Eagle Lead Poisoning on Quadra Island

On the afternoon of Feb 6 I was alerted to an eagle behaving strangely on north Quadra Island, near Village Bay Lakes, on the southern-most lake. It had been observed walking on the road and seemed to be having trouble flying, although some of us saw it flv/hop short distances, at least at first. MARS Wildlife Rescue Centre was contacted in Courtenay, but they weren't able to send anyone that day and the eagle was still there in the evening and seemed to be in greater distress, possibly stuck in bushes by the lake edge, with a cold rain bordering on snow setting in. After some conversation and advice from the MARS wildlife rehab assistant, I was



able to approach and secure the eagle, transferring it to a large dog kennel (thank you Perrin Sparks!!). It was so much bigger, and lighter, than I'd imagined. It was clearly exhausted and weakened, although with no obvious injuries. I took it to the MARS centre the following morning where they examined it more thoroughly and expertly. They told me it showed no signs of avian bird flu but was emaciated and very dehydrated, and lead poisoning was suspected at first sight. Later blood analysis showed very high levels of lead in her blood. When I checked in a few days later she was eating and better hydrated. The most common cause of eagle lead poisoning is lead shot in gut piles left by hunters, and a lead fragment the size of a grain of rice is lethal to an adult eagle, and lead toxicity often accumulates over time. Even sublethal lead poisoning levels can lead to lifelong debilitating effects. I thought I should write about this eagle because all the hunters and fishers I know on



Quadra care about eagles and wildlife. I imagine that a pile of deer guts might seem like a nice gift to leave for wolves and scavengers, and it's probably important to many on the island to realize it can be debilitating or deadly. The MARS Rescue Centre has a visitor's centre and an interesting donation list, and you can learn more from their website, https:// marswildliferescue.com/. There are also lots of helpful reminders about not assuming young birds, fawns, or seal pups are abandoned, and being careful about approaching wildlife without experience and guidance.

Nut Tree Project

Do you want to host a nut tree or two?

The Quadra Nut Tree Project is looking for publicly accessible places to plant nut trees. Might you have a spot on your property, along a road or public trail, where you would welcome a walnut, or host 2 hazelnuts? We are planting 100 nut trees on Quadra in publicly accessible places so that one day there will be lots of nuts around, of the edible variety. Nuts play an important role in increasing our food security as they provide a plantbased source of protein and oil.

The trees would be paid for by the Project, planted by volunteers and protected from deer. They will be mulched, pruned and cared for by our team, although we would welcome your help with this as well. The harvesting would take the form of gathering nuts from the ground and you would be welcome to have some too!



Free April Bicycle Tune-Ups

The first free tune-ups of 2023 at the Quadra Bike School will begin April 25th. You pay for parts only and get a 1.6-hour tune up. Details below. Longer jobs can be charged for the extra work. We are at 1024 Heriot Bay Rd. at Animal Farm Rd. 285-2447

There are only two students this April. Bring your bike early if you really need this one. Fill out a repair tag at the door between 9am & 4pm. I can't consult with you during class so please call later. This is a \$115 tune up. Here's what we'll do:

Replace bearings in both wheel hubs, replace headset bearings, replace loose balls in the bottom bracket or replace a sealed bottom bracket if gritty, lube/ replace sticky pedals. Secure & lube both brake levers; remove, trim and lube/replace brake cables; clean & adjust caliper pivots; secure calipers; adjust/ replace brake pads; true wheels laterally to allow for brake adjustment; clean rims; clean/ replace, set & toe-in brake pads, centre brake pads. Check tires for cracked rubber, holes or excessive wear. Remove, trim and lube/replace derailleur cables; lube, secure and adjust shift levers; clean, lube and align derailleurs, tune shifting; secure handlebars, stem, grease seat post, level the seat; torque crankarms, chainrings, pedals accessories, and clean the frame. Replace rusty mounting bolts. There are no additional charges for the installation of new parts, brake pads, brake callipers, or derailleurs. But you DO pay for the new parts. Tune up includes disc brake pad alignment, but not other disc brake services. If you have a price limit on new parts or you want an estimate, please write that on your repair tag when you drop off your bike. - Thanks, Smokey

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Friday Flicks presents: Aftersun



Friday March 24, 7:45 at Quadra Community Centre. Brimming with warmth and the ache of cherished memory, Scottish writer-director Charlotte Wells' feature debut is a quiet revelation. Recalling a father–daughter journey to a Turkish seaside resort some 20 years after the fact, Aftersun employs the gentlest touch yet leaves an indelible mark.

Though Calum (Paul Mescal) is 30 and his daughter Sophie (Frankie Corio) just 11, they occasionally get mistaken for siblings. This is because of Calum's baby face, but also his playful attitude: the pair really get along. Having split from Sophie's mum, and having left their Edinburgh home for England, Calum knows how precious their time together is. Whether hanging by the pool, taking excursions on the sea, or shopping for carpets, Calum encourages Sophie's abundant curiosity ... until he doesn't.

Every now and then, with their MiniDV camera in hand, Sophie makes enquiries that Calum won't accommodate.

Fleeting glimpses of adult Sophie (Celia Rowlson-Hall) remind us whose perspective animates Aftersun, something underlined by Wells' elegant weave of Sophie's DV footage and the film's gorgeous 35mm imagery.

So much about Wells' approach to sound and image feels intimate, yet never intrusive the inner life of her characters remains mysterious without being portentous. In this regard, Aftersun is a showcase not only for Wells, but also for her actors. Corio's Sophie is wondrously alert to everything going on around her, and Mescal, so memorable in his recent roles in The Lost Daughter and Normal People, is magnetic in his first big-screen lead. Wood Stoves - Part 4

So what is the "new technology"? What makes a new wood stove "new"?

The simple answer is that new wood stoves are designed to have what is called a "secondary burn". The stoves create this possibility in one of two ways – by using a baffle system or by using a catalyst. These are the two general approaches used to meet smoke emission limits. Both approaches have proved effective, but there are performance differences.

Non-catalytic stoves are the most common. They have three internal characteristics that create a good environment for complete combustion. These are firebox insulation, a large baffle for producing a longer, hotter gas flow path, and preheated combustion air introduced through small holes in the firebox.

In catalytic stoves, the smoky exhaust is passed through a coated ceramic honeycomb (the catalyst) where the smoke gases and particles ignite and burn. Catalytic stoves are capable of producing a long heat output. Because they are slightly more complicated to operate, catalytic stoves are suited to people who like technology and are prepared to maintain the stove properly so it continues to operate at peak performance. These stoves use the least amount of wood and produce the fewest emissions.

When choosing a wood stove, you also need to consider the size of the space you'll be heating. Wood stoves can be sized to heat a single room or an entire home. Small stoves are suitable for heating a family room or a seasonal cottage. Medium stoves are suitable for heating small houses, medium-sized energy-efficient houses, and cottages used in winter. Large stoves are suitable for larger, open plan houses or older, leakier houses in colder climate zones.

So, you checked out your present stove and now you're thinking, maybe I ought to buy a new one. But, gee whiz, even if my present stove qualifies for the SRD Wood Stove Exchange program, \$300 is not going to go very far toward buying a new stove. Can we sweeten the pot? See Wood Stoves – Part 5 in the next issue of the DI.

The frog choirs have emerged and dusky

evenings are expanding. I trust you are also enjoying that winter is in the rear-view mirror and brighter days are ahead. Recently my inbox has had questions about woodchipping and Last Mile internet, I thought the answers would be of interest broadly so that's what this report discusses...

Connected Coast & Last Mile fibre optic internet

High speed internet connectivity in our area is a longstanding conversation. The Strathcona Regional District set a strategic priority of 'improving broadband infrastructure' and in 2018 created the Connected Coast partnership with CityWest of Prince Rupert. The Connected Coast network is a massive project connecting rural and remote coastal communities with high quality, high speed, fibre optic internet.

By now you probably know that signing up for the "drop-in" is a no-obligation way to have the fibre-optic connection delivered to the end of your driveway.

Addressing some reports regarding this high-speed internet and connections to your home, participation sign-ups from Quadra Islanders has shown there is interest for CityWest to proceed with Last Mile construction. I want to confirm that Last Mile fibre-optic cable to home connections will be built on Quadra Island in both northern 'remote' and southern areas.

Connected Coast shoreline 'vaults' are being installed on landing sites around our region and Islanders are wondering when Last Mile connections from the vaults to their homes will get underway. While I don't yet have information on when this will happen, I want to let folks know that construction plans and permitting are underway and as soon as I have a construction start date, I'll share it with you.

FireSmart and wood-chipping in 2023

The last several years the SRD has secured grant funding to support our communities becoming more wildfire resilient. The SRD has a Community Wildfire Resiliency Plan for Quadra Island which lists 42 objectives. Vegetation and fuel management is one of the many Wildfire Resiliency goals; for the past three years end-of-driveway chipping & removal of woody debris has been offered to support homes and neighbourhoods FireSmart their yards and properties. Uptake on wood-chipping grew from the pilot project in 2019 to "overwhelming participation" in 2022. In 2022 the woodchipping was tens of thousands of dollars over-budget due to the volume of debris piled up which was chipped and trucked to approved locations. This super involvement has meant the program has become a casualty of its success: roadside woodchipping is not being offered by the SRD this year while other recommendations in the Wildfire Resiliency Plan are supported.

Wildfire Resilience grant funds have not yet been approved by the Union of BC Municipalities for 2023 but if they are, the SRD's goals include two days of chipping on Read Island, a wildfire resilience prescription for the Quadra Community Centre, and support for the Quadra Island Fire Department with wildfire training. Was the wood-chipping super helpful to you and your property, and do you think it should be an annual offering? According to Protective Service Coordinator Shaun Koopman, if Islanders want annual woodchipping in unlimited quantities and the chips returned to homeowners, grant funding isn't the answer. Wildfire grant funds are limited and our enthusiasm for the service means there would need to be limits, whether by geography, lottery or pile-size, each creating administrative challenges. Woody-debris chipping could be funded by a Service, which would require the desire and support of Islanders. (A Service is an annual requisition, a line-item in our taxes which can be designated for a specific geographic area). Questions, concerns or comments can be sent to skoopman@srd.ca.

A Grief-Soaked Love Mary Oliver writes in

"Oh, to love what is lovely and will not last! What a task

Snow Geese

to ask

of anything, or anyone,

vet it is ours,

and not by the century or the year, but by the hours."

Everything we love in this world will not last. We will not last.

"It's never too late," we say, smiling at one another in an encouraging way. But that's not true. "You're not dead yet," may give the same encouragement but without the lie.

Sadness, pain, and death are difficult. How do we cope with them? We are drawn to beauty, goodness, and love, but can we open our hearts to life without also opening our hearts to grief?

One of the mantras of our culture is "don't worry, be happy." We are encouraged to think positive thoughts, improve ourselves, and rise above our problems. As we strive to feel good, the sadness and pain that surface are an indication that we have fallen short and so we may work even harder to eliminate them.

Promoting happiness by excluding sadness denies a vital part of what it means to be human. Sorrow is a part of life, and not accepting this reality inevitably leads to more suffering.

I attended "The Soul of a Well-Lived Life" workshop with Stephen Jenkinson, who is well versed on the topic of death. He explained that grief is an expression of love, and love inevitably leads to grief. He calls grief and love two wings of the same bird.

When we bring a child into the world, we need to acknowledge that she will not be immune to heart-ache and sorrow, and that she will eventually die, likely before she is ready. By giving life to this child we are complicit in her suffering. Rather than feeling regret or guilt, Stephen Jenkinson calls this "a grief-soaked love". He says that death is the cradle of our life of love. We need to live as if we will die – it's the only sane way.

According to Buddhist teachings, impermanence is one of the three basic facts of all existence. A student recounts this story.

Before saying a word, he [Ajahn Chah] motioned to a glass at his side. "Do you see this glass?" he asked us. "I love this glass. It holds the water admirably. When the sun shines on it, it reflects the light beautifully. When I tap it, it has a lovely ring. Yet for me, this glass is already broken. When the wind knocks it over or my elbow knocks it off the shelf and it falls to the ground and shatters, I say, 'Of course.' But when I understand that this glass is already broken, every minute with it is precious."

We cannot avoid grief, for it is inextricably linked to everything we love.

Oh, to love what is lovely and will not last! Let us celebrate the grief-soaked love of being alive.

Governments Don't Lead: They Follow

A housing needs report prepared for the Strathcona Regional District in May 2022 took a deep dive into some of the reasons why we have a housing crisis in this region. Onethird of all households in BC are renters and, as we all know, the availability of affordable housing has not kept up with increasing demand. Some factors that have worsened this problem are the high cost of land and building homes and the fact that, until very recently, governments have largely abandoned their support for affordable housing.

After 25 years on Salt Spring Island, we purchased property here for the first time in 2011 because it was still affordable. But putting a roof over our head was not cheap. Some immediate solutions to alleviate the housing shortage could include more businesses and homeowners providing modest seasonal accommodation for workers. Seniors can investigate refinancing and stay in their homes. Or they could add on a senior's suite and rent out the larger part of the home. Hornby Island has levied a 3% tax on all fixed roof transient tourist accommodation. They plan to use the revenue collected from this tax to create affordable housing.

An acute shortage of affordable housing has been an issue in Canada for decades. Fifty years ago when I was a youthful 18, I lived in Toronto and shared a residence with two other young women in a place called the Bain Avenue apartments. The complex comprised 260, low rise units – a 20 minute streetcar ride from downtown Toronto. Constructed after World War One, they were specifically built to house veterans and their families. The units were spacious and affordable. Each block of units had a grassy, fenced-in, courtyard and the streets were lined with enormous, leafy trees.

When we three teenagers, barely out of high school, signed our lease in 1972, the formerly subsidized apartments had been sold in 1964 to the private sector. The landlord had hired a middle man to run the day to day operations. Whenever we went to Mr. Sherman to discuss repairs or gain access to the locked courtyards, he would scream at us,"you're noth'in but a bunch of troublemakers." We didn't know the owners were quietly letting the place fall apart while making plans to convert the apartments into high end condominiums.

Not easily discouraged, Meera, Alexandra and myself, created a tenants organization to address the repair issues. We hoped Mr. Sherman would just blow a fuse and disappear. But it was I who left in 1973 and headed for Whitehorse Yukon. The

renovictions began in 1974. With the help of people like city councillor John Sewell, the condo sales stalled giving time for the tenants to form a housing cooperative. By 1977 they had enough support from various levels of government to purchase the entire property occupying two city blocks. In 1983 the co-op began the long overdue repairs. My extremely modest contribution to the project included conducting the title search (which is how we found out it had been originally built for veterans), organizing meetings and protests, hanging up posters, passing around attendance lists and taking notes. Back then we didn't have computers, the internet, smart phones, printers or voice mail. It was all done through leg work, snail mail, long hand writing, gestetner copy machines and rotary telephones. I lost track of Meera but Alexandra went on to become a major force in a very successful housing organization called the Cooperative Housing Federation of Canada. http://www. chfcanada.coop

You can Google Bain Avenue Cooperative and see the place (https://bainco-op.ca). The red brick exterior with cedar shingle gables, roof dormers with opening windows and enclosed lower and upper verandas, are very charming. The courtyards, which are key elements of the Garden City movement, have picnic tables, children's play areas and vegetable gardens. A new hall on the site provides a meeting centre and commercial kitchen for the local community. A two bedroom unit rents for \$1,400 a month in a city well known for its pricey real estate. During its 100+ year history, the Bain

Avenue apartments went from being the first social housing complex constructed in Canada in 1913 to becoming the first cooperative housing complex in Ontario in 1977. For 13 of those years, this extraordinary property was in private for profit hands and was nearly lost forever had it not been for the hard work of concerned citizens. And that, my friends, is what it takes to create affordable housing.



Why Wells Should Be Registered

ICAN – WST encourages everyone to register their wells as this can enable a much better understanding of how much groundwater is present and is being used on Quadra.

For commercial uses including farming, the B.C. Provincial Government has required since March 1 2016 that the wells used must be registered. Registration may also provide some right of supply, since owners of older, long-registered wells would have allocation priority over wells registered at a later date. This principle is referred to as FITFIR (First in Time First in Right) and has been the principle of allocation used in BC since water resource legislation was first enacted. If you have a well that might be needed for larger scale agriculture or commercial use from which you would receive an income, we strongly recommend getting the well registered as soon as possible.

For domestic use, a basic allocation for residential and modest agricultural use is not reliant on registration. However, we are all in this together, and this is particularly true for those who are reliant on the limited shallow aquifers that form the source of shallow wells. Shallow wells may be particularly affected by neighbouring water use under extended drought conditions, which is an increased risk as the global climate changes. So even though you are not REQUIRED to register your shallow wells, we encourage you to do so.

ICAN -WST is motivated by a desire for Quadra Islanders to collectively understand and manage our groundwater resources.

Protecting Old Forests

At least 1,000 people, representing more than 220 diverse organizations and First Nations from British Columbia. attended the United for Old Growth March & Rally in Victoria on February 25. They marched from City Hall to the BC Legislature, demanding the implementation of the Old Growth Strategic Review, a comprehensive 2020 study that recommended the immediate protection of the remnant old growth forests in the province. Not one of its 14 recommendations has yet been implemented.

The Old Growth Strategic Review included the creation of an Old Growth Technical Advisory Panel (TAP). Its findings are quoted as follows: "Some ecosystems have so little old-growth remaining that old-growth deferrals do little to reduce risk. In these cases, recruitment of younger stands is needed urgently.

"The OG TAP was tasked with identifying old-growth that should not be logged in the short-term. Remnant old forest is identified for priority deferral where less than 10% old remains. As part of that analysis, we also noted whole ecosystems with little to no remaining old forest. These ecosystems are some of the highest risk ecosystems in the province... For these highest risk ecosystems, where little to no old-growth or older mature forest remains, we identified remnant old areas, and then additional forest sufficient to meet the default target with what we term 'recruitment' forest; the largest forest in those ecosystems older than 80 years in age."

On Quadra Island, much less than 10% of this remnant old forest exists. Indeed, less than 4% of "primary" forest remains, so Quadra more than meets the criteria for protection as identified by TAP as a "highest risk ecosystem". About 175 small fragments representing 600 hectares of this forest is all that remains on Quadra. And because most of our logged trees are at least 80 years old, they fall within the protection recommendations of the Old Growth Technical Advisory Panel. Additionally, Quadra Island, under the Vancouver Island Land Use Plan, has been designated a Special Management Zone. As such, at least 25% of the forested area is to be "mature" forest, which means trees older than 80 years should be allowed to grow to their natural maturity.


Meanwhile, Mosaic continues to log on Quadra, and most of this logging is in the areas recommended for protection by TAP. Sierra Quadra has been trying, with little success, to negotiate for the deferral of logging in these areas, and these valuable forest stands for ecological, environmental and carbon sequestration purposes. These rare forested patches, which have been mapped as "Priority Deferral Areas", should be permanently set aside as "recruitment forests". Mosaic is thinking about annual allowable cut and profits; Sierra Quadra is thinking about carbon sequestration, species conservation, ecological protection and the future of our planet during this time of climate crisis. Indeed, our situation, according to all scientific assessments, is dire.

This assessment was once again repeated at the COP27 meeting by the Secretary-General of the United Nations, Antonio Guterres. We are "on the highway to climate hell" he warns, "with our foot on the accelerator". This position is supported by the world's climate scientists. We must cut carbon emissions by at least 40% by 2030—seven years from now—to avoid exceeding a 1.5°C temperature rise. We can only reach this 2030

target if everyone does whatever they can to reduce carbon dioxide emissions, store carbon, save forests, and preserve ecologies. This includes Mosaic. In a crisis that is confronting everyone, Mosaic cannot ethically hide behind its corporate credentials and exclude itself from the moral obligation to do whatever it can to save us from the unthinkable.

The situation is serious. There is no other way to describe it. And if you don't think so, then you don't understand the severity, extent and ramifications of this unfolding crisis. After a 1.5°C increase in the global average temperature, we really don't know what is going to happen, and a sustainable human civilization is in doubt. Climatologists thought that maybe 3.0°C was safe, or maybe 2.0°C. But almost every worst-case scenario from past predictions has been exceeded by a temperature increase of the 1.2°C that we have already reached. Storms are more extreme than anticipated. So, too, are weather anomalies. Oceans are acidifying and rising beyond our control, and species extinctions are unprecedented. Every tonne of carbon dioxide we keep out of the atmosphere by sequestering it in trees gives us a better chance of avoiding "climate hell". This is not a game. And if it is, it's Russian Roulette, with all the gun's chambers loaded. Ray Grigg for Sierra Quadra

Planning for Warmer Weather - Be FireSmart and Be Prepared

Spring is a good time to think about the hot weather. The Seniors Emergency Preparedness Program (SEPP) is supporting Quadra Island seniors to plan ahead so that they will be able to cope with extreme heat. Seniors will be more resilient and comfortable if they know how keep cool and how to prevent fires from encroaching on their home.

Plan to do some Firesmarting around your home before the summer heat increases the potential for forest fires. A few precautions may prevent the loss of your home or outbuildings. There is information available online through Firesmart BC. The Quadra Island Fire Department may be able to offer an evaluation of your property and make suggestions to improve your fire resiliency.

Here are a few basic things you can do yourself or hire a contractor. Seniors registered with SEPP may make a request to SEPP to recommend or hire a contractor or recruit a volunteer.

1. Yard and home maintenance should include cleaning forest debris from gutters, decks and house perimeter within 1.5 metres.

2. Store firewood and lumber at least 10 metres from your house.

3. Remove flammable vegetation such as cedar, pine, juniper and tall grasses within 10 metres of your house.

Summers on the coast tend to be warm and dry with at least one or two hot spells. Environment Canada provides warnings for extreme heat along with precautionary notes. However, vulnerable seniors may be stressed by warm weather even if a heat warning is not warranted. Planning ahead for hot weather may help you or a neighbour feel more comfortable during extended heat waves.

Seniors should have a 72 hour kit for weather extremes and other emergency situations and be prepared to spend a day or more without power or with minimal help. For information about 72 hour kits and emergency preparation contact seppquadracircle@gmail.com or the Quadra Circle website at quadracircle.ca. There are many practical ways to cope with extreme heat. When it is hot enough to feel uncomfortable, keep your house cool by doing the following:

• open windows at night and close them early in the day and keep curtains and blinds closed

• avoid using oven and larger appliances

• make an air conditioner by filling a bowl with ice and place in front of an operating fan

• cover your sky lights or sky light ceiling openings.

Keep yourself cool by reducing activity and wearing lightweight and loose fitting clothing and use a damp towel around your neck to create evaporative cooling. Also, drink cool, non-alcoholic beverages. You can also use ice packs to cool your bedding and keep a hot water bottle filled with cold water for added cooling.

During extreme heat waves there will be cooling centres available at the Quadra

Community Centre and at the Legion. If you can, try to spend part of the day there. If there are seniors in your care or in your neighbourbood who are known to be vulnerable, monitor them during hot spells. Are they drinking enough? Do they have access to air conditioning? Do they know how to keep cool? Do you see signs of heat stress?

SEPP is trying to strengthen neighbourhood networks and build business and volunteer partnerships so that we can all cope with the inevitable weather extremes. SEPP may be able to provide temporary air conditioning, fans and icepacks or hot water bottles.

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Land Development Critical to Solving Housing Crisis

A recent letter in the DI took issue with the draft of the updated [Integrated] Community Sustainability Plan (ICSP). Most of the criticism suggested little other than the intention to criticize those who put their time in to the writing of such a complex overview of a community such as Quadra. In spite of its title 'In Defence of a Thriving Community' the letter ignores the fact that as Canadians we live in a climate of counter productive financial speculation which has only worsened during the recent pandemic. Under such a regime when a speculator with assets purchases a marina, trailer court or apartment complex the cost of living to those on the lowest rung goes substantially higher. You don't have to look very far on Quadra for examples. Everything from food to gasoline, rent, postage and moorage continues to accelerate in cost. The opportunity to have a thriving community under the pretext of constant

financial speculation is a pipe dream. Wealth becomes more concentrated not less. Most of the land in BC is in lock down. Certainly there is property for sale on Quadra but unless young families have the financial backing of their parents, they face going in debt to the banks for the next 35 years. Vast tracts of BC and Quadra Island are under the protection of timber forest licenses [sic]. The inflated market value and yearly taxes on private property is driven by its lack of availability. The situation is not getting any better. Canada by the way, is one of the largest, least populated countries in the world. Germany for instance has 100 people per square kilometre and we have 1. Yet we have a housing crisis. That should be next to impossible unless things like zoning bylaws have been used to bolster the status quo. Note too that the proposals in the OCP of 2015 turned the young people in to a generation of renters confined to

smaller and smaller high density housing tracts. What type of legacy is that and to who's benefit when we live on such an under populated country and island? In a post pandemic world, people forced to rent are kept broke by landlords who spend their winters in warmer places.

A recent meeting at the QCC sought to mitigate our housing crisis by opening up 125 acres for development at the far end of Harbour [brook] Road (Gowlland Heights). To be sure the development would have caused a problem at the ferry for us old foggies but would have created a large number of opportunities for younger people both in work opportunities and housing availability. Yet the proposal was effectively trounced by most community members who spoke from the floor and as such were put on record by the SRD. Even the editor of this paper stood up and attacked the proposal. Incredible - and then shortly thereafter the DI laments how Quadra has lost "as high as 1/2 our workforce over the last five years". Little wonder when any progressive proposal (such as land development) is quashed before it can see the light of day. In the same vein, the DI letter states "we need to find ways to develop zoning that allows for agriculture communities, water-based accommodation, and so much more". A good sentiment which ignores the fact that the land required to undertake such activities will be blocked when forced to seek community approval. Given the response to the Schelnick application at the QCC, the proposal to diversify our economy is nothing less than absurd. Zoning and bylaws are getting more restrictive not less. We'd rather sit and watch our trees get shipped offshore than be delayed at the ferry terminal.

Back in the 1900's the provincial government enacted the *Homesteading Act* (after giving 1,200,000 acres of coastal forest to pundits in exchange for a short section of railway from Victoria to Courtenay). If we really do want to solve our housing problems I would suggest a new homesteading act be tabled, opening up the land to the next generation not just on Quadra but across the entire province.
