# Heriot Bay – Whaletown Terminal Upgrades



# Hello Quadra and Cortes Island community members,

It's been a productive month and I want to first and foremost share our appreciation of your ongoing patience and support. The crews on site have loved getting to know the community as you drop by for visits and check-ins. Thank you for welcoming us to your communities!

I'm pleased to share that construction has been going well, and we have reached the first official milestone at Heriot Bay with the opening of the temporary trestle on July 15. As I mentioned last month, this structure will allow us to keep the ferry running while we remove the old trestle and construct a new one. This structure will be in use until the new berth is completed later this year.

At Whaletown, the crews have been working hard to install the new structural piles that will eventually support the new ramp early next year and later in July, you will notice additional marine equipment on-site that will be used to install new rock and rip-rap to armor and reinforce the shoreline.

As exciting as the on-site construction is, this month, I'd also like to highlight some of the work that is happening off-site and behind the scenes. BC Ferries is pleased to be working with local contractors to complete not only the construction of the new berths, but also the fabrication of several new components.

- Duncan, BC: Many new structural steel components are being built, by Pacific Industrial and Marine, our general contractor.
- Campbell River, BC: Two new concrete floats are being fabricated by Pacific Marine Construction.
- Delta, BC: New concrete pontoons that will support the ramp are under construction at International Marine Flotation Systems.

Keeping you informed throughout the project is top of mind, and you'll continue to hear from us through service notices, mail-outs, social media, sign boards, and this regular column. We also plan to be back to visit your communities in the fall.

Eligible applicants are Quadra Island students who have not received this bursary in the past.


Michael was a tradesman and always proud of his blue collar status, so these bursaries are open to students entering trade schools and art academies, etc, as well as academic institutes.



From the bottom of our hearts: thank you!





# Help Shape Campbell River's Future: Join Us at Upcoming Events to Discuss the Official Community Plan

The City of Campbell River is inviting community members to help shape the future of the community by attending upcoming pop-up events for the Official Community Plan (OCP) update.

The City is updating its OCP — a long-term plan that guides how Campbell River will grow and develop over the next 20 years. Since the project began in early 2024, we've completed background research, gathered community input, and started developing draft policies. Now, we're in Phase 3: Draft Plan Development, and we're ready to share early ideas and hear what you think.

Join us at Campbell River Farmers Market: Sunday, July 27, 2025 | 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. | Spirit Square, Downtown

These informal events are drop-in style — no presentations, just City staff ready to chat, answer questions, walk you through ideas, and collect your feedback.

We'll be sharing highlights from the spring 2025 community survey, which more than 660 of you took the time to complete! These results are summarized, alongside details on values, ideas, and priorities, in the What We Learned report, which is available on the project website.

Highlights of feedback to date include:

• What you love most about Campbell River: breathtaking natural beauty, that small-town

feel, the wealth of recreational opportunities, and easy access to water and trails.

- What matters most to you: a safe community, housing choices people can afford, parks and trails, community facilities and amenities, and thoughtful land use planning.
- Where there is room for improvement: making downtown safer with local businesses supports, more recreation facilities, more housing, supporting vulnerable residents, and better transportation.

"We heard from many residents early in the process, and now we're checking back in to share what we've learned and where we're headed," says Andy Gaylor, Director of Community Planning and Livability. "Your input continues to be key in shaping a plan that reflects the community's values and priorities. Drop by, learn about the OCP process and the highlights from the recent community survey, and provide your feedback on future land use ideas."

# Where have all the forests gone?

Our family moved to Quadra Island 10 years ago to enjoy the sea, the forests, and all the amazing hiking trails here close to home. During the last few years though I have noticed many of the hiking trails that I have enjoyed with family and friends are being logged over. Clearcuts go right up to the trails or right across them; and leave the lakes, rivers and wetlands with little or no buffer - often piled with debris, and the slopes eroding into the streams, no longer able to retain water. I understand from speaking with

long-time residents and doing some research that concerns about the ongoing loss of mature forests have been brought forward over the years with little result. The old growth remaining on Quadra Island is now around 4% according to estimates. There are still some old trees in the few protected areas and on steep bluffs inaccessible to logging. The few large trees left from previous logging, now in stands of trees 80-100 years old, are basically the only "mature forest" remaining on the island and are now being targeted for logging.

This island is seeing more drought and a scary wildfire last year! Science has shown that preserving mature forest ecosystems is vital to providing recharge of the water tableimportant for residential wells and businesses on the island; they mitigate wildfire and flood risk by storing water that seeps slowly into the soil and the mycelium networks This ground water keeps forests moist and cool through the summer, stabilizing temperatures and providing the habitat all the wildlife and plants need to survive. Wetlands need to be protected to conserve water in this era of warming climate, drought and wildfire danger. These mature forest groves provide the "ecosystem services" that we all depend on; and this should be the guiding value for deciding where and what to log not just profit.

It is contradictory policy that the government on the one hand is providing important residential FireSmart recommendations; yet on the other allowing logging governed by weak, poorly enforced regulations, to destroy water retention in the soil and to leave piles of dead, drying debris in large clear-cut areas - potential fuel for wildfires.

We all need this resource and should use it wisely. BC government stats show that most of the cut by Mosaic Forest Management is exported as whole logs. If more stayed on the island or in BC there would be more jobs at the local mills and businesses. Many First Nations have realized that leaving the forests intact provides much greater long-term economic and cultural value. In some cases the forests are selectively logged. Other First Nations are selling carbon credits which generate more value than industrial logging. The forests also provide the basis for very successful eco-tourism businesses drawing tourists from around the world - many of whom want to see some of the only remaining intact forests, and wildlife, left in the world. The tourism sector across BC now brings double the GDP value of each of the logging, oil and gas or mining sectors.

The beautiful forests, home to many animals and the recreational activities that tourists and residents enjoy on the island, should be preserved for the local communities who depend on them for their living: by tourism, recreation, agriculture or even small-scale logging by residents. At the very least the watersheds-lakes, wetlands, rivers and streams, and wildlife corridors-could be protected to ensure the island has adequate water, wildfire resilience, and can continue to provide necessary wildlife habitat, and many recreational opportunities for community and tourists.

We need intelligent stewardship

of the land and resources. I understand that over 30% of Quadra Island is open to logging in TFL47 by government policy compared to 18% of land in protected areas. The Federal and Provincial governments have committed to effective protection and management of 30% of lands and water by 2030. I am hopeful! Sheila Cavanagh

Seeing forests on this island treated with respect is what I as a granny would love to witness in my lifetime. It is, after all, what First Nations have done historically and so perhaps not too much to hope for.



# **Biological Wonders - Part 2**

Below are seven biological wonders that should help to confirm the sophisticated intelligence of nature. These are merely a sample of what we are discovering about the animals and plants that share this planet with us, a reminder that is particularly appropriate since our behaviour has initiated the sixth major extinction event in Earth's history.

- Soil, which is not the same as dirt, is alive, "criss-crossed with a hard-to-fathom complexity of connections, a multitude of symbiotic partnerships between plant roots, mycorrhizal fungi and nitrogen-fixing bacteria." (Rowan Hooper, "Going Deeper", New Scientist, Feb. 22, 2025). Up to half of all the living biomass of soils is composed of these networks. Soil soaks up about a third of all carbon humans put into the atmosphere each year. It holds three times more carbon than the living biomass above ground, and twice the amount that is in the atmosphere.
- A fruit-sucking moth found in northern Australia and South-East Asia, Eudocima aurantia, tricks predators with colouration on its flat wings that make the moth appear to be a curled leaf. Its scales are a nanostructure that produces mirror-like reflections to create the illusion of curvature. This allows the moth to sit safely on fruit without being noticed ("Moth Uses Optical Illusion to Disguise Itself as a Leaf", New Scientist, Feb. 22, 2025).
- In 1967, while exploring a disease that decimated potato crops, Theodor Diener eventually identified an infectious agent that was smaller than a virus. He called it a viroid. The scientific community paid little attention for half a century. We now know that a viroid is a single "naked" molecule of RNA surrounded by a protein. Like a virus, a viroid can't replicate on its own, so it enters a cell and commandeers its systems causing the cell to die. We have since discovered that there are thousands of different kinds of viroids, mostly found in plants but also in fungi, animals and the human gut. Biologists debate whether or not viruses are "living", so viroids pose the same question but at an even deeper level. "Should we view them as biological or merely complicated chemistry?" ("Small Wonders", Michael Marshall, New Scientist, Feb. 15,
- A newly discovered fungus, Gibellula attenboroughii, affects two cave-dwelling species of spiders by taking control of their bodies, inducing them to move from their preferred hiding places to unusually high and exposed locations. Once there, the fungus

- consumes the spider, turning it into white fibrous mass. Once mature, the spores of the fungus can then be rained down on other unsuspecting spiders. This is similar to another parasitic genus of fungus, Ophiocordyceps, that affects ants and other insects. It, too, forces the insect to climb to high places, bursts through the head, and showers other insects with its spores. ("Behold the Fungus...", Sheena Goodyear, As It Happens, CBC Radio, Posted Feb. 10, 2025).
- When one mouse finds another unconscious mouse, it attempts "first aid" (Chris Simms, New Scientist, March 1, 2025). After sniffing, pawing and licking the unconscious mouse, in more than 50% of the cases, the attendant mouse pulls out the victim's tongue to facilitate breathing. In laboratory studies, when a plastic ball was placed in the mouth of the anesthetized mouse, in 80% of the cases the attendant mouse removed the obstruction. This is commensurate with similar "first aid" behaviour noted in other social mammals. Rats are known to attempt the rescue of a distressed rat rather than eat food that is immediately available.
- Salamanders (Aneides vagrans) have a trick for increasing their traction while crawling on rough vertical surfaces (Sophia Quaglia, New Scientist, Feb. 8, 2025). As they put down their feet, they extract the blood from the tips of their 18 toes, essentially creating a soft adhesive surface. When lifting their feet, the blood pulses in again, essentially launching them from the surface. This deflation-then-inflation technique is much more efficient for walking than using muscle strength. The analogy that describes this process is like the difference between a deflated basketball that lands on the floor and stays there, in contrast with an inflated basketball that bounces.
- Chimpanzees, it seems, drum to communicate. Recent studies in Africa have revealed that the drumming is so explicit that each individual chimpanzee can be recognized by its own rhythm, intensity and volume, in effect, a recognizable signature. Since the sound travels long distances, chimpanzees have a clear idea of who is where in the jungle. Chimpanzees in East Africa have distinctly different rhythms, a seemingly different drumming dialect than those in West Africa. (Quirks and Quarks, CBC Radio, May 24, 2025).

# What Happens If You Die Without a Will?



Most of us don't like thinking about death, but it's part of life—

and when someone dies without a will, it can leave behind more

than just grief. It often creates confusion, legal complications, and unintended consequences for the people left behind.

When there's no will, it's called intestacy. In this situation, the law decides how your money, property, and belongings are divided. The government doesn't usually keep your estate, but it does follow a strict formula that may not reflect your wishes.

For example, if you have a spouse but no children, everything typically goes to your spouse. If you have both a spouse and children, the estate is divided between them according to a legal formula—whether or not that's what you would have wanted. If there's no spouse or children, your assets are passed to parents, siblings, nieces, nephews, and more distant relatives, in a specific order. Close friends, stepchildren, and charities you care about aren't included unless you've named them in a will.

A will also lets you choose someone you trust—called an executor—to handle your affairs. Without this, someone has to apply to the court to administer the estate, which can lead to delays or disagreements. And if you have children under 19, your will is where you name guardians to care for them. If you don't, the court may have to decide who steps in.

But here's an important point: your will needs to be valid and fair. If it's not properly signed and witnessed, or if it leaves out certain people the law requires you to consider (like a dependent spouse or child), the courts may treat it as though you never made one. In that case, intestacy rules will still apply, no matter what your intentions were.

Making a will doesn't have to be complicated or expensive. Quadra's notary public Sally Houghton can help, and if your estate is very straightforward, you can use a do-it-yourself kit or trusted online resource. The most important thing is to make sure your will is clear, legal, and thoughtful of the people who rely on you.

None of us likes to imagine the worst, but making a will is one of the kindest things you can do for your loved ones. It removes uncertainty, prevents unnecessary stress, and gives you peace of mind knowing your wishes will be respected. So pour yourself a cup of tea, take a deep breath, and start the process. Your family will thank you.

# SRD Area C OCP - Kids Art Contest Winners Announced



# JOB OPPORTUNITY PROJECT LEAD FOR CAPE MUDGE GARDEN

The Garden Club/ICAN Food Security team has received funding from ISPARC, BC Hydro and the CCCU to revitalize the garden at Cape Mudge. What began as youth in the afterschool program asking, "Are we going to get the garden going again?" is now a work in progress.

Together with the Youth Coordinator of the We Wai Kai Nation, the GC/ICAN project lead will manage the garden in consultation with the We Wai Kai youth and the wider Cape Mudge Community. At this time, we are offering a contract position of 40 hours at \$30 an hour for a total of \$1,200. There is some potential for the hours to be increased.

The raised beds have been weeded, provided with new soil and amendments and there are growing crops in each.
