC Ferries, here on Ouadra last Friday and he is all for having the ferry sail as necessary. He has asked me to attend a meeting with BC Ambulance to see if we can get our ferry back to the service level that we used to enjoy. Of course I agreed. He will be setting the meeting up asap. Hopefully we can make this work as the CCG has now let us know that they will not be sending a vessel over here for medical evacuations since they are a marine based safety service, not tasked for upland evacuations! Helicopters are also mostly out of the picture due to night flights, weather conditions and various other concerns including cost. So our best bet is to put our energy into the reinstatement of the after hour ferry sailings for ambulances. ### WATER SYSTEM FOR QUATHIASKI COVE

As many of you are aware, the densification that we envisioned for the Cove area in our Local Area Plan that was inserted into our OCP about 5 years ago, has been held up on a regular basis by Island Health (formerly VIHA). We have done the preliminary studies *continued next page...*

and now they want more. It is unfortunate because at our Board meeting this Wednesday we will be applying for some grant money that has come available but we won't qualify due to not having the next step of our investigation completed. But we will qualify for funding towards the Q. Cove sewage treatment plant replacement and will apply for that.

So, rather than wait, I decided to approach the Chief of the Cape Mudge Band to see if there might be a possibility of a reciprocal partnership with them. We supply sewer service to them (which they are in need of ) and they supply water service from their massive new water supply system (which we need). He was going to bring it to his council and see what the possibility might be. This would be the quickest, easiest way to provide services to two areas. I am very hopeful.

### IN CONCLUSION

As usual, I still have many other topics to talk about but I also have two hefty agendas to read and digest and I am still reading the letters regarding the Schellinck Public hearing from April 20th. 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# Free Yard Wood Debris Pick-up June 19

**QUADRA ISLAND RESIDENTS,** please Fire-Smart your home and property by bringing excess wood debris to the end of your driveway by 9am Sunday on June 19!

Depending on how many residents participate, it may take a couple of days for the chipper to get to your property.

Debris will be disposed of for free as part of the FireSmart Community Chipper program offered through the 2022 Community Resiliency Investment grant. The wood chips will be disposed on the island in collaboration with Quadra ICAN and the Ouadra Island Garden Club. No sign-up is required but if you feel your driveway may be hard to locate, then please let us know and we'll put you on a special list. Please note:

• No rocks, no nails, no roots and no treated lumber.

• Ideally all the 'butt ends' of branches should be pointed the same way so they can be fed efficiently into the chipper.

• Tree trimmings must be under 16cms in diameter and 10m length maximum.

• No invasive species such as Scotch Broom, English Holly, Giant Hogweed and Knotweed.

• The contractor reserves the right not to pickup any piles that they feel do not meet these rules.

• Do not block traffic by piling debris on the road.

Any debris brought to the end of driveways after 9am on June 19 may not be picked up.
Wood chips cannot be returned to residents as they are considered fuel under the

FireSmart principles.

• As long as these rules are respected, there is no limit as to the amount of wood debris that will be chipped.

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## Cone Zone Season Has Arrived

**SLOW DOWN** and pay attention! Every day tens of thousands of workers in British Columbia are depending on drivers, like you, to keep control of your vehicle in a Cone Zone. If you are driving through a roadside work zone, you have a legal responsibility to drive safely. Failure to do so can result in penalties and fines. As a driver here's what you can do to keep these roadside workers safe: 1. Slow down before reaching a Cone Zone and obey the posted speed limit.

2. When entering a roadside work zone pay attention and avoid distractions. Leave your phone alone.

3. Pay attention to temporary road signs, traffic cones and directions given by a traffic control person. It's the law.

4. Plan ahead. Listen to traffic reports before and during your drive – and where possible – adjust your route to avoid work zones.
5. When driving near work vehicles with

flashing amber, red and blue lights, always Slow Down and Move Over. If the posted speed limit is greater than 80 kmh, slow to 70kmh. If the posted speed is less than 80kmh, slow to 40 kmh. In both situations, move over if it's safe to do so.

The price to be paid for unsafe driving in a Cone Zone can be high. Tickets to drivers can range from \$196 for disobeying a flag person to \$368 for using an electronic device while driving. The economic and social costs resulting from loss of life or serious injury are even greater.

# **Medical Assistance in Dying**

**CANADA'S MEDICAL ASSISTANCE** in dying (MAiD) first came into effect in June 2016. It continues to evolve, with the latest changes coming into effect in March 2021, and more expected in March 2023. The law "seeks to respect personal autonomy for those seeking access



to MAiD, while at the same time protecting vulnerable people and the equality rights of all Canadians".

In BC, physicians and nurse practitioners can be trained to provide MAiD, if they choose to do so. To be eligible to receive MAiD, a person must qualify for government funded health services in their area (visitors to Canada not

eligible), be at least 18 and mentally competent, have a grievous and irremediable medical condition, request the service of their own free will, and give informed consent.

To be considered as having a grievous and irremediable medical condition, a person must have a serious illness, disease or disability (excluding a mental illness), be in an advanced state of decline that cannot be reversed, and must experience unbearable physical or mental suffering from their illness, disease, disability or state of decline that cannot be relieved under conditions that he or she considers acceptable.

The person seeking MAiD does not need to have a fatal or terminal condition to be eligible. He or she must have received all of the

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information needed to make the decision, including a medical diagnosis, available forms of treatment, and available options to relieve suffering, including palliative care. For those whose natural death is not reasonably foreseeable, more safeguards are put in place, including an assessment period that must take a minimum of 90 days, though this could be shortened, if necessary.

If a mental illness is the only medical condition leading a person to consider MAiD, they are not eligible at this time. This exclusion will remain in effect until March 2023.

MAiD is "a complex and deeply personal issue." There was heated debate before legalization which continues today over the expansion of MAiD to include youth, those with mental illnesses and disabilities, and whether it can be part of an advance care plan.

Some believe all Canadians should have the right to have autonomy and control over their own death, for which MAiD is essential. Many who consent to MAiD choose to die naturally; just knowing their suffering can be relieved, if it becomes unbearable, provides peace of mind. Others, with no access to MAiD, may end their life prematurely while it is still possible for them to do so. For some, the ability to die without prolonged decline and suffering and with loved ones present, provides for a meaningful and rich experience, a heartwarming memory for those left behind.

Others argue we do not provide adequate palliative care to those facing death, in which case MAiD becomes the only option to relieve suffering. There is concern that it is premature to begin providing MAiD for those with mental illness when there is simply so much work for Canada to do when it comes to improving mental health care. In a health care system burdened by resource constraints and burn-out, especially during the pandemic, there is concern that MAiD becomes motivated by economy and convenience, rather than care.

In Canada 2.5% of all deaths are by MAiD, and in Belgium and the Netherlands, which have been providing assisted dying for decades, 4%. Here on Vancouver Island the percentage is 7.5%. Clearly this is a relevant topic for each of us, and one we could learn more about.

Way to Go is a once a month gathering of folks in which we talk about death, dying, and grief, educate ourselves about current and alternative approaches, and strive to make death truly a part of life in our community. Any questions or comments can be sent to QuadraWayToGo@gmail.com.

# **Being Us**

### **OUR ENVIRONMENTAL** problems are the result of a fundamental disconnection between our understanding of reality and what it seems to be.

In other words, we are discovering that the world doesn't work the way we have thought it works, and that we now have to make major adjustments in how we individually and collectively behave.

Of course, we have always been doing this, both as individuals and as cultures. Our personal experiences, registered through consciousness, adjust our basic sense of reality, and cultures are always undergoing similar changes. Fundamentally new understandings totally remake us. As the media guru, Marshall McLuhan, said in one his intriguingly aphoristic reversals, "If I hadn't believed it, I wouldn't have seen it." Consider history.

During the Middle Ages, the Sun was thought to move around a flat Earth that was the centre of Creation, and authorized Christian beliefs were the measure of all truth. The only continents that could exist were Greater Europe, Africa and Asia because they corresponded to the Holy Trinity. Humanity was in a heaven-or-hell struggle against the forces of Satanic evil. Individuality was only relevant for the saving of souls. The shift to "man the measure of all things" in the Renaissance challenged this paradigm. Then the evolving empiricism of the 17th century wrecked the old religious sense of reality by inventing a new one. Science and the Industrial Revolution then refined this reality almost as dramatically as did the Agricultural Revolution of some 12,000 years earlier – agriculture changed our relationship with nature from being passive recipients of its generosity to being active regulators and controllers of it. In the past century, as technological innovations have accelerated, our sense of reality has again been dramatically altered. Change always creates confusion. So, what is reality?

Reality seems to be created by consciousness. When the 17th century rational philosopher Descartes tried to clarify the mystery of consciousness, he got as far as "Cogito ergo sum" – "I think, therefore I am." He could doubt everything, but he could not doubt that he was doubting. However, this explained neither consciousness nor the reality that is the consequence of being conscious – two problems that have frustrated modern science's pride in answering such difficult questions.

The assumption science makes is that we live in a material, objective world that can be understood by rational, empirical inquiry. But the consciousness that we use to understand this reality is neither material nor objective. Consciousness can't be studied by any scientific method because we can't get outside it to conduct the necessary examination. No matter what we do, it always remains subjective. Where does it come from and where does it go? Theologians and philosophers have made many heroic attempts to answer these fundamental questions, which science cannot. Illuminating insights are now being proposed by neuroscientists, and one of the most recent and interesting ones comes from Anil Seth in his book, Being You: A New Science of Consciousness.

Seth, a British professor of Cognitive and Computational Neuroscience at the University of Sussex, defines consciousness as "any kind of subjective experience, whatsoever", and describes it as a "controlled hallucination." In other words, it's not fixed, final or objective. It varies by person, by culture and over time. He describes the brain as a "prediction machine" that is continually using sensory input to minimize errors about what will happen next. This process constructs a cohesive reality with the semblance of order and structure that we each need for our physical, psychological and social survival. "Reality" is the "controlled hallucination" that works for us.

The sensory input that creates "our perceptual experiences of the world are internal constructions shaped by the idiosyncrasies of our personal biology and history." The result, Seth explains, is that, "We perceive the world not as it is, but as it is useful to us." Our individual needs and uses vary, so our individual realities vary.

As social beings, we also adjust our perception of the world to conform to a "reality" that we can share with others. This process of reciprocal influence is largely how we define ourselves and how we agree on a common reality. Disagreements do occur as a normal part of the evolutionary process. In times of change, however, these disagreements are amplified in both number and degree. And the faster the change, the greater and more disruptive are the disconnections. Thus, reality gets confusing.

The burgeoning evidence of a global environmental crisis is now forcing a change in our previous sense of reality. Our individual and collective "controlled hallucination" is being dramatically altered again. Earth is not just an objectively defined scientific idea, but our only real home in the vastness of a hostile universe. Biological processes and ecological principles are replacing the importance of industrial production and capitalist economics. The awesome complexity and intelligence of the natural world, which once seemed composed of merely remote species, is becoming alive and vital to our sense of survival. The atmosphere is not just the impersonal air that we have thoughtlessly breathed, but a dynamic regulator of our weather, climate, security and lifestyles. The oceans are not just water with "marine product", but living places that are vital to our health and wellbeing. Forests are not just a casual distribution of trees, but ordered and organic communities of intricate and sophisticated co-operation that have been evolving their communication systems for 500 million years.

The aspect of reality that we call nature, instead of being an abstract and detached object, is becoming very alive and extremely personal in our "controlled hallucination." Even though some of us may be unaware of this reality-altering change in consciousness, it is already occurring. Ready or not, it will profoundly reshape everything we think and do – even for us on our little island in the wholeness of things.

# The Time Has Come

SEVEN YEARS, TWO KIDS, and one pandemic later, the time has come for Rafiki to set sail again. Time to leave our home/jobs/school/friends/life as we know it behind and start anew. Aboard a small vessel that will be our home for the next four months, we are setting out to explore the coast that we call home and see what we can see.

Loaded to the gills with provisions, and among them tucked only the most necessary of posessions, we cast off from the Heriot Bay government wharf on May 10 in Rafiki, our BC-built Fortune 30 cutter-rig sailboat.

Some may recall a similar story from several years ago, when we sailed our thennew (to us) boat down to Victoria, up to Calvert Island and back again to Quadra. Our route this summer will be similar, but our experience will be (and so far has been) vastly different. back then we had only ourselves and our two-way dynamic to navigate; now we have added two more humans to the mix, both with their own unabashed opinions on just about everything – yet both double-whammied with an inherent sense of adventure.

Our departure day was pleasant enough, with winds sufficiently strong to have our sails raised and our motor stilled before crossing the tip of the spit. Our original destination was Shark Spit, but on arriving there we could see we'd be sitting ducks in a mounting wind. We opted instead to slip into Gorge Harbour and wait out the worst of the wind there. A couple days were passed exploring the shore and basking in a hot tub overlooking our boat at anchor before the wind finally let up enough (seemingly) to make our move south.

We crept out of the Gorge on a foggy Thursday morning, our sights set on Cape Lazo and Comox just behind it. Well, that southeaster had its sights set on us and soon gave us more trouble than we bargained for.

Rafiki is an ungainly boat when it comes to upwind sailing, and fully loaded she fared no better. A solid twelve hours of battering wind and inconsistent waves left three-quarters of our crew riddled with the queasies, aching to round the cape it seemed like we would never reach.

But reach it we did, and we scraped past the buoys into Comox Harbour for two nights of comfort at the public wharf. It was neat to bring the kids by boat to a place they recognized, to experience an alternative



mode of travel, and also to get them into the spirit of things (ice cream has been promised at every opportunity) before whisking them off to the wild north coast.

Comox soon disappeared behind us as we cruised down baynes sound to Deep Bay. Gurgling sea lions and spring sky light shows over calm waters faded into a blissfully still night – our first so far. We slipped off the next morning to cruise across to Lasqueti Island. Alongside a pair of humpback whales, we slipped into False Bay, sighting orcas on the horizon. No sooner had we dropped anchor and settled than the orcas crossed the mouth of the bay, spending the next few hours making maneouvres by the dark dozen.

We holed up in False Bay to wait out a storm, then had a long downwind jaunt to Gibsons – 40 miles in a day! The kids stayed there with their grandparents, and Aaron and I crossed down to Vancouver alone. Finally graced with good weather, we spent the long weekend anchored in False Creek, enjoying the city by way of the water and indulging in all the tasty foods that we just can't get at home!

The pinnacle of the weekend was my cousins' weddings – a blend of western and East Indian culture that included two ceremonies in a day! Everyone was awash in happiness and love, and fun and to-die-for food (so much food!) was had by all.

Next up: we cross to the Gulf Islands to explore some new shores, new communities, and to say hello to my grandma. Here's hoping for more sun!
