Through the Compassionate Community initiative, this FREE training will be available to all who want to learn more about how to support family and friends in their time of need.

Way To Go (https://way2go.ca) offers many educational opportunities that provide information and discussion around the human experience of death, dying, and grieving. Community-Led Death Care (part of Way To Go) volunteers provide services around death and dying such as helping with necessary paperwork, home funeral plans, natural burials, and emotional support. With Way To Go, death can be less of an unknown and more of a shared community experience.

Quadra Circle (https://www.quadracircle.ca/) has a mixture of volunteers and funded services including Seniors Activities, frozen meals, foot care, Better At Home, and Care Giver Support Group to name a few. No wonder they picked us!

We've just launched this 18-month project with UBC and BC Centre for Palliative Care to help Quadra become even better Islanders helping Islanders!

Water Awareness Workshop

Saturday, June 14 - 10 AM to Noon

ICAN's Water Security Team and the We Wai Kai Nation invite you to a series of short talks followed by a hands-on workshop about water issues that concern us all. First, we will share updates from studies by Vancouver Island University, We Wai Kai Guardians, and the ICAN Water Security team on Quadra's water status. This research is ultimately aimed at answering the question: "Will we have sufficient water for our future needs given climate change and possible future development?" Professor Lesemann will talk about the weather stations and other efforts underway. We will briefly share the findings from your responses to the survey about droughts and wells circulated last November. We will wrap up the presentations with a preview of our upcoming website by Mark Wunsch of Quadra's Greencoast Media. The website will be our community information hub for water issues, research, and solutions, brought to life through expert interviews and interesting observations and anecdotes by Quadra residents. Please bring your ideas, we want to hear what interests you!

After these updates, you can explore these and other topics at hands-on information tables. For example, use an online tool to estimate how much water your family uses, learn about wise water use in the garden and drip irrigation, find out how Quadra's water situation compares to other islands in the region, see some of the data on our aquifers, talk to the experts who presented, and more. To top things off, if you have a dug well, you can enter a draw for one of ten devices that monitor water levels from the comfort of your

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

Quadra Island Residents Affirm Support for Tourism in New Provincial Report

Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce commits to community-first tourism development

Quadra Island, BC — A new report from Destination British Columbia has found that Quadra Island residents recognize and value the positive role tourism plays in their community, with strong levels of support across key areas such as economic benefit, cultural enrichment, and quality of life.

The Resident Perceptions of Tourism Snapshot Series 2024–25 reveals that:

- 70.2% of Quadra Island residents agree that visitors make a valuable contribution to the local economy.
- 55.6% believe tourism contributes positively to their overall quality of life.
- Tourism's social and cultural impact received a score of 3.31 out of 5, while Indigenous tourism experiences were rated the highest among impact areas at 4.02.

"We are grateful to the 238 residents who took the time to respond to the survey. These findings reflect a thoughtful and balanced view of tourism among Quadra Island residents," said Carol Perry, Treasurer for the Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce. "Our community sees the value tourism brings, while also expressing clear expectations for sustainable growth and cultural respect."

The report also highlights that residents are generally comfortable with current tourism levels in the spring and fall and show interest in seeing more balanced year-round visitation. Segmentation analysis shows that nearly one quarter of respondents categorized as Tourism Ambassadors or Tourism Supporters—those with consistently positive views across multiple tourism impact areas.

Chamber of Commerce Responds with Commitment to Community

In response to the report, the Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce is reaffirming its dedication to responsible and inclusive tourism planning that reflects resident priorities.

The Chamber commits to:

- Engaging residents in decision-making and keeping community sentiment at the forefront of tourism strategies.
- Promoting sustainable practices that respect environmental limits and reduce seasonal strain.
- Championing local and Indigenous tourism operators to ensure economic benefits are felt locally.

- Educating visitors to respect Quadra Island's natural beauty, community values, and cultural heritage.
- "Our path forward is one that listens to our residents and works collaboratively to protect what makes Quadra Island unique," Carol Perry added. "Tourism can and should support—not strain—the fabric of our island community."

Marine Debris Clean Up Grand Totals

The 2 big 40 yard bins of recycling contained 1560 kg & 1680 kg totalling 3240 kg (7143 lbs).

They will go to the Ocean Legacy Foundation recycling facility.

The 20 yard bin for Landfill garbage was 1600 kg or 3527 lbs.

For a grand total of 4480 kg (10,758 lbs) removed by volunteers from Quadra's beaches.

The totals do not include items that were taken (stolen from the site) or upcycled or sadly not possible to be removed by human power from beaches due to their size.

We are very hopeful our new recycling facility will be constructed this fall which will have an area for marine debris to be brought to any time of year.

Thank you to everyone who came out on our beach clean hikes and those that sorted the collected material and loaded the bins.


This is our largest collection so far. Its sad really that that much garbage is just thrown or lost into our waters.

Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce Launches "Four Seasons of Reconciliation" Training Initiative

A community-wide effort to promote reconciliation, economic inclusion, and cultural understanding

Quadra Island, BC - The Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce (DICC), in collaboration with the We Wai Kai Nation, Quadra Island Foundation, and local partners, is proud to announce the official launch of the Four Seasons of Reconciliation training program. This initiative marks a major step toward building a more inclusive and resilient local economy through education, dialogue, and meaningful relationship-building.

The program will roll out over two years, beginning with Chamber Council members and project team, then expanding to the broader business community and public. Participants will engage in a series of workshops, videos, and discussion circles designed to deepen understanding of Indigenous histories, cultures, and contemporary issues. The program is being delivered in partnership with Reconciliation Education and the First Nations University of Canada.

"By launching this program, we are committing to a future where reconciliation is embedded in how we do business and build community," said Carol Ann Terreberry, President of the Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce. "We believe economic development must go hand-in-hand with respect, equity, and cultural awareness."

The launch aligns with broader goals laid out in the Chamber's Economic Diversification and Sustainable Tourism Strategy, funded through the Province of British Columbia's REDIP program. The training supports Call to Action #92 of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, urging businesses to provide intercultural competency training and build respectful relationships with Indigenous communities.

Jason Wilson, Director of Economic Development for the We Wai Kai Nation, emphasized the importance of this initiative: "This training is a chance to strengthen our shared understanding and foster economic partnerships built on trust, inclusion, and respect. It's encouraging to see the Chamber taking a leadership role in reconciliation."

Logging in Hyacinthe Creek Watershed



On May 20th I received an email from Mosaic's Jimmie Hodgson, apparently responsible for logging in TFL47, to say that guided by their "science-based watershed assessment" they would be logging an area that previously I and a few grannies had blockaded and got an unofficial moratorium the headwaters of Tan Creek which flows into Mud Lake.

On May 25th I replied to him that:

- (1) the objectivity of their study was questionable as Mosaic had paid for most of it
- (2) due to climate change (we had a level 5 drought in the summer for 3 years from 2021-2023) clearcutting the headwaters and wet-lands of Tan Creek (salmon bearing at

its estuary to Mud Lake) was wrong, and moreover that

(3) their "science-based watershed assessment" was flawed because it referenced an isolated fact that young conifers, aged 10-43 years take up more water in the summer than they give back -water that could otherwise be available to trickle down into creeks

Yet Mosaic is clearcutting ALL second growth trees irrespective of age.

In any case this is a poor practical application of an isolated scientific finding seen from one perspective only and misapplied to all second growth trees. Nature doesn't work like this.

On May 21st., the day after I received the email from Jimmie Hodgson, Mosaic started to clearcut the 2 areas, it took them 2 days to finish. Many years ago I met Ruth Masters on the trail to Love Lake. When I congratulated her on the work she did to try to save Strathcona Park from mining, one of the things she said was: "You turn your back and they're in like a rat up a drainpipe."

The Board moved to send a letter of complaint to the CRTC (Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission) regarding decommissioning and removing payphones from areas where there is a lack of alternate service and an ongoing need for public payphones for reasons of community safety and accessibility. I'm hopeful the Board's advocacy will positively affect this issue.

THE QUADRA PROJECT

The Warming Oceans

The close connection that exists between the atmosphere and the ocean is not surprising considering that 70% of the planet is covered

by water—about 360 million km2—and the few dozen km of air is extremely thin compared to the 12,750 km diameter of Earth. This means that about 90% of the atmospheric heating caused by rising concentrations of CO2 is transferred to the oceans.

In approximate terms, about one-third of the carbon dioxide we add to the atmosphere by burning fossil fuels stays there for centuries, about one-third is captured and sequestered in various land forms such as forests, soils and vegetation, although one recent United Nations study suggests the terrestrial sequestration may only be about 25%, possibly because forest and plant cover is being diminished by agriculture and fires, and because a higher global temperature is reducing the photosynthesis process by which plants process carbon dioxide into carbon, sugars and oxygen. Much of the remaining one-third of our CO2 emissions that are not absorbed by marine algae dissolves in the oceans to form carbonic acid.

As for the transfer of heat from the atmosphere to the oceans, this close connection is good news and bad news. The good news is that the atmosphere is sufficiently cooled by this transfer of heat that we are able to continue living in a place that, otherwise, we would have rendered uninhabitable decades ago. In this respect, the oceans act as a very efficient shock absorber, collecting about 2,100 times more heat than can be stored in an equal volume of air.

The bad news is that the shock absorber is disguising and delaying the symptoms of our anthropogenic climate crisis. Indeed, this crisis is unfolding exactly as the laws of physics dictate, but with unpredictable surprises that we are just discovering.

The surface of the oceans, described as the top 700 metres, has warmed by about 1°C since 1901 measurements. This means that the water is able to contain less dissolved gases such as the oxygen needed by marine animals. Warmer water is also less able to absorb the carbon dioxide helping to keep down the atmospheric concentrations. And warming water expands, already increasing sea levels by an estimated 21-24 cm since 1880, with another 38 cm expected by 2100 as global temperatures rise. But there's more bad news. A warmer atmosphere holds more humidity—it increases

by about 7% for every Celsius degree, which yields about a 14% increase in precipitation since pre-industrial times. So our 1.5°C higher global temperature means a 10.5% increase in humidity and a 21% increase in precipitation. Unfortunately, this precipitation is not distributed equally, so some places get huge deluges causing flash floods, while others may experience rapid and excessive drying as moisture is sucked out of soils by "flash droughts".

For even more bad news, most of our weather is generated from the oceans, and its higher temperature "supercharges" storms. Whereas the deep ocean temperature is about 4°C, the average surface temperature is about 17°C, which can vary from -2°C at the poles to 30°C in the tropics. It's these high temperatures, either shifting northward from the tropics or being produced locally, that generate the super storms with high winds and heavy precipitation. They cause havoc for us. A warming atmosphere and ocean indicate that the frequency and severity of these storms is going to increase, something that is now happening almost everywhere on the planet. This means that we are paying a price for our carbon dioxide emissions one way or another, if not directly in taxes that are intended to reduce emissions, then in property damage, higher insurance rates, floods, washed out roads, forest fires, heat domes, droughts, bomb cyclones, higher food prices, cancelled ferries, power outages, missed appointments, dislocation, health problems, financial stress for governments and individuals and, for some people, death. As climatologists remind us ,we are bringing to an end the Holocene Climatic Holiday of the last 12,000 years.

Beside the short-term consequences of our carbon dioxide emissions, we will eventually have to confront the long-term effects.

Unless we undergo a radical psychological transformation that instigates a dramatic change in our behaviour, and we manage to perform some revolutionary acts of technological magic, we are on an unstoppable trajectory to higher temperatures. Some parts of our planet will become uninhabitable, unleashing hundreds of millions of refugees. And most of our coastal cities and settlements will eventually have to be abandoned to an inexorable rise in ocean levels.

We seem to think that, individually and collectively, we can carry on as we always have. But, if we do, the eventual consequences will be dire. Unfortunately, the "eventual" is creeping closer.

WAY TO GO

5 Questions to Ask at End-of-Life



Facing the end of life is never easy, but asking the right questions can bring clarity, comfort, and a sense of control during one of life's most uncertain chapters. A

growing movement in healthcare is shifting the focus from simply extending life to ensuring that the life remaining is lived in alignment with personal values and goals.

Dr. Atul Gawande, a surgeon and public health researcher, has been a key voice in this shift. In his influential book Being Mortal, and through his work at Ariadne Labs, he has introduced a framework of five essential questions to guide end-of-life conversations. These questions are designed to move the focus away from just medical treatments and toward what truly matters most to each individual.

The five questions are:

- 1. What is your understanding of where you are and of your illness?
- 2. What are your fears or worries for the future?
- 3. What are your goals and priorities?
- 4. What outcomes are unacceptable to you? What are you willing to sacrifice—and not?
- 5. What would a good day look like?

These questions encourage thoughtful, ongoing conversations—not just at the time of a medical crisis, but early enough to shape care that is consistent with the patient's values. As Dr. Gawande has emphasized, asking these questions allows everyone involved—patients, families, and clinicians-to understand what the person is really fighting for.

This approach doesn't suggest that people give up on treatment or hope. Instead, it offers a way to ensure that the choices made along the way support what's most important to the individual, whether that's more time,



more comfort, or more meaningful moments with loved ones. Even choices that may seem unconventional—like indulging in small pleasures or declining aggressive treatments can be completely valid when weighed against the person's definition of a good day.

While healthcare often focuses on safety and longevity, Dr. Gawande points out that questions about connection, joy, and personal dignity are just as critical. Sometimes, honoring someone's wishes means saving "ves" to something that may not be medically ideal but deeply meaningful to them. That, too, is living well.

It's normal to meet some resistance when beginning these conversations. Talking about mortality can be uncomfortable, and people may initially avoid the topic. But even if the conversation is brief or tentative, it plants a seed. It opens the door to deeper understanding later—when the need becomes more pressing, or when the person feels ready to share more.

The most important thing is to start. By asking these five questions, inspired by Dr. Atul Gawande's work, we create space for compassion, clarity, and peace in this last season of life.
