

**A Quadra hiker asks
'How Long Can This Go On?'**

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Friday Flicks Feb 13 & 27

ON FEBRUARY 13TH, a great Valentines Day date suggestion, at 7:45, Quadra Community Centre, Friday Flicks presents Peak Everything (Amour Apocalypse) Canada. Writer-director Anne Émond (Night #1, TIFF '11) has reinvented the romantic comedy for the age of ecological anxiety. Winsomely pairing Patrick Hivon (TIFF '17's Les affamés) and Piper Perabo (Coyote Ugly), Peak Everything suggests that there is no better time to open your heart than when the world seems on the cusp of collapse. Despite his regimen of exercise and antidepressants, Adam (Hivon), proprietor of a Quebec kennel, cannot help but despair over the ever-escalating climate catastrophe. One night, while feeling especially hopeless, he calls the tech support line for his newly acquired therapeutic desk lamp, believing it to be a crisis help line. He gets lucky: on the other end is Tina (Perabo), who's relieved to talk about something more meaningful than assembly instructions. The pair connect over their shared existential worries and, when an earthquake rocks Tina's Ontario town, Adam takes the opportunity to drive there and help this woman he's never seen. Environmental dread brought these two together on the phone, so it's only fitting that a natural disaster prompts them to meet. This sets the couple off on a path of romance and adventure. Peak Everything is a wild ride, populated by conspiracy-theorizing drug dealers and comically entitled Gen Zers, and offering Adam numerous opportunities to confirm his worst fears about the state of the planet. But at the core of this over-the-top love story are eternal questions about how best to use our time on this Earth, how to truly care for each other — and how to accept ourselves as we are. 'Peak Everything' turns climate anxiety into a Canadian love story worth watching. – TIFF

FEBRUARY 27 Sentimental Value (Norway, Germany, Denmark, France, Sweden, United Kingdom). Joachim Trier returns with a poignant, darkly comic portrait of fractured family ties and artistic ambition. A fading film director (Stellan Skarsgård) disrupts the lives of his estranged daughters when he returns to their childhood home with plans to shoot a deeply personal biopic. As old wounds resurface, Nora (Renate Reinsve), a celebrated actress battling anxiety, and Agnes, a steady but scarred mother, must confront the legacy of abandonment, art, and emotional manipulation. An intimate, moving, and often funny film about family, time, and how we sometimes need to rewrite the stories we tell about ourselves in order to survive.

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Why Affordability Matters

IF FOOD ISN'T AFFORDABLE, people simply can't shop locally. It doesn't matter how community minded a business is, affordability is the foundation of food security. That reality is exactly why we are pursuing the co-operative model for our island.

Quadra's small independent grocers play a vital role in maintaining competition. Without them, pricing power concentrates in the large franchise and history shows that less competition rarely leads to lower prices. Protecting local options is about protecting choice, affordability, and resilience for our community.

Across Canada, large grocery chains continue to report record profits, while families feel the pressure of rising food costs that help fuel those profits. When households are forced to take their grocery dollars off Quadra Island, the impact is felt locally by resulting in fewer services, independent businesses struggling, and ultimately fewer choices for our community.

A co-operative works differently. By purchasing through a non-profit co-operative wholesaler and keeping ownership local, profit does not leave the island. It's reinvested back into the co-op, supporting long-term operations and pricing affordability. This approach creates a path toward narrowing the gap between island and off-island prices.

At its core, the co-operative model is designed to serve everyone. It is built on shared ownership, responsibility and benefits.

Today's economic pressures are reshaping communities everywhere; co-ops offer a practical way for people to regain control over essential food services and other community amenities.

This transition takes time, effort, and community involvement. Meaningful change rarely comes from waiting for solutions, it comes from people choosing to invest in their own backyard as much as they can.

We appreciate the conversations, questions, and constructive feedback. They help ensure this co-op is being shaped for our community. Together, we are working toward a future where affordable food is not a privilege, but a shared community value. Supporting our neighbours is our business.

Sustainable Tourism Plan Engagement Process Launches for Quadra Island

THE DISCOVERY ISLANDS Chamber of Commerce, in collaboration with the We Wai Kai Nation, is pleased to announce the launch of a Sustainable Tourism Plan engagement process for Quadra Island, beginning with a community session on March 14, 2026. This planning process will be shaped by local voices, grounded in community values, and focused on long-term community wellbeing.

The Sustainable Tourism Plan will build on Quadra Island's recently completed Economic Diversification Plan and will draw on the extensive community input gathered through that work. As it moves forward, the plan will support long-term economic vitality while protecting the environmental, social, and cultural values that make Quadra Island unique.

Tourism is already part of life on Quadra Island. This planning process is not about attracting more visitors at any cost. Instead, it will carefully consider local capacity and infrastructure realities, including transportation, services, and seasonal pressures.

"This plan will be about balance — supporting livelihoods while respecting our environment, our capacity, and our quality of life," said Carol Ann Terreberry, President of the Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce. "We heard clearly from residents and businesses during the Economic Diversification process. Rather than pursuing growth for growth's sake, this work will focus on quality over quantity, ensuring tourism contributes positively to community wellbeing and economic diversification."

From the perspective of the We Wai Kai Nation, collaboration and care will be central to the process. "Tourism has a role to play in our shared future, but only when it is guided by respect, responsibility, and relationships," said Jason Wilson, Director of Economic Development, We Wai Kai Nation. "This planning process is an opportunity to

work together to ensure tourism supports community wellbeing, honours culture, and protects the lands and waters that sustain us all."

As it unfolds, the Sustainable Tourism Plan will focus on practical, real-world priorities, including:

- Supporting local businesses and workers so they can thrive year-round
- Improving how visitors and peak seasons are managed
- Encouraging tourism that aligns with Quadra Island's values and limits
- Protecting ecosystems and natural resources
- Strengthening collaboration across the community

The Discovery Islands Chamber of Commerce encourages community members, businesses, and organizations who care about the future of Quadra Island to participate as the plan takes shape. Opportunities for engagement and input will be shared throughout the process. The Economic Diversification Plan can be viewed at quadraedp.ca.

She was head of the provincial State of Environment Reporting Unit for the next six years, then the Executive Director of the Salt Spring Island Conservancy until the end of 2011. Linda now devotes her time to writing, teaching and consulting. She is the author of two books: *Backyard Bounty: The Complete Guide to year-Round Organic Gardening in the Pacific Northwest* and *West Coast Gardening: Natural Insect, Weed & Disease Control*.

How Long Can This Go On?

LAST SUMMER we started up the Nugedzi Trail from Granite Bay Rd. It was hot, the forest was cool. A short way up the forest was cut open by a logging road with clearcuts going off to right and left. We crossed and carried on – but the joy was subdued.

Quadra has unique biodiversity with dense coastal forests and varied wildlife. Summer is coming and tourists will be visiting this beautiful forested island to get out hiking and biking with friends and family, to enjoy the beautiful trails, forests and lakes we are blessed with on Quadra Island. Have many of you noticed that many of our trails and recreational areas are being targeted for clearcutting? Instead of the cool forest, ferns and mushrooms, in many areas we are now walking through or beside an oven of dried debris.

Discovery Island Forest Conservation Project (DIFCP) has shown that the rate of logging on this Island is unsustainable – more than eight times than is recommended. The scientists and forest managers that authored the Biodiversity Guidebook back in 1995 (B.C. Ministry of Forests, Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks) stressed biodiversity in the forests required preserving at least 34% old and mature forest for our biogeoclimatic zone on Quadra. This would preserve some wildlife habitat, support water retention in the soil to ensure adequate moisture through the ever-hotter summer months; keep the streams running, the fish happy and the lakes filled. Water needs to be absorbed and stored underground feeding watersheds and wells. Mature intact forest cover protects from

wildfires, flooding and landslides.

However, only 18% of Quadra Island is preserved in parks. TimberWest's TFL47 covers over 30% of the public land on Quadra, where they are literally clearcutting around old growth trees leaving a few standing alone in the slash, and cutting into watercourses and community trails.



With the 1925 fire and continuous logging, only about 3.8% of old forest is left. Yet TimberWest continues to ignore the 2004 order to designate these last remaining fragments of old and mature forest ecosystems as legally protected Old Growth Management Areas (OGMAs).

The lack of government oversight means there has been no incentive for Mosaic to take the concerns of local residents seriously; many have spent years trying to engage with Mosaic to provide input into logging plans, expressing concern with clearcutting that intrudes on the beauty of the local environment, and degrades the watersheds and trails that are so important to the local community. The intact forest ecosystems that provide the foundation

for local communities also support a vibrant, sustainable local economy of eco-tourism and small business providing many local jobs keeping money on the island!

The recent and proposed cutblocks in TFL47 intrude on old growth areas and well-used hiking and biking trails of the island, degrade the ecosystem integrity of the forests, the aesthetic/visual landscapes, and deface the shorelines, seriously interfering with the 'Supernatural BC' experience of fishermen, boaters, hikers, bikers and kayakers!

Cutblocks around Blindman's Bluff, Missing Links, Morte Lake and Maude Island access trails, trails into Nugedzi Lake and Mt. Seymour should not be allowed! The access off Hyacinthe Bay Road will become an active logging road into several more clearcuts, with obvious

negative impacts. Eagle Ridge trail is slated to be clearcut right up to the trail along the big wetland and pond, and Hyacinthe Creek watershed is losing more of its forest cover!

Mosaic should seriously consider how they can resurrect any social license they have left to operate on Quadra – and ruining the community trails, mature forests and recreational spaces will not do it!

ISLAND FORUM

Federal Appeal Court Says No

HELLO TO ALL,

Now that we have won this battle backed by the Federal Appeal Court [to remove and prevent fin fish aquaculture in the Discovery Islands] we need to remove all reference to fin fish aquaculture in both our OCP and Bylaw.

No farms will be allowed in any of the Quadra OCP nor Bylaw 1460 area by Federal law.

So we must not have any mention of it in our documents. It no longer applies so we need to get it right out of those documents. Shellfish will remain.

All AQ-3 zoned areas must revert to the original zoning which was AC-2. That was the original intent of the Shoreline Zoning Bylaw agreed to by the CSRD/SRD

This should be made clear to the public in the upcoming OCP meetings. Fin fish farms are no longer acknowledged as a vision nor a regulated zone in all of the Discovery Islands (Area C).

Regional Director's Report

Hello,

This report includes news of the SRD investigating land for housing in Heriot Bay and other decisions of interest made at the January meeting of the SRD Board. Let's jump in...

EXPLORING DISPOSITION OF PROVINCIAL LAND FOR HOUSING

I'm excited to share that the Board supported my motion to investigate disposition and suitability of two lots located in Heriot Bay on Quadra Island for development of affordable and attainable housing. These lots are currently owned by the Province.

The move to investigate disposition of the lots follows a staff report I advocated for, a report which looked at public lands near the village centres of QCove and Heriot Bay which may be suitable for affordable and attainable housing. The complete staff report, which includes maps, can be read here: bit.ly/land-for-housing-on-Quadra

Two lots were considered by staff as most suitable to explore further, although they noted there could be constraints which may limit the overall suitability for housing development. Disposition could be a licence of occupation, a lease agreement, a fee simple grant, or market rate land sale. If the Province agrees to disposition of some sort, there would be many subsequent steps. These would include consultation with First Nations, development of a land use management plan, and site condition assessments including environmental, archaeological, geotechnical, potable water and sewage disposal.

Staff advised that Provincial inquiries move slowly, but they do move. I'm happy that we're embarking on this now, because moving forward on housing requires taking steps in many directions.

As we know, land is expensive and an extremely costly barrier on the path to constructing attainable and affordable housing. Collaboration between levels of government to access land is one way we could potentially surmount the financial barrier.

And as a reminder, the SRD can issue tax receipts for land donations, for housing or conservation purposes. If this is of interest to anyone, please reach out to me for details.

NEW FIVE-YEAR CONTRACT WITH QIRS

Following months of meetings between SRD staff and the Quadra Island Recreation Society (QIRS) Board, a new five-year contract has been negotiated and authorized for approval by the SRD Board. This contract is different than previous versions, in that it is a service contract rather than a lease arrangement.

The new service agreement is not bound to a physical site, allowing the QIRS to adapt to emerging interests and opportunities that may be better suited to other locations, such as indoor hockey at the Quadra Elementary School gym, for example.

Additionally, as a service provider (rather than a tenant) the QIRS may be eligible for coverage under the SRD's insurance plan as an

Associate Member. This would be super, as it could eliminate the need for the QIRS to obtain supplemental insurance, thereby reducing insurance costs paid through requisitioned property taxes.

REGIONAL GRANTS IN AID

Following discussion and consideration of regional grants in aid at a January 21 Committee of the Whole, the Board moved that a policy regarding awarding regional grants in aid be prepared for consideration. This policy would include grants awarded via Service bylaw.

While the SRD does not currently have any Services for grants, there could be in the future: in April 2025 the Board requested a report on a regional arts and culture service. It's early days on this topic but in the interests of transparency I wanted to share it with you.

CHAT WITH THE DIRECTOR

Currently I don't have access to an office for monthly meetings, as I've previously offered to folks. While I work on an alternate solution, I am offering an opportunity to say 'hi' and/or check in on a topic of interest one Thursday morning a month at Aroma Cove Café. Help Bring Aquamation to BC

IN BRITISH COLUMBIA, families currently have only two legal options for human disposition: burial – either traditional or green – and flame-based cremation. In contrast, other provinces and many U.S. states have expanded their offerings to include more environmentally responsible alternatives, while BC’s options have seen little change.



In some communities, including ours, we are fortunate to have access to green burial. Natural burial aligns with values of simplicity,

land stewardship, and a positive ecological impact. This option, however, is not available everywhere in the province. In many parts of BC, green burial is either unavailable or cost prohibitive, leaving most families with cremation as the default—and often only—realistic choice.

As awareness grows around climate responsibility, many people are beginning to reflect not only on how they live, but also on how they wish to die. Flame-based cremation, while widely accepted, carries a significant environmental cost. It relies on fossil fuels, requires high levels of energy, and contributes to greenhouse gas emissions. For many families, this impact is at odds with the environmental values they hold.

One alternative gaining attention elsewhere is aquamation, also known as alkaline hydrolysis. Aquamation is a water-based process that uses a combination of water, gentle heat, and an alkaline solution to return a body to its basic elements. Compared to flame cremation, water cremation uses substantially less energy and results in far lower emissions. The remaining bone material is processed into a form similar to cremated remains and can be returned to families in much the same way. Aquamation is already legal and regulated in several Canadian provinces and many U.S. states, where it is increasingly recognized as a respectful and environmentally responsible option.

Policy change is shaped by public engagement. When people speak up about the choices they want, it signals that these options are practical, relevant, and widely supported. If you support bringing aquamation to BC, consider contacting Attorney General Niki Sharma and MLA Anna Kindy to express your interest and to ask about timelines for proposed legislation.

News from a Century Past

QUADRA’S ANONYMOUS COLUMNIST opened his report for January 1896 with the weather. “Snow, the beautiful, nasty, slushy snow. We had about 30 inches last month and about one foot more this month.”

“Mr. Tom Petch, the well-known hand logger and rancher, who has a place at Seymour Narrows, spent Christmas at Hall’s store, Quathiaski Cove, and left there in his canoe in a southeast gale. The wind was fair, but he had to buck the tide, and in Discovery Passage with a strong tide running against a gale, a man soon finds out it is no place for him in a canoe.”

Petch detoured into south Gowlland Harbour, his winter supplies soaked, to wait out the weather with Tom Bell, who I suspect was our columnist.

He noted the sudden death of Charlie Dallas, one of Quadra’s first non-Native settlers, and an obituary that followed provided details. “The deceased was eating his dinner at Sayward’s logging camp, when without the slightest warning he fell from his seat to the floor. His friends instantly went to his assistance, but the vital spark had flown and Charlie Dallas had suddenly crossed the dividing line between life and eternity.”

Dallas was born in Missouri in 1827 and after time in California and Oregon he settled on Quadra in about 1885, where he raised cattle and hogs on a ranch that encompassed much of Buker Road. In 1894, he got an additional land grant in Heriot Bay, which was called Dallasville through the 1890s, but he relinquished it in favour of Hosea Arminius Bull, who also hailed from Missouri.

Hosea Bull would have removed his hat and held it at his chest in memory of Charlie Dallas – but his star was just rising, with plans to make Heriot Bay a local mecca.

The Architecture of Deception: Navigating Digital Disinformation

(Part 1 of 2)

I WAS RECENTLY reading about AI and deepfake memes. Our social media feeds are rife with deepfakes and AI-generated disinformation. I felt it was time to revisit a topic near and dear to my heart.

In the hyper-connected landscape of 2026, information is the primary currency of social and political life. However, this ecosystem is increasingly polluted by disinformation – the strategic dissemination of false or misleading information with the explicit intent to deceive. Unlike misinformation, which may result from a simple oversight, disinformation is a calculated tool used to manipulate public perception and erode social cohesion.

The Algorithmic Incentive

The primary engine behind the spread of disinformation is the underlying architecture of social media platforms. These platforms utilize algorithms designed to maximize user engagement above all else. Because inflammatory, sensationalist, or polarizing content triggers a strong emotional response, it is prioritized by these systems. This creates a “viral” effect where falsehoods can reach millions of people long before a factual correction can be issued.

Furthermore, the rise of Generative AI has revolutionized the production of these narratives. Malicious actors now utilize deepfakes – synthetic media that uses machine learning to create realistic but entirely fabricated audio and video. This technology has effectively lowered the barrier to entry for sophisticated propaganda, making it increasingly difficult for the average user to distinguish between authentic footage and manufactured deception.

COGNITIVE VULNERABILITIES AND ECHO CHAMBERS

Disinformation is most effective when it exploits cognitive biases. Humans are naturally inclined toward confirmation bias, the tendency to favor information that reinforces our existing beliefs. When an individual encounters a “news” story that aligns with their political or social worldview, their critical faculties often diminish.

This is exacerbated by the formation of digital echo chambers. As algorithms continue to feed users content that mirrors their preferences, individuals become insulated from diverse perspectives. In these closed loops, disinformation can circulate unchallenged, eventually becoming accepted as “common knowledge” within a specific community.

THE SOCIETAL TOLL

The ramifications of a compromised information environment are severe and far-reaching. Disinformation campaigns have been strategically deployed to:

- Destabilize Democratic Processes: By spreading fraudulent claims regarding election procedures to suppress voter turnout or incite civil unrest.
- Endanger Public Health: By promoting pseudoscientific “cures” or debunked medical theories that undermine trust in scientific institutions.
- Fuel Social Fragmentation: By amplifying “us versus them” narratives that deepen cultural and political divides.

CULTIVATING DIGITAL RESILIENCE

Addressing the crisis of disinformation requires more than just better technology; it requires a more discerning public. Media literacy is no longer an elective skill but a civic necessity. Experts recommend adopting a mindset of “lateral reading,” rather than staying on a suspicious page, users should open new tabs to verify the source’s credibility and look for corroboration from established, non-partisan organizations.

As we move further into the decade, the ability to navigate this digital fog will determine the health of our global society. Protecting the truth is a collective responsibility that begins with a single, skeptical click.

THE QUADRA PROJECT Reality Through the Rear-View Mirror

WE CAN MAKE some sense of the extent and pervasiveness of our present environmental problems by considering the ideas of Marshall McLuhan, the Canadian philosopher and media theorist who died in 1980. In describing the effects on ourselves of the things that we invent, he coined the expression “the medium is the message,” which was playfully modified to “the medium is the massage.” He summarized the process by saying, “We invent things, thereafter they invent us.” He also aptly described the effect of instantaneous electronic communication as having created the “global village.”

McLuhan argued that the initial content of a new medium – be it print, radio, television or the internet – is the culture that preceded it. For example, the first content of print was the oral stories that came before it. The first content of radio was the material in the written word. The first content of television was the movie. Then the internet made everyone into a movie star. Consequently, as McLuhan explained, we interpret the present in terms of the past, or to use his metaphor, “We drive into the future looking through the rear-view mirror.”

This idea isn’t so strange once we give it a moment of thought. The medium through which we get information transforms the shape of that information into the character of the medium that is presenting it. Print created what we would call the individual as a self-contained identity, someone with the impression that a complete life could be lived without making compromises to social pressures. Radio exaggerated the importance of the human voice; television the importance of the face. But we don’t usually notice these transformations until we eventually become familiar enough with the effects of the new medium to recognize how its distinctive character is affecting us. But once this happens, then we can begin to exploit its capabilities. As a simple example, no one could successfully advertise salad until the arrival of colour in printing and television – salad does not look appetizing in black and shades of grey.

The raw sensations that we get from experiencing our immediate surroundings have to be interpreted for us to make sense of them. To do this, we need some kind of a mental construct to give it order. In

every culture, this is the primary function of mythology. It is the template that we place over raw sensory input to organize it into meaningful experiences. Media has the same effect. The extent to which we get information through media is the extent to which it “massages” our experience into a reality that is based on its particular character. Except for direct experience, which is difficult to get without freeing ourselves from all cultural and media biases, much of the reality we experience has been mediated by some sort of process.

By understanding these mediating processes, we can discern how we are being affected and what they convey about the world around us. For example, thanks in large measure to the empiricism of science, nature is being understood directly without the cultural interference of mythology. Ominously though, according to media theory, the existence of nature as the subject of documentaries is an indication that we are moving into a post-nature phase, a process confirmed by the plummeting populations of wild species. And when weather starts to become a source of entertainment on a TV channel or the internet, this is also an indication of trouble.

We don’t usually notice the ordinary. When nature was intact and everywhere, we did not need parks to remind us what it was because we were always in it. Feelings became the subject of the Romantics during the Industrial Revolution because people were being depersonalized by mechanization. Sadly, the existence of

nature documentaries and nature tourism foreshadows the end of nature.

The future is really unfolding in the present, but what is coming usually surprises us because we don’t know how to read the signs that are heralding its arrival. If we can angle our awareness appropriately, the rear-view mirror of the moment will come very close to telling us what is about to happen.
