Heriot Bay – Whaletown Terminal Upgrades



Hello Quadra and Cortes Island community members,

As summer winds down, I'm pleased to share the following updates for the terminal rebuild projects. As always, I'd like to thank everyone for their ongoing patience and support while we work to upgrade the terminals to support the deployment of the Island Class Vessel between Cortes and Quadra.

At Heriot Bay, construction crews have made significant progress installing portions of the new trestle, including large steel piles and concrete beams that will eventually support the vehicle loading ramp for the new ferry. In the coming weeks, you will notice the terminal becoming quite busy as we ramp up production from both the marine and land side. The contractor is mobilizing additional marine equipment to assist the land-based crane with placing large pre-cast concrete beams and installing marine pilings. At the same time, crews will work from land to place new shoreline protection rock called rip-rap. The rock has been sourced from a local quarry on Quadra Island and will be trucked to the terminal.

The work at Whaletown has faced challenges over the last month due to unforeseen ground conditions and equipment issues. The crew has shown perseverance and advanced the work as much as possible. We are expecting phase one marine work will conclude by the end of September and the crew will join their colleagues at Heriot Bay as production accelerates into October. You may see crews on site at Whaletown installing a concrete pad near the terminal electrical room to support new BC Hydro infrastructure.

Offsite, fabrication work for both new terminals is progressing. On September 3rd, we reached a major milestone with the launch of new floating dolphins for both terminals in Campbell River. The dolphins will be stored in Campbell River until they can be installed on-site.

We look forward to being back in your communities later this fall to discuss the details of the planned alternate service next winter (February 2026). We will share the date and time of our in-person event as soon as it is confirmed.

Renowned Earthquake Expert to Give Talk at Quadra Legion

EARTHQUAKES ARE a fact of life for all of us who live and work on the West Coast. Will you be prepared or panicked when the next one hits?

To learn more about earthquakes in southwestern British Columbia so you can be better prepared, you are invited to a presentation by Alison Bird, an internationally recognized seismologist with Natural Resources Canada, on Thursday, October 23rd at the Quadra Legion Hall.

Alison is passionate about creating safer communities through natural hazard education and risk mitigation. Her presentation will cover earthquake hazards, preparedness, and the Earthquake Early Warning System, which she helped develop.

This is a great opportunity to hear, and learn from, an expert on what we can expect here on Quadra. There will be a question period after her talk.

Alison's presentation on Quadra is hosted by the Quadra Island Emergency Preparedness Program, to mark the Annual Great BC Shakeout event held in October every year. Support for the Quadra Island Emergency Preparedness Program is provided by the Strathcona Regional District, Emergency Preparedness.

Note that this presentation will be held at the Quadra Legion, next to the Heriot Bay Tru-Value Food Store. Doors open at 6:30, coffee and dessert provided. Alison's presentation starts at 7pm. Come early to hear this popular speaker as seating at this venue will be limited.

When They're Not Ready to Talk About Death

THIS WAS EXTRACTED from a video by Sarah Kerr, founder of the Centre for Sacred

Deathcare.



Talking about death can be difficult—especially if you're in good health and not expecting it anytime soon. But the truth is, death can come for any of

us at any time, and it's still important to have that conversation, even when it feels far away.

It's also important to talk with friends and family, even if they don't feel ready. Many people aren't open to talking about death for all kinds of reasons, and that's okay. It's essential to honour and respect where they are. The key is to approach the conversation gently, one small step at a time.

We titrate. We take tiny doses of truth, gradually. One way to begin is by creating a space for gentle witnessing. For example, instead of diving into personal feelings or plans, you might say: "I saw a movie where someone died, and it really made me think;" or "I came across a video where someone talked about caring for their loved one after they died; I found it really moving. What do you think about that?"

These kinds of abstract or third-person examples don't feel threatening. You're not

talking about your death or their death—just inviting reflection.

When you say, "This is what I want when I die," it can escalate quickly into someone confronting their love for you and their fear of losing you. That can be overwhelming.

So start with the abstract. Then, gradually move a little closer: "When Grandma died, did you think her funeral felt right?" or "My friend's mother passed, and they handled things very differently; what do you think about that?" or "When so-and-so was in hospice, how did you feel about the care they received?"

Slow steps. Going slow matters – because when people feel overwhelmed, they shut down. The goal is to keep the gates open, to gently turn the valve and let the conversation flow a little at a time. With patience, it will grow.

Way To Go strives to integrate death as part of life by initiating conversations, providing education, and encouraging people to prepare for end-of-life. We also empower, guide, and support the practice and process of caring for our own dead and dying, in community. One to One: John and Yoko

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 26, 7:45 at Quadra Community Centre: One to One: John and Yoko. On August 30, 1972, in New York City, John Lennon played his only fulllength show after leaving The Beatles, the One to One Benefit Concert, a rollicking, dazzling performance from him and Yoko Ono. Director Kevin Macdonald's riveting documentary One to One: John and Yoko takes that epic musical event and uses it as the starting point to recreate eighteen defining months in the lives of John and Yoko. By 1971 the couple was newly arrived in the United States - living in a tiny apartment in Greenwich Village and watching a huge amount of American television. The film uses a riotous mélange of American TV to conjure the era through what the two would have been seeing on the tube: the Vietnam War, The Price is Right, Nixon, Coca-Cola ads, Cronkite, The Waltons. As they experience

a year of love and transformation in the US, John and Yoko begin to change their approach to protest – ultimately leading to the One to One concert, which was inspired by a Geraldo Rivera exposé they watched on TV. Filmed in a meticulously faithful reproduction of the NYC apartment the duo shared, *One to One: John and Yoko* also includes a wealth of neverbefore-seen material, including home movies and numerous phone call recordings of John and Yoko to offer a unique take on a seminal time in the lives of one of music's most famous couples. "the rare rock doc that's a must-see." (Variety).

OCTOBER 10: SANTOSH. In rural Northern India, the widow of a slain police officer takes his place on a force rife with compromised ethics. The arrival of a charismatic female inspector, who takes the title character under her wing, challenges the prevailing patriarchy even as the pair discover how deep it runs.

Quadra History Reference Source in the Local Library

DID YOU EVER WONDER what the name Okisollo (for our northerly channel) means or who planted the old orchard at Haskins' Farm? You'll get answers to these and other island obscura in a binder of research and writing I've recently placed in the Quadra Island branch of the library.

The compilation of research notes and short articles were written over the past four decades as background for local history books and for property owners caring for significant heritage sites. In some cases, I was able to go into more detail in these pieces than the word count of published books allow, complete with cited sources.

The binder opens with an index and maps and is mainly arranged by place, from Heriot Bay Road to Bold Point and Granite Bay's Lucky Jim Mine; with a sprinkling of community events such as May Day. I've also included recollections written by early residents; and a partial list of the original land holders, arranged by district lot numbers.

The binder focusses upon settlers, but I may later add notes about We-Wai-Kai families, if Band Council permission is granted; and I'll update the articles periodically as I gather more information.

The binder is available for in-house use at the library and a second copy will soon be placed in the Museum at Campbell River Archives. The articles are not intended for publication, but I hope they will inspire your own research and writing, with a nod to your source. Happy reading! *Jeanette Taylor*

Quadra Concerts Presents: Gordon Grdina's Haram - Arabic **Traditions Reimagined**

WE'D LIKE TO EXTEND a heartfelt thankyou to the Quadra community for making our opening concert a sold-out success! Let's keep that momentum rolling with our next event:

On October 4th, the Quadra Island Community Centre will resonate with a sound unlike anything you've heard before, as Gordon Grdina's Haram takes the stage. This is not just another concert — it's a rare opportunity to experience a world-class ensemble that reimagines Arabic musical

traditions through the spirit of jazz, dynamic energy, and fresh, modern textures. And with the community hall's beautiful new sound system, this ensemble will truly come alive.

Led by Vancouver-based oud master and Juno Award-winner Gordon Grdina, Haram has been captivating audiences since 2008. The ensemble was born out of Grdina's deep love of classic Arabic repertoire, from Iraqi folk to the golden age of Egyptian

radio icons like Oum Kalthoum and Farid Al Atrache. But Haram doesn't simply preserve this music; they transform it. By infusing these timeless melodies with rich harmonies, vibrant rhythms, and bold arrangements, the group creates something entirely new — a meeting of past and present, tradition and innovation.

Over the years, Haram's repertoire has expanded to include Sudanese and Persian influences, drawing in the hypnotic grooves of 1960s and 70s Sudanese music while exploring the subtle intricacies of Persian modes. The result is a sonic journey that moves fluidly between moments of meditative stillness and surges of joyful, driving rhythm. Their performances are known for their intensity and emotional power, offering listeners an experience that is both deeply moving and exhilarating.

Haram is also remarkable for its lineup, bringing together some of Vancouver's most celebrated creative musicians: Gordon Grdina - Oud, Guitar Jesse Zubot - Violin Chris Kelly - Saxophone François Houle - Clarinet Emad Armoush - Vocals/Ney Kenton Loewen - Drums Tim Gerwig - Darbuka Karlis Silens - Bass

Neighbourly Kindness Returns to Quadra

SOME OF Quadra's best ideas are born at the kitchen table, on forest trails, or in casual conversations at the supermarket. The Neighbourhood Mini-Grant Program aims to help bring these small ideas to life with a little support and a lot of heart.

This fall, you can once again apply for up to \$500 to bring our neighbours together in simple and meaningful ways. The application period begins on September 15 and ends on October 31, 2025. Application materials are available online at neighbourhoodsmallgrants. ca in nine different languages.

This year's theme is "neighbourly kindness," which is fitting for Quadra, where generosity is expressed in many small and more quiet gestures.

Last year's projects were as diverse as the people behind them. Anita Murdoch introduced yoga to students at Quadra Elementary School, filling classrooms with the quiet concentration of breath and movement. Lois Taylor's Curious Co-op Learners brought together more than fifty people to imagine how cooperatives could strengthen the island's resilience.

Some gestures of kindness were quieter: Melanie Circle added five carefully selected titles to the End of Life and Caregiving Library. Others rolled up their sleeves: with a new chainsaw funded by the grant, Nevil Hand and the Beach Clean Dream Team sawed driftwood.

And at the community centre, the Community Kitchen turned its grant into a festive December dinner that brought 160 people together to enjoy good food and good company - no donations were required that day, just the gift of being together.

None of these projects were large in scale, yet they enrich our community in impressive ways. That's the power of the Small Neighbourhood Grants program: it turns small sparks into shared experiences.

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Hello, the seasons are turning, and the cozy joys of autumn are close at hand. This report has news about municipal interest in joining the electoral area planning service, and progress towards a wood-chipping service in collaboration with Cortes Island.

MUNICIPAL INTEREST IN JOINING ELECTORAL AREA PLANNING

In August the Board received a short report and legal opinion outlining the costs and timing of municipalities joining the SRD's Planning Service. The Planning Service serves the four electoral areas of the SRD: decisions made through this service include zoning and subdivision bylaws, official community plans, development and variance permits, and other land use matters in the Electoral Areas (EAs) only. Municipalities can decide to join and pay for the EA (Part 14) Planning Service, allowing them to vote on Electoral Area planning issues, but they cannot utilize the planning services – they must manage their own land use planning within their own municipality.

At the August Board meeting this report was referred to the Municipal Services Committee (MSC) for discussion; this took place September 9. At the MSC meeting, Directors from the City of Campbell River were clear in their interest in joining the planning service despite a \$450,000+ annual cost to City ratepayers.

CAMPBELL RIVER COMMENTS

There was a robust discussion at the MSC meeting. Comments include Director Chapman who said 'growth is going to happen at the north end of the island whether we like it or not. I would like to control how that happens, where it happens and when it happens. This is us getting ahead of the train instead of being dragged behind it.'

Director Lanyon stated 'we need to have a more unified reputation as a region for development... Right now, it's a very small group influencing the land use decisions for a large area. A lot of those decisions are made not for what I would say are for mathematical, economic, or logical reasons. They're made for ideological reasons and that really bothers me.'

NEXT STEPS

The municipalities moved to 'refer the concept of joining the Planning Service to each municipal council for consideration and a request to report back the Board'. This will be discussed at the September 17 Board meeting, which is after me writing this report and before it is published.

SRD IS A FEDERATION

The Strathcona Regional District is a federation, a partnership of municipalities and electoral areas coming together to deliver services which makes sense to handle together, things like emergency services and regional housing.

Rural Electoral Areas have unique, community-led visions enshrined in Official Community Plans and zoning bylaws. Site specific OCP amendment applications are brought to the community through a public hearing process and decisions are thoughtfully considered by the four Electoral Area Directors in the Planning Service. Having five Campbell River councillors at the decision table pushing their desire for development onto the rural Electoral Areas is challenging to for me to reconcile with the federation model.

I've already heard concern from constituents on this. Comments I've received include 'I live here because it's quite different from town. Not everyone wants mass development', and 'I choose not to live in a municipality, why should I be ruled by it'. I appreciate the apprehension and view the issue with concern. Stay tuned, I'll be sure to share more on this as it unfolds.

And now for some completely different news... WOOD-CHIPPING & CLIMATE RESILIENCE SERVICE

Residential wood-chipping offered by the SRD was well-used by islanders working to FireSmart their properties. For a few years the service was funded by a provincial grant, however that stopped in 2024 because the grant must support a variety of wildfire risk mitigations, not just wood-chipping.

Since then, myself and Director Vonesch of Area B/Cortes Island have been considering how best to provide this important service to islanders, and working towards creating a 'capital S' Service. A wood-chipping service would provide certainty that wood-chipping could be provided annually, potentially without the restrictions mandated by the grant

funder (under the grant, woodchips were unable to be returned to the homeowner).

A big benefit of creating a Service is that other climate resilience grants can be applied for, as grants must have a Service to connect the funds to. Plus, having a shared service means that the participants (Areas B & C) would vote on decisions, rather than the whole Board.

DISCUSSION CONTINUES

Discussions about the Service are ongoing at the Electoral Area Committee. We recently made some recommendations to staff and are looking forward to a draft bylaw in the coming months. I reported on the beginnings of this in August 2024 and now its September 2025: yes, local government moves slowly, but it does lumber along.

REFERENDUM QUESTION IN 2026

As you are likely aware, to begin a new Service require elector assent, which can happen through an Alternative Approval Process (AAP) or a referendum. I've heard from many folks that the AAP process is not preferred as it requires those in opposition to fill out an analogue form and submit it to the SRD, while those in support are not included in the process. Director Vonesch and I agree that a referendum question on the October 2026 election ballot is a cost-effective path to determine community support on a wood-chipping & climate resilience service.

CAMPBELL RIVER

Just Like Home

THE SRD (Strathcona Regional District), together with its partners the Campbell River Hospital Foundation and Seymour Pacific Homes gathered yesterday, September 10th to celebrate the official start of construction for the Just Like Home (JLH) Lodge and Healthcare Workforce Housing project.

The milestone event took place on the traditional unceded territory of the Laichwiltach people and opened with a ground blessing led by Shawn Decaire, hereditary chief of the We Wai Kai Nation, together with his son Kye Decaire. Community members, government officials and project partners came together to mark the beginning of a project that will strengthen healthcare access for the North Island and Central Coast region.

The Just Like Home Lodge will offer a safe, supportive, and affordable home-away-from-home for patients and their loved ones travelling to Campbell River for medical care not available in their communities. Conveniently located next to the Campbell River Hospital, the Lodge will feature ten private units with washrooms, alongside a shared kitchen, laundry, day room, and communal living spaces that provide the comforts of home. With accessibility and comfort at its core, the Lodge will help families stay close and focus on healing rather than the challenges of travel and accommodation.

The project also includes 20 workforce housing rental suites, ranging from studio to two-bedroom layouts. These self-contained units are designed to help attract and retain doctors, nurses, and other essential healthcare professionals by easing the region's critical housing shortage. Together, the Lodge and workforce housing represent a transformative investment — enhancing patient care while strengthening the stability of the healthcare workforce across the region.

"This project is about more than construction — it's about care, community, and hope," said SRD Board Chair, Mark Baker. "The Just Like Home Lodge and Workforce Housing will directly benefit patients, families, and healthcare workers across 32 communities and improve healthcare access for more than 57,000 people in our region. Today's groundbreaking is a true celebration of what collaboration and community spirit can achieve."

THE QUADRA PROJECT

Toxic Positivism

THAT WE SHOULD ALWAYS look on the bright side has gone too far and may be damaging our wellbeing." This is the opinion expressed by Conor Feehly in "The Happiness Trap" (New Scientist, June 8, 2024).

The problem with repeatedly chanting such mantras as "I am a lovable person" or "Every day in every way I'm getting better and better," explains Feehly, is that they don't work. Assertions such as "happiness is a choice" and that "I am in control of my emotions" turn out to be fallacies. "It's going to be okay" may be false optimism. Devising strategies to avoid negative emotions is what Susan David of the Harvard Medical School calls "the tyranny of positivity." Psychologists have found that these exercises in self-affirmation are ultimately ineffective primarily because they aren't believed by those who are reciting them. The long-term effects are really to cause damage because they create a world of illusions, described as "toxic positivism."

The present status of emotions was not particularly important until 1998 with the emergence of the positive psychology movement. But long before this recent trend was the traditional philosophy that humanity was special, and that civilization was an ascending process that would affirm just how amazing humanity was. "Toxic positivity" is the personalization of that philosophy.

Humanity's unrealistically positive attitude about itself can probably be traced to the ascension of human power that began with the Agricultural Revolution of 12,000 years

ago. More recently, it was amplified by the Industrial Revolution and further exaggerated by our current Technological Revolution. But it was aided much earlier by the Greeks who thought of humanity as just one level beneath the gods, by the privileged position given to humanity by Christianity, by the "man the measure" attitude of the Renaissance, and by later biology that has defined Homo sapiens as the pinnacle of evolutionary theory. The "pursuit of happiness", with its roots in the 17th century became a guiding principle of the 18th century Enlightenment and was even enshrined in the American Constitution as a human right. The dubious validity of this argument is best summarized by a quote attributed to Mark Twain in his Letters to the Earth: "Man is the noblest work of God. Now I wonder who got that idea?"

Studies did find, however, that an optimistic outlook did lead to healthier and longer lives, but both an unrealistic optimism and an unrealistic pessimism had the opposite effect.

But other studies show a broader application of "the happiness trap" is connected to socioeconomic status. People who are poor tend to be blamed for their own poverty, whereas people who are affluent tend to ascribe their prosperity to hard work and good choices. Social blame is not likely to make the poor more positive about their poverty, but the psychology is likely to make the rich feel less guilty about their wealth.

Such psychological dynamics are not going to help us in an environmental crisis where the laws of physics and biology are determining our planet's changing climate and the resulting ecological impacts. Indeed, this "tyranny of positivity" may ultimately be a facade of denial that is both delusional and dangerous.

The global environmental crisis is an existential one with deep roots in our psychological, philosophical, mythological and religious past, which is why it is so difficult for us to confront and surmount. It questions who we are as a species, and casts into doubt the fundamental opinion we have of ourselves. If we are now capable of destroying the biophysical structure of our entire planet, and perhaps ourselves in the process, then what does this reveal about who we are? Such a looming possibility doesn't leave much room for positivity. Indeed, the folly of this attitude may be much more toxic than we care to imagine.

For a Strong Start to the School Year

AS FAMILIES are busy with the return to school, Island Health's Public Health team is reminding parents and caregivers to take proactive steps to support their children's health and well-being, ensuring a strong start to the school year and in life.

"It's normal for children to feel both excitement and anxiety at the start of the school year," says Island Health medical health officer Dr. Carol Fenton.

Parents and caregivers can support children by:

- Taking time to talk openly and validate their feelings.
- Model being calm to help children coregulate
- Establishing consistent routines for sleep, meals, and homework.
- Making opportunities for physical activity and time outdoors.

"Anxiety can become more serious and persistent," says Dr. Fenton. "If anxiety is getting in the way of day-to-day activities, like going to school or spending time with friends, then it's time to talk to a doctor or mental health professional."

Supporting children's physical health is also important to prepare them for being back together with all their classmates. With recent cases of measles reported in BC and abroad, it is especially important to ensure children's immunizations are up to date.

"Measles spreads easily through the air, especially in places where people gather closely—like schools," says Island Health medical health officer Dr. Christina Kay. "With students back to class, and many families having travelled over the summer including to areas where there are measles cases, we should ensure children are fully immunized to protect them from vaccine-preventable illnesses that can cause serious illness, long-term disability and even death."

One in 10 people who get measles are hospitalized.

Children and youth are eligible for vaccines protecting them from more than a dozen diseases including polio, chickenpox, meningitis, and human papillomavirus (HPV). To book an immunization appointment or check your child's records, visit the Island Health immunizations webpages or a local public health unit. Immunization records can also be accessed online through the Health Gateway.

The world is heating up fast and horridifying, (cool new word), on all levels. We are on fire. An intelligent person can't ignore that change is not a choice anymore.

No longer should you ask why environmentalists are resisting corporate destruction. Instead, you should be asking us for permission to harvest parts of our lungs.

In reference to logging Primary Forest Block 12-651, which is wrongly classified as second growth and is both a wildlife corridor and is clearly defended by the island community, please know that I and others are thinking that you will have to harvest it over our dead bodies. It is important that people are willing to step up to defend what we love and need, to survive.
