Heriot Bay – Whaletown Terminal Upgrades



Hello Quadra and Cortes Island community members,

It's been a busy time on both islands as terminal work progresses and summer visitors arrive! I'd like to thank everyone for their ongoing patience and support while we work to rebuild the terminals. It's been a productive month for the construction crews at both terminals and I'm pleased to share an update.

At Heriot Bay, you may have noticed that the existing trestle was quickly removed following the commissioning of the temporary operations trestle last month. In addition, we've built a temporary bridge structure to support the crane during construction of the new trestle.

Earlier this month, the crane — working from this new structure — installed the first permanent pilings. As we move through August and September, you'll begin to see the new trestle take shape with the installation of steel piles and concrete beams. In late August, additional marine construction equipment will be mobilized to Heriot Bay to further support the construction of the new berth.

As I mentioned in last month's update, work continues at Whaletown through August. Some unforeseen ground conditions have challenged the construction crews on site, but the pile installation

work is progressing and is expected to wrap up around the end of the month. Once complete, the crews will join their colleagues at Heriot Bay.

Significant progress has also been made installing new rip-rap and armour rock (material used to protect shoreline structures) at Whaletown. The contractor has been busy unloading marine barges and carefully placing rocks to stabilize the shoreline banks on both sides of the terminal.

Behind the scenes, we've also been planning the alternate service period that will take place during berth closures scheduled for next winter (February 2026). We are looking forward to visiting your communities again later this fall to share additional details of what the alternate service will entail and what your journey to and from Campbell River may look like when the berths are closed.

You'll continue to hear from us through service notices, mail-outs, social media, sign boards, and this regular column, and when we visit your communities in the fall. OLD MAN LUEDECKE

Old Man Luedecke is the
recording name of two time
JUNO award winning and
Polaris prize nominated singer
songwriter Chris Luedecke.
A multiple East Coast Music
Award winner known for his high
energy banjo driven stompers,
touching guitar ballads and dry
humorous stories, Luedecke has
been making a soundtrack to an
authentic life for nearly twenty
years.

Songs like “I Quit My Job” at
the beginning of his career and
“The Early Days” at the beginning
of his family and dozens of other
fan favourites trace a warm line
of effort, sadness and joy, and
provide a soundtrack to many
peoples’ own progress through
adulthood, touching a rare
place of truth and charm in the
holiness of the mundane. His
performing style with his easy
going humour and storytelling

creates a rare space of hopeful and
intimate magic.

Luedecke has kept up many
worldwide concert appearances,
playing in Europe and around
Canada and the USA and six
trips to Australia, including
a memorable tour where his
whole young family travelled with
him around rural Queensland for
the Festival of Small Halls.

In May 2022 Luedecke was
awarded an honorary doctorate
from King’s University in Halifax
for his cultural contributions.

KING MISSILE (DOG FLY RELIGION)

King Missile is an alternative and
psychedelic rock band from New
York City. They are known for
their humorous and existential
songs, typically made from
the poetry stylings of vocalist
John S Hall. Their music covers
the realms of psychedelic rock
and folk, with the earliest and
current iteration of the band

being filled out by the musical
stylings of singer/songwriter
Dogbowl (Stephen Tunney).
They are known for songs such
as “Detachable Penis,” “Sensitive
Artist,” “Jesus Was Way Cool,”
and “Take Stuff from Work.”

JARON FREEMAN FOX & ANH PHUNG

Crawling out of the depths of a
perpetual psychedelic sojourn,
Acidtripca insists on its own
inexistence as a literal illiterate
alliteration; a tactile fractured
fractal time-tunnel where the
punchline is a distant memory.

Virtuoso flutist Anh Phung
floats between countless
genres and is known for her

Team Work Makes the Dream Work!

AFTER SEVERAL MONTHS and a few postponements August 4th was selected by all involved to get some massive pollution out of the environment and off Quadra's shores.

Captain Carl Peterson volunteered his boat to pull this large offroad haul truck tire off the beach at Whalebone Bay (just north of Copper Bluffs). John and I were on board as deck hands and skiff operators. The tire didn't come off easily after having been stuck there for over 10 years. We persevered and it finally did start to move. Towing it back to Quathiaski Cove was easy with the calculated flood tide. The

next part was for me to maneuver it to the boat ramp where Terry Krook, The Happy Hooker, was waiting with his trusty flatbed tow truck. After dragging it onto his deck, Terry offloaded in the Harbour Authorities parking area. Jay Caldwell agreed to provide short term storage.

I checked my email when I returned home to find that the BC Tire Stewardship Authorities want \$450 per ton for recycling. I am still communicating with them and Strathcona Waste Management about removal and associated costs. I estimate the weight at over 5000 lbs.

Thanks goes out all those involved, and to Barb and Shelly for bringing this tire to our attention.

Spirit Points fueled the crew on the journey north, so remember #319 when shopping at either TruValue store.

It was a very interesting and satisfying afternoon and good news for our environment.

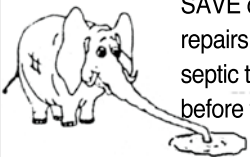
UPDATE: The tire won't be recycled due to the cost, unfortunately. CVWM will take it as landfill.

DID YOU KNOW that Quadra's very first Fall Fair sprouted up back in 2011? It was dreamed into being by a passionate crew of island visionaries who gathered in living rooms and around kitchen tables to hatch a plan. The list of folks who pitched in is waaaaaay too long to list here, but a special tip of the hat goes to Sioux Hartle, Leslie Smith, Robyn Mawhinney, Maureen Fox and Lesley-Ann Hart for helping to get the ball rolling.

They imagined an event that would celebrate the culture of rural life on Quadra Island—a true community gathering where traditions could be shared, talents showcased, and neighbours of all ages brought together. From those early dreams, the Fall Fair was born.

At its heart, the Fall Fair philosophy has always been about more than just fun. It's also about:

- Sharing knowledge and talents
- Welcoming people of all ages, lifestyles, and interests
- Creating a beloved community tradition
- Celebrating the spirit of volunteerism
- Encouraging self-reliance in food production and sustainable living



And what a success it became! 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REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Hello,

What a blessing the rain has been, when wildfires and smoky skies have been sparking so much stress. This report is an update on the SRD's Beach Access project and shares news on further Quadra beach accesses which SRD staff are working on, plus how to find the shore accesses the SRD have already opened and installed signage for.

BEACH ACCESS PROJECT: PHASE TWO HAS COMMENCED

As islanders surrounded by the sea, access to shorelines improves our quality of life. Beach access signage provides comfort to coastal explorers in knowing they are utilizing a public access point. For years the SRD has been working on opening shore access locations on Quadra Island: big thanks to Director Abram for his work initiating this, and the shore access locations which had signage installed in Phase One of the project.

The SRD has now received permits from the Province for six additional beach access locations and the Quadra Island Beach Access project is officially in Phase Two. The project has a further Phase Three for future consideration, which includes accesses that require more resources to open them to the public.

BEACH ACCESSSES ARE PUBLIC ACCESS POINTS

Beach accesses are located on 'undeveloped provincial road rights-of-way' which lead to the foreshore; they are managed by the Ministry of Transportation and Transit. Technically undeveloped road rights-of-way are all public accesses, but they are often overgrown with shrubbery, unmarked, and in occasional instances utilized by adjacent property owners.

FOUR SITES IN PROGRESS

Of the six beach accesses in Phase Two, signage and minor works have been completed on two of the sites: at Bold Point, and at Ferry Road (in the Cove). The other four sites are at Huntley Road, Hyacinthe Bay Road, Raydon Road, and Orian Road. Initial site inspections have been completed for these four sites and necessary improvements have been determined.

The four sites have various requirements for improvements to facilitate access, including brush clearing, boardwalk or stair construction, drainage works, and parking management (or other options to minimize potential issues with neighbouring private properties).

The next step for these four sites is organizing site visits with SRD staff, contractors, and volunteer groups, to help determine budget requirements to action development of the sites. Once the budgetary needs are known they can be brought forward and considered for incorporation in the 2026 financial planning process.

Perhaps one of the four new sites listed above is in your neighbourhood and/or you're interested in volunteering time or resources to open up

these beach accesses? Now is a great time to connect and discuss. Please reach out to Jacob Blanchard, the SRD's Parks Technician (jblanchard@srd.ca) to chat about possible options.

HOW TO FIND SRD BEACH ACCESSSES

By now you may be wondering where the already-signed shore access locations are, so you can explore and possibly expand your 'favourite beaches' list. The SRD is working on a webpage which shares information and locations for shoreline accesses, alas, the site is not available quite yet. However, there is a map which shares all the beach access locations for Quadra, along with those for Cortes and Area D. If you're curious or want a new adventure, check out this link, which SRD staff keep updated as more sites are completed: bit.ly/SRDBeachAccessMap

The shoreline access project strikes a personal chord – during the pandemic my husband and I used the SRD's uMapit utility to discover and explore undeveloped road rights-of-way, leading to many beautiful and interesting shorelines. I'm excited that the SRD's shore access project continues, providing access to more shores, for more folks.

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MAPLE MEADOWS
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Granite Bay's Gold Mine Era Population

VISITORS SNAP PHOTOGRAPHS of Lucky Jim's giant flywheel and toss pebbles through the grillwork capping of its shafts to test for depth. The old copper mines in north Gowlland Harbour were actively worked too, but gold sparkles in our imaginations, giving Lucky Jim enduring appeal and the exaggerated claims of legend. A notice screwed to a tree on site suggests Granite Bay had a population of 5,000 people at the mine's peak—which is about the size of the current town of Duncan—but historical records prove otherwise.

One of Quadra's earliest logging operators, Hugh Grant, took samples of gold and silver-bearing ore he found in Granite Bay to Victoria's Colonist newspaper in 1892, but nothing further came of his discovery.

Grant was followed by a larger firm, BC Mills Timber and Trading Company of Vancouver (known as Hastings.) They started horse logging in the early 1890s and the site proved so rich they switched to hauling by railway in 1901. Their main camp was about three miles inland.

In 1901, eight mineral claims on north Quadra were registered with the Minister of Mines and many more followed over the next few years.

Lucky Jim was likely among them.

Capital was required to test and develop mines, so the Great Granite Development Syndicate was formed and a bombastic New York investor named George D. Mumford took the helm. He said they 'acquired' Lucky Jim in 1904 from Alexander McNair, Superintendent of the Hastings Company, and a logger named James Deans. (It's possible Lucky Jim was Deans' namesake.)

Work on Lucky Jim proceeded slowly at first, but by 1908 the mine was shipping ore. That September its shaft was said to be down fifty feet and a spur line from Hastings' logging railway was used to transport ore to an expanded dock in Granite Bay.

The next year, in 1909, the

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syndicate erected crew housing along Hastings' rail line, at the junction of what's now Granite Bay and Open Bay Main roads. (Granite Bay Road did not exist until 1951.)

Mumford placed full-page ads in newspapers across the country through 1909, saying they were shipping 336 tons of gold and copper-bearing ore.

Work was done by hand until 1910, when an air compressor plant was installed to run drilling equipment and to pump ground water from the shafts.

Dozens of other mineral claims to the east of Lucky Jim were also tested at this time, through a limestone belt that ran as far as Bold Point.

In 1910, with what seemed a bright future ahead, the Bull family—owners of Heriot Bay Hotel and Store—opened a small hotel, store and post office in Granite Bay. Sadly, work on Lucky Jim slumped the following year and was never again fully revived, causing the Bulls to sell their business in 1911.

That same year, George Mumford resigned his post in a swirl of controversy, with 32 people suing for unpaid wages. Alexander McNair of Hastings Company took over the helm and the mine was eventually sold at public auction. Work continued thereafter in a modest way, with 181 tons of ore being shipped to a smelter in 1916. In 1925, a major forest fire that swept down from Granite Bay to north Gowlland Harbour wiped out Lucky Jim's compressor plant and its boilers.

Various companies have held the mineral rights to Lucky Jim since that time. In 1984, in a deep recession that saw a spike in gold prices, Butler Mountain Minerals sampled the mine's two shafts. They found gold and silver-bearing ore, but not in sufficient quantity or quality to warrant the expense of working the mine.

In Granite Bay's heyday, in 1910, there were 29 people listed as residents in a provincial directory, a partial source based upon postal records. The 1911 Canadian census captured all (or most) names, listing 219 people living in and around Granite Bay. Fifty-five of them were loggers and thirteen were miners or prospectors, the rest were farmers or fishers.

So, there you have it—Granite Bay's peak population, as it relates to settlers, loggers and the Lucky Jim Mine. (Archaeological sites in Granite Bay and Kanish Bay, however, demonstrate this area had a population in the hundreds before the smallpox epidemic of 1862 killed thousands of Indigenous people.)

For a more detailed account of Lucky Jim Mine (with research sources cited), look for my local history binder recently donated to the library as an in-house reference tool.

Watts Up?

BESIDES CALCULATING global warming by correlating it to the carbon dioxide concentration in the atmosphere—which, incidentally has now risen from 280 ppm to nearly 430 ppm—another method is to measure the direct heating of Earth's surface that comes from sunshine. This is done by measuring the energy that strikes the surface of our planet as watts per square metre. This energy is then reflected from Earth's surface as radiant heat, blocked from escaping back into space primarily by the carbon dioxide in the atmosphere.

Without the warming effect of any greenhouse atmospheric gases, the energy we get directly from the sun would only heat Earth to -18°C . In other words, the unique gaseous composition of the atmosphere enveloping our planet warms it to the so-called "Goldilocks Zone"—not too hot and not too cold for sustaining life as we understand it.

Unfortunately, writes Madeleine Cuff in New Scientist ("Earth Warms as Heat Trapping Doubles", June 15, 2024). "Earth's atmosphere is trapping more than twice as much excess heat as it did in 1993." The surplus heat "in the climate system... is the difference between how much energy enters Earth's atmosphere from the sun, and how much is radiated back into space."

This difference can be measured in watts per square metre (W/m^2). Between 1974 and 1993 the average energy imbalance was 0.42 watts/ m^2 , and between 2004 and 2023 it had more than doubled to 0.87 W/m^2 .

Much of this heat, more than 90%, is being transferred to the oceans, a process that is changing currents and weather patterns, is decreasing the aquatic oxygen levels needed by fish, and is melting Greenland and Antarctic ice. This, in turn, reduces surface salinity that then changes current movement and weather patterns. The heat is also penetrating deeper into the oceans, up to 2,000 metres. This warmer water is less capable of absorbing the CO_2 that becomes carbonic acid. This reduced the rate of ocean acidification is good news, but the process leaves more carbon dioxide in the atmosphere to accelerate atmospheric warming.

The rate of heating from sunlight on the whole planet has increased sharply since 2022. The rate between 2010-2022 was 0.89 W/m^2 and 2024 put the heating rate from 2011-2023 at 0.96 W/m^2 . Some of this increase can be attributed to an El Niño year, but the heating trajectory is clear: Earth is getting hotter, faster. It is now heating at 0.26°C per decade, double the rate in 1983.

All this affects our health and our economic systems. A study by Dabo Guan from Tsinghua University in Beijing (New Scientist, March 23, 2024, and Nature, doi.org/mm2t.) found that, even by a low emissions scenario for greenhouse gases by 2060, a 25% increase in heat waves will cause 600,000 fatalities, and a \$3.75 trillion reduction in global economic activity as people are unable to work in the heat and as supply lines are disrupted and food shortages occur.

By 2060—which is 35 years from now, if anyone is counting—if we don't drastically

reduce emissions, according to the study, we can expect a 100% increase in heatwaves, 1.1 million extra deaths per year, and \$25 trillion in lost economic activity. "In the high emissions scenario, [the study found] that losses from the indirect effects on global supply chains grow exponentially from 2030, and by 2060 become the major contributor to total losses." As a comparison, all global earnings in 2023 came to \$100 trillion. This heat-induced scenario would trigger the most severe financial crisis in modern history. According to Guan, "People will suffer from disruption of electricity, shortage of food or price surges, and loss of employment."

All this information means that we are tampering with the fundamental climate structure that has accommodated our civilizational success as a species. The changes to the biosphere that we are initiating will subject us to a massive experiment resulting in unprecedented economic and political stresses. We can also expect dramatic challenges to our safety and security as weather extremes intensify and ocean ecologies become traumatized by temperature and acidity.

For us, as we live our daily lives, it's easy to forget that, in geological terms, our dramatic alteration of Earth's ecology is almost instantaneous. All the indications are that the increasing intensity of fires, floods, storms and drought are just a sample of what is to come for our children and their children as they try to live on a less hospitable planet. Watt's up? is a question that we should be asking ourselves with a measure of considerable concern. Ray Grigg, for Sierra Quadra

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Observations of a Not-so-idyllic Past

JEANETTE TAYLOR'S BOOKS have always provided the basics of Quadra Island history, but other accounts may help to expand those horizons. They hasten the conclusion that much of what has been said about the present Quadra Island does not accurately correspond with the history upon which it is drawn. Indeed, there appears a picture of an idyllic island of the past besmirched by its industrial present, a flawed present largely ascribed to logging.



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Following colonial expansion onto our island, many features changed. Logging came early and commercial fishing soon afterward. As an outgrowth of logging, mining and agriculture also arrived. And this is where the idyll begins to evaporate. The settlement of Quadra Island was industrial almost from its outset and that industry was far from benign.

By 1950, most of the forest was directly and indirectly destroyed by logging, fire and water diversion. The largest logging operation on the island now employed only 20 people. Smaller operations operated intermittently. The fishery declined. Logging came almost to a standstill. Communities atrophied and disappeared. Little was done to restore the forest apart from the encouragement of local regeneration. Wherever possible, logging continued and forests continued to burn. Fortunately for Quadra Island, it was then, and is now, a prolific regenerator of forests... but regeneration was not enough.

By the late 1940s, it was evident that changes in logging had to be made, not only on Quadra Island, but throughout the province. The Province believed that logging by small-scale operators was not producing at the level that the government desired and responsibility for forest recovery had been left to the government.

A new approach was necessary. With the Forest Act of 1947, came the tree farm licences (TFLs). On Quadra, that meant Tree Farm Licence 2, established in 1948 and only the second in the province. As with other TFLs, the licensee, Canadian Western Timber Company, was obliged to contribute private land holdings to the licence. As a result, TimberWest, the present licensee, owns a sizable amount of private land around the island.

Many of the earlier obligations placed on TFL licensees have now been dropped. For example, a licensee is no longer obliged to maintain a local sawmill (a practice called 'appurtenancy'). Instead, it must now offer all its timber to BC mills through the local log market. Any wood that is left may be sold elsewhere. About 90% of logs from TFL 47 (the successor to TFL 2) are sold domestically.

In 1979, legislative changes also allowed the government to "take back" portions of a TFL every 25 years or when the licence changed hands. In this way, small woodlots were extracted from the tree farm and allocated to smaller operations. There are eleven such woodlots on Quadra Island including that of the We Wai Kai Nation.

But, in the late 1940s, there were few logs to sell. Even the most cursory examination of photographs from the period displays the destruction wrought by fire and unabated

cutting. Tree farm licences were believed to facilitate regrowth and revitalize the local industry. In order to further pique the interest of large companies, tree farms were conditionally awarded free. While they were subsequently sold for millions, the first ones were awarded without cost.

In 1948, a forest survey crew under W.G. Hughes reported that 97% of Quadra's immature timber was less than 40 years old and two thirds was less than 20. Mature timber constituted under 20% of the productive forest. Most of the forests are now just beginning to reach the 80 to 100 years that interest forest licensees. In other words, logging has expanded now because it is only now that the forests have sufficiently matured for harvesting. And, unlike logging in the past, local Indigenous people have been invited into the new expansion.

For settlers, the increase in logging in an otherwise natural environment brings its own disturbances. With industry comes heavy traffic and noise. But such disturbances have been here for more than one and a quarter centuries. The new ones – wrought by a growing influx of tourists – have also broken the peace we have had with our environment. More boats crowd the waterways. We see less wildlife. More automobiles congest and mangle our primitive roads. Large trailers and recreation vehicles make ferry transportation ever more frustrating. More people produce more artificial light and make more noise. Unregulated tourism, sometimes seen as a substitute for logging, throws up its own problems. Climate change is already modifying our living environment as surely as logging ever has. And, like tourism worldwide, the industry produces increasing volumes of carbon dioxide.

As settler history of Quadra Island demonstrates, trees can regrow. And they can continue to sequester the carbon dioxide from our atmosphere. But it is difficult to foresee how climate change can be reversed if we do not reduce our emissions now. It seems to me that the new, ahistorical industry – tourism – must answer for some of that.

I was camping with my family at the We Wai Kai Campground site 95 when something spooked me on the morning that we were leaving, July 10. I'm not sure where I am now; I could be hiding in a shed, in someone's house, or wandering through the neighbourhoods close to the campground.

FROM NATALIA, MOCHI'S OWNER:

My thanks to Janet and Lara of Quadra Island Cat Rescue. They have been phenomenal in the search for Mochi by volunteering their time and efforts by posting online, making calls, setting traps, and canvassing neighbourhoods. I am also deeply thankful to the staff at We Wai Kai campground for supporting me in the search.

Mochi has been missing since July 11 when we had to leave the island. Mochi has since been seen in various locations, but has evaded capture. I've returned to the island several times to continue the search, but to no avail. On August 10, I returned home after putting up posters along Hooley and Buker Roads. The next day calls came in that Mochi was spotted along Hooley Rd. I packed up the camper again and came back, setting up on Hooley Rd. this time. After 3 days of setting traps, cameras, and walking along the roads without any



sightings, I came back to the campground hoping this is still his familiar home base.
